## Christmas Mail Speed-Up Hints Given By P. O.

Mailing early and spreading the mail flow out along the entire pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time of the year, according to postmaster Floyd Hokit. The following mailing tips are offered by the Postal Service:

Use Zip codes on all mail. If you need Zip codes for your mailing list, check with the post office.

Wrap packages well, including sufficient padding, a card with your name and address and that of the person to whom the parcel is being mailed in case the wrapping should come off, and a list of the contents of the package.

Address all parcels and cards clearly and most important, mail early. Airmail cards and parcels should be mailed overseas no later than Dec. 10 to assure delivery before Christmas. Gift parcels and cards to distant states should be mailed in early December and those for local delivery by Dec. 15. During the week before Christmas long distance gifts and cards should be sent by airmail.

Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded in case recipient has moved. Cards that have a return address will be returned to sender if they are undeliverable. Cards with five-cent stamps may contain written messages and are given priority in delivery and forwarding.

Under normal conditions there will be no mail delivery on Christmas Day other than Special Delivery. Remember to mark all mail for which you have paid special charges with the type handling it should get.

If a letter is enclosed in a package, it should be noted on the outside and first class postage should be paid for the letter, in addition to the parcel post rate.

During the Christmas season, special sacks will be set up in the patron lobby for your mailing. It would be helpful if you tie your cards in bundles.

## 4-H Rifle Club Shooting Tourney Slated For Dec.

The Crockett County 4-H Junior Rifle Club will hold a club shooting tournament the first three Saturdays in December at the Junior Livestock Show Barn.

Some one hundred 4-H members, both boys and girls are expected to compete for four high individual trophies and sixty award ribbons. Five divisions have been set up for the members to compete in. There is a division for shooters under 11 years of age along with four divisions for junior and senior 4-H members 13 years of age and under and 14 years of age and over. There will be divisions for both boys and girls.

County agent Pete W. Jacoby and Kent Johnston, rifle club adult leader, will be in charge of the tournament.

Winners of the tournament will receive their shooting awards at a rifle club meeting in the high school auditorium on Saturday, December 17, at 7:30 p. m.

## Long Distance Telephone Rate Cut Is Announced

Reduced long distance rates for most station-to-station calls within Texas will become effective January 1, 1967 for customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Southwestern States Telephone Companies and Four States Telephone Companies, according to E. H. Danner, president of the three companies.

State-wide reductions on three minute calls vary from five to fifteen cents on most station-to-station calls over 56 miles in distance within Texas. Reductions for calls over three minutes are even greater, according to Danner. The reductions apply to calls made during the time when "day rates" are in effect as well as to all intrastate (within Texas) station-to-station calls made during the "night rate" hours after 8 p. m. and all day Sunday.

The new tariffs reflecting the reduced rates will be distributed to all offices handling long distance calls at the earliest possible date, Danner stated.

## Brucellosis Test Program Set For Recertification

Crockett County is due for recertification in the Brucellosis Eradication Program, according to a report received by county agent Pete W. Jacoby from Dr. S. B. Walker, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

To receive the recertification, a number of cattle herds in the county will have to be tested for Brucellosis. Herds tested in 1963-64 for recertification and herds tested through the Market Testing Program since February, 1964, will not be required to have their cattle herds tested during the current testing program for recertification.

Several ranchmen in the county will be asked to serve as line-up men when the testing of cattle herds in the county starts. Testing for recertification may start this next week if a testing crew becomes available from the Texas Animal Health Commission.

## Archaeologists To Save Caves In Path of IS 10

Southern Methodist University archaeologists have been awarded a State Building Commission contract to do salvage archaeology near the Pecos River in Crockett County, Texas.

Dr. Edward B. Jelks, associate professor of anthropology, is principal investigator under the \$3000 contract. Mrs. Dessamae Lorrain, a member of SMU's archaeology research staff, will supervise the on-site excavation.

Dr. Jelks said Mrs. Lorrain and a salvage team are already at the site.

"This work will be primarily to salvage data from archaeological sites that would be destroyed by Interstate 10, the new highway being constructed in that vicinity," he said.

Efforts will be made to obtain prehistoric remains from several small rock shelves, or shelters, under which Southwestern Indians presided in the past. The new highway will cut directly across the shelving.

## Crockett Gasser Second Largest In West Texas

The District 7-C headquarters of the Texas Railroad Commission gained its second largest gas well and the JM (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County gained its sixth producer and a 1 1/2-mile southeast extension with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 8 Mitchell, 34 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 430 million cubic feet of dry gas daily.

Production was through perforations at 13,011-14,171 feet, in a 4 1/2-inch liner hung from 12,648-14,426 feet, on total depth of 14,329 feet.

The four-point gauges follow; two hours on a 22-64-inch choke, making 13,157,000 cubic feet of gas, plus three barrels of load water, with bottomhole pressure of 6,400 pounds; 1 1/2 hours on an 18 1/2-64-inch choke, making 8,767,000 cubic feet of gas, plus two barrels of load water, with bottomhole pressure of 6,421 pounds; one hour on a 12.4-64-inch choke making gas at the daily rate of 6,446,000 cubic feet, with bottomhole pressure of 6,435 pounds.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 2,060 feet from the west lines of 49-GC&SF.

Largest gas producer also in Crockett County, is H. L. Hunt No. 1-9 University, Strawn gas producer in the Lancaster Hill multipay field of Crockett County, which was finished in October 1963, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 770 million cubic feet daily through perforations at 6,526-556 feet.

Earlier Concho County held the record with its Holland Oil Co. No. 1 Marlon Hays, producer in the Paint Rock gas field, which was finished Aug. 11, 1961, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 350 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 3,376-86 feet.

"I sincerely believe: "That we must reawaken in every citizen a fierce devotion to supremacy of law and equal justice;

"That we must forever renounce the idiocy that associates glamor and heroism with law-breakers;

"That all criminals must be brought to the bar of justice for realistic handling, not merely maudlin sympathy;

"That means must be provided to defeat the enemies within our borders who are puppets of enemies from without;

"That we must insure by every lawful means that differences are resolved in the courtroom, not in the street;

"That we must adamantly insist that each individual is held responsible for the natural and probable consequences of his acts.

"Let the hoodlum, the racist, the demagogue, and the exponent of anarchy know that the great, quiet power of this Nation lies in the law-abiding citizens, and they will stomach no more. The choice is ours. The time is now."

Precisely because he holds these views, the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation has been Number One on the Hate Parade of the bubbleheads and eggheads, Communists and mobsters for many years. Together, the Hoover-haters exercise tremendous influence. They have destroyed a lot of good people in our time.

The fact that they haven't been able to get J. Edgar

Hoover is cause for thanksgiving. And reason for hope.

It certainly is not because those communications media which "associate glamor and heroism with law-breakers" haven't tried.

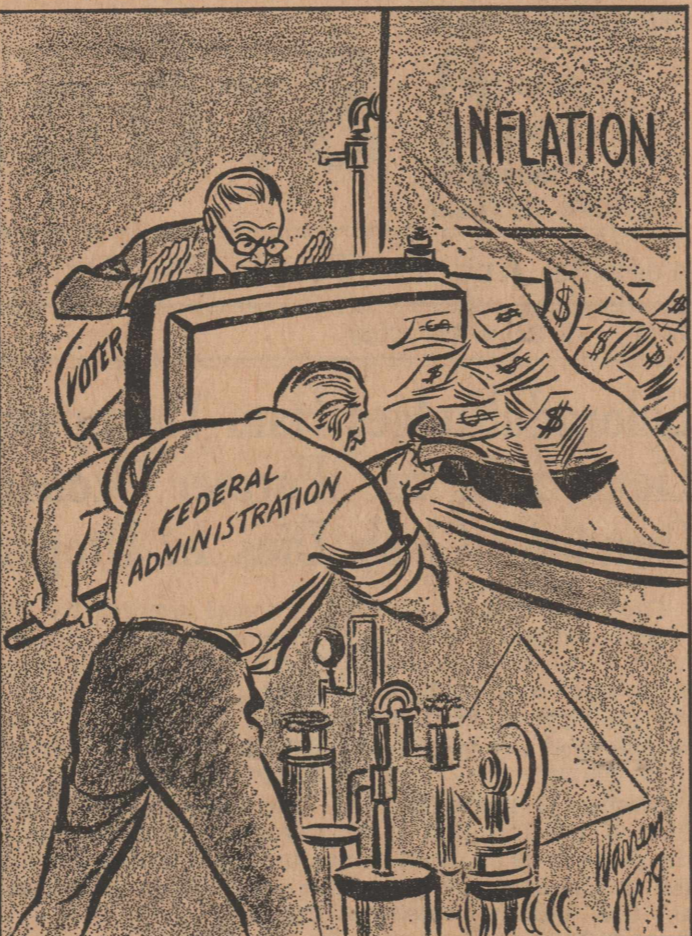

**Second Pay Zone In Crockett Test Is Unidentified**

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1 Aamcker in 35-31-H&TC, Crockett County unidentified prospect, seven miles south of McCamey, 1 1/2 miles west-southwest and the same distance west-northwest of lower Leonard production in the Tippett multipay field indicated production in a second pay with the flowing of oil on a drillstem test in an unidentified formation.

Tool was open an unreported time on the test taken between 5,842-866 feet, on which gas surfaced in eight minutes, no gauges, and oil in 15 minutes, through a 1/2-inch surface choke. Recovery was 2,010 feet of oil and gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was 1,3771 1,653 pounds; 1 1/2 hour initial and two-hour final shut-in pressures were, 2740 and 2,552 pounds, respectively.

Scheduled for 6,500 feet, drilling continued below 6,016 feet.

Production, possibly Clearfork, was indicated earlier, with the recovery of three feet of high gravity oil and the flowing of gas at the maximum rate of 2.9 million cubic feet, decreasing to 1.62 million cubic feet daily on a drillstem test taken between 4,460-97 feet.

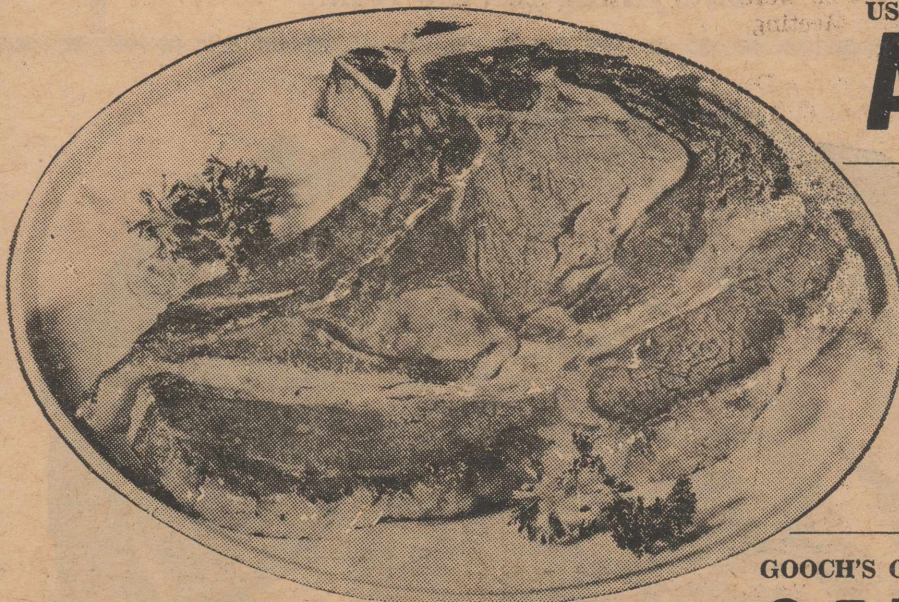

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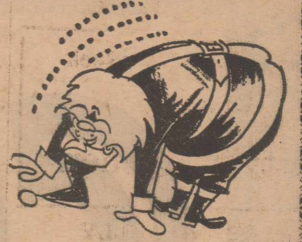

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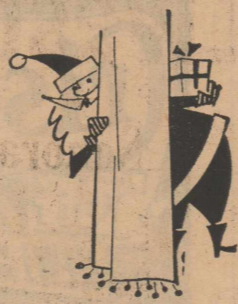

Recipe of the Week

**JALAPENO JELLY**

1 cup sweet pepper (ground)  
¼ cup fresh jalapeno pepper (ground) or hot red pepper  
1½ cups apple cider vinegar  
6½ cups sugar  
1 bottle Certo red or green food coloring  
Remove seeds before grinding peppers. Mix in large pan, peppers, 1½ cups apple cider vinegar and 6½ cups sugar and bring to rolling boil. Remove from heat and let set 20 minutes. Return to heat and bring to rolling boil stirring for 2 minutes. Turn heat to low, add Certo and stir for 5 minutes. If making jalapeno jelly, add green food coloring. Add red coloring for red pepper jelly.

**PARSLEY JELLY**

3 cups prepared juice (2 large bunches parsley and 3 cups boiling water)  
4½ cups (2 pounds sugar)

2 tbs. lemon juice  
1 box (1¾ ozs.) powdered fruit pectin  
few drops green food coloring

Wash and chop 2 large bunches of parsley. Measure 4 cups into bowl. Add 3 cups boiling water, cover, and let stand 15 minutes. Strain through cheesecloth or jelly bag. Measure 3 cups juice into large saucepan.

To make jelly — Measure sugar and set aside. Squeeze juice from 1 lemon, measure 2 tablespoons and mix into juice in saucepan with fruit pectin. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. Immediately add all sugar and stir. Blend in a few drops of green food coloring to make mixture a pale green. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover at once with ¼ inch hot paraffin. Yields about 7 medium glasses.

**CORNCOB JELLY**

12 washed corncobs  
5½ cups juice  
7 cups sugar  
1 pkg. Sure-Jell  
Juice of 2 lemons  
(vegetable coloring option-

al) Break cobs into pieces, cover with water and boil until water is coffee-colored. Measure 5½ cups of corncob juice and add other ingredients after first straining juice in jelly bag. Bring to hard boil in large saucepan and boil for 1 minute, stirring constantly.

With the crazy jelly fad going around, we thought you might like to try these. I haven't tried them, but Mary Kay Brewer has made both the pepper recipes with success and Mrs. Clay Adams made the parsley recipe, which turned out well. However, Mrs. Adams suggested a bit more lemon juice than the recipe calls for. As for the corncob jelly, nobody to my knowledge has tried it, so use your own judgement.

Done up in pretty jelly glasses, they make unusual little tuck-in gifts, to say the least.

There's one lure you'll find in almost every fisherman's tackle box. That's the spinner lure. It comes in various forms and just plain spinners.

It is no secret why spinners are so universally popular. Day in and day out, season after season, a spinner will catch more fish, more consistently than any other lure.

One day I asked a friend of mine who owns a sporting goods store what one lure he would recommend to a man who knew nothing about fishing.

"This one," he said, showing me an Ayu Spinner. It's the Garcia lure with the solid metal body, a treble hook dressed in a bucktail on one end and a revolving chrome spinner at the line end. Evans calls their the Shyster. Dave Hawk calls his the Champion. But the principle is the same.

"Why this one?" I asked. "Because all you have to do is throw it out and reel it in to catch fish," he explained. "It won't catch as many big fish as some other lures, but it will catch more fish."

Old-time fishermen know that the spinner is one of the oldest of all artificial baits. Very likely the first spinner was a bit of shell.

Anyway, the greatest compliment you can pay the spinner is that it has stood the test of time. Other baits have come and gone, but the spinner continues unequalled in its fish catching ability.

Although it is true that spinners will catch fish when simply thrown out and reeled in, they will catch more fish in the hands of the skilled angler. He knows how to vary his retrieve and presentation to conform to present conditions and seasons.

For example, one time he might let the spinner-bait sink to the bottom before starting it back. Another time he might reel it briskly just under the surface. Maybe he will jerk it occasionally, to make it simulate a crippled minnow. Or perhaps he might reel it fast, on top the water, where the spinner churns the surface.

Sometimes even the fly-rod fisherman adds a tiny spinner in front of his dainty fly. This to get more flash and action to his bait. Trollers frequently add a spinner in front of their wobbling baits, to add to their appeal. Spinners have been used as forerunners to plastic worms.

Spinners themselves are available in many sizes, from the tiny creations not much bigger than a drop of water, to large ones the size of a half-dollar. These are attached to a shaft by means of a piece of metal that revolves around the shaft. Each shaft has an eye by means of which it can be attached to a line or to another lure.

Commercial spinner baits are basically of two designs. One is the straight-shaft spinner with the metal body and a shaft running horizontally through it. There's a hook and bucktail on one end, the spinner and line eye on the other.

Second design has an offset spinner. This one is built on a V-shaped piece of wire. On one leg is the hook and bucktail or rubber skirt; on the other is the spinner. The line eye is at the apex.

Although there are many different shapes and designs of spinners, the two most basic and popular are the Colorado and the Willow Leaf.

The Colorado is teardrop shaped while the Willow Leaf is long and narrow.

The thin spinner runs through the water with less resistance and consequently less flash, but it has its place in the angling scheme.

In swift water, for instance the larger Colorado spinner may turn too violently, twist-

ing the line and causing too much flash. This instance would call for the Willow Leaf. But in still waters, the Colorado spinner is better.

If you prefer two spinners on a bait, use the Willow Leaf design. Two Colorado spinners create unnecessary drag and resistance and twist the line even if a swivel is used.

Spinners also come in many colors. They are made from various materials such as stainless steel, nickel, brass and copper. Most popular are the chrome shine and the hammered brass.

Although a spinner creates a flash in the water, this is only part of its appeal. Additionally, it causes vibrations, which attract some fish. So with a spinner you are creating two distinctive motivations which cause fish to strike — flash and vibration.

It wasn't too long back that a spinner was simply fished in the conventional manner, cast out and reeled in. This caused the lure to travel some two to four feet under the surface.

But many fishermen have learned to put the spinner deep. They allow it to plummet to the bottom before starting it back. Or they put it right on the bottom and retrieve it with an up-and-down jigging motion. This lifting the lure up and allowing it to flutter back down keeps the spinners barely tick-tocking.

At times it also pays to skitter the spinning lure along the surface, perhaps over submerged moss or weeds. This can be affected by reeling in the moment the lure kisses the surface and holding your rod tip almost straight up. Thus the spinner will fan the water as the lure skims across the surface.

Beauty of the spinner-type lure is that it can be used effectively in many different ways . . . and it catches fish.

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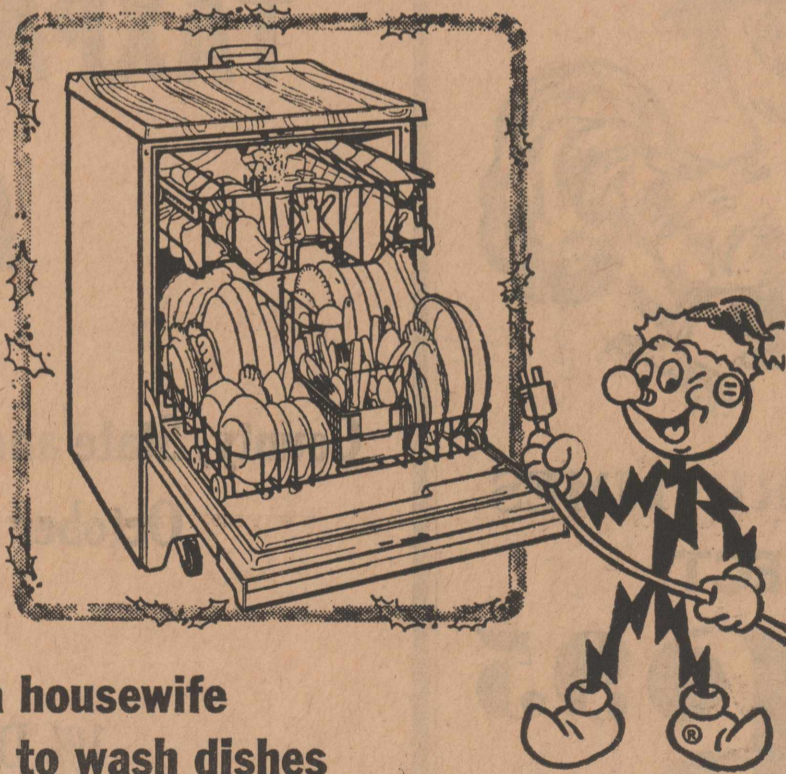
