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UN VETOES INDEPENDENCE

On November 11, 1965, a small nation proclaimed its independence. Normally, there would have been cheers in the United States, welcomes issued by fellow African nations and friendly editorials and commentary around the world.

But, this African nation was Rhodesia, which under the leadership of its white Prime Minister Ian Smith declared itself independent of Great Britain. Immediately, there descended upon Smith and his government an avalanche of stern warnings that they could not take such action — unless they immediately gave Rhodesian blacks a majority voice in the government. (The current ratio of black to white in Rhodesia is about 18 to 1.)

Smith responded by saying that this was the aim of his government but that it would be folly to turn over the reins of government to the African majority until they had proved themselves ready to govern.

Until then, he and his associates intended to keep Rhodesia the politically stable and economically prosperous nation it has always been.

Great Britain has since tried just about everything to force a reversal of Smith's position. Nothing has worked. And now Great Britain has dumped the problem in the lap of the United Nations where sanctions against Rhodesia have been ordained, with the U. S. supporting the sanctions.

To a former U. S. Secretary of State, the charges brought against Rhodesia are "absolutely incomprehensible." Dean Acheson, who ran foreign affairs for President Harry Truman, has commented:

"In the first place, declaring their independence is not, so far as I have been able to read in the (U.N.) Charter, a violation of any of its provisions.

"It certainly was lucky for us that there wasn't any United Nations in 1776 because we not only declared our independence, but went to the

extreme of conspiring with France to engage in international war to get it."

Asked what the U. S. response to the British call for sanctions should be, Acheson replied: "I think we ought to veto it."

Acheson, of course, is no kook extremist, nor is he an opponent of African nationalism.

He is an experienced observer of foreign affairs and, unlike our man in the U. N. Arthur Goldberg, he has troubled to read the U. N. Charter.

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Grocery bills of Texans are increasing. And there isn't much anybody can do about it except shop more thrifflily.

That's Gov. John Connally's conclusion after studying a special committee's report on food prices.

While the cost of market-basket items is going up faster here than for the nation as a whole, food still is a bargain, the committee advised. Connally requested the study by representatives of the University of Texas, A&M University and Texas Technological College.

\$100 Million Tax Bill Possible — Governor Connally acknowledge the tax bill required to balance his spending recommendations to the Legislature next month might well range over \$100,000,000.

In addition to his budget (\$911,400,000 general revenue), the governor will recommend separate spending items, possibly including a teacher pay raise.

Connally and mayors were unable to get together on emergency aid for cities. Mayors want his backing of a one-cent local option sales tax.

Governor prefers a penny a-gallon gasoline tax boost with three-fourths of the revenue (about \$40,000,000 a year) earmarked for city street building, maintenance

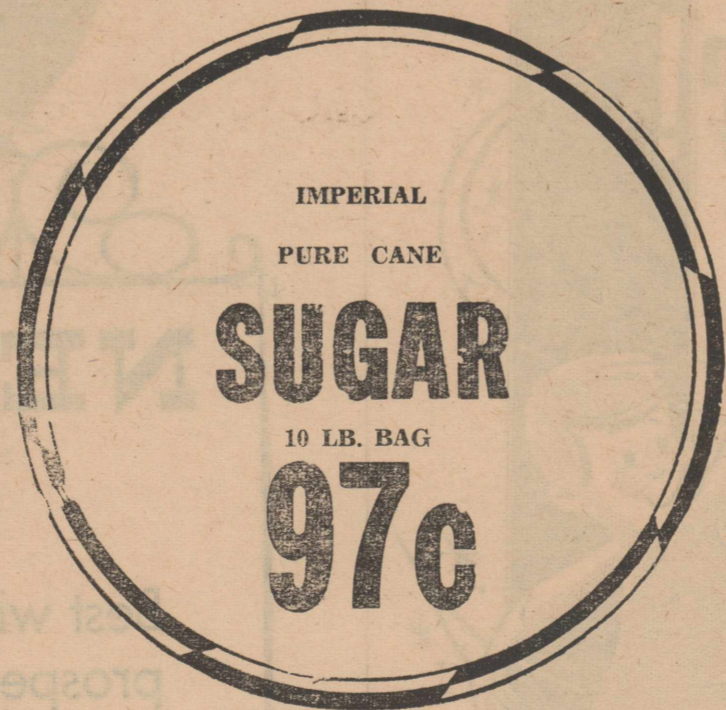

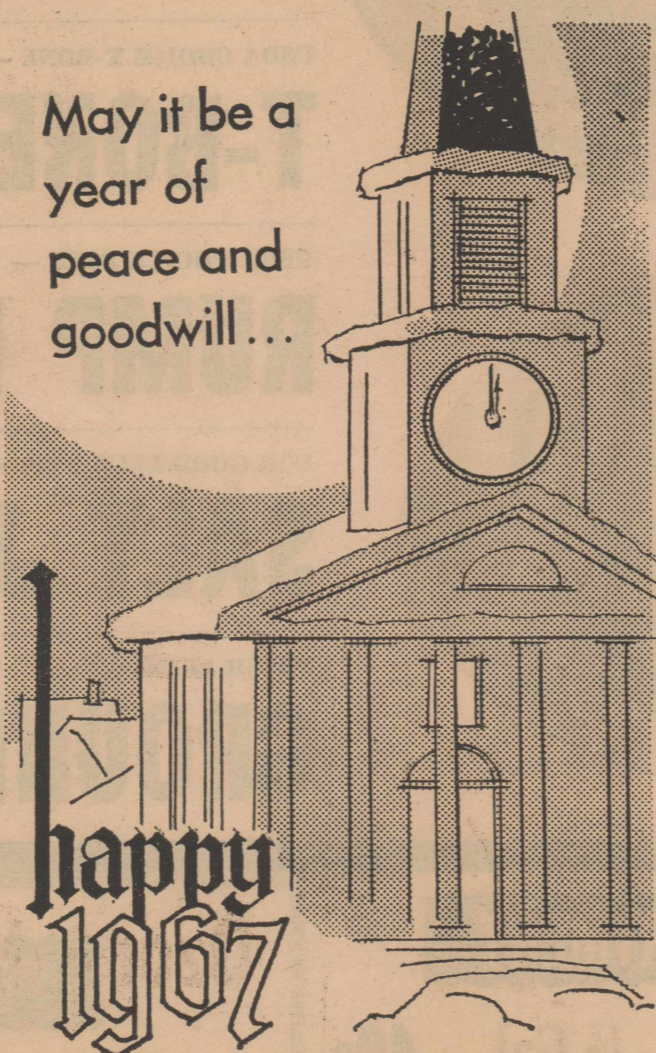

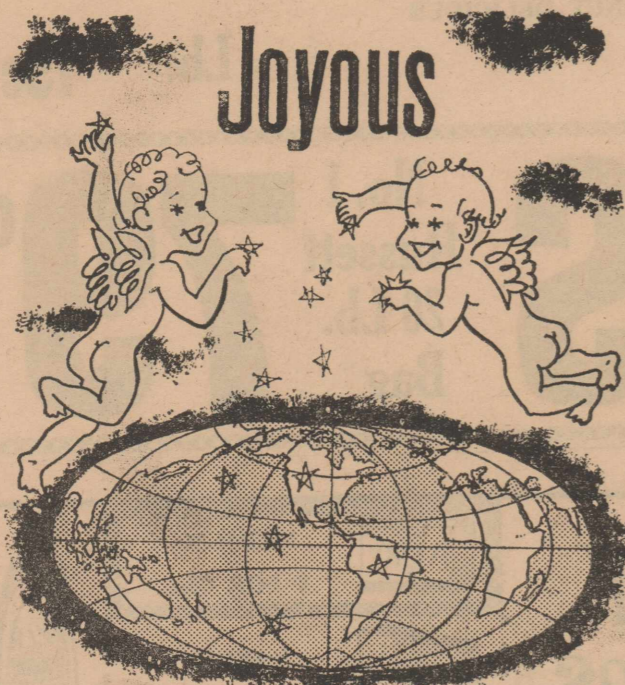

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

Salt And Pepper Straws — For camping conveniences and space-saving purposes, make individual salt and pepper shakers by filling ordinary soda-pop straws.

Pinch one end of straw closed, pour in salt or pepper, then pinch other end closed. Place one strawful of each condiment beside each plate.

Repairing Waders — When your fishing waders become worn and cracked, try covering worn spots and cracks with tire paint. This type of paint won't crack and it's pliable.

Your waders so treated will serve you for several more

seasons.

Don't Lose Your Arrows — Arrows frequently are lost from the quiver. To prevent an occurrence of this sort, fit a 2" chunk of styrofoam into the bottom of the quiver.

Arrowheads then can be stuck into this pliable material. But, a slight pull will release them.

Keep Possessions Safe — Small objects sometimes are lost overboard in rowboats, or other small craft, during rough weather.

Keep such valuables safe by screwing, or nailing, the metal top of a widemouth mason jar to the underside

jar and screw it to the top that you fastened under seat.

Not only will your valuables be out of the weather but they'll also be off the floor, partially hidden and out of harms way.

Light Weight Rations — Experienced sportsmen, out for only a day or two, do not tire themselves by lugging along a lot of heavy cooking stuff. Instead they package a supply of raisins, chocolate chips, and nuts before leaving home. Secured in a plastic bag, these eatables afford

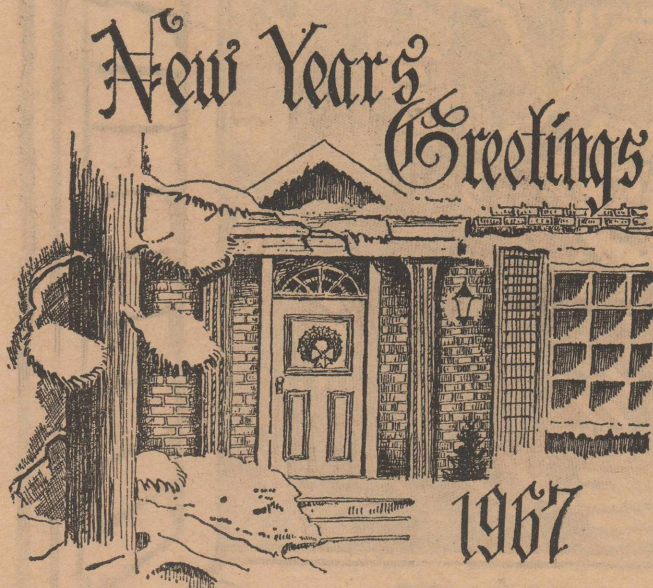
nourishment that is light to carry.

And of course Texas "jerky" can't be beat for energizing, concentrated food.

Loosening Tent Ropes — Loosening tent ropes that have become wet can be a chore.

Make such work easier by digging a 6-inch hole on the tent side of each pole. Then as you slide the poles into the holes the ropes become loosened.

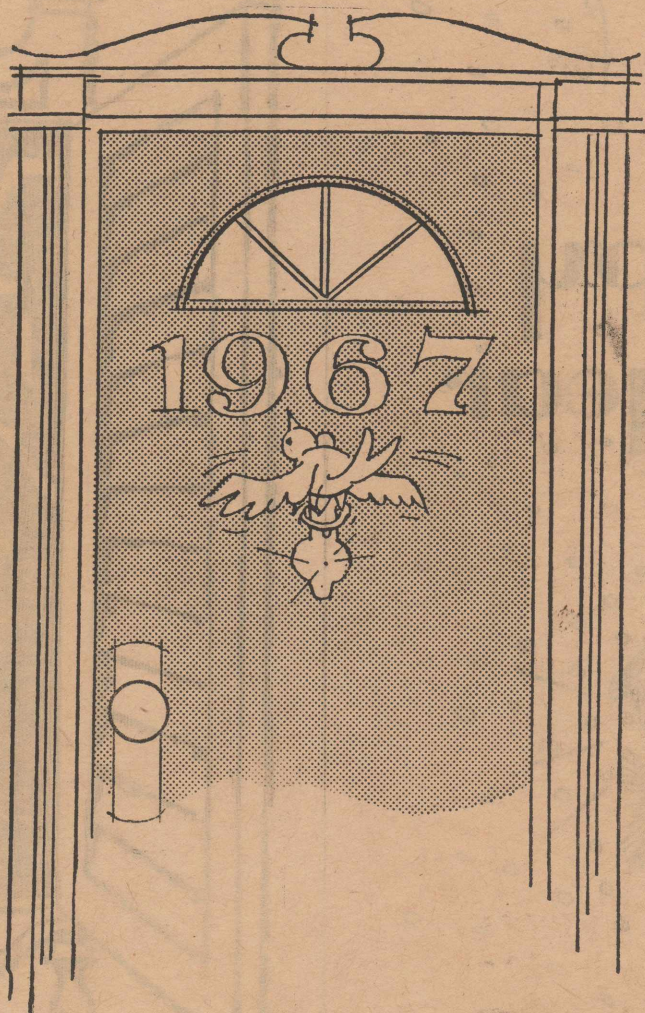

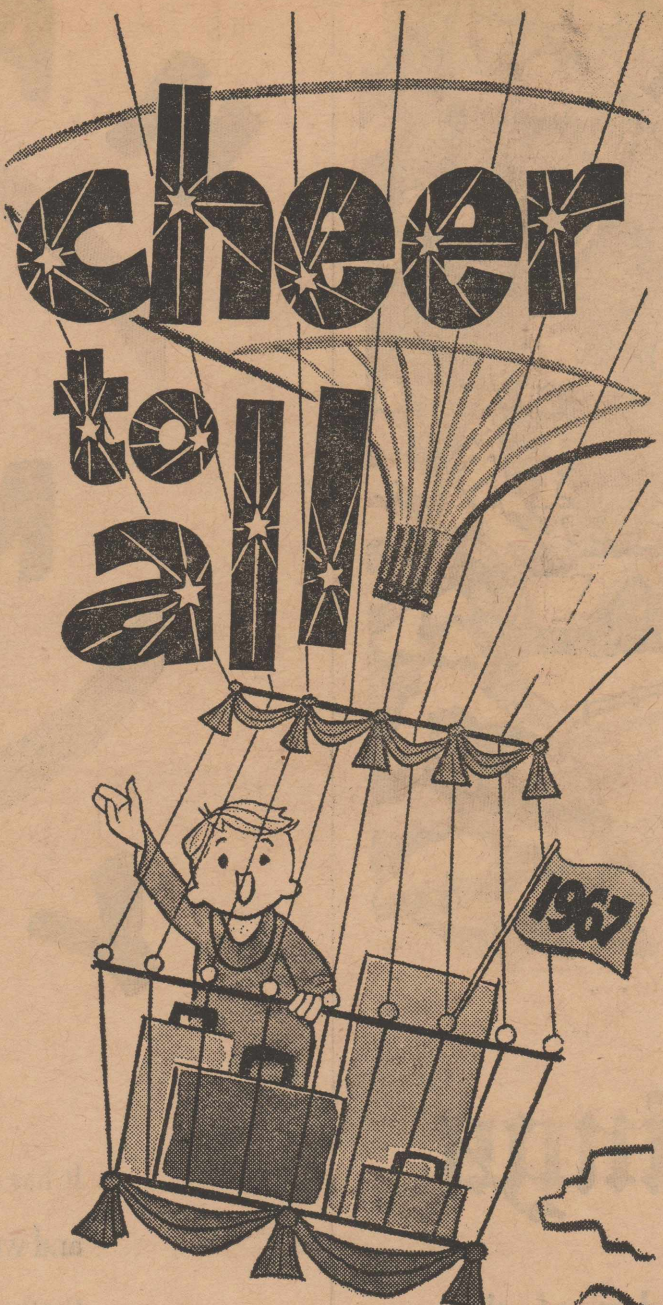

Dual Discovery Noted In Tippet Crockett Field

Crockett County gained a dual Ellenburger and Mckee oil discovery with completion of Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1 Amacker, seven miles south of McCamey, and 1½ miles west-southwest and the same distance west-northwest of lower Leonard production in the Tippet multipay field.

From the Ellenburger, it was finished for 144.04 barrels of 43 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 505-1. Production was natural through a 12-64-inch choke and open hole at 6,598 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 6,639 feet, the total depth.

Top of pay was picked at 6,598 feet, on derrick floor elevation of 2,279 feet. Tubing pressure was 320 pounds,

with packer on casing. From the McKee, it was finished for 126.89 barrels of 43 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 690-1. Production was natural through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,850-864 feet.

Top of pay was picked at 5,850 feet. Tubing pressure was 550 pounds, with packer on casing.

The following tops and bases were reported: Tansill, 785-833 feet; Yates, 833-935 feet; Seven Rivers, Queen and Grayburg, 735-1,685 feet; San Andres, 1,685-2,210 feet; Glorieta, 2,210-2,415 feet; Clearfork and Wichita-Albany, 2,415-4,925 feet; Detrital, 4,925-5,505 feet; and Permian, 5,505-6,639 feet.

Admiral Crude Oil will take the oil. Operator suggested field designations of Tippet, west (McKee and Ellenburger.) Location is 3,250 feet from the northeast and southeast lines of 35-31-H&TC.

Standard Oil Co. of Texas, No. 2-35 University, in 35-7-

University, indicated second producer and location southeast extension to the World, North (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 13 miles southwest of Big Lake, was continuing to test through perforations at 8,002 - 110 feet.

Tested four hours, it flowed six barrels of acid water and 17 barrels of new oil in hours, with tubing pressure of 450-0 pounds. No choke was reported.

Acidized with 3,000 gallons and tested 4½-hours on a 20-64-inch choke, it made 35 barrels of load oil and 47 barrels of acid water, with tubing pressure of 450 pounds.

Testing continued with 35 barrels of load in and 72 barrels of acid water remaining to recover.

The discovery, B. L. McFarland, Inc., Midland, No. 1 35 University, was finished No. 11 for 220.8 barrels of oil through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,050-070 feet.

These statistics debunk a lot of the popular theories about shooting accidents.

Very few accidents happened because the victim was mistaken for game. Most of them were the direct result of careless gun handling.

Often when a veteran hunter brings a weapon into camp or enters a vehicle, the gun is loaded. It shouldn't be! Or he throws it around haphazardly as he slips under a fence — never bothering to check the safety device. Or he props it idly against a tree or stump or fence post . . . where it can easily fall . . . and the jar set off the primed cartridge.

Carelessness is easy to come by. A few years back some Texas nimrods were winding up a dove hunt. A veteran hunter pumped the cartridges from his shotgun. Then he casually pointed the muzzle skyward and pulled the trigger. "BOOM!" went the gun — scaring the daylight out of his buddies.

Sheepishly the guilty one remarked, "Guess I didn't get 'em all out!"

He could have been pointing the weapon toward one of his companions . . . instead of the sky. In that case someone would have become another statistic and there would be one more needless shooting fatality in the books.

Far too few people realize that no gun ever caused an accident. A gun is merely a tool. Blame rests with the human who guides the destiny of the bullet.

Every hunter owes it to himself and to his friends to acquire safety discipline. He must be on the alert and never guilty of gun mismanagement. Good gun manners are acquired through discipline and determination . . . plus consideration of the safety of others.

Most hunting accidents can not be blamed on the young and inexperienced. Statistics prove that the accident levels among shooters usually reach their high peaks after a person has been hunting and using firearms for years. Sometime, after three or four years of hunting, a shooter reaches a point of casual acceptance of gun handling. When that happens . . . watch out!

People are all too quick to shrug off careless gun handling.

In a party of hunters, anyone guilty of such careless violation should be reprimanded. Unfortunately it isn't the careless one who is likely to suffer. Usually it's

the innocent bystander who gets hurt. All of us know that alcohol and gunpowder do not mix. Yet we too often condone the person who nips on a bottle while out with a gun.

We also know that a muzzle, whether loaded or unloaded, should never cross a party. But we let such carelessness pass unnoticed. We know too that loaded guns should never be brought into camp or into a car.

Yes, we overlook the obvious. But — when this happens, the unforeseen should not come as a surprise.

There is absolutely no excuse for a hunting accident. It only happens when someone becomes careless. You don't have to be out wandering through the woods to be in danger. Accidents can

happen in camp, or in your home. Gun handling discipline does not start and end in the woods. It should be ever-present!

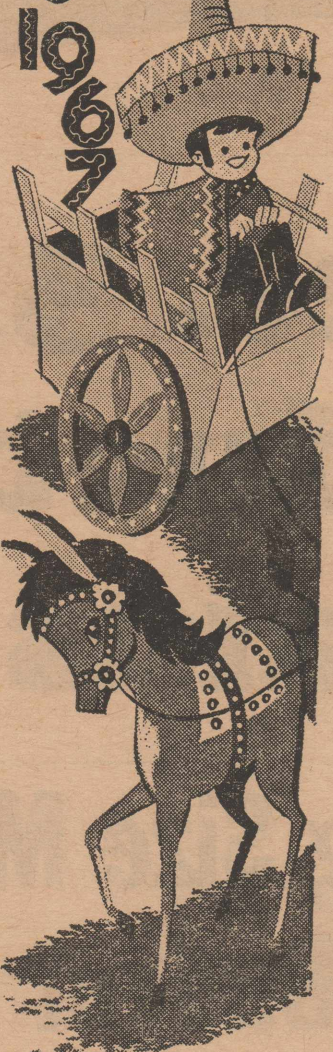

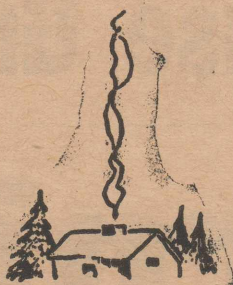

feet. Gravity of the liquid was 56.1 degrees.

It was finalized earlier as a 2½-mile northeast extension to Canyon production for a calculated, absolute open flow of 370,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 102,000-1, through perforations at 7,877-938 feet.

Location is 560 feet from the north and 610 feet from the west lines of 22-KL-TCRR.

The discovery, Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc. No. 1-C McMullan, was finalized Dec. 15, 1965, from the Strawn for a calculated, absolute open flow of 6.4 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 9,084-9,139 feet. It also was dually completed from the lower Canyon.

Stanard Oil Co. of Texas No. 2-35 University, in 35-University, indicated second producer and location southeast extension to the World, North (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 13 miles southwest of Big Lake, swabbed 12 barrels of new oil, along with 40 barrels of unidentified water, in 8½ hours.

Testing continued through perforations at 8,002-110 feet.

The discovery, B. L. McFarland, Inc., Midland, No. 1-35 University, was finalized Nov. 11 for 220.8 barrels of oil through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,050-070 feet.

Place Marker At Yates Oil Field Discovery Well

An official Texas Historical Marker soon will be erected in Pecos County to commemorate the Marathon Oil Company Discovery Well near Iraan in 1926 which opened the fabulous Yates oil field.

Dedication date of the marker will be announced by the Iraan Chamber of Commerce.

The 27 by 42-inch marker will be erected on S. H. 29 in Iraan.

The marker is one of 107 being erected in 49 counties this year through the Texas State Historical Survey Committee in observance of the 100th anniversary of the discovery of oil in Texas and the 75th anniversary of the establishment of the Texas Railroad Commission.

The inscription on the Yates field discovery well reads:

"Marathon Oil Co. Discovery Well, 3.8 Miles South.

"Opening one of the greatest oil fields in the world, Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas Co. (a subsidiary wholly owned by the Ohio Oil Co., whose name has now been changed to Marathon Oil Co) brought in the I. G. Yates A No. 1 well on October 29, 1926. The well at the shallow depth of 1,150 feet had a rated potential daily flow of 72,869 barrels.

"Previously oil men had said: 'You won't find any oil west of the Pecos.' This did not stop the work of Mid Kansas and its partner, Transcontinental Oil Co., later acquired by Marathon. The strike was sensational.

"Scarcely more than a year later, the Yates Field has 100wells — two of which had higher yields than Yates No. 1. Under the 200,000-acre Ira G. Yates ranch and adjoining lands lay one of the largest oil reserves in the world.

"The many developers voluntarily accepted proration. Their plans for allocating and restricting Yates Field production were approved by the Texas Railroad Commission in 1928. This was the first complete proration of an oil field in the state — and an important milestone in petroleum conservation.

The Yates Field now has 607 wells."

In 1903 an automobile race from Paris to Madrid (670 miles) had captured the interest of all Europe. Thousands lined the roads to watch the newfangled gasoline buggies. In the excitement, the spectators refused to stay off the road and many drivers lost control of their cars, killing not only themselves but many spectators as well. The police stopped the race after 343 miles had been run and, in that short distance, 550 people had been killed and thousands injured.
