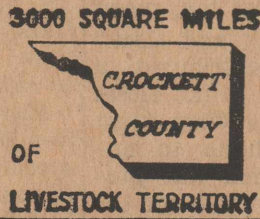

Lions Seek Tie For West Zone In Finale Fri.

Coach Brooks Dozier's Lions will be shooting for a West Zone tie in the district 8A basketball race when they host the Iraan Braves tomorrow night in the last scheduled game of the season. A Lion victory over the Braves would give both clubs a 4-2 zone record and force a playoff game between the schools for the title.

The Lions lost Tuesday night in Rankin 55-52, but the Sanderson Eagles upset Iraan 60-44, giving Ozona another shot in the zone race.

Against the Red Devils, the Lions trailed most of the game before putting on a last quarter rally that almost caught Rankin. Led by the outside shooting of Earlex Williams who hit for 24 points, Rankin jumped out to a 29-21 halftime lead. The Red Devil lead mounted to 45-32 at the three-quarter mark before Ozona put on its 4th quarter drive that fell 3 points shy. The Lions outscored the Red Devils 20-10 in the last stanza. Pacing the Lions scoring was Beto Vargas and Marlin Farris with 12 and 10 points.

In games prior to the varsity tilt, Rankin won the B-team game 78-42 and the girl's game 50-24.

Last Friday night the Lions whipped out a 54-51 win over Sanderson on the home floor. Ozona led most of the game, enjoying a 9 point lead at halftime. But the Eagles put on a last minute rally that suddenly narrowed the gap to two points, with less than a minute to play. The Lions scoring was paced by Rex Bland who hit for 18 points, with 14 points coming in the second half. Vargas added 14 points to Ozona.

Phone Service Disrupted By Damaged Cable

Being the first moisture of consequence in about four months, Sunday night's rain and snow proved a serious if temporary inconvenience for folks living in the Crockett Heights addition five miles east of Ozona. And for the General Telephone Co. it was a king-size headache—and a considerable financial loss for somebody.

The rain seeped into the telephone cable serving the addition, putting telephones in the community 100 percent out of service. Damage to the cable had been inflicted weeks, maybe months ago, during the re-location of the Pioneer Gas Company's pipeline, furnishing gas to Ozona from fields east of town, incident to Interstate 10 construction, E. S. Woullard, district manager of the General Telephone Co. told the Stockman yesterday.

Approximately 2,000 feet of cable will have to be replaced, Mr. Woullard said, and emergency orders were placed immediately for the cable. The cable was delivered Tuesday and telephone company crews were making the repairs yesterday, hoping to have the work completed and telephones back in service by last night.

To meet emergencies, a mobile telephone unit was stationed at Crockett Heights during the interim of the interruption in service, Mr. Woullard said.

Cubs Whip Big Lake In Final Game of Season

Coach Ron Murdock's Junior High Cubs rang down the curtain on this year's basketball season Monday night by beating the Big Lake Owlets 28-14. The Cub seventh graders took an 18-21 win in the first game of the double-header here on the local court.

Taking game honors in the first game was Fernando Garza with 10 points, followed by Cheo Vargas with 6. The Cub A jumped out to a 19-3 halftime lead and were never in trouble. David Pagan was high point man with 14 points, followed by Will Collett with 8 and Phillip Perner with 5.

After taking a 38-19 win over Sonora in the Iraan tournament last weekend, the Cubs were upset 34-32 by Imperial and eliminated from the finals. The Cubs, who were highly favored to win the tournament, just couldn't get started in their game with the Imperial five Saturday afternoon and couldn't find the basket until the fourth quarter. However, they got hot and cut the Imperial crew's 10 point lead to 2 in the last two minutes of the fourth quarter.

Pagan was high point man for Ozona for the two games hitting for 32 points. Will Collett hit for 17 and Jim Montgomery, 10.

Out of 19 starts, the Cubs won 16 and lost 3. Undefeated in regular play, they suffered the losses in tournament play. During the season the squad entered four tournaments and placed in three. They brought home the consolation trophy from the McCamey tournament, placed third in the Eldorado tourney and won the championship at Sonora.

6.3 Miles More Of Hiway 163 To Be Constructed

Crockett county highway construction work totalling \$396,095.60 was awarded this week by the State Highway Commission in Austin and the county shared in another contract totalling \$269,977.05 involving seal coat work in thirteen West Texas counties.

Jones Bros. Dirt and Paving Contractors submitted the low bid of \$396,095.60 for 7,479 miles of construction on State Highway 163, including grading, drainage structures, flexible base and two course surface treatment.

This job will see a 6.3 miles extension of paving on Highway 163 south of Ozona, connecting with the recently completed section five miles south and extending to just south of the Early Baggett ranch headquarters, W. F. Dixon, resident State Highway Engineer, said.

Included also in this project are widening of two bridges on 163 north of Ozona, one two miles north of Ozona, the first bridge north of the Big Lake cut-off road, and the other in Irion county, the bridge on the highway curve just at the edge of Barnhart. The additional mileage includes widening the pavement on each side of the widened bridges.

In another contract awarded by the Highway Commission, that to Strain Bros. of San Angelo, for seal coating 192,684 miles of highways in 13 West Texas counties, Crockett county was included for two projects. One will be seal coating of 17,335 miles of RM 865 from the intersection with State Highway 163 two miles north of Ozona to its intersection with RM 33 and State Highway 29 two miles northwest. An additional segment of 9,754 miles of seal coating will be done on RM 1980, the Iraan road from its intersection with RM 33 and State 29.

The 4-H members were selected on the basis of outstanding achievements in 4-H club work during the past eight years. Both members are Gold Star winners and have won many honors with livestock projects, other 4-H projects and activities.

The 4-H members will attend the honor banquet Friday evening in the Gunter Hotel where they will be recognized for their achievements and will be presented a gold medal.

Saturday, the twenty 4-H members selected throughout the state will be official hosts for all 4-H members in Texas as official 4-H delegates for Rural Youth Day at the San Antonio Livestock Exposition.

The local 4-H members will be accompanied to San Antonio by Charles E. Edgerton and County Agent and Mrs. Pete W. Jacoby.

Without some follow-up moisture the recent fall will not be a great deal of benefit in one of the driest winters the county has endured in several years.

A suit contesting the will of the late Arthur C. Hoover, wealthy Crockett county rancher, has been filed in Crockett county court on behalf of four nephews and nieces of Mr. Hoover by Fred C. Chandler, Sr., of Ozona, as attorney for the plaintiffs.

The plaintiffs in the suit are Lois Brock Hoover, only child of Brock Hoover, de-

ceased brother of A. C. Hoover; Jake Hoover, son of Rowdy Hoover, another deceased brother of A. C. Hoover, and Melba Graves and her daughter, Jill Graves, widow and daughter of Robert Graves, who was a son of Elmer Hoover Hatton, deceased sister of Mr. Hoover, all claiming to be heirs at law of A. C. Hoover, who died in Ozona Sept. 10, 1966.

Named as defendants are the various individuals and institutions who became devisees, legatees and beneficiaries of the Hoover will. Defendants in the suit are the First Baptist Church of Ozona; Hardin Simmons University, Abilene; Howard Payne College, Brownwood; Buckner Baptist Benevolences, Dallas orphanage; Baylor University at Waco; Wayland Baptist College, Plainview; Paisano Baptist Encampment; Peery Holmsley, Elmer D. Graves, Bill Hoover, Jr., Bud Hoover, Hallie Kirkpatrick Wills, William Ernest Dunlap, Donnie Dunlap, Mary Jane Dunlap, Walter Dunlap, Larry Graves and J. Lowell Littleton, all of Ozona; Billy Ray Graves and Buddy Craven of Pecos county; Louise Hoover Michels, Caldwell, Texas; Larry Holmsley, Eleanor Holmsley, Louise Holmsley; Howard Graves, Bander; Marvin Graves, California; Jean Kinser Salmon, Hallie D. Kinser Mankin; Jack Kirkpatrick and Mamie Kirkpatrick Daniels, both of San Angelo; W. L. Nall of Jeff Davis county.

The petition recites that all the defendants, with the exception of the churches, schools and encampment and the defendants J. Lowell Littleton, the Rev. Morris M. Fulmer, (deceased), and W. L. Nall, are heirs at law of A. C. Hoover. Wm. Ernest Dunlap and J. Lowell Littleton have been appointed by the county court as executors of the will and are made party defendants to the suit.

The petition attacks the will and asks that it be "held for naught" on the grounds that "at the time of the execution of the said instrument on the 16th day of March, 1963 (in the place of business of the Ozona National Bank) that the said A. C. Hoover was not of sufficient mentality to know and understand the details and the workings of his business in looking after and carrying on the same with reference to administering any of the details connected with his oil operations and livestock and ranching operations." Re-Entry Planned For Crockett Test

Bill J. Graham, Midland, will re-enter and plug back to 1,600 feet at a Crockett County 1,616-foot wildcat failure, 16 miles northwest of Ozona and 1½ miles south and very slightly east of a recent prolific San Andres gas discovery. It is the No. 1-12 University.

Originally drilled by Ralph Pembroke, Midland, it was abandoned Sept. 10, 1962. Location, exception to Rule 37, is 2,310 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of 12-31-University.

The discovery, McGrath & Smith, Inc. No. 1-A Todd Ranch, was finalized Jan. 6 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 26.5 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 1,165, 1,222 feet.

Nor do we recall that any big metropolitan newspapers assigned reporters to interview Hitler or Tojo to report how American bombers had blasted Berlin and Tokyo. Funny isn't it. We seem to be terribly sensitive about the precious lives of Communists behind the Iron and Bamboo Curtains, not to mention the civil rights Reds at home.

Heave Ho: We read somewhere that a special performance of "Hello, Dolly!" was presented at the White House for the Shepherds of our Great Society. Apparently the big hit of the evening was a line from the show: "Money is like manure — it's not worth a thing unless it's spread around."

This caused everybody to laugh and laugh and applaud and applaud, with the President the most delighted of all. Which suggests that this song ought to be used by the LBJ forces as their

theme song for the next political campaign. It's most appropriate — a two-way thing because you may be sure that both items mentioned in the ditty are going to be thrown around with abandon between now and November, 1968.

Keep the Faith: We see that the Rev. Adam Clayton Powell has a gimmick to pay the libel judgment against him that is one of the reasons he is not in good odor with his fellow Congressmen. He has made a record, a weird thing reminiscent of a revival meeting without much music and with less talent. With the loot from the sales Powell will pay the woman he libeled and the Congress will welcome him back to the fold. It's a good gimmick, especially when you consider that there's a sucker born every minute. But we don't think the idea should stop with the Reverend Adams. Using this system we could empty the nation's jails. All that's needed is a tape recorder in every calaboose. Clearly we already have a never-ending supply of nitwits to buy the output.

IMMORTAL WORDS

Periodically certain phrases creep into the language, have a certain vogue, then disappear. Right now we are hearing such cliches as, "We must build bridges of understanding (with the Communist nations)", . . . "This is the world's last hope for peace (U Thant & Co.)" and "We most show that we are willing to negotiate (what and with whom?)".

An interesting study could be made of such phrases, what brought them into being, what they accomplished and how much sense they make today in the soundtrack of history. Let's consider a few.

President Wilson sent the A. E. F. to Europe "to make the world safe for democracy," in "a war to end all wars." Unfortunately there was another war, but President Roosevelt proved his pacifism when he said "again and again and again I say to you that American boys will not be sent to fight on foreign soil."

When FDR wasn't tossing off quotable quotes some of his associates were. Standing out in a long list of nifties by such experts as Harold Ickles, Ironpants Johnson

and others is Harry Hopkins' classic: "Tax and tax, spend and spend, elect and elect." Harry also contributed a deathless crack to the effect that Americans were "just too damned dumb to understand." Which was probably just as well — for the New Dealers.

Soon after this era other phrase-makers hove into view. President Truman contributed his neighborly "Good old Joe," totally oblivious, it seemed, to the colubering Stalin had just given him at Potsdam. And along about that time someone described the Chinese Communists as "agrarian reformers", and not Communist at all. An eloquent diplomat of that time allowed as how we had to "let the dust settle" before facing up to the Communists in Asia and then recorded for posterity a classic of loyalty with the observation that he had no intention of turning his back on Alger Hiss. Then of course we had a thing called "McCarthyism" a phenomenon which caused professors to bleat that they couldn't speak their mind because of "a black cloud of fear."

After that we heard an eloquent phrase "ask not what the nation can do for

you," by the spokesman for the most prodigal administration in history, till that time. Then came "Come let us reason together."

Maybe the National Archives Building should have a special alcove for such gems. It could be called "America's Laughing Gallery."

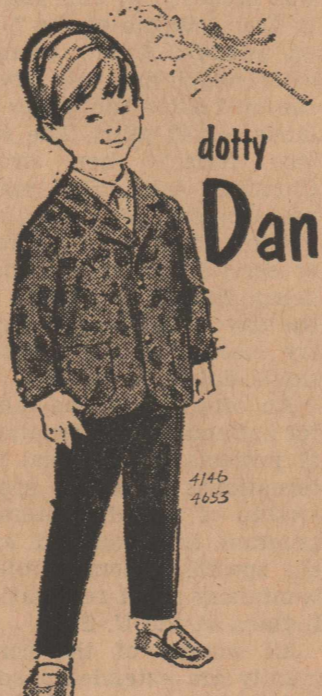



There are a few basic steps to follow in nocturnal game calling. Mind these ABC's of calling technique and you can easily beguile the predators within gunshot range.

One of the first things to remember is to notify your local game warden if you're going to be using a light in known deer range. . . which includes almost the entire state of Texas. This way the warden will know where you're hunting varmints should he get a report from some irate landowner that a poacher is out after deer.

Next thing is to pick an area where predators are known to roam. Most landowners can tell you where you're most likely to find animals like foxes, coyotes, bobcats and coons. Select an area that hasn't been called recently. This is a mistake many beginners make. A predator once fooled by a game call is almost impossible to beguile a second time unless several months have elapsed.

Dark of the moon is the best time to call. Blacker the night, the better. Get out in a clearing where you can see a good way in all directions. Wear drab clothing and put any prevailing breeze in your face. Any predator that approaches from downwind and gets a whiff of human scent will usually spook. Human odor is one danger signal that no wily predator is likely to ignore.

Wear a headlight, one that straps to your forehead. Tilt the beam upwards so the ground is barely illuminated by the outer edge of the beam. A light near the eyes makes it much easier to spot the glow of a predator's eyes.

Swing the light steadily in a full circle as you blow on the game call. It's true that predators are not supposed to approach from downwind, but a hungry predator often is an unpredictable one. He might just come rushing in, ignoring all danger signals.

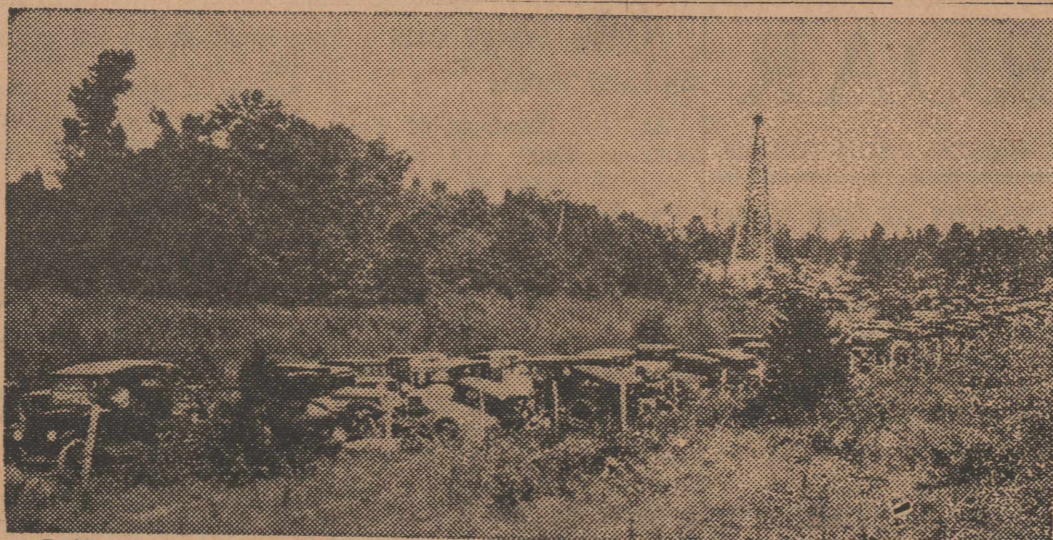
Start by blowing on the call strongly. Later, when you first spot eyes, tone it down softly. A harsh call often will drive close game off.

Just as you get ready to shoot, you can drop the beam of the light directly on your quarry. For night shooting a shotgun is a good choice. It is easily handled in the feeble light conditions. A .400 No. 4 or No. 2 shot in a full-choke 12 gauge gun is fine.

A rifle also works well when equipped with a quality scope sight that gathers and intensifies the light. A post or dot reticle is best since it more readily shows up in the beam of a headlight. Any centerfire cartridge .222 or larger is sufficient for all predators. For foxes alone, the .22 Magnum will suffice.

Foxes and coyotes usually rush right in within 10 minutes after you start calling. Coons react quickly . . . but require about 15 minutes to arrive on the scene. Bobcats, because of the deliberate way they come in, are slower, often taking 20 minutes or more to get there.

If the eyes come in bouncing up and down, you can bet you've got a fox or coyote. If they bounce, but not very much, it probably is a coon. A cat's eyes will come in on a level plane, not varying up or down much at all.

Be positive of your target before you shoot! A neighbor's housecat or dog may respond to the call, to see what all the excitement is about.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

THE 1ST SESSION of the 90th Congress started off with a bang, and set the stage for restraint and prudence in the months ahead.

In the first order of business the flamboyant Harlem Congressman, Adam Clayton Powell, was stripped of chairmanship of the House Committee on Labor, and was then ordered to step aside and not take the oath until a select committee investigates the many charges against his official conduct.

The vote to have Powell step aside was overwhelming — 364 to 64, with the majority including all from Texas but two — one member from San Antonio and one from Houston dissenting.

THE PRESIDENT'S State of the Union message was typical of such addresses, with one new recommendation — a raise in income and Social Security taxes to help finance additional welfare programs. Despite the prediction that the federal deficit this year will be about \$10 billion, the President called for a substantial increase in the vast complex of welfare aids.

As I see it, we should concentrate on financing the war in Vietnam and combating inflation, and reduce non-military outlays instead of saddling an additional tax load on the American people at this time. The income tax proposal would raise about \$4.8 billion a year. It would be no problem at all to cut nondefense spending by \$5 billion, or even more.

Moreover, the President's recommendation for a 10% increase in Social Security benefits would cost about \$4.5 billion a year, which presumably will have to be financed by an increase in the social security tax. Thus, the overall jump in taxes would be the equivalent of about 12% in income taxes.

The President's message pleases Labor by not suggesting any new strike control legislation to better protect the public interest. And it offended the militant professionals in the civil rights movement because the speech did not give more emphasis to their demands.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Texas House of Representatives is operating under far-reaching new rules. And a cooling-off period has been called in a controversy over whether both houses should revise joint procedures.

House of Representatives voted 145-0 for a modernized rulebook.

Key changes reduce the number of House committees from 43 to 25, after this session; inaugurate a modified seniority system; and set up a calendar system to determine the priority rights of bills ready for consideration.

Three days deep in the 60th Legislative session the House also approved 145-0 a proposed set of joint rules to govern matters involving both houses. This included Speaker Ben Barnes' proposal to limit conference committees to adjoining differences in bills passed by the two houses, rather than writing new legislation.

Another major provision calls for joint committees to hear budget requests and perform some housekeeping functions.

Still another would require that conference committee meetings be open to the press and the public.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith turned a cold shoulder to the conference committee restriction, long advocated by Barnes. Smith said the Legislature has too many more important things to do than squabble over rules.

According to some House lieutenants, Barnes feels that majority of the Senators favor his proposals. Smith pointed out that rules can be approved or amended only by a two-third vote.

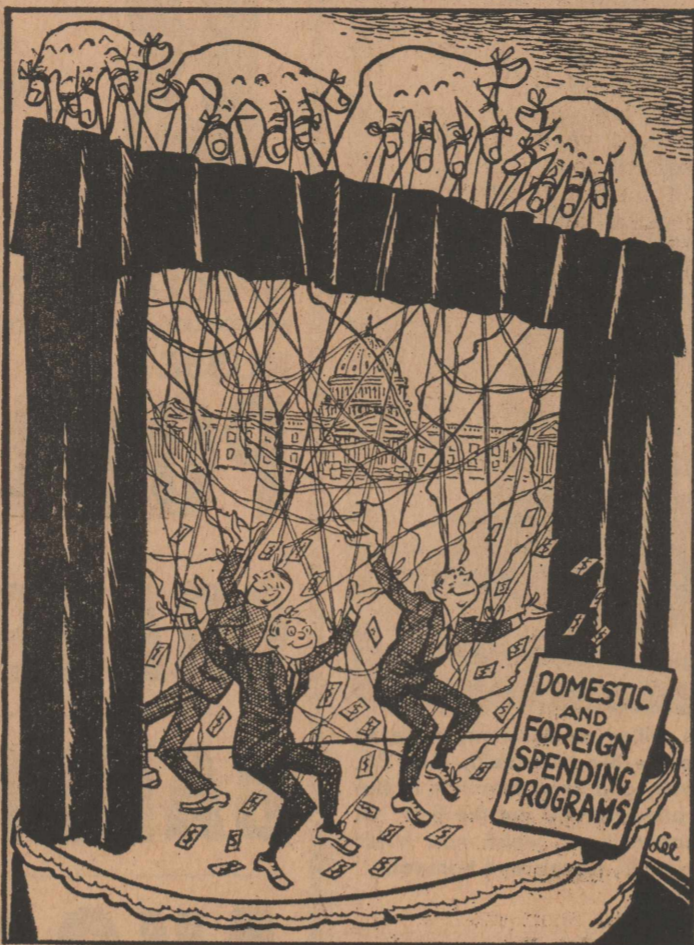
So, the House version on joint rules is expected to spend an extended cooling-off period in a Senate committee.

If the House recommendations are not accepted, Barnes made it clear that he will regard his own conference committee appointees as duty bound to adjust differences only. If Senate conferees are not restricted, he readily admitted an impasse may be reached when the first controversial piece of legislation goes to a conference committee.

- Authority for cities to levy local option one-percent sales taxes by Rep. John Treager of Seguin.

- A minimum wage bill (\$1.25 an hour) with Sen. Joe Bernal of San Antonio and Rep. Lauro Cruz of Houston as main sponsors.
- Legalization of mixed drinks by Rep. Jack Johnson of San Antonio.
- Abolishing the death penalty for crimes by Rep. Ronald Bridges of Corpus Christi.

Dilled New Potatoes

1 lb. small new potatoes, pared
3 tbs. butter or margarine melted
1/2 teas. paprika
1/4 teas. salt
1 teas. dried dill
Cook potatoes in 1 inch boiling water in medium saucepan, covered, 19 minutes and drain. Turn potatoes into shallow baking pan. Brush well with 2 tablespoons butter; sprinkle all over with paprika and salt. Broil, 6 inches below heat, turning frequently, 10 to 15 minutes, or until fork-tender. Potatoes should have a golden outer crust. Add all to remainder of butter and roll potatoes in mixture, coating well. Makes four servings.

Savory Rutabaga

1 2 1/2 to 3 lb. rutabaga
1 can cream-of-mushroom soup, undiluted
1/2 cup crumbled cooked bacon
1 teas. salt
1/2 teas. pepper
1/4 cup chopped parsley
Pare rutabaga and cut into 1/2 inch cubes. Place in large saucepan, add boiling water to measure 1 inch, simmer, covered 25 minutes or until tender. Drain and stir in soup, bacon, salt and pepper. Heat gently 5 minutes and stir in parsley. Makes 6 servings.

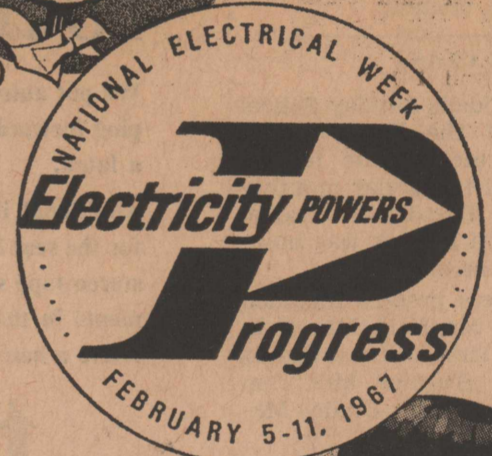
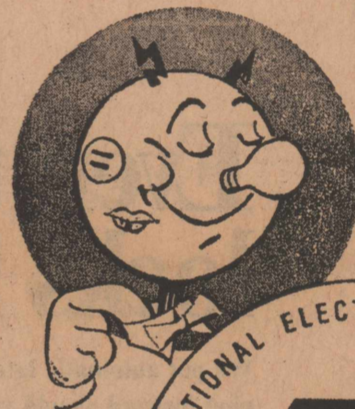

cites further as evidence of this condition that Mr. Hoover had failed to cash for many months some \$75,000 in checks which were found in his home among other papers.

The petition further recites that Ernest Dunlap had been carrying on Mr. Hoover's business at the time the will was made, that Mr. Hoover was "mentally confused . . . as to current events, was not able to carry on his business affairs and did not recognize his closest friends."

The petition further alleges that "undue influence" to execute the will was applied "by representatives, agents and employees of each of the schools and institutions named herein as Defendants" and "that they spent hours with him and presented arguments that he was not sufficiently strong mentally to offer resistance to and he did yield to such importunities and arguments and compulsions and allowed the minds of such persons on account of the weakness of his own to take the place of his own mind and to guide him in the making of such purported will without, in fact, assenting himself thereto."

Extensive land holdings, oil and gas production and mineral interests, livestock and other assets to the possible value of several million dollars are involved in the will contest.

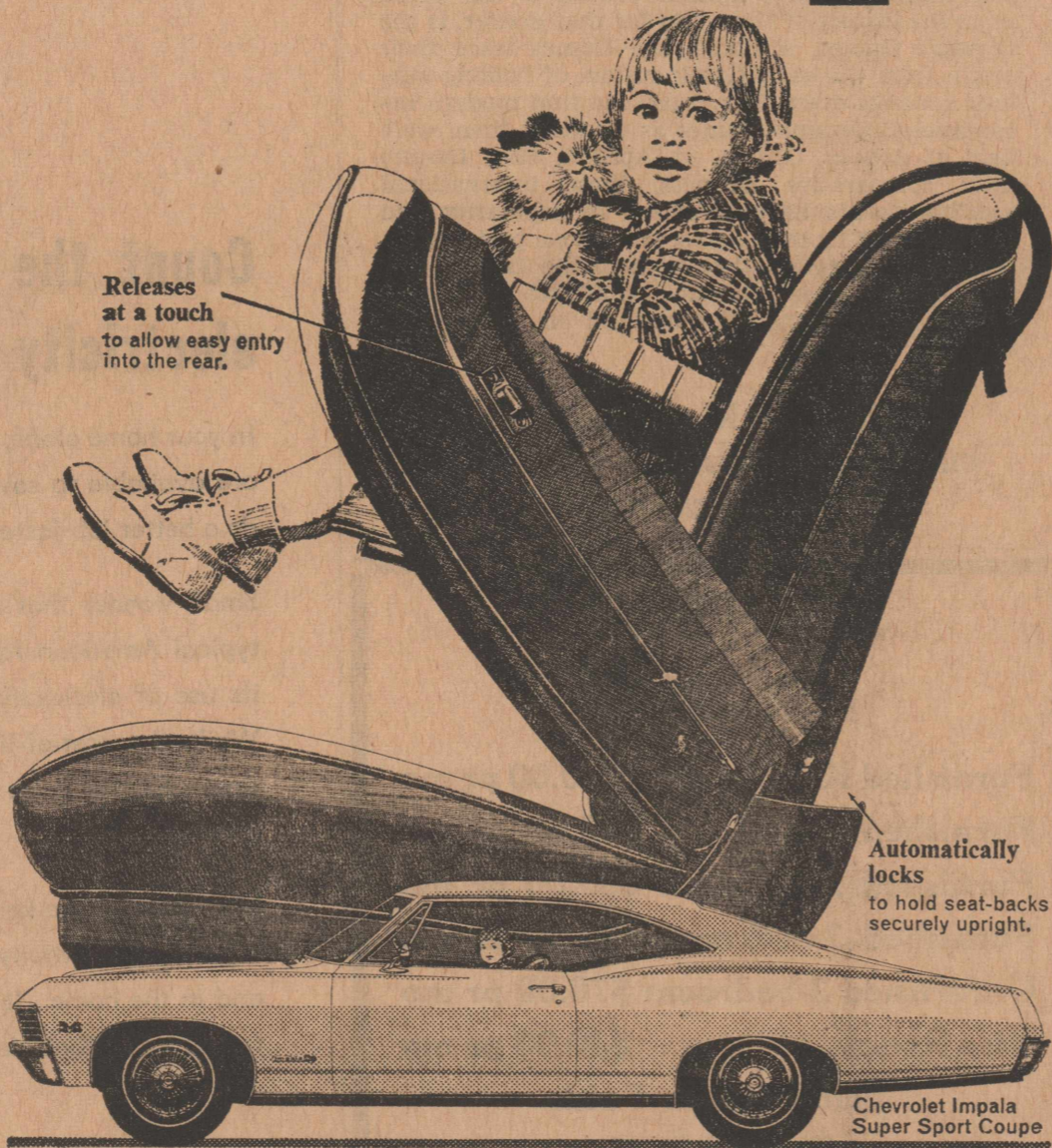
