## Rex Halydier Succumbs To Heart Attack

Funeral services for Rex Halydier, 56, Crockett County Commissioner of precinct 2, were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Harry Trulove of Ft. Stockton officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mr. Halydier, who had been a heart patient several years, became ill at his home here Monday night and was taken to Crockett County Hospital, where he died Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock.

A resident of Ozona for 27 years, he was born in Seguin August 12, 1910. He married Lillie Belle Layne in Menard January 21, 1933. At the time of his death he was serving his second term as commissioner, having won re-election in the Democratic primaries last May. He was unopposed in the general election in November. Before becoming commissioner, he operated a taxi service and was distributor for the San Angelo Standard-Times.

Survivors include his wife; 2 sons, Bobby Halydier of Ozona and James Halydier of Corpus Christi; 2 brothers, J. J. Carley and Lewis Halydier, both of San Angelo, and 2 grandsons.

Pallbearers were Glenn Sutton, Dick Kirby, Al Fields, C. W. Gotcher, T. J. Bailey, W. E. Dunlap, J. S. Pierce, III, and Henry Lucas.

## License Plate Sales Spurt As Deadline Nears

Sales of 1967 automobile license plates have picked up this week, according to Mrs. Gertrude Perry, deputy tax assessor-collector.

With the April 1 deadline in sight, the tax office will be open this Saturday and next Saturday from 9 a. m. till 5 p. m., Mrs. Perry announced today, to accommodate those who are unable to purchase license tags during the regular weekday office hours.

Vehicle owners have until midnight, April 1, to have '67 tags on their cars and trucks. However, those who wait until April 2 will be charged a 20-percent penalty unless they sign an affidavit to the effect that the vehicle had only been driven to the courthouse for the purpose of purchasing license plates.

The penalty will also be waived after the deadline if the purchaser signs an affidavit attesting that the vehicle for which tags are being purchased has not been driven since the deadline.

## Ozona Finishes 4th In Eldorado Track Meet Sat.

Hampered by the cold and wind as well as a soft, slow track, OHS tracksters finished 4th behind Colorado City, Brady, and Rankin at the Eldorado Track Meet last Saturday.

Thirty-six of the Lion 59 1/2 point total was picked up by Gary Sutton and George Cox who got firsts in the discus and 220 yard dash and seconds in the shot put and 100 yard dash, respectively.

This Friday and Saturday, the Lions will be entered in the big 4-division meet at San Angelo. The Lions, along with Abilene Woodson and Rankin rank as strong contenders for a Division IV title. Finals are set for 1 p. m. Saturday.

Sutton set the only meet record in Eldorado Saturday as he hurled the discus 169 feet 10 1/2 inches. Sutton is undefeated this year and ranks as one of the best in the state - certainly in class A. For the first time this year, Sutton beat old rival John Mayo in the shot, only to have a Paint Rock weightman win the first place medal.

Cox hooked up with Brady veteran sprinter Puddinhead Jones in the 100 and 220 yard dashes. In the most thrilling race of the meet and running into the wind, Cox and Jones appeared to finish in a dead heat in the 100. Judges ruled that Jones had nipped Cox by inches for first place. But in the open 220 it was a different story. Cox took Jones on the curve and maintained a 4 yard lead for an easy win in the time of 22.5, considered excellent on the soft track. Like Sutton, Cox is undefeated in the 220 and could be tops in Class A.

Other points getters for the Lions were Derold Maney 3rd in the 330 yard hurdles; Maggie Galindo, 6th in the mile; Marlin Farris, 5th in the shot; and Tony Cullins, a tie for 6th place in the pole vault; the 440 yard relay team of Cox, Fleet Coates, Thomas DeHoyos and Maney was second behind Brady.

## Dual Discovery Is Assured In Crockett Field

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 2 Amacker, in 35-31-H&TC, one location northeast of the dual Ellenburger and McKee opener and lone producer from those pays and 1/2 mile north of Gulf Oil Corp.'s No. 2-E Tippett, the Wolfcamp pay opener, swabbed 26 barrels of brine and 69 barrels of new oil in four hours from the Ellenburger.

Recovery was from open hole between 6,605 feet, where 7-inch liner was seated, and 6,618 feet, total depth. Testing continued.

Earlier, it swabbed 26 barrels of brine and 64 barrels of new oil in 3 1/2 hours, with a shakeout of 3 to 4 per cent basic sediment and water, from an open hole section between 6,605-08 feet. Operator then drilled out an additional 10 feet of open hole section.

While being drilled it indicated production in the Wolfcamp with the flowing of oil at the estimated hourly rate of 10 barrels on a drillstem test between 4,945-5,021 feet, and in an unidentified section, with the flowing of gas at the estimated daily rate of 8 million cubic feet and recovery of 330 feet of 43.3 gravity oil on a drillstem test taken between 5,093-131 feet. In the overall contest with some 25 area teams competing, the Ozona team took sixth place. Rex Bland was fifth high individual, with 448 points out of a possible 500.

The Ozona team scored 1293 points in taking sixth place, only 31 points less than the Iraan team which took first place with 1324 points.

M. A. Barber accompanied the team to San Angelo.

Other members of the Ozona Chapter participated in three judging contests at Sweetwater, Saturday, range and pasture, wool and mohair and livestock judging.

The range and pasture team, consisting of Eugene Vinson, Don Edgerton, Larry Kilgore and David North, placed second to qualify for the State Contest which will be held in Stephenville April 21. Eugene Vinson was first high individual for the entire contest with a score of 260 points, Don Edgerton was fifth with 232 points and Larry Kilgore placed tenth with 213 points.

Placing third in their contest, the wool and Mohair judging team included Buddy Couch, Jesse Deaton, Steve Hubbard and Charles Childress. Buddy Couch was fourth high individual and Jesse Deaton seventh.

## Hitch-Hiker Beaten, Robbed, Left On Hiway

Officers from Ozona to El Paso are on the lookout for two men who allegedly beat and robbed a hitch-hiker and dumped him by the side of the road eleven miles east of Sheffield Monday night.

The victim, Richard Gray, 18, of Los Angeles, Calif., was given a ride into Sheffield by a truck driver Monday night. When Sheriff Billy Mills was notified around 8 p. m. he sent out alerts to all points west for the two men, who were described as around 24 years of age, average height and weight and driving an old model Ford automobile.

Gray said the two men picked him up in San Antonio around noon Monday and mentioned that they were going to California to work. He said the pair beat and robbed him of fifteen dollars and left him at the point near Sheffield where he was picked up. He was hospitalized Monday night in Crockett County Hospital with bruises about the head, a black eye and a long scratch on the neck. Gray was released from the hospital Tuesday morning.

At press time the two suspects had not been apprehended, nor had any trace of the two been found. Sheriff Mills felt the two had either turned off Highway 290 or doubled back. He said no more than an hour elapsed before officers to the west were alerted to be on the look-out.

## Scattered Rains Raise Hopes In Favored Areas

The biggest news in Ozona this week was the surprise thundershower, Sunday night, which dumped up to a half inch of rain on Ozona proper and up to an inch and a half on thirsty ranchland surrounding Ozona.

North of Ozona the Vauhn ranch reported on inch of rain, while the Baggett ranch south of town had an inch and a half. Further south the fall was much lighter. East of town on the Ralph Jones ranch three-tenths of inch was reported. The heaviest reports were from west of Ozona, where 1.7 inches fell on the B. B. Ingham ranch, with other ranches reporting over an inch.

The rain brightened prospects considerably for the area lamb crop.

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ANOTHER SCRAP OF PAPER?

Late in the evening of November 16, 1933, the President of the United States, Franklin D. Roosevelt, and the People's Commissar for Foreign Affairs, M. M. Litvinoff, exchanged letters. The President's letter agreed to normal diplomatic relations between the two countries and the exchange of Ambassadors. Litvinoff's letter committed to writing a long list of promises he had made officially in exchange for recognition.

This letter said... "It will be the fixed policy of (the USSR) to refrain... from any act overt or covert liable in any way whatsoever to injure the tranquility, prosperity, order, or security of the whole or any part of the United States, its territories or possessions, and in particular, from any act tending to incite or encourage armed intervention, or any agitation or propaganda having as an aim, the violation of the territorial integrity of the United States, its territories or possessions, or the bringing about by force of a change in the po-

litical or social order of the whole or any part of the United States, its territories or possessions... Not to permit the formation... of any organization or group, which has as an aim the overthrow or the preparation for the overthrow or the bringing about by force of a change in, the political or social, order of the whole or any part of the United States, its territories or possessions."

The late Benjamin Gitlow, one of the top officials of the Communist Party of the USA in 1933, recorded in his memoir, "The Whole of Their Lives," that some members of the Party were deeply worried that Litvinoff had promised too much in his letter to the President. Litvinoff immediately reassured the comrades, and Gitlow quotes him as saying: "Don't worry about the letter. It is a scrap of paper which will soon be forgotten in the realities of Soviet-American relations."

Somehow it seems appropriate that Litvinoff's language should go into that new "consular treaty" which the Administration is so proud of. And then it could also include the Yalta agreements

Recipe of the Week

Kitty's Kitchen

For Easter Sunday dinner, you might like to try our recipes in your menu. We will begin with the traditional Easter Ham

1 smoked whole tenderized ham  
1 1/2 cups brown sugar, firmly packed  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
3 tbs. pineapple juice  
2 tbs. whole cloves  
1 can sliced pineapple, drained

Maraschino cherries  
(Bake a 10 to 12 lb. ham 25 minutes per lb., bake a larger ham 20 minutes per pound, and bake a half ham 30 minutes per lb.)

Scrub ham well and place on a rack, fat side up, in a roasting pan; do not cover. Bake in a preheated 300 degree oven required amount of time. Forty-five minutes before ham is done, remove from oven and take off rind, all except a collar around the shank bone. Cut 1-inch diagonals across fat to form diamonds and place a clove in cut intersection. Combine flour, sugar and mustard; drain pineapple, reserve juice and make a paste of dry ingredients and 3 tablespoons of the drained pineapple juice. Layer 1 cup of paste on the ham 1/2 inch thick and place slices of pineapple over it, in conventional pattern. Baste frequently with remaining juice. Before last 10 min. layer ham with remaining paste, raise heat to 425 degrees, and remove when glazed and brown. Decorate with cherries in center of each pineapple slice.

Spinach Ricotta Balls

2 pkgs. chopped frozen spinach  
1/2 teas. salt and dash of pepper!

1/2 cup of ricotta cheese (or drained cottage cheese)  
2 tbs. grated Parmesan  
1/4 cup butter

Cook spinach according to pkg. directions. Drain thoroughly and squeeze out any excess liquid. Mix in salt, pepper, and both cheeses. Form into ping-pong size balls. Heat butter in skillet and drop in the spinach balls. Saute over low flame, basting with butter until thoroughly hot.

Sweet Potato Ring

12 small to medium sweet potatoes, boiled and mashed  
1/4 lb. butter, melted  
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
1/4 cup pecans, coarsely chopped

Scrub potatoes and boil in sufficient salted water to cover for 30 to 35 minutes. Peel potatoes and mash to a fine puree. Grease a 6 cup ring mold thoroughly. Pour in melted butter and tilt pan so bottom and sides are thoroughly covered. Add sugar evenly and cover with nuts. Place in refrigerator to set. When ready to bake, fill with mashed potatoes. Place in a pan of hot water and bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 45 minutes. To serve, turn out on platter as for an upside-down cake, so ring will be caramel topped. Encircle with Spinach Balls. A small bowl of fruit compote may be placed in center of ring if desired.

Shotgunners who come up with sore shoulders after every trip afield may find some consolation in the knowledge that science is continually trying to reduce recoil.

This mule-like kick of the lightweight shotgun, plus magnum loads, has become a very unpleasant thing for all shooters. It affects some more than others. This usually is a matter of inexperience, or having a gun that doesn't fit.

Any man who knows how to shoot and has a gun that fits him will have fewer bruises than the occasional shooter, or the man who rents or borrows a shotgun for a day or two of fast and furious shooting.

Some hunters can stand up under the pounding of a 12-gauge with full load better than others with a 20-gauge. All guns have recoil. Extent of the impact depends as much or more on the shooter than on the gun and its load.

Some shooters have reduced this kick by using good quality recoil pads. Others use compensators on the muzzle end of their scatter guns. Both are slightly effective. But neither is a total solution.

Naturally this has been a great concern both to the gun and the ammunition manufacturers. They have been producing lighter guns and heavier loads, neither of which tends to reduce recoil.

Winchester has a stock which may prove to be the greatest step forward in reducing recoil bruises on the shooter. It is designed to take the "kick" out of shotgun shooting.

This new recoil reduction system utilizes the principle of hydraulics and a powerful spring. On a 12-gauge gun it reduces the recoil approximately 78 percent. This gives an effective kick of less than half the 20-gauge load, when shooting the heavier 12.

This stock is available on two Winchester guns, the Model 1200 and the Model 1400.

"Inside story" of the new method of recoil reduction includes a new Cyclocac stock. It duplicates the warmth of walnut, but provides greater strength than wood. It resists scratches, corrosion, salt solutions, oil, alkalies and mild acids. It won't warp or crack under extreme temperatures.

Inside this stock is a set of strong springs that flank a hydraulic cylinder. When

the shotshell explodes, the springs and the hydraulics cushion the impact. The two-piece stock depresses under the kick, and then returns to its original form.

Measuring the impact of recoil is not a new practice. Technically the kick is known as kinetic energy. It is created by the backthrust of the shotload as it travels along the barrel length. It is referred to in foot-pound measurement, and the results are generally known as "free recoil".

A comparison taken from available tables, shows that a 7 pound, 12-gauge shotgun loaded with 3 dr. of powder and 1 1/4 oz. shot will give a kick of 22.4 foot pounds. In a heavier load, 3 3/4 dr. of powder and 1 1/4 oz. shot, the recoil amounts to 44 pounds.

A 6 1/2 pound 20-gauge, with a light load of 2 1/4 drs. and 7/8 oz. shot will produce 16.9 pounds of back thrust. The 2 3/4x1, will produce 28.4 foot pounds.

This indicates that if the new Winchester device reduces free recoil of the 12-gauge to approximately one-half of the 20-gauge load the light charge would deliver under 10 pounds of kick and the heavy load would be less than 15 pounds.

Any shooter should be able to stand up under this all day at skeet, trap or in the field.

Naturally the reduced recoil shotgun will get its first real tryout on the shooting range. Skeet and trap shooters, as a rule, have more time and money to spend. And they are constantly seeking ways to reduce recoil in sustained firing. These men also know the science of getting their gun butts to the right position against their shoulders.

No doubt similar studies are being made on big bore rifles. Here the casual hunter pays little attention to the recoil in the fever of excitement. The target shooter does. Also, it may be able to do a lot for the shooters of fully automatic weapons on the battlefield.

Congressman O. C. Fisher

A-BLOC-VOTE - GETTER — civil rights — popped up again on Capitol Hill last week despite reports from throughout the country that the people have grown sick and tired of the subject. With no business programmed last week in either the House or Senate, a special message from the President, calling for radical new civil rights legislation, grabbed the Washington headlines.

The message was preceded two days earlier by a massive demand by more than a score of professional civil rights who descended upon the White House.

The President's new plan calls for total and complete prohibition against refusing to rent or sell your private real estate to a Negro.

The message also called for an extraordinary amendment which would give a government bureau power to issue "cease and desist" orders in employment practices, without bothering to seek such actions through the courts. Already in existence (approved two years ago) is a bureau which is completely stacked with pro-civil rights, having power to enter private businesses, examine all books and records of an employer, and then order the businessman to hire or promote Negroes, and to force him to reinstate — with back pay — a Negro if the bureau should decide the worker lost his job because of race.

The new proposal would help close the bureaucratic noose around the neck of private business throughout the country — but exempts small businesses for the time being.

It is reported that with riots and demonstrations on the wane, the Negro leaders are grasping for an issue to exploit among their followers — and open housing seems to be their best bet at the moment. It remains to be seen whether this will trigger renewed civil disobedience movements with enough following and publicity to pay off.

Some politicians are known to be skittish about the issue, fearing the backlash which saw a sizeable number of civil rights stalwarts busted out of office last November.

A welfare society contains many facts. The most ingen-

ious of schemes are hatched, and some of them are real shockers. When it was disclosed that in high government levels a plan was afoot to guarantee every family an income of \$3,000 a year, whether a person works or not, the scheme was at first dismissed as a fantasy. But the idea gained momentum to the point that only recently the President appointed a commission to make a study of the feasibility of such a thing.

Another corker has just come to light: The Labor Department has issued a regulation which classifies prison work by a convict as Federal service, thereby probably making the criminal eligible for unemployment benefits, social security benefits, and under certain circumstances having the time served count in figuring the amount of pension under civil service retirement!

This is, of course, outlandish. It sometimes appears that some people are more interested in protecting the criminal than the rights of the victims of the crimes.

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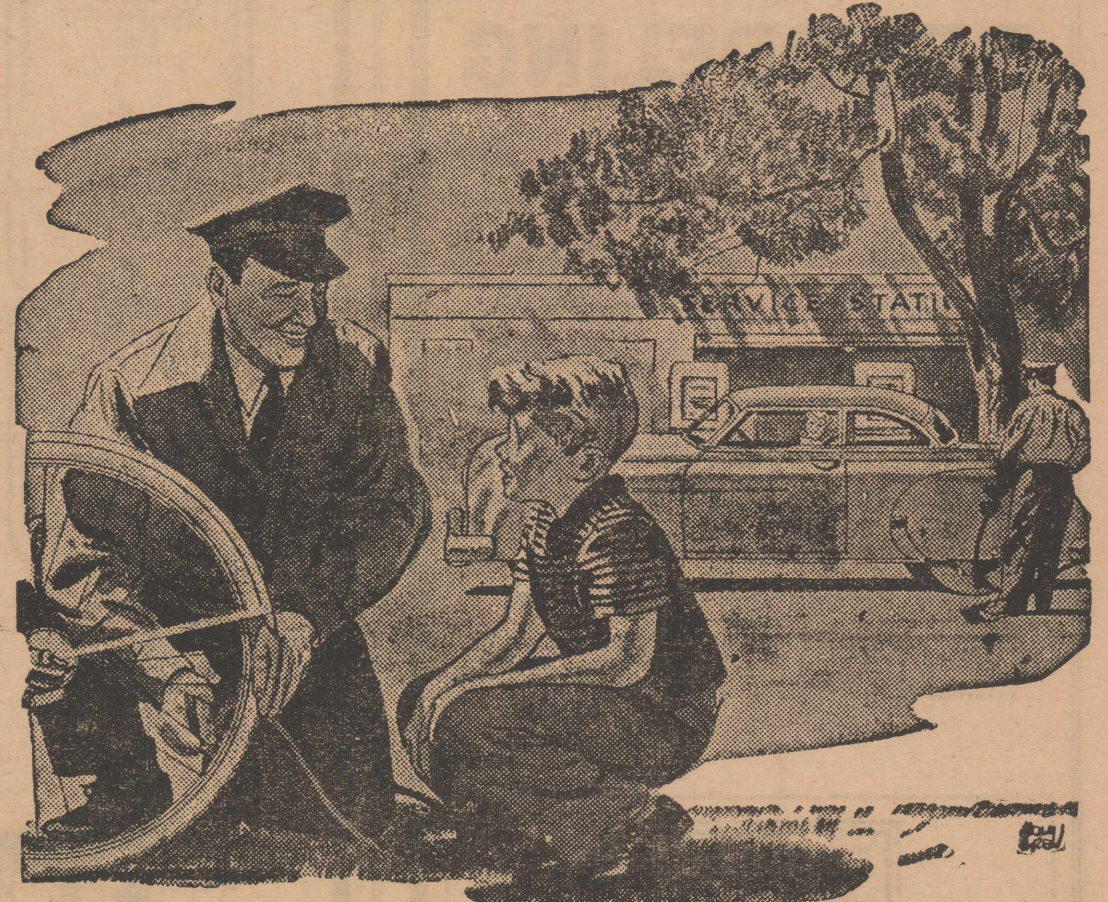
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**17th Annual Junction Easter Pageant Saturday**

Junction's seventeenth annual Easter Pageant will be presented next Sunday, March 25, at 10 p. m. on the eve before Easter Sunday, in a natural amphitheatre on the hillside below the Everburning Cross, one mile southeast of Junction.

Presentation is by five-score Kimble County people, all laymen, women and children in colorful costumes, typical of the dress of Biblical times. Here they will re-enact Jesus Christ's last Days on Earth, so timed that the Scene of the final Ascension will take place shortly after midnight on Easter morn.

This Holy Spectacle will be presented in pantomime supported from a broadcasting booth by readers and background music. A dozen stages have been arranged among the rugged rocks of the hillside, and changes of scenes are effected by the shifting of spot and flood lights.

The production is entirely amateur and non-commercial. Members of the cast are all local people, with no professional or paid actors.

Mrs. Jack Reeves, accomplished ranch woman, directs the Pageant for the sixteenth consecutive year. In 1951, a group of about twenty people enacted the first Pageant from a single stage. From year to year the Spectacle has grown, with changes and improvements in scripts, scenes, staging and props. Attendance has yearly increased, and last year over 8,500 people came from far and near.

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**JUNCTION PAGEANT** — Five-score Kimble county residents will take part in the 17th annual Easter Pageant to be presented Saturday night in the natural amphitheatre on the hillside below the Everburning Cross one mile southeast of Junction. Here they will re-enact the last days of Jesus Christ on earth. Attendance at the spectacle has grown from year to year. Last year's attendance was estimated at 8,500 persons.

**BOWLING HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS**

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — First big public debate over the Legislature's spotlight issue — sales of liquor by the drink — was scheduled this week.

House Revenue and Taxation Committee set Tuesday afternoon hearing on the proposal to legalize mixed drink sales under five-cent-a-shot-tax, stiff retailers' fees and strict regulation.

One of this session's biggest crowds was on hand for the House Committee session. Dry forces were lined up in depth for opposition testimony. Citizens Committee for Tourism and the Regulated Sale of Mixed Drinks announced formation of a key support group — an advisory board of 37.

**Redistricting Study Begins** — All state representatives and some of their constituents will be called on for advice as to how to draw new federal court-directed state House and congressional district boundaries.

Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham, chairman of House District Committee, said subcommittee will conduct an

intensive four-week study in an effort to produce bills acceptable to the lawmakers which also meet the court's one-man-one-vote yardstick.

**Tax Cut?** Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville and Reps. James E. Nugent of Kerrville and Ralph Wayne of Painview are backing a proposed constitutional amendment to do away with the state property tax, thus leaving it for use by the cities, counties and school districts.

Since bonds have been issued by the colleges for buildings, to be retired out of a part of the property tax, they propose to make it gradually effective, with the final lifting of the state property tax coming in 1978, when present college bonds are paid out.

**Vets Land Revival Favored** — Chances of a state constitutional amendment to revive the veteran's land program appear favorable. House passed the resolution and sent it to the Senate.

Only four representatives voted against re-submission of an additional -200,000,000 in bonds, with eligibility for long-term, low interest land purchase loans broadened to include Vietnam veterans.

**Sulphur**—West Texas' sulphur mining claim mixup has been cleared by the Legislature.

On the latest reported test from that zone, it flowed 38 barrels of new oil and 38 barrels of load water in nine hours, from open hole between 6,622-23 feet.

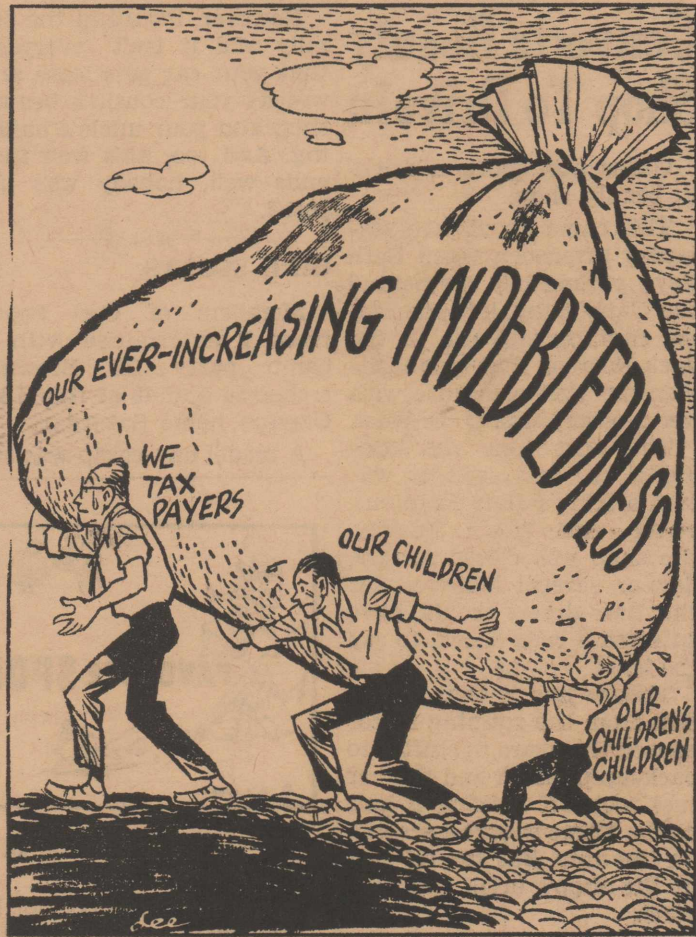
**LYNN COX INITIATED INTO PI PHI AT TECH**
