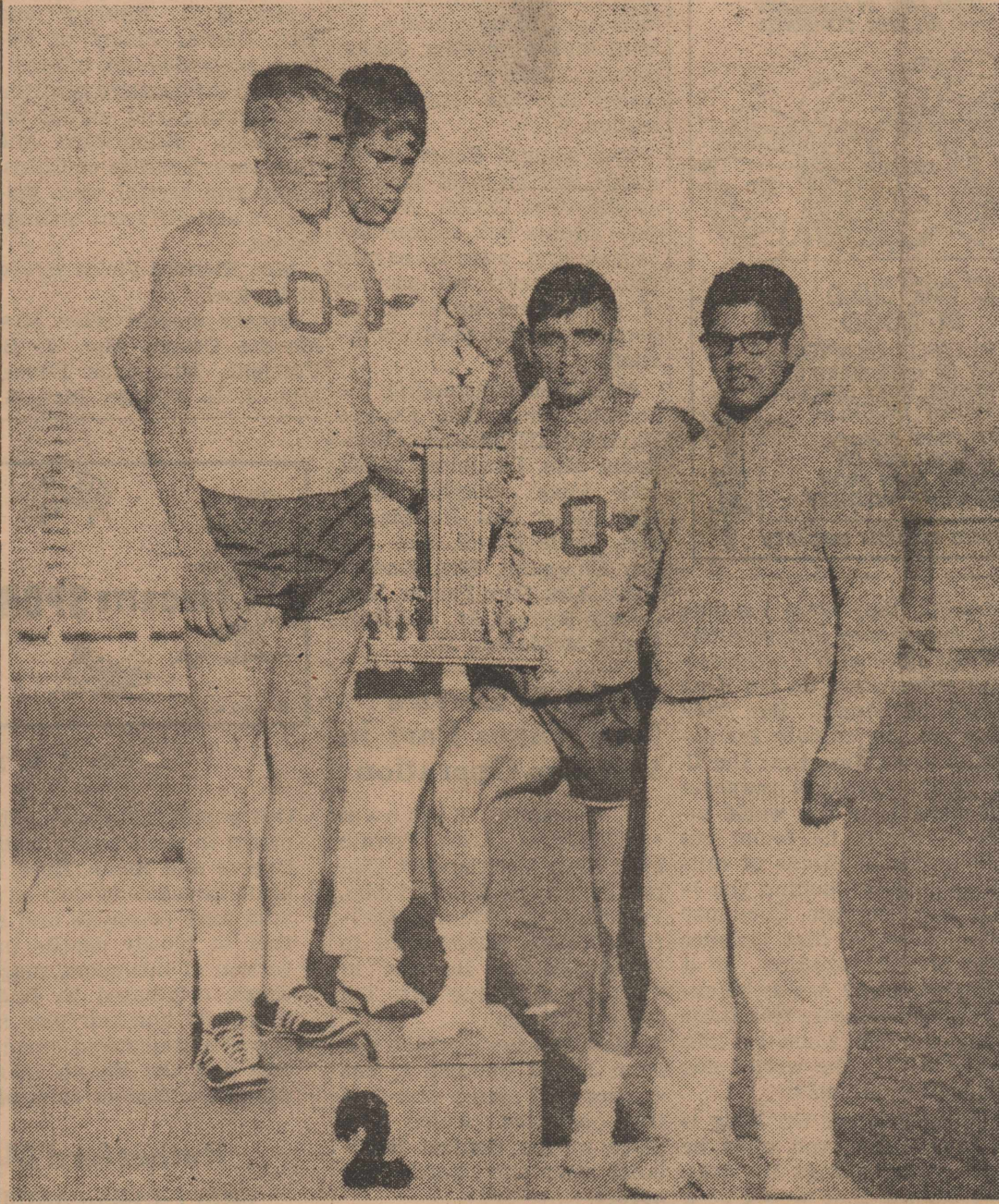

### 60 Boys Report For Little League Try-Outs Mon.

Little League try-outs got underway this week with around 60 boys reporting to the field Monday. The try-outs will continue next week, everyday except Wednesday, and the players auction will be held Friday night, April 21.

All boys between the ages of 9 and 12 are urged to be on hand if they want to try-out for a major league team. There are around 25 places to be filled in order to round out the four major league teams, according to LL president Bill Lewter. Boys who are not chosen for the major league may join one of the minor league teams.

Major league managers and coaches are the same as last year with one exception, Fred Nicks will replace Bill Gillit as coach for B&B Grocers.

One manager is lacking for the four minor league teams and Winston Koerth and Richard Fields will replace last year's managers on two of the teams.

Practice begins for both leagues Monday, April 24. Official opening games for the leagues will be Thursday, May 4 for the majors and Friday, May 5 for minor leagues.

### Drouth Continues, But Rains Hop, Skip In South of County

After a week of misty mornings and cloud laden skies, Ozonia has received no measurable amount of rainfall. However, from an inch to two inches of rain fell Monday afternoon on ranch lands in some parts of the county.

The heaviest rainfall reported was toward Pandale, with over an inch of rain reported in a strip south of Ozonia. Farther south there was no appreciable amount of rainfall recorded. So while some ranches were blessed with rain, for others the drought continues.

A blustery storm before midnight last night dumped .18 of an inch of rain on Ozonia. High winds accompanied the storm and there were reports of hail.

Setting four records, the Ozonia Lions swept to their 8th District Track title in 13 years, qualifying both relay teams and 7 individuals for the Regional Track Meet to be held in Lubbock on Saturday, April 22nd. These regional qualifiers will compete in the Winters track meet for qualifiers this Saturday. In addition to the

eight wins in the past 13 years, Ozonia's Lions have emerged second in the other five meets.

Gary Sutton, George Cox, and Tony Cullins set new District 8A records for the Lions as Ozonia garnered 8 firsts and a second for a good portion of their 149 point total. The Lions were trailed in scoring by Sonora with 101; Rankin, 100; Eldorado, 75; Junction, 47; Menard, 11; Iraan, 8; and Sanderson, 7.

In addition to the Championship trophy, Ozonia won the B-team meet for freshmen and sophomores and were second in team standings in the Jr. High division.

Sutton got the Lions rolling with wins in the shot and discus, setting new records in both. The big junior weightman went 57'5" in the shot and 168'4½" in the discus, both ranking high in state. Cullins pitched in with a 12'7½" leap in the pole for a new record and climbed up among the leaders in class A vaulting. Cullins is only a freshman.

Grabbing a total of 60 points in the field events held in the morning session, the Lions were led in the afternoon running events by the smooth, striding Cox who thrilled the track fans with a 22.9 in the open 220, running into the strong 20-25 mph wind, and two great legs on the winning sprint and mile relay teams.

It was Cox who ran the anchor lap of the mile relay the final race of the meet! Taking the baton some 8 or 9 yards behind the Sonora anchorman, Laney Cook, Cox picked up most of the distance on the back side of the track, held his own behind Cook around the last two curves, and turned it on down the stretch, finishing some 10 yards ahead of Cook.

Cook set a new standard in the high hurdles with a 14.7 clocking as he and teammate Ed Renfro finished 1 and 2 in the high hurdles, low hurdles, and the broad jump, with both qualifying for the regional in these three events.

Sophomore Rodney Pagan helped the Lion cause with a surprising first in the high jump. Maggie Galindo won the mile run in 4:54.7.

The accident occurred only seconds after the couple passed Texas Ranger Alfred Allee, who called in for the ambulance. Both occupants of the car were taken to Crockett County hospital where their condition was listed as good earlier today.

The car was a total wreck.

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SUDDENLY, REALITY

The Federal Government is preparing to expand the capacity of the hydroelectric generating equipment at Grand Coulee Dam. Some new giant generators will be needed.

Guess who has asked to be permitted to bid on the contract for manufacturing the generators? Moscow.

It didn't take a week for the administration's high-pressure salesmanship in sponsoring the new Consular Treaty with the USSR to bear fruit. This was the favored "bridge of understanding" which was to signal a new era of expanded trade and other contacts with the Soviet Union. The President's signature wasn't dry on the document before Moscow had crossed the bridge with its embarrassing proposal.

There are, of course, a number of US firms which specialize in building such giant generators. Many millions of dollars will be involved, and many thousands of man hours. Employment.

If the USSR is permitted to bid on the contract, it is a foregone conclusion in US industrial and labor circles that it will successfully underbid US companies. Why, because the USSR will be competing with higher-paid US workers. The unionized US workers makes more in a week than the Soviet worker of the same skill takes home in a month.

Both labor and management are holding their

breath — and their tongues, afraid to comment publicly on this precedent-making case. They are aware that should the Administration duck the issue by restricting the bids on the contract to US firms, then it will surely be attacked for reneging on its widely heralded policy of building economic bridges to Communist Europe.

On the other hand, if it permits the USSR to bid, it opens a flood-gate which could sweep the American working man into a sea of squalor. For certain it is that the high-paid US labor force cannot compete with slave-labor in the USSR. The average pay for industrial workers in the USSR is 75 rubles, \$83.25 — a month. If the USSR can bid on these turbines, what then can it not bid on? Prefabricated buildings? Wire fences? Communications equipment? Petroleum products? Where does it end?

Sooner or later, US labor leaders, and US corporate heads, are going to answer these questions in tones that Washington, and Moscow, will understand.

And it had best be right now.

WHAT'S YOUR THEORY?

We've heard many strange speeches in our time but the one that was delivered a few days ago by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., in New York's Riverside Church is in a class by itself. Certainly it deserves close study by anyone trying to understand the mess we are in because it illustrates the befuddled kind of thinking that made the mess and keeps making it messier.

The Rev. Dr. King, as you know, called for a boycott of the Vietnam War and urged Americans to refuse to fight. There are some who look upon statements such as this as treasonable, and they do give aid and comfort to the Communist enemy. However, it would be wrong to call Dr. King a traitor.

A few months ago J. Edgar Hoover made a statement to the effect that Dr. King is sometimes careless with the truth. And in this speech Dr. King made some amazing statements for a gentleman of the cloth. A good example was his claim that "Twice as many Negroes as whites are in combat." Some might call Dr. King a liar for saying a thing like that, but it's possible he was misinformed and didn't know any better.

But some will say, why shouldn't he know better? He's a doctor, isn't he? Doctors are supposed to have some brains. Certainly the Nobel Peace Prize people must have thought he was smart. Their image would suffer terribly if people

thought they were handing all that money and publicity to any idiot with a complaisant personality. So Dr. King can't be stupid. But then how do you explain his asinine accusation that the U. S. is the "greatest purveyor of violence in the world today?" Hasn't he found out about the hundreds of millions ensalved behind the Iron and Bamboo Curtains? Who purveyed that violence and is still working at it without letup? And is he expressing sympathy for those slave-masters when he tells us we're "on the wrong side of the revolution?"

Some will say Dr. King is a Communist, and must be to say the things he does. We submit that would be a hard thing to prove. Our only theory it that the reverend doctor is one of those tiresome orators who gets so carried away by his organ-like voice that anything goes — out of his mouth and into those waiting microphones.

It's the most charitable explanation we can think of for his fate-filled diatribes against these United States.

### Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

#### Fried Pies

2 cups flour  
1 teas. salt  
½ cup shortening  
½ cup cold water  
Sweetened stewed fruit  
Sift flour and salt together, cut in shortening and mix with hands. Add water and mix. Roll out about ¼-inch on a floured board. Cut with a large cookie cutter about 4 inches in diameter. In each round, place 1½ tablespoons fruit (dried apricots, peaches or apples, cooked and sweetened. Moisten edges with cold water, fold to make semi-circle and press edges together with a fork. Fry in deep fat.

#### Apple Fritters

1 cup flour  
1½ teas. baking powder  
3 tablespoons powdered sugar  
¼ teas. salt  
½ cup milk  
1 egg, well beaten  
2 medium-sized apples (sliced thin)  
Sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Beat the egg and add the milk and stir into dry ingredients. Mix well. Add sliced apples. Drop batter by teaspoonfuls into hot fat and fry. Serve with whipped cream or sprinkle with powdered sugar.

#### Old Country Dumplings

2 cups flour  
1 tbs. butter  
1½ teas. baking powder  
¾ teas. salt  
Milk  
Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt into a bowl. Add butter and work in with finger tips. Add sufficient milk to make a stiff batter. Turn out on a well-floured board and roll about ½ inch thick. Cut in small squares and drop in hot liquid and cook for 20 or 25 minutes. Cooking utensil must always have a tight fitting cover or else dumplings will be heavy.

The above are three recipes picked from a collection of Pennsylvania Dutch recipes made famous by the early Dutch settlers in Penn. Taken from Beth Boyd's collection of recipe books.

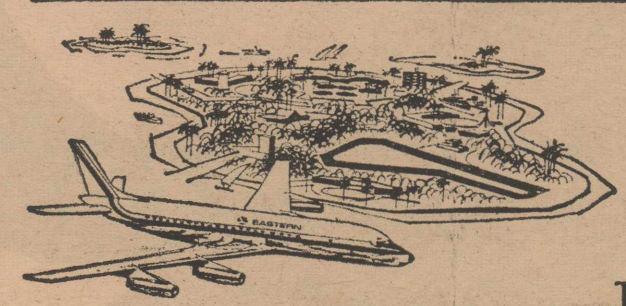

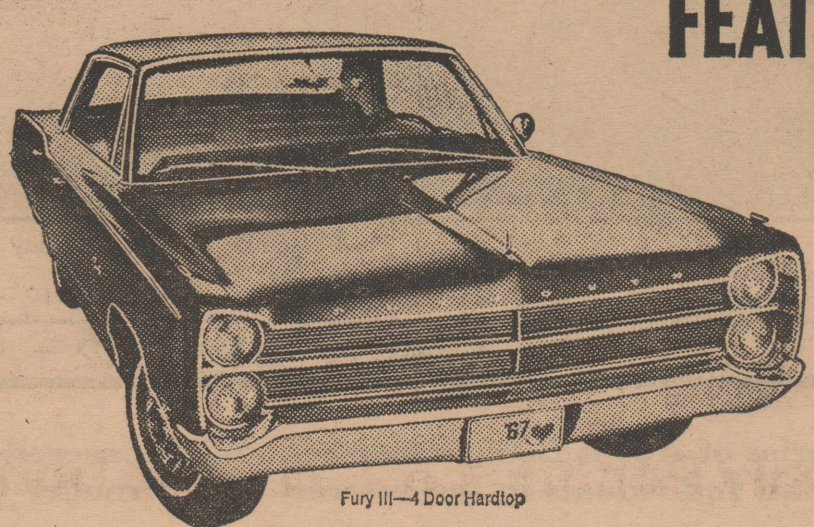

**HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS**  
**From Your State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — A \$170,000,000 pay raise bill for Texas school teachers now is in its flight through legislative thunderclouds.

Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris, sponsor of the legislation, steered it through the Senate Education Committee with ease.

Aikin indicated he will move for passage after the general appropriations bill is passed. He has sufficient votes to send it to the House.

Additional state money involved is almost as much as Gov. John Connally's entire \$187,300,000 tax program. For that reason this bill will play a significant part in the overall financial complexion of this legislative session.

Connally's spending and revenue include \$50,000,000 for teachers. . . or a total raise of five per cent across the board. This is about one-third of what TSTA wants.

While there is general feeling that teachers will get more money again this session, House sentiment appears to lean toward a lower figure than that covered by TSTA's bill, but a higher one than recommended by the governor.

**Old-Age Benefits**—Awaiting the governor's signature is a bill by Senator Bernal to make eligible for old age assistance payments 10,000 persons who have lived in Texas 25 years or longer. . . but who are not U. S. citizens.

Estimated cost to the state is approximately \$1,000,000 the first year and \$2,000,000 the second.

**"Civil Rights" Bill Passed**—First state "civil rights" bill in recent history has been passed by the Legislature.

Measure by Sen. Don Kenard of Fort Worth prohibits discrimination because of race, religion, color or national origin in employment with all branches of state and local government in Texas. It also forbids discrimination in agency-dealing with people.

**Long Terms Delayed**—Proposed Constitutional amendment to provide four-year terms for governor and other statewide officials is bogged down in the Senate after booming through the

House. Senate placed the proposal on table subject to call after a motion to kill it failed 8-10.

**College Bills Cleared**—Only a few hours after it cleared Committee, the Senate passed a bill authorizing a regional college district to operate a four-year Permian Basin College at Midland-Odessa.

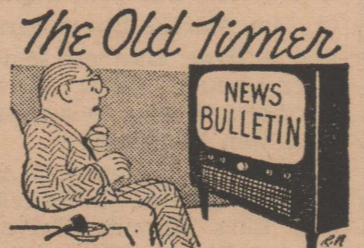
Its late in the House is uncertain. Even if passed, the governor has left some doubt whether he would sign the bill.

**No Jury Exemptions**—Rep. Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi wanted to add veterinarians to the list of persons exempted from jury duty, but by the time the House had finished with his bill, it removed all exemptions.

Bill, which now goes to the Senate, would take away the exemptions enjoyed by mothers of small children, lawyers, small businessmen and other large groups. It would allow the judges to decide whom to exempt from duty.

**No-Pit Ban**—Texas Railroad Commission has issued a statewide order prohibiting the use of open earthen pits in the disposal of salt water produced in oil field operations. It takes effect January 1, 1969.

Order will not affect non-pit orders already in effect in individual counties and fields.

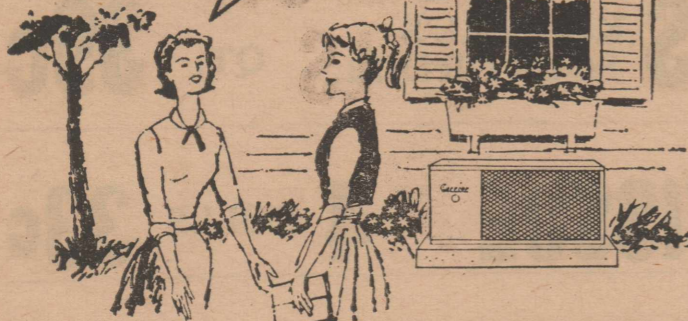

The completed forms can then be mailed back in the envelope provided and will be counted by volunteers in the District Cancer Society offices.

Brawley, Crusade Chairman, has seconded the enthusiasm of his fellow volunteers about the survey. "We'll be giving something tangible to our neighbors in this project," he has said, "because we're giving them a chance to help us understand what the greatest needs are in programs to reach all sections of the population."

A follow-up survey will be conducted during 1968 to compare progress made through the Society's year-round programs of films, exhibits, pamphlets and speakers.

"A survey of this size would be impossible by a health organization were it not for the tremendous cooperation of volunteers," Mrs. Hunnicutt commented. All volunteers wishing to join in the Crusade and survey are invited to call Mrs. Hunnicutt at 392-3145 for more information.

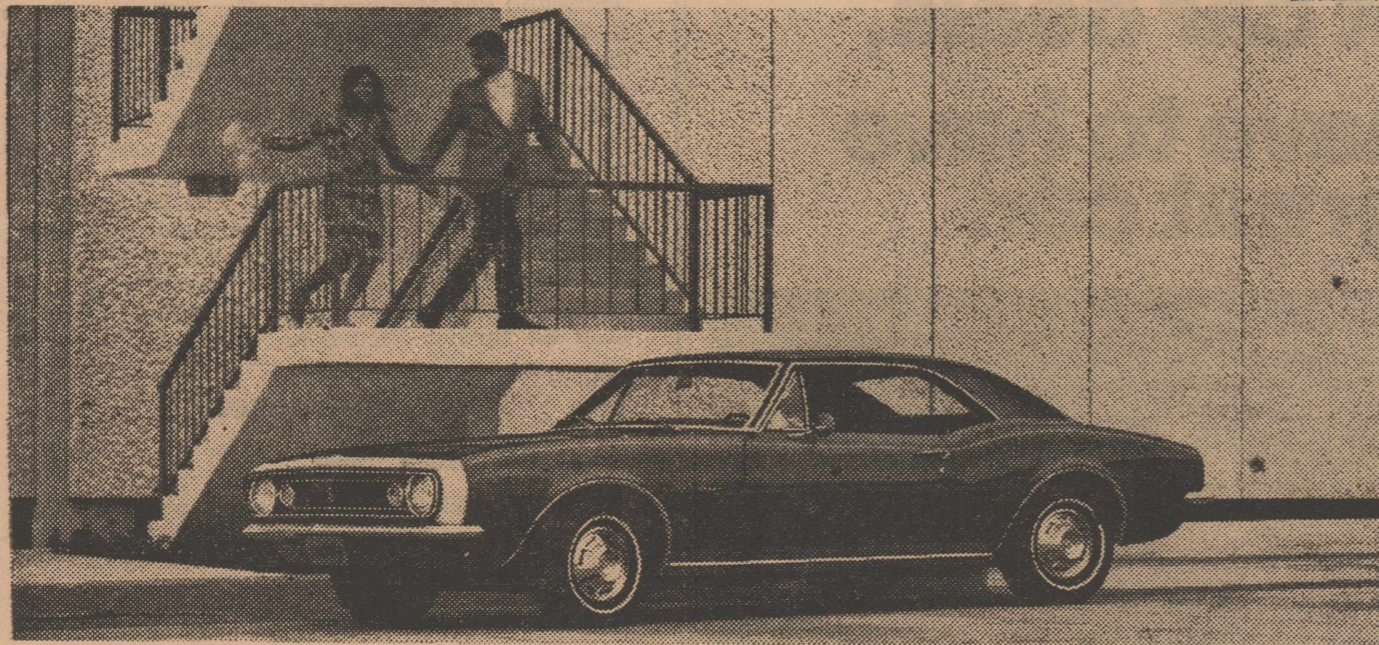
