Ozونا Track Team Is Third In State Meet

Paced by Junior weightman Gary Sutton who scored 16 points, the Ozona Lions finished third in the Class A division of the state track meet held last weekend in Austin. The Class A Title was won with 79 points by the powerful team from Tidehaven. Coach Chick Womack's Lions had a total of 22 points.

225 lb. Sutton easily won the state discus title for 10 points with a throw of 166 feet. A toss of 54 feet 11 inches in the shot was good for third place and another 6 points. Sutton's throw was only 10 inches shy of the winning toss of 55 feet 9 inches.

Sprinter George Cox was

fourth in the 220 yard dash, running a 23 flat to pick up 4 more points for the Lions. The foursome of Derold Maney, Rodney Pagan, Fleet Coates, and Cox got the other 2 points with a 6th place finish behind the first place winners from Tidehaven who handily broke the Class A record in the mile relay with a 3.19.9 clocking.

Sutton, Coates, and Pagan are underclassmen and will be back next year for another try for the state title, while speedster Cox and Maney have finished their high school eligibility.

Many Ozona fans were on hand last weekend in Austin to the big two-day track meet.

Ozونا's official Little League season got underway Thursday with Flying W downing Ozona Oil 6-3 and Moore Oil crushing B&B 11-0 in the second game. In the season's second double-header Monday night, B&B came back to trounce Flying W 16-6 and Moore Oil handed Ozona Oil its second defeat by 11-4. As of now Moore Oil leads the league 2-0, B&B and Flying W are tied at 1-1 and Ozona Oil is in the cellar with 0-2.

In the first game of the season, Ozona Oil led for three innings, scoring 2 in the first and 1 in the third. Flying W Ranchers rallied in the fourth to score 2 and wrapped it up in the bottom of the fifth with 4 runs scored. Winning pitcher was Gerald Olson, who also led the hitting with 2, and losing pitcher was Rick Webster.

The second game was called in the fifth inning because of the 10-run rule. Moore had collected 11 runs with 8 hits and B&B was 0-2. Leading hitters for Moore Oil were Saul Torres, Tony Borrego and Charlie Ramos with 2 each. Ned Stephens was winning pitcher and Melecio Martinez was the loser.

Monday night B&B, ahead 10 runs in the fifth, was declared the winner and the game was called. Melecio Martinez was the winning pitcher and Jeff Stuart, pitcher for Flying W the loser.

In the second game, Saul Torres led in the hitting department, collecting 4 hits, 2 were home runs with one a grand slam. He batted in 7 runs. Mike Williams had 2 hits for Ozona Oil. Tony Borrego was the winning pitcher and Gerald Huff the loser.

After 2 minor league double-headers Friday and Tuesday, the Yankees lead with 2 wins and no losses. The Dodgers and Giants are tied at 1 and 1 and the Astros trail 0 to 2.

Friday night the Giants beat the Astros in a close one 3-2 and the Yankees steam-rolled the Dodgers 27-9. Tuesday night the Yankees took a 5-3 win from the Astros and the Giants were defeated by the Dodgers, 10-8.

Teacher Salary Raises Granted By School Board

An across the board raise in salaries of Ozona Public School teachers was granted by the school board in a meeting Tuesday night of this week.

The raise will approximate 20 percent for beginning teachers a little less than 10 percent for the higher salaried, more experienced teachers.

Salaries of beginning teachers, with BA degrees, will be upped from \$4,604 a year to \$5,504, a raise of \$900. The maximum salary will be \$6,557, up from \$6,008 a year.

The starting salary for beginning teachers with Master's degrees will be \$5,810, again a raise of \$900, with the maximum, 15 years or more experience, will be \$7,565, raised from \$7,016.

The new salary schedule will put the local school system on a salary level that will be competitive in the present market for teacher talent, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes said of the board's action.

Time Short For Enrollment In Summer School

Only two weeks remain for students to enroll in the math and English summer school classes, which will be taught each morning for seven weeks in the new library building. Anyone interested in either of the classes may contact J. A. Pelto, high school principal.

Algebra I and English I will be taught in the summer classes and no restrictions will be placed on pupil participation. The fee for each course will be \$30. This is less than a correspondence course would cost and a full credit will be given.

Earlier this week, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes said that little interest had been shown in the summer school sessions so far. He stressed the fact that the courses were designed to develop good study habits, as well as earn a full credit for either course. He said the courses were primarily approved for high school students who had not received a credit in one of the courses, but that students entering high school next fall would be accepted as well as anyone else desiring to take one of the courses.

In order to have the courses a minimum enrollment of 15 students for each course is required.
