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THAT'S SICK

There are it should be mentioned, white people who are poor, too. The census figures for our nation say that there are ten times as many poor whites as Negro. Do you think for one minute that those wretched, jobless whites in Appalachia would dare to march downtown to raid and loot every liquor store, TV shop and exclusive haberdashery in sight?

The finger-shaking Freuds who rush out of their segregated suburban homes to assert that "the major burden of responsibility for the current civil disturbances . . . must be accepted by the majority, white community of our nation," are patently phoney. They blaspheme the

99 percent of the black community in our country who work, save and pray on Sunday whether or not President Johnson requests them to do so.

That 99 percent doesn't think or talk about hyphenated-Americans. They learned from grandparents, parents and in person, in two world wars, in Korea and in Vietnam, that not even a hyphen separates Americans fighting to keep the American dream alive. There are no hyphenated - Americans in fox-holes or trenches.

Can the color-conscious Freudians or the quaking politicians name a county in the world where 10 percent of the population is represented in as many high posts, in and out of government,

as in the United States? Russia? Britain? China? France? India?

Or what about Cuba, which hosts international conferences to incite insurrection in every country in the hemisphere? A Negro in Havana has the stature of a stray animal, and any Negro who bothers to read knows it.

And what about the wealthy Congo, where a Negro named Mobutu gouged out the eyes of two political opponents, then hanged them, wearing hoods to cover his brutality? He wants to do the same to a western-educated and refined Christian statesman named Tshombe. There hasn't been very much civil rights legislation passed in the Congo, really. And the Welfare State hasn't dawned. In the United States the kook who writes a threatening letter to the President of the United States is smothered by a swarm of Secret Service and FBI men.

But the kook who shouts "Burn, Baby, Burn," and incites 34 unnecessary deaths and millions of dollars in damage gets a full-color profile on TV and a double-page spread in the Sunday supplements.

Why? Because politicians in Washington fear they might lose some fraction of one-tenth of the vote in the United States. That's sick.

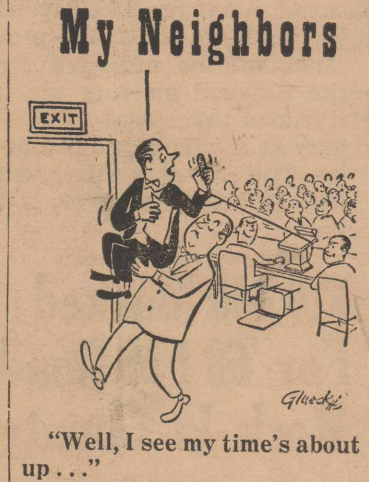

Recipe of the Week

New Orleans Angel Cake

- 1 large pkg. angel-food cake mix;
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans
- 1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate;
- 1 1/2 cups heavy cream

Early in day prepare, bake and cool angel-food cake as mix label directs. While cake cools make candy crunch. In bowl, with pastry blender or 2 knives used scissor-fashion, cut margarine into brown sugar and flour until like corn meal. Stir in pecans and spread thinly on bottom of an 8" round cake pan and bake at 350 degrees 10 minutes. Remove from oven and cut chocolate in tiny pieces and scatter over top. Return to oven for about 3 minutes, then remove and spread melted chocolate over surface; refrigerate. With long paring knife, split inverted cake into 3 layers. Whip cream until just stiff. Place bottom cake layer on serving plate; spread it with one-third of whipped cream. Bread candy crunch into small pieces and sprinkle one-third of it over whipped cream. Repeat with two remaining layers. Refrigerate about 3 hours. Serve, cut into 12 wedges.

Garden Club
Urges Mosquito
Control Efforts

Mosquitoes are abundant in Ozona and the Ozona Garden Club reminds residents that mosquito control takes effort. Recent rains are responsible for the increase in the mosquito population and the Garden Club warns that some mosquitoes transmit diseases, although most are simply a nuisance.

Habits of the different species vary, but they all require water to produce their young. Eggs of most species hatch within a two or three day period; others require a drying period. The eggs may remain dormant for months, then hatch within a few minutes after being flooded by rain.

The Garden Club suggests that home owners prevent mosquito breeding by eliminating standing water on their premises. Some of the more common problem areas include dripping faucets, puddles resulting from cooler drainage, tin cans and other articles which trap and hold water. Keep tall grass and weeds cut and use prepared household spray or aerosol bombs to rid your premises of mosquitoes that have already hatched.

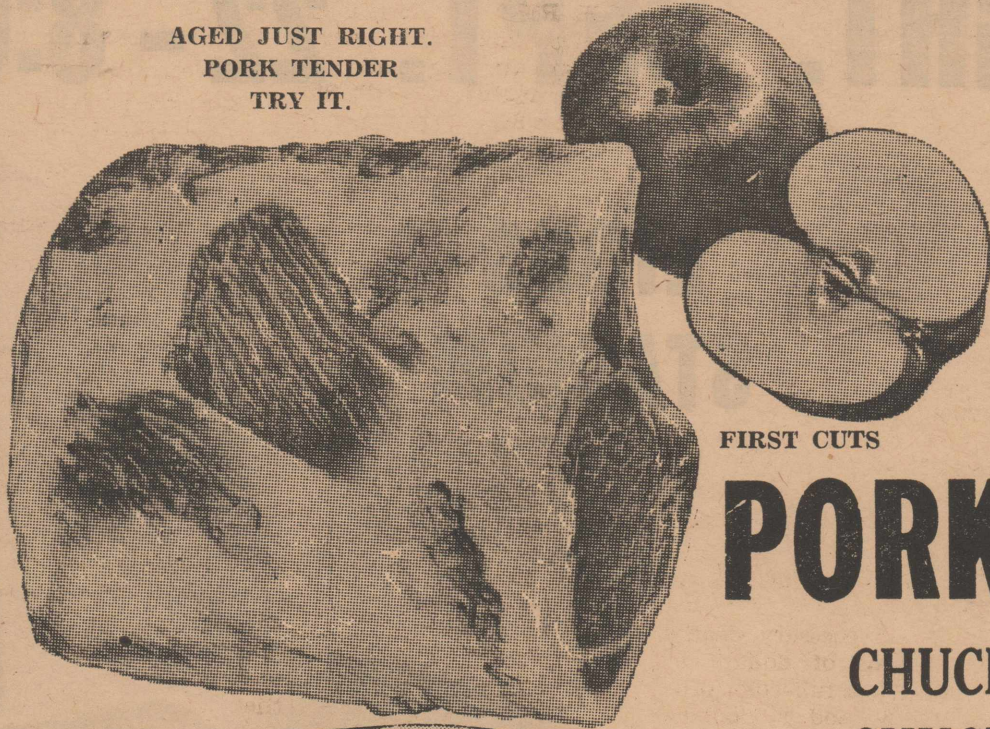

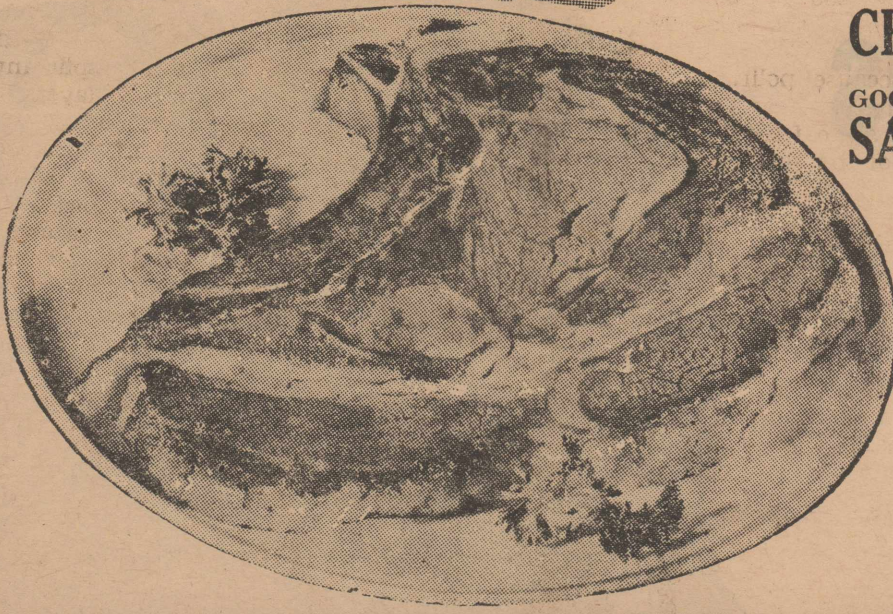

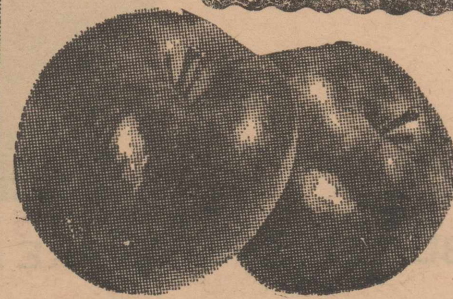

Scheduled for 7,000 feet and drilled to 6,750 feet, 4½-inch casing was set at 6,689 feet.

Gulf Oil Corp has dually completed as a one-mile southwest and the same distance southwest extension to lower Leonard oil production in the Tippett multipay field and recompleted from the Wolfcamp its No. 4-E J. E. Tippett, previously completed Wolfcamp oil pay opener, 10 miles southeast of McCamey.

It was finaled for 66.93 barrels of 39.2 gravity oil, plus 23.46 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 3,287-1, was through a 12-64-inch choke and lower Leonard perforations at 4,657-59 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons.

From the Wolfcamp, it was finaled for 72.86 barrels of 38.5 gravity oil plus 37.54 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 6,176-1, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,562-64 feet.

A gauge of 119.37 barrels of 38.5 gravity oil, plus 2.76 barrels of water and gas-oil ratio of 8,377-1, through a 13-64-inch choke and the above perforations, had been reported Aug. 16.

Originally scheduled in the Tippett, West (Ellenburger, McKee and 5,000-foot detrital) field, it was drilled to 6,036 feet.

Location is 2,980 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the northwest lines of the southwest half of 38-31-H&TC.

The Tippett, West multipay field gained its ninth producer 5,000-foot detrital with completion of Gulf Oil Corp. No. 6-E J. T. Tippett, nine miles southeast of McCamey, for a daily flowing potential of 210.45 barrels of 30.9 gravity oil, plus .69 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 855.1.

Production was through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,008-10 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

Triple completion is being effected through McKee perforations at 5,858-60 feet and lower Leonard through perforations at 4,705-09 feet. Operator was running packer leakage tests on both zone.

Location is 2,630 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the southeast lines of 36-31-H&TC.

Shell Oil Co. No. 1-37 Amacker Trust, in 37-31-H&TC, one location west of Gulf 4-E Tippett and ¾ mile southwest of Hueco and 4,950-foot Wolfcamp production in the Tippett field and 5,000-foot detrital in the Detrital in the Tippett, West field, has indicated production in an unidentified zone

with the flowing of 107 barrels of oil to separator and the reversing out of seven barrels of oil on a drillstem test in an unidentified zone.

Gas surfaced in five minutes, no gauges, mud in 18 minutes, and oil in 25 minutes, flowing the above gauge on the test taken at 5,342-93 feet. Tool was open an unreported time.

Flowing pressure was 925-1,367 pounds; 145-minute initial shut-in pressure, 2484 pounds; and three-hour final shut-in pressure, 2,350 pounds.

Operator was running pipe size and seat unreported. Total depth is 5,700 feet.

The Tippett, West multipay field gained its eighth 5,000-foot detrital producer with recompletion of Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 2 Amacker, Ellenburger producer and former McKee producer, 8½ miles south of McCamey.

It was finaled for 249-55 barrels of 41.6 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of

874-1. Production was through a 12-67-inch choke and perforations at 5,001-010 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons.

McKee perforations have been squeezed off.

It was finaled April 7 from the Ellenburger for 161 barrels of oil from open hole at 6,588 618 feet; and May 5 from the McKee for 136 barrels of 39.9 gravity oil through perforations at 5,377 878 feet.

Location is 2,050 feet from the northeast and 467 feet from the southeast lines of 35-31-H&TC.

Gulf Oil Corp. was preparing to run casing for completion attempt at its No. 7-E Tippett, in 36-31-H&TC, one location southeast of a triple McKee, Ellenburger and 5,000-foot detrital producer in the same field, nine miles southeast of McCamey.

A final one-hour drillstem test, possibly in the McKee between 5,845-901 feet, recovered 370 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud, 670 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut salt water and 3,000 feet of salt water, plus 1,750 feet of gas. Flowing pressure was 658-1,784 pounds; one-hour initial and 1½-hour final

shut-in pressures were 2,918 pounds.

Earlier, a drillstem test in an unidentified zone at 5,538-546 feet recovered 940 feet of oil.

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland will drill the No. 1 Perner Ranch as a 1½-mile southeast outpost to the Cox, North (Strawn and detrital gas) field 21 miles west-southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 40-2-I&GN. Contract depth is 8,800 feet to test the Strawn and detrital, elevation, 2,596 feet.

The discovery, Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-AA-TG University (formerly Texas Gulf Producing Co. No. 1-AA University) was finaled Oct. 3, 1961 for a calculated absolute open of 2.6 million cubic feet of gas daily through detrital perforations at 8,526-564 feet and Strawn perforations at 9,470-95 feet.

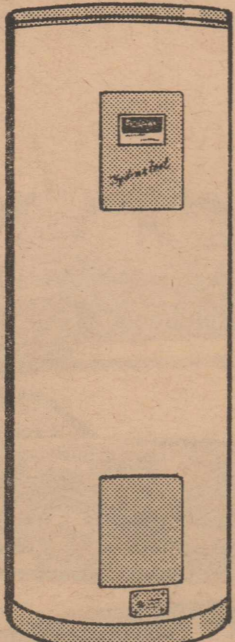
Mr. Sanders is band director at Ozona High School. Mrs. Sanders formerly taught at South Elementary. This is their first child.

He said types of work included by the program includes surface widening and replacement, base strengthening, seal coating and resurfacing and rebuilding of shoulders.

tide. This was the beginning of our worldwide aid program, he pointed out.

The Greeks are a competent people and are making good use of our aid, Col. Cannon said. They have their own pilot training program under U. S. modernized methods and, although theirs is a small force, it could be effective if put to the test. Of course, they have the same personnel problems as we have, the colonel said, putting money into expensive training programs to turn out pilots only to lose them to industry.

"The Greeks are about the staunchest allies we have in the world," Col. Cannon said. "This is a comforting feeling when we read about how different it is in many of the countries receiving our aid."

Col. Cannon will be engaged in essentially the same kind of work in his Korean assignment, the training of combat units in the Korean air force. He will head a team consisting of two Air Force Majors and a number of experienced non-commissioned officers on the mission. He will leave next week for his new duty. Col Cannon is a native of Phoenix, Ariz. The Cannons have rented one of the Holiday Terrace Apartments.
