# Crockett Wildcat Tests Ellenburger

Caroline Hunt Sands, Dallas, will drill a 9,600-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 12 miles southwest of Ozona, 31/4 miles northwest and the same distance southwest of the Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field and one mile due east of a 9,858-foot Ellenburger failure. It is the No. 1-14-32 University.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and east lines of 14-32- University, Elevation is 2,368 feet.

The failure, Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1-BW University, was abandoned Aug. 18, 1961, after unsuccessful tests of the Simpson through perforations at 9,272-282 feet and the Strawn through perforations at 8,-503-551 feet.




