Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Kolaches

2 cups milk ½ cup sugar

1/4 cup margarine

½ cup shortening 2 whole eggs

egg yolks

teas, salt

1 pkg. yeast 7 cups flour

Put lukewarm milk in bowl, add yeast and sprinkle with 2 tbs. sugar. Let set for a few minutes, while beatuntil thick. Add egg mixture to milk mixture. Add salt flour and mix well, then add melted margarine and shortsmooth. Set aside in warm place and let rise for 30 minutes, then work it down and knead it until it is very smooth and elastic. Cover and let rise until more than double in bulk. Cut out dough the size of a small egg with a teaspoon and shape into small balls and place on well greased baking sheet one inch apart. Brush with rise in a warm place. Make

4 tbs. sugar 3 tbs. melted butter 2 tbs. flour

Prune Filling

1 lb. cooked prunes 1½ cups sugar 3 tbs. melted butter vanilla or cinnamon

1 lb. cooked dry apricots 2 cups sugar

3 tbs. melted butter


