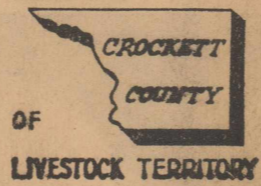

## Ozona Trackmen Enter First Meet At Stockton Sat.

Lion trackmen are scheduled to enter their first competition of the 1968 track season at the Fort Stockton Relays this Saturday. One of the earliest track meets in Texas, the Fort Stockton Relays is a three division affair with separate divisions set for AAAA school, one for AAA schools, and the 3rd for AA, A and B schools. Preliminaries are set for Saturday morning, and finals tabbed for Saturday afternoon.

Coach Chick Womack's Lions, defending 8A Champs as well as Regional Champions, may limit the number of entries and events because of the small amount of practice most of the 44 candidates have had. Since members of the basketball team reported for workouts, Coach Womack has been able to get in only 3 good workouts with the team.

Earlier in the week, Lion coaches were not able to determine who would be entering the Stockton Relays. But the Lions are preparing to defend their own Ozona Invitational Relay crown won last year. The Ozona Invitational is set for Saturday, March 2nd. Entries from 21 teams are expected for the Ozona track meet, several teams more than were able to attend last year.

## Heart Sunday Canvass Plans Made by Workers

A residential canvass here, giving every family a personal opportunity to advance the fight against the heart and blood vessel diseases, will get underway here Sunday, February 25 under the leadership of Mrs. W. B. Robertson, Jr., Heart Sunday Chairman.

## Opinion Of Archaeologists Sought In Identifying Ancient Grinding Tools Found In Pecos River Cave

David Cooke and Glynn Southard, local spelunkers, made an interesting find in a cave near the Pecos River last Thursday. An Indian relic of great age, it seemed to be a wooden grinding bowl and handle for grinding. The two boys, who hunt in the caves every chance they get, stumbled onto the cave where they found the relics almost by accident as they were climbing toward another cave. The entrance, which was about two feet wide, looked like a fissure in the bluff, but when the two investigated they found a long narrow cave and the bowl and handle. Frank Mills, local author on Indian relics, examined the pieces and told the explorers he had never seen pieces like that, except in South America. Most Indians in this part of the country had stone grinding bowls. Upon examination, the two discovered that the wood pieces were made from what is foreign to this part of the country and they were unable to identify it. They plan to send the two pieces to Austin for a carbon test, which they hope will give them the age of the relics. The young men expressed a theory that when the Spanish conquistadors came through South America and dispersed the Aztec and Maya Indian tribes some of them might possibly have wandered as far as the Pecos river country in search of a peaceful home.

## Adult Education Classes To Offer Four Courses

Plans have been completed for the adult education program, sponsored annually by the Ozona Woman's Forum. Four courses will be offered this year to Ozona adults free of charge, beginner's bridge, knitting, flower arranging and typing. All courses, with the exception of bridge, will begin Monday night March 4 at 7 o'clock. Bridge classes will be held on Tuesday night and classes will begin March 5. Classes will be held weekly for 6 weeks.

Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Bailey will instruct the beginner's bridge class. This course is designed strictly for beginners and will begin with the deal of the cards, scoring, point count and other basic fundamentals. The course will last 1½ hours, and will be held in the library.

The course on Floral Arrangements for the Home will be taught by Mrs. Charles Williams in the kitchen of the high school Homemaking Department. Mrs. Williams will use the first meeting to register adults interested in the course and give information on supplies needed. Everyone will be asked to furnish her own materials for the class, which will last an hour.

Mrs. James Baggett and Mrs. Ralph Jones will instruct the knitting class which will be held in the parlor of the Homemaking Department. Instruction will begin the first night and Mrs. Baggett suggested that anyone already knitting on an item bring it along. Others are asked to bring a pair of medium sized needles, 5, 6 or 7, and some yarn, medium worsted is easiest to work with.

Mrs. Pete North, instructor for the typing class, said that this class will begin typing the first night and anyone who wishes to use his own typewriter may do so. Typing classes will be held in the high school commercial department located on the second floor.

Thirty typewriters are available and preference will be given to adults. However, if there are any vacancies senior students may enter the class. This class will also last one hour.

## VIP Field Gets Third Clearfork Oil Production

The VIP (multipay Clearfork oil and gas) field of southwest Crockett County gained its third middle Clearfork oil producer and a location north extension to that pay with completion of Sunray DX Oil Co., Midland, No. 1 V. I. Pierce, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finished for 110 barrels, of 34.8 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 735 - 1. Production was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 2,610-75 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 40,000 pounds of sand. Tubing pressure was 175 pounds; casing pressure, 400 pounds.

Top of pay was picked at 2,610 feet on ground elevation of 2,381 feet.

Drilled to 2,900 feet, with 4½-inch casing set at 2,899 feet, it is plugged back to 2,869 feet.

Location is 2,300 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 3-BBB-TCRR.

The field has one middle Clearfork gas producer, two lower Clearfork oil producers and two Clearfork gas producers.

## Four Quality To Compete In Dist. 4-H Food Show

Enemencia Diaz, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lucio Diaz, was named county winner in the senior division and Elizabeth Zapata, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Zapata, was named winner of the junior division in the 4th annual Crockett County 4-H Food Show on Saturday. Second place winners in the two divisions who, along with the first place winners, will represent county at the district 4-H food show in April, were Mary Jane Martinez, senior division, daughter of Mrs. Elvira Martinez and Sylvia Flores, junior division daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leandro Flores. Named first alternates were Mary Frances Martinez, daughter of Mrs. Elvira Martinez, and Kaye Rippetoe, junior division, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Rippetoe.

Forty-three 4-H members participated in the show and received 28 blue ribbon awards, 12 red ribbons and only three white ribbons. Food Show contestants were scored on the basis of 50 percent of the total score on their 4-H food record, 25 percent on the recipe and menu and 25 percent on the exhibitors knowledge of food and nutrition, the food exhibited and the exhibit itself. Blue ribbons were awarded on scores of 90 or better, red ribbons on scores of 80 to 89 and white ribbons on scores of 70 to 79.

Mr. Schauer was found dead in a San Antonio Motel late Friday afternoon. From information received here death came suddenly from natural causes late Wednesday night. He was on a business trip to San Antonio.

Born in Ozona May 25, 1923, he moved to Del Rio with his family in boyhood. He was a Sales Engineer for Schlumberger Well Service and had lived in Victoria the past 17 years. 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#### JUNGLE LAW AT SEA

North Korea's seizure of the Pueblo dramatized still another failure of the United Nations. The Law of the Sea today is the law of the jungle. Nothing more. It is important for Americans to understand how this has come about.

In the spring of 1958, the United Nations convened in Geneva to consider the Law of the Sea and to codify an international agreement on a number of key issues. Brought to formal consideration were these two questions: How far from the shores of a nation is the limit of territorial sovereignty? How far from the shores of a nation is the limit of that nation's exclusive fishing rights?

The US representatives urged that both limits to be set at 3 miles. This had been our position since it was first advanced by Thomas Jefferson in 1791. It was the position of most of the maritime powers. It was the limit which had been upheld in arbitration and judicial action when disputes arose between nations.

No agreement was reached in the 1958 conference. So an identical conference (with 2 more new members present) was convened in Geneva. Summarizing the situation at that moment, Arthur H. Dean, chairman of the US delegation, pointed out that different limits had been proposed in 1958 and that, although no agreement had been reached, he took it to be the sense of the previous conference that it agreed the limit could vary from 3 to 12 miles. Mr. Dean

then proposed that a 6-mile limit be accepted by the conference.

Arthur Dean was putting the best face on the 1958 conference. What had really happened was that no limit had been agreed upon. And the 1960 conference ended exactly where the 1958 conference had ended; there was no agreement on any limit, whatsoever. The reason was this: non-maritime nations, the "have-nots" nations, the Arab bloc, the African nations, and the Communists voted down every proposal by the maritime powers. Technical experts were scolded. Precedent and experience were thrust aside. The concept of international law was rejected. The majority of the conference was united in opposition to any interest of the Western powers.

The implication of these two UN conferences on the Law of the Sea must not be ignored by the Congress any longer. The Law of the jungle was established. The territorial waters of a hostile nation are whatever that nation states them to be on any given day. Our State Department has jeopardized our sailors and our vessels by their see no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil attitude in this perilous circumstance.

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#### Recipe of the Week

#### Kolaches

- 2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup margarine
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 2 whole eggs
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 teas. salt
- 1 pkg. yeast
- 7 cups flour

Put lukewarm milk in bowl, add yeast and sprinkle with 2 tbs. sugar. Let set for a few minutes, while beating eggs and sugar together until thick. Add egg mixture to milk mixture. Add salt, flour and mix well, then add melted margarine and shortening. Work dough until smooth. Set aside in warm place and let rise for 30 minutes, then work it down and knead, until it is very smooth and elastic. Cover and let rise until more than double in bulk. Cut out dough the size of a small egg with a teaspoon and shape into small balls and place on well greased baking sheet one inch apart. Brush with melted shortening and let rise in a warm place. Make a well in the center of each ball of dough and fill with your favorite filling. Bake in pre-heated 450 degree oven 15 minutes or until golden brown then brush with melted butter and sprinkle with sugar.

#### Cheese Filling

- 1 lb. cottage cheese
- 2 egg yolks
- Pinch of salt
- 4 tbs. sugar
- 3 tbs. melted butter
- 2 tbs. flour

#### Prune Filling

- 1 lb. cooked prunes
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 tbs. melted butter
- vanilla or cinnamon

#### Apricot Filling

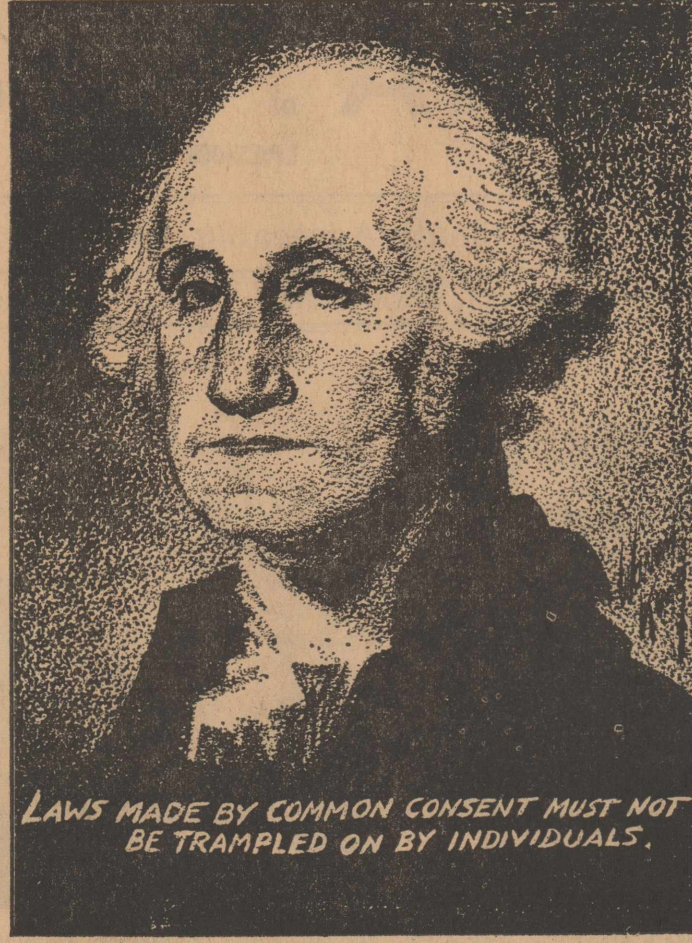
- 1 lb. cooked dry apricots
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 3 tbs. melted butter
  - 1/2 teas. almond flavoring

#### TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

**Bury Faulty Shells** — Anytime a rifle cartridge or shotgun shell fails to fire immediately remove it from your gun and bury it deep in the ground.

Sometimes these mis-fires will explode if hit or exposed to unusual heat. Never toss a mis-fire round into the brush for it could strike just right on a rock and explode.

**Smoke Odor Spooks Deer** — Alcohol and gunpowder don't mix. So if you hunt, don't drink or smoke.

Remember the wind can carry the cigarette, cigar or pipe smoke odor to the deer and spook that big buck before he steps into the clearing.

If the barometric pressure is low, the smoke will cling close to the ground and the odor will carry a long distance.

**Handwarmer Warning** — Careful where you keep that handwarmer. Never slip it into a pocket in which there is live ammunition.

And don't drop it into the inside pocket of plastic waders. Those warmers can get very hot and will cause plastic to melt.

**Fingernail Polish Protects Matches** — It's a sad camper who learns the hard way

that wet matches won't light. Here's one way to waterproof 'em.

Dip the match heads in clear fingernail polish. Polish not only sheds water but burns readily.

**Pebble Keeps Mouth Moist** — If you're hiking with a dry canteen, here's a tip that will help you last until the next waterhole.

Put a small stone or button in your mouth and you'll find you won't be quite so dry.

**MAKE Your Dog Happy** — It doesn't take much to make a bird dog happy. His life is made up of simple pleasures.

When hot weather comes he relishes a patch of soft ground in the shade, on which to nap, with a pan of cool, fresh water within easy reach.

If you care for your dog you'll see that he gets these physical comforts.

**FINDING Motor Leak** — Have you ever had your outboard motor spring a leak that you could not find? If so, try dusting a little talcum powder over your motor. In a few minutes the leak will stand out clearly against the white powder.

**GIVING Your Dog Medicine** — Does your sick dog stir up a storm when you try to give him a dose of medicine?

Don't try to ram the stuff

down his throat. There's no need for unpleasantness.

Just pull out a corner of his lower lip and pour the liquid in. Then hold his jaws close, raise his head and stroke his throat until the medicine is swallowed.

**CLEANING A Leader** — To clean a leader that has picked up floatant from the fingers, or from contact with freshly-dressed line, remove the fluid-soaked cotton filler from a cigarette lighter and stripclean the leader with it. This works better than slime or detergent.

**DOGGONE Good Fish Bait** — If you want to create your own little fishing "hot spot" just take several cans of dog food — any brand — and punch holes in the end. Then tie these cans together with tough twine and sink them at your favorite fishing spot.

In a day, or so, you should be able to fill your stringer in a hurry — at that spot.

**ICE For Your Camp Cooler** — Campers often are faced with the problem of not having enough ice.

Usually this is because the cubs they brought with them were soon melted. Ice can be made to last much longer if, instead of filling the chest with conventional cubes, you freeze water in 1-quart, or gallon, milk cartons.

These king-size ice cubes melt much more slowly. And they will last much, much longer if re-frozen in the deep freezer.

Take along an old towel or rag when you go fishing. After removing a fish from the

hook, wipe the slime off your hands with the towel. Sure saves your pants.

Believe it or not, some fish can't stand waves. They get seasick after an extended period of wave washing.

Ever watch a butterfly? It does its tasting with its feet as it flits about from flower to flower.

When using a dip net on fish, put the net into the water and work the fish toward it. A sudden movement of the net will cause the fish to take another plunge for freedom and that plunge may mean the last you'll see of the fish.

Bats that frequent caverns are great insect eaters. It is estimated that those around Carlsbad Caverns eat several tons of insects each night.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — State attention continues to center on the embattled Texas Liquor Control Board.

Speaker Ben Barnes appointed a special subcommittee from the House State Affairs Committee to study possible changes in the election laws. Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, committee chairman, also heads the subcommittee.

Cory stressed that the committee will not investigate Board operations. It will look into the cumbersome liquor laws which have not been modernized since they were first adopted in 1935. Chairman Cory says the panel will be ready with its recommendations (which conceivably could include legalization of liquor-by-the-drink sales) "whenever Governor Connally calls a special session of the Legislature."

LCB itself has drafted a set of recommendations which include the provision that no private clubs, veterans or fraternal organization can serve liquor over the bar in dry areas without local-option election approval.

Special Session Talks — with all the 1968 candidates now on the line and campaigns still in low gear, favorite capitol speculation is the date of the upcoming special legislative session.

Governor Connally must call one in order to pass a 1969 budget and a new tax bill. This has to be done before September 1, start of the next fiscal year. Otherwise, there will be no money for continuation of state services.

Oil Demand Continued blockage of the Suez Canal and the TAP pipeline in the Middle East again has zoomed demand for Texas oil.

Railroad Commission increased February oil production allowable from 47 to 49.6 per cent of potential, retroactive to February 1.

Commission set March factor at the same level, responding to demand by producers.

New allowable will permit maximum production of 3,732,485 barrels a day, compared with 3,588,958 under 47 per cent factor.

Fire Rate Cut Proposed — State Board of Insurance proposed its first cuts in seven years (average of 3.6 per cent) in statewide fire extended coverage and home owners insurance premiums.

Rate experts suggested 4.4 per cent reduction in fire premiums, 3 per cent in extended coverage and 3.1 per cent average for home owners.

Fire and extended coverage rates are set statewide, and homeowners rates are figured on a three-region basis due to weather hazards.

Motor Vehicle Inspection Lags

Austin — The Texas Department of Public Safety reported today that more than 4,250,000 vehicles still remain to be inspected for the 1968 tskicker before the April 15 deadline.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, said that only 1,574,397 cars had been inspected so far this year. The total number of vehicles inspected during 1967 was 5,702,862.

Garrison urged motorists to have their cars inspected as soon as possible in order to avoid the long lines which will undoubtedly develop as the inspection period draws to a close.

Garrison reminded car owners that under new provisions of the law the inspection will include front seat belts in cars where the anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment, steering, and wheels and rims.
