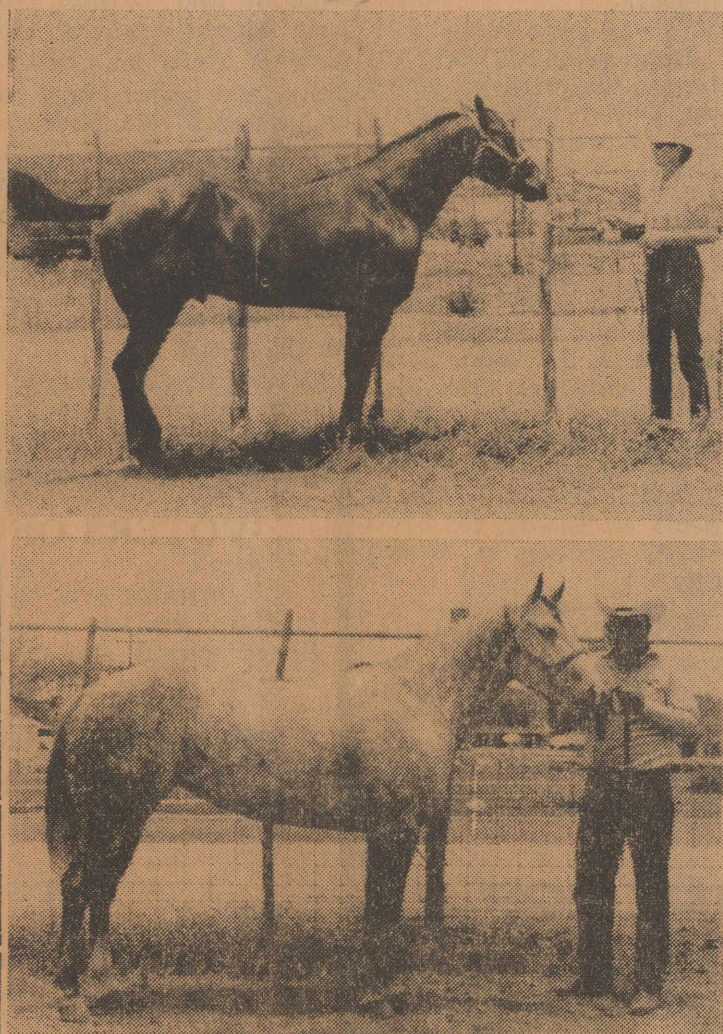

## Ranchers Urged To Keep Lookout For Screwworms

Ranchers in Crockett and area counties were warned this week by County Agent Pete W. Jacoby to keep a sharp lookout for possible screwworm cases among their livestock.

The outbreaks are getting closer, according to a news release from the Mission screwworm control center this week. With all the wet weather this winter and spring, Jacoby said, there is real danger of widespread outbreak of worms. Careful watch to catch every case and report it so that sterile fly treatment can be applied immediately may prevent a recurrence of last year's widespread infestation, Jacoby said.

Screwworm cases were reported early this week in Terrell, Kimble and Edwards counties, according to the Mission news release.

For the second consecutive day, Texas chalked up 19 new screwworm cases on Tuesday, says the Mission report.

The new outbreaks boost the state's total cases for the year to 188. This week's (Continued on Page Five)

## Court Continues U.S. Suit Against Water District

Principals in the suit filed by the United States government against the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District to collect an alleged indebtedness of \$88,000, plus an estimated \$16,000 in interest, in connection with water service to the former Air Force Station east of Ozona, met in U. S. District Court in San Angelo Monday for a pre-trial conference before U. S. District Judge Joe E. Estes.

After additional pleadings and a motion for a summary judgment had been filed by attorneys for the Water District, the government filed a motion for a continuance in order to enable it to investigate and evaluate the various defenses being asserted by the defendant Water District in its answer to the government suit.

Mrs. Rex Halydier, appointed by the court to the post of Commissioner, precinct 2, upon the death of her husband about two years ago, will face Bill Black in the election Saturday. In the first primary Black polled 99 votes and Mrs. Halydier 89. Winner in this primary will be opposed by Charles Applewhite, Republican, in November.

Polls will open Saturday morning at 8 o'clock and close at 7 o'clock Saturday night.

All polling places will be open, although precinct 4 voters will vote only in the governor's race. Polling places will be the courthouse for precinct 1 voters, the high school and Powell Field for precinct 2, the Civic Center and the power plant for precinct 3, and South Elementary school for precinct 4.

Absentee voting has been heavy for a run-off election, according to County Clerk Leta Powell. This indicates a possible large turn-out of voters for a second primary.

**GUEST EDITORIAL**

A few days ago, Senator Karl E. Mundt, Republican of South Dakota, addressed the Senate on the subject of the so-called Poor People's March on Washington. The following is expected from that speech:

"... Think of what we confront, Mr. President. We are told that little children will be brought in in great numbers in the march. Why? They cannot vote. They cannot even understand what all these arguments are about. We are told that they will be used in the formula invented by the Vietcong in the war in Vietnam, where they put women and children in front of the marchers in a war. They propose to do that as they loot the stores, as they try to disrupt orderly government in Washington, as they overrun our public buildings.

"We are told that people will be enlisted in this crusade, pathetic, ill, elderly citizens. Why? Because they make such a picture of police brutality for television. A crippled man who has been knocked over — part of the great propaganda to discredit law and order in this country. The type of incident some television stations seem to delight in over-emphasizing and in projecting to their viewers. . . .

"Mr. President, no one wants this march to eventuate into disorder or crime. But I submit that no one is in a position to guarantee today that this cannot occur. No one knows how many people are coming. Some of the evidence indicates that the leaders of the march are planning to produce over 100,000 by the end of this month, and, if they do not get what they want, over 200,000 by the end of June, and after that they plan to keep the people coming in until they win.

"I defy a single spokesman for this administration to tell us what they have done, even remotely, to protect the community from the first 100,000, to say nothing of the second or third. "I doubt that members of Congress who would crawl to kiss the boot of a rioter, to give rioters what they want, are sufficient in number to carry a single motion or a single measure while these people are here. I hope that is the case, because if Congress, along with the Administration, starts capitulating to intimidation, law and order will have been reduced to archaic phrases to be studied only in our history books. . . ."

Cost will be \$1.50 per car. Proceeds from the car wash will be used for the club's civic projects.

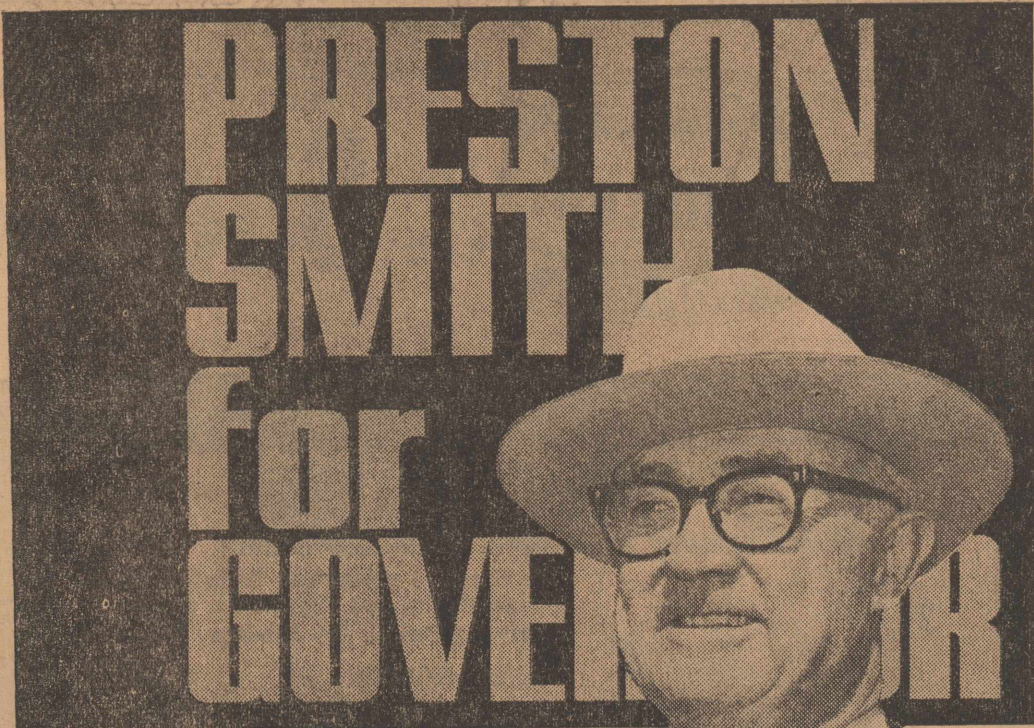

 trict's motion for a summary judgment nor did the court announce when the case would be reset for trial.

The Water District is being represented by attorneys Bill Griffis and Dick Davis of San Angelo while the U. S. attorneys at the pre-trial hearing were Melvin Diggs and his assistant Andrew Bai.

The suit is the outgrowth of a contract between the Water District and the U. S. Air Force to supply water for use at the AF Station which was activated in 1960 after being two years under construction. After drilling several test wells on the government's property and failing to get a sufficient water supply, the Air Force opened negotiations with the Water District. The result was a contract to supply the base at a stated per thousand and gallon rate, the government advancing the total cost of the installation, such cost to be returned by a system of credits on monthly water bills.

The Air Force Station was closed in 1963 and negotiations were then begun by the water district to dispose of the contract obligation. Offers were made to the Air Force to pay salvage value for the property, since at that time there was no demand for water at the base. The abandoned facility was sold to Troy Dutton and associates in Feb. of 1965 for \$175,000. The existing water system was partly dismantled. The only source of supply immediately available was that of the water district and after replacing components dismantled by the government, the district began to supply the residential addition created by the purchasers.

The Water District in its pleadings points to the availability of water making possible sale of the property. Another strong contention of the district as outlined in attorneys' pleadings is that the government can not create an indebtedness against taxpayers of the district without a vote and that under existing circumstances the facility would never amortize the sum asked by the government.

 total so far is 38, one more case than Texas had reported through the end of May last year.

Heavy infestations of cases in the Rio Grande Valley and Medina - Uvalde Counties appear to be getting under control, officials at the Mission Screwworm Eradication Laboratory report, following intensified releases of sterile screwworm flies over these target areas. More than 2,000 sterile flies per square mile have been distributed over these areas during the past week by Mission-based and Uvalde-based planes.

Additional outbreaks of cases are showing up, however, in DeWitt County. Seven cases were recorded there Tuesday in areas around Yorktown and Westoff. The critical areas will be treated with increased releases of sterile flies.

Jim Hogg County reported three cases Tuesday and will receive accelerated sterile fly treatments.

Kimble County, in Extension District 7, recorded its

first case of the year Tuesday on a ranch south of Junction, Terrell County, in District 6, also had its first case confirmed, as did Edwards County. Sterile fly treatments will be starting immediately there.

Other District 12 counties recording cases were Hidalgo, one north of Edinburg; Medina, one north of D'Hanis; San Patricio, one; Zavala, one; and Kenedy, one near Sarita. District 10 counties with cases confirmed Tuesday were Atascosa, one southwest of Charlotte; and Karnes, one near Gillette.

### Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

Prospects for the enactment of an effective crime bill at this session were advanced last week when the Senate okayed a measure approved in the House. As passed by the Senate, the bill will help law enforcement unless the Supreme Court later knocks them out.

The Senate version reverses key Supreme Court decisions restricting the use as evidence in court of confessions and police interrogations? One, a 5-to-4 decision by the Court, held that a confession is invalid unless the suspect has been given a series of notices prior to questioning and unless he understands that the police will make available to him a lawyer to sit by his side and advise him during an interrogation. This absurd ruling served as a barrier to any effective questioning of criminal suspects.

The Senate amendment allows the trial judge, taking into account all the surrounding circumstances, to decide if the confession is voluntary.

The bill also allows six hours for questioning of a suspect in federal cases before there is actual arraignment before a magistrate. The Supreme Court had turned loose on society some desperate criminals solely because they were not rushed before a magistrate following arrest.

The Senate version also allows wiretapping in certain investigations, where approved by a Judge in advance. And it restricts the mail order purchases of pistols.

Another provision authorizes \$100 million the first year and \$300 million the second year, of federal grants to the States, for use in towns of under 25,000, designed to help cope with organized crime, riots, and other violent civil disturbances.

These are the chief provisions in the much-debated bill as it now stands. The House must approve the Senate version or a conference

committee must resolve the differences, before the measure can be sent to the White House.

The bill still must face some rough sailing in the House, but many of us are determined to get a good bill enacted if humanly possible particularly the provisions which correct some of the pro-crime bloopers committed by the Supreme Court which have successfully tilted some procedures in favor of the criminal and against society.

The Poor People's welfare campaign has just released its latest demand — that "a national guaranteed minimum income of \$4,000 for every American family" be promptly enacted by the Congress — or else! This is to be paid whether they work or not.

On this subject, a Capitol Hill wag reported; "Did you know that two members of the marchers dropped dead over in the Capitol this morning?" "What happened?" someone asked. "Somebody offered them a job!" was the response.

### Ellenburger Strike Assured In Crockett World Field Area

An Ellenburger discovery was assured in Crockett County with the flowing of 64.81 barrels of oil in six hours, plus gas at the rate of 1,212,000 cubic feet daily at Mallard Petroleum Inc., Midland, No. 1 Conoco-Enco, in 2-BB2-Nariso A. Miller, multipay prospect, surrounded by Grayburg production, 1 1/2 miles south of the Ellenburger oil opener, but separated by a recent Ellenburger failure, in the World field, 14 miles southwest of Big Lake.

Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,100-182 feet, with tubing pressure of 750-800 pounds.

Operator was installing high pressure test equipment.

Strawn production was indicated while being drilled with the recovery of four barrels of heavily oil and gas-cut mud, 12 1/2 barrels of 41.7 gravity oil, and 130 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud on a test at 8,055-83 feet.

Tyra & Tyra, Midland, will drill the No. 1-5 University, a 2,400-foot Grayburg-San Andres wildcat, in Crockett County, 14 miles south of Big Lake, 1 1/2 miles northwest of the depleted Block 51 (Fusselman and San Andres) field and 2 1/2 miles south of the Farmer (San Andres) field.

Location is 1,810 feet from the north and 560 feet from the west lines of 5-51-University.

It is approximately 100 feet west of a 10,358-foot Ellenburger failure, Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-E CCC-University, which was abandoned Nov. 17, 1948.

Atlantic Richfield Co., Midland, will plug back to wildcat depth of 2,000 feet for completion attempt in the Queen at its No. 2 J. M. Shannon, former Ellenburger producer in the Todd Deep (Crinoidal and Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 20 miles northwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 65-UV-GC&SF.

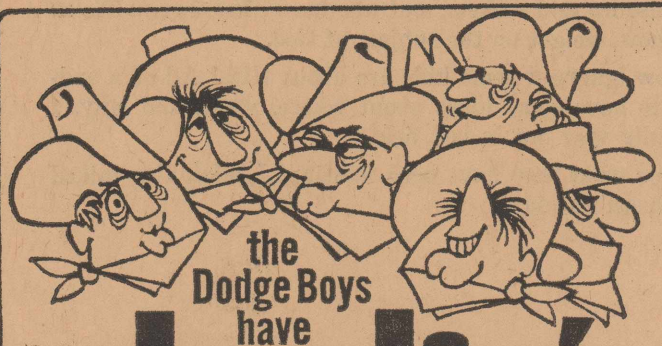

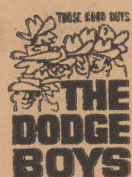
