





Congressional authorities, including Carl Albert, Democratic leader of the House, are now saying that to require registration and licensing "would put a burden on the lawabiding citizen and would have no way of reaching the criminal who intends to use his gun for illegal purposes."

Many experts agree with me that mandatory registration would not make a dent in the crime rate. There are more than 100 million guns privately owned. The criminal element would not voluntarily register their guns. That's been the experience in States which require registration. Besides, police records reveal that most guns used in crime are stolen.
