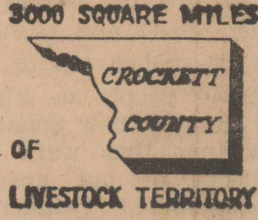

Methodists To Hear San Angelo Speaker Sunday

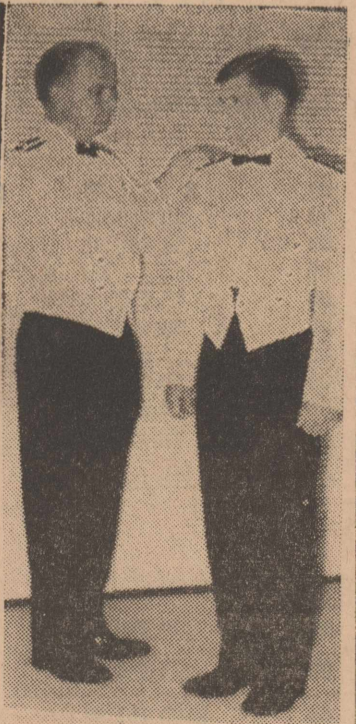

Test May Bring Sulfur Action To Crockett County

Southland Royalty Co. has confirmed information that it has begun a test 17 miles north of Ozona that could bring the West Texas sulfur boom to Crockett county for the first time.

The test, No. 1-27 Shannon, being drilled is being drilled by Southland on Shannon Estate land in the Todd Field area and is slated for 1,900 feet.

Southland officials announced that the test is being drilled "tight", no information being planned other than the test location, a policy said to be in keeping with the super-secrecy of other sulfur exploration efforts.

An area geologist has been quoted as saying that the Crockett County test is "in a completely different trend" from the recent sulfur find in Tom Green county near Christoval. The geologist said that he knew of a few scattered shows in the area.

The announcement by Southland of the Crockett test came on the heels of an announcement by Duval Corp. of plans to build a \$65 million plant 17 miles west of Orla in Culberson county. The Culberson strike by Duval has been estimated at 5080 million tons, worth about \$3.4 billions.

Sulfur activity in Pecos and Culberson counties have heightened prospects that the sulfur boom may be as big a boom to West Texas economy as the oil boom.

Sulfur trend strata have been identified running from Christoval into New Mexico through a wide swath of West Texas.

Property Loss Heavy In Series Traffic Mishaps

Highway Patrolman Orvil Perry investigated several traffic mishaps over the weekend, all but one minor.

The most serious accident occurred 8.7 miles west of Ozona on Hwy 290 at 6:15 Saturday morning. Four Burnet residents narrowly escaped serious injury when Ernestine Baker, driving a 1967 Chevrolet and traveling east, swerved to avoid an oncoming automobile, ran off the shoulder, lost control as she cut back and slammed broadside into a concrete bridge. One passenger, Glenn Lewis, was treated and released at Crockett County Hospital.

Thursday night Manuel Camarrillo, Jr., driving a 1961 Dodge pickup, hit a parked 1952 Ford pickup belonging to Felipe Castro, in front of the Castro residence at Ramos and Cima streets. Camarrillo said his brakes failed as he came down a hill, forcing him to make a wide turn and collided with the parked vehicle. Damage to the Ford was \$50 and to the Dodge \$75.

Just after noon Friday a 1965 pickup driven by Tommy Joe Loudamy clipped the fender of a 1959 Chevrolet station wagon, driven by Rosa Ingram, as he drove out of an alley near the post office. The Ingram car was turning south on Ave. F. Damage to the pickup was \$150 and to the station wagon \$200.

Ozona All-Stars Wiped Out 9-0 In Playoff Opener

Ozona's Little League All-Star team was shut-out to the tune of 9-0 Thursday night by Sonora All-Stars, with a capacity crowd of fans from both towns looking on at the Little League park here.

The winning pitcher was Henry Mata and the loser was Richard Gonzales. In a flurry of hitting, Sonora's Browne slammed one over the fence for a one-run homer. Mata only allowed two base hits all night long.

Sonora scored three runs in the first inning and Gonzales was retired in favor of Jeff Stuart, who in turn gave up his position at the mound to Chris Reeves. Errors were the contributing factor to the lopsided score.

As one Ozona Little League official put it "the whole story was too much Mata and too many errors."

Sonora beat Midkiff, the winner of the Big Lake-Midkiff playoff, 13-1 in Sonora Tuesday night, while Pecos was downing Crane 15-0. The Sonora team will play the Pecos All-Stars Friday night in Sonora for the regional championship.

Ozona Postoffice Curtails Window Service Saturday

Due to a recently enacted bill by Congress, ordering an employment cut-back in the postal service, the Ozona post office will be closed for window service beginning next Saturday, according to postmaster Floyd Hokit.

Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson moved to comply with the bill by ordering some postal services and hiring curtailed. "Under the manpower restrictions imposed by the tax bill, we simply will not have enough people to continue all postal services at their present level," he said.

Effective July 27, all Saturday and Sunday window service at first and second class post offices and classified units will be discontinued except that a general delivery or call window may be opened for not more than two hours to deliver mail regularly addressed to general delivery. The above order affects Ozona, as the post office here is classified second class.

Hokit said that although the directive makes it possible to open the general delivery window two hours, for the express purpose of mail delivery, that the Ozona office will not do so because of lack of volume in general delivery. Those wishing Saturday mail delivery may rent a post office box. Mail will be dispatched out of town and put in boxes as in the past, the only change will be the discontinuance of window service on Saturdays.

There will be no change in window service hours currently provided Monday through Friday each week. There will be no reduction in personnel in the local office, only a reduction in service.

Work began this week at the intersection of Highways 290 and 163 on installation of a new traffic lighting system. Replacing the old traffic light in the center of the intersection will be new overhead signal lights.

The new lights will be installed on diagonal corners

and will form an arch over the intersection. The new installation will be set up to favor traffic going east and west on Hwy 290. Automatic sensors will be installed on both sides of the intersection on Hwy 163 and will stop traffic on Hwy 290 when a vehicle approaches the intersection and allow north-south traffic to clear before returning the right-of-way to east-west travelers.

Parking limits signs have been moved back to make room for the automatic sensors and a concrete island curb is being built from the park to the edge of Hwy 290 on the south side of the square. Angle parking will still be allowed around the park and the curb will not take up any parking space. The curb is a safety feature, supposedly, to eliminate right-hand turns in the parking spaces when they are empty.

The commissioner's court and the State Highway Department have been discussing a change in the highway intersection for over a year. Only recently was a plan accepted and put into effect.

Installation of the sensors eliminated some parking space in front of businesses located on the corners of the intersection. After a complaint was filed by one of the proprietors, the state agency compromised and eliminated ten feet of the space on the original plan.

A plan was discussed by the commissioner's court to build a parking rail around the rock wall of the park where vehicles park at an angle, after several complaints came from automobile owners who had damaged the fronts of their vehicles on the wall. However, the court has not come up with a plan that would allow the safety rail and still leave room for angle parking. The project is still under discussion.

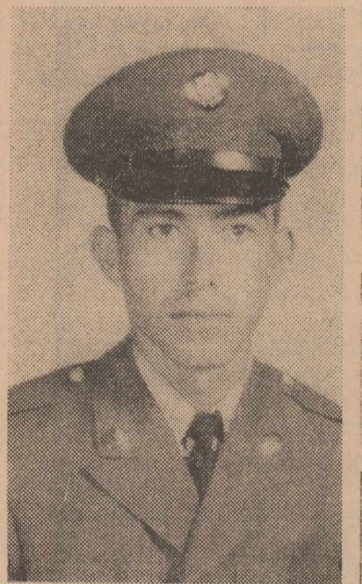
Funeral Here For Mrs. Sawyer Former Ozonan

CITIZEN MAFIA?

The emotional cackling for "gun registration" has begun to die down a bit. Those who sought to persuade Congress that sportsmen who own hunting guns and homeowners who own weapons, are all potential assassins, have talked themselves hoarse enough to listen for a moment, perhaps. They wailed that the National Rifle Association was some sort of citizen mafia, without being able to cite a case when a member assassinated anybody. It is certain that not one of the assassins cited as the reason for gun registration was a member, past or present.

In fact, if the Kennedy-King-Kennedy assassinations were the pressing reasons for registration—and they were so represented—then clearly it would be more effective to register Communists than guns. But in our society the thought of registering Communists is unthinkable; it would violate their "civil rights." Is it better to restrict the civil rights of every citizen in the land?

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Sensing the News

The Fortas-Warren Maneuvers

The more complex the political maneuvers become to force Senate confirmation of the nomination of Justice Abe Fortas as Chief Justice, the more clear it is that the Senate will act responsibly and in the public interest if it rejects the nomination.

On the one hand, Chief Justice Earl Warren is busily trying to pressure the Senate into confirmation. He threatens to remain on the bench if Mr. Fortas is not approved as his successor. Under the U. S. Constitution, a justice of the Supreme Court has no voice in the selection of his successor. This does not deter Mr. Warren, who already is guilty of many usurpations of power and who has only contempt for the procedures of constitutional government.

The Senate has an unquestionable right to refuse to confirm any judicial nomination it deems improper. Indeed one-sixth of the Supreme Court nominees presented to the Senate in our country's history have been rejected. In such cases, it is the President's duty to submit the name of other nominees, more acceptable to the Senate. Certainly, the Founding Fathers never intended for a Supreme Court justice to play a part in naming the man who succeeds him on the bench. If Mr. Warren is allowed to get away with this grossly political maneuver, designed to elevate another "liberal" activist and fasten that philosophy on the court for years ahead, the other justices likewise will be encouraged

to take a hand in choosing their successors.

What Earl Warren is doing is an affront to the Senate and to the people. He would render meaningless the power to confirm or reject, that the Constitution assigns to the Senate. As the next President will be chosen by the people, Mr. Warren is trying to silence the voice of the people. He is playing politics in a way unheard of in the history of the U. S. Supreme Court.

The whole deal involving Mr. Warren's negotiated retirement, which constitutes maneuvering to create a vacancy on the bench, is sordid in character. It smacks of something worked out in a smoke-filled room at a political meeting. It is cynical as well as unconstitutional. As U. S. Senator Robert P. Griffin has said, the maneuvering "suggests a shocking lack of faith in our system and the people who make it work."

Leaving aside these aspects of the nomination, there is the question of Justice Fortas' activities to consider. It appears that Mr. Fortas, while on the bench, has displayed little respect for the principle of the separation of powers that is basic to our constitutional system. The New York Times Magazine said June 4, 1967, that Mr. Fortas is "drawn into non-judicial matters by friends who want government jobs and know he still carries weight at the White House." The Times cited Justice Fortas' role in landing a federal judgeship for one man, in advising the President on coping with steel increases and in helping to frame measures dealing with labor disputes.

United Press International said June 27, 1968, that "Fortas has been one of the President's closest advisers, in a wide range of governmental matters, even while serving as an associate justice."

This involvement is ample cause for rejecting his nomination. It is a much more serious matter than mere cronyism, for a judge of any court should know that he has no business taking part in the decisions of the executive, whether of a state or of the nation. A Justice who also is a political adviser and aide to a President cannot be impartial when he goes on the bench. He is a participant in the political process when he is an adviser, and this a judge has no right to be. A judge who is an agent or a political co-worker of the Chief Executive is violating the deepest traditions of the Anglo-Saxon legal system. Mr. Fortas apparently does not recognize this, or, if he does recognize it, he is contemptuous of the obligations of a judge in this respect. Whatever his rationale for working as a White House adviser, the relationship he has maintained is an improper one. It profoundly disqualifies him for the high

position of Chief Justice.

These facts and issues must be spelled out to the American people so that they can let their Senators know that they want the traditions of our government upheld. Mr. Fortas may be a skilled political fixer, who has rescued the Johnson administration from many tight spots. But that is not a credential for Chief Justice. The next man who holds that post should be a man who cherishes the Constitution and is respectful towards its underlying principles. Mr. Fortas doesn't fit the bill.

Ozona Girl Among 22 Young Pianists In UofT Workshop

Austin, Texas — Twenty-two talented young pianists have been accepted to participate July 29-Aug. 8 in a Piano Performance Workshop for high school students at The University of Texas.

The workshop is under sponsorship of the Music Department.

The students will receive intensive instruction, individually and in groups, from UT music professors — Dr. William Race and William Doppmann.

"This is a highly selective program that we plan to offer each summer," Dr. Race said. "The students we have

chosen are serious young artists who intend to be piano majors in universities and to continue in professional piano careers."

Dr. Race pointed out that, in addition to private lessons, there also will be daily performance classes and lectures. Student participants will be expected to practice four hours each day.

The student pianists will be housed in UT dormitories and will have access to the library facilities of the Music Department and the Undergraduate Library.

A public recital by workshop participants is planned Aug. 7 at 8 p. m. in the Music Building Recital Hall. The final concert is to be recorded, Dr. Race said, and

copies will be available to the students.

Among the group of workshop participants is Miss Judy Barber, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Barber of Ozona.

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

Foreign aid and firearms legislation topped House action last week. The amount of the aid to other countries was whittled down from \$2.6 billion last year to a little less than \$2 billion this time. Texans in the House were divided, with 12 voting for the bill and 11 of us recorded against it.

Actually, these dollar figures tell but a part of the story. Programs involving foreign aid are scattered throughout the budget and carried under 20 different titles, chapters, items or separate bills. When all items are added together, total foreign aid for this year will likely exceed the amount expended for this purpose in recent years. Moreover, there are several billions in the pipelines, unexpended.

The total amount expended for foreign aid exceeds \$122 billion, ranging from \$9½ billion to France down to .60 thousand to the small Negro Republic of Gambia. There have been 120 nations and 6 territories which have been favored by generous Uncle Sam.

The time is long overdue for a drastic reduction. Any such aid should be on a carefully selective basis then and then only to those countries which stand up and are counted on our side when the occasion arises, and not then except where our own security and well-being are involved. I have been voting against foreign aid bills for years because each of them has contained too many items which I simply could not justify.

On gun legislation the House by a more than two-to-one margin voted against compulsory registration of firearms. It was felt that such a requirement would not make a dent in the crime rate. A registered gun

in the hands of a criminal is just as lethal as an unregistered gun.

It happens, however, that there is now on the books a form of gun registration. A 1938 law requires gun dealers to keep records of every sale.

The outlook now is that the Congress will restrict the mail order sales of all guns, and any sale to youngsters, criminals, dope addicts, mental cases, and so forth. But there appears to be no likelihood that this Congress will enact any law which will interfere with the right of a law-abiding citizen to purchase guns from local dealers, and then use them in any legal way desired.

Crockett World Field Test Gets Production Gauge

Mallard Petroleum, Inc., Midland, is attempting completion through unidentified perforations at 7,996-8,001 feet, 8,014-32 feet, 8,038-44 feet and 8,056-61 feet at its No. 2 Dino, in 7-A-B&SF, 2-150-foot northwest offset to its No. 1 Conoco-Enco, opener and lone producer in the M.I.P. (Ellenburger gas-distillate) field of Crockett County, surrounded by Grayburg oil production and 1½ miles south of the Ellenburger oil opener and lone producer from that pay in the World field, 14 miles southwest of Big Lake.

Operator ran tubing and shut the project in. Scheduled for 8,500 feet to test the Ellenburger, it was drilled to 8,310 feet, where 4½-inch casing was set.

It indicated production in an unidentified zone with the flowing of 53 gravity oil at the rate of five barrels per hour for an unreported time and the recovery of 150 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud on a drillstem test at 7,995-8,075 feet, which surfaced gas in five minutes, rated at 1,000 cubic feet daily.

The discovery was finalized June 13 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.95 million cubic feet of gas per day with gas-liquid ratio of 4-170-1, through perforations at 8,100-182 feet. Gravity of the liquid was 52.4 degrees.

It indicated Strawn lime production with the recovery of four barrels of heavy oil and gas-cut mud, 12½ barrels of 41.7 gravity oil and gas-cut mud on a test at 8,055-83 feet. It topped the Strawn lime at 8,046 feet and the Ellenburger at 8,080 feet on Kelly bushing elevation of 2,828.67 feet.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

Austin, Texas — Texas Liquor Control Board is studying new regulations for private clubs where "spirits" are sold.

Members won't reveal the recommendations that were submitted to them by Acting Administrator O. N. Humphreys Jr. until after careful study.

Last set of regulations banning cash sales in the clubs and curbing the issuance of guest cards by managers was knocked out by a district court order in May.

Tax Bill Law—Now there's no way out of paying those new taxes approved by the Legislature in special session. Gov. John Connally has signed into law the bill which is designed to raise \$160.2 million for 1969 state operations. It's effective October 1, and here's what it does:

Raises the general sales and auto sales tax rates from two or three per cent statewide. In cities which levy 1% local option sales taxes the rate will be four per cent. (No change was made in exemptions.)

Increases the corporation franchise tax rate (collect-

ible May 1) from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per \$1,000 of taxable capital, surplus and undivided profits. Portion of the franchise tax on corporate debt will be reduced from \$2.25 to \$2.09 in 1969 and phased out by 1973.

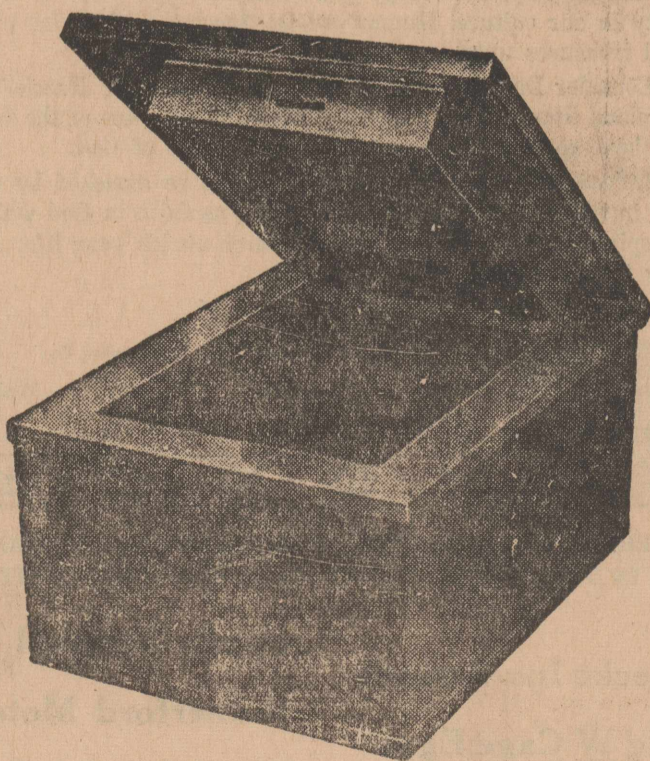

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Beef, Rice, and Egg Plant Casserole

- 1 pound ground beef
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 1 medium eggplant cut in 1-inch cubes, peeled and cooked in boiling water until just tender.
- 5 tbs. margarine
- 1/2 cup minced onion
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 tbs. minced parsley
- 1 teas. salt
- 1/2 teas. pepper
- 1/2 cup bread or cornflake crumbs
- 2 tbs. grated Parmesan cheese

Drain and mash eggplant. Brown beef in 3 tbs. margarine, add onion and green pepper and simmer until tender. Mix together eggplant, meat mixture, parsley, salt and pepper, and rice. Turn into a medium casserole. Heat the remaining margarine, stir in crumbs and spread on top of casserole. Top with cheese and bake in a 375 degree oven 20 to 25 minutes, or until brown and bubbling.

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

Personalizing Rods — It is

easy to write your name or initials on a glass fishing rod. Just use talc powder, white chalk, or similar to buff the rod near the butt, write your name with India ink and cover over with clear nail polish.

Detach lure when not fishing — Are you a lure dangle? Before you get of the boat, detach your lure and put it in your tackle box. You are taking a chance of hanging a hook in a fishing buddy, or even yourself. Cautious anglers tie on a rubber plug used for practice casting.

Always carry spare line — Smart fishermen always carry an extra spool of fishing line in the tackle box. It is even better if you have a spare loaded spool for your reel.

Handy Boat Bailer — A handy boat dipper can be made by cutting the bottom out of a half-gallon, or even gallon, detergent bottle. And every boat should have one. Texas laws now require a bail bucket in every boat.

Mat Prevents Slipping — If your feet are inclined to slip in the bottom of your boat when it is wet, toss in a couple of those "welcome" door mats or a large size bath mat.

Flashlight Important — How about including a small flashlight in your tackle box? It may take up the space of a couple of plugs but in an emergency it may pay off better than the two plugs it replaces.

File "Flight Plan" — When you leave home on a fishing or hunting trip always file a "flight plan". Leave your destination, address, telephone number and even your automobile tax number. You may be needed sometime in a hurry.

If you take a camera out in the fishing boat with you, wrap it in a plastic bag and cover it to keep out the spray and the direct heat. Otherwise you may ruin your film, or camera.

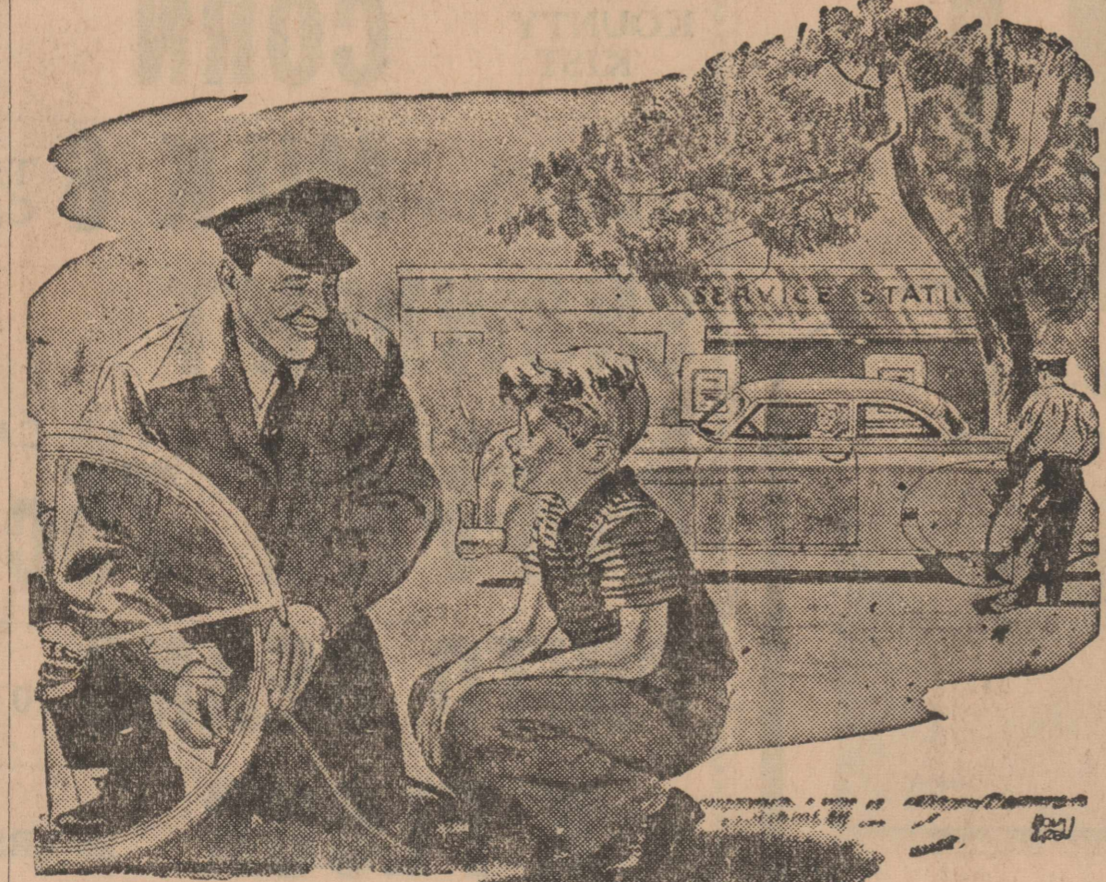

Senator Hardeman Named To Parks Study Committee

Austin — Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith has named Senator D. B. Hardeman of San Angelo to membership on the Senate's special interim committee to study the Parks and Wildlife Department.
