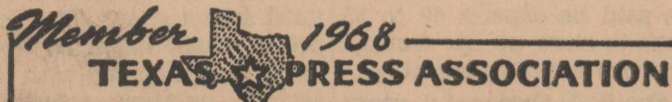

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DIRE CONSEQUENCES

Back in 1962 when some of the steel companies announced price increases, President John F. Kennedy delivered a public denunciation in mule-skinner language that most family newspapers found too rough to print. It did not go unnoticed, however, that neither Castro, Khrushchev, nor Ho Chi Minh ever inspired such violent language on the part of the youthful President.

Now, six years later, President Johnson has repeated the performance, although the language he used was not as profane as that of his predecessor. Mr. Johnson sees "dire consequences for our nation" in the price increases announced last week by certain steel companies. "Inflation in steel", the president told a press conference, is inflation for the nation."

He particularly singled out Bethlehem Steel, which had announced a 5 percent general increase, and said that the action was "unreasonable" and "just shouldn't be permitted to stand."

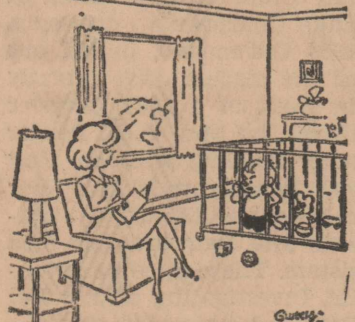
When a President sounds off, he makes headlines. The "unreasonable" charge was repeated so often by the news media that the reason for the increase was obscured. Earlier in the week, on Tuesday, the eleven major steel companies wrapped up a new contract with the United Steelworkers of America. Under the contract the companies agreed to increases in wages and fringe benefits amounting to between 90 cents and \$1 an hour over a three-year period. The price for averting a nationwide steel strike had come to about 6.5 percent increase each year, for three years.

In short, Bethlehem and the other steel companies obligated themselves to make pay increases of 6.5 percent, and then increased prices 5 percent. And that is what the President angrily branded as "unreasonable," raising high the spectre of "inflation for our nation."

For our part, we thought President Johnson's outburst more than a little "unreasonable" in the circumstances.

As to inflation in our nation, steel executive Roger Blough put it this way last month: "When government spends more than it gets, and when labor gets more than it gives, that empty feeling in your pocketbook is inflation."

**Recipe of the Week
From
Kitty's Kitchen**

Ice Cream Cake
1 qt. strawberry ice cream
1 qt. lemon sherbet
1 qt. vanilla ice cream melted
3 cups heavy cream whipped

Fill a 9-inch tube pan with scoops of strawberry ice cream and lemon sherbet. Freeze until firm. Pour the melted vanilla ice cream over the ice cream balls to fill in all the spaces. Freeze. When frozen unmold on a serving plate and frost all over with the whipped cream. Return to freezer until serving time. Serves 10-12.

Strawberry Ice Cream Pie
Baked deep 8-inch pie shell
1 qt. strawberry ice cream, softened slightly
3 egg whites
1/4 teas. salt
3/4 teas. cream of tartar
6 tbs. sugar
1 teas. vanilla
Pack ice cream firmly in pie shell and refreeze at once. Beat the egg whites with the salt until almost stiff. Add the cream of tartar and then gradually beat in the sugar until the meringue is very stiff. Stir in the vanilla. Spread the meringue over the ice cream care-

fully, making sure there are no gaps or holes, and that the meringue is in contact with the edge of the pie shell all around. Bake in a hot oven, 450 degrees, 4 or 5 minutes, or until the meringue is a delicate brown. Serve at once.

This is really a form of baked Alaska, and it is just as good and just as spectacular as that popular dessert, and a little easier to make.

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

During the recent flurry over gun control legislation, I received communications from some 6,000 constituents. A letter which caught my attention was from a 71-year-old woman, living alone in a rural area, without a telephone.

"My concern," she wrote, "is the apparent drive to disarm law-abiding citizens such as myself, making us look like criminals because we own firearms for protection and sport. Little seems to be done to punish criminals severely who misuse firearms."

Then, defending her need for guns, she continued:

"I've lived with firearms all my life. My shotgun to me is an essential tool that is old and well worn. It has served me well — many a rattle snake, chicken hawk, and coyote can attest to that. On a few occasions it has been my own personal policeman and bodyguard. I've never had to shoot anyone, but looking down the barrel of a 12-gauge kind of backs people off and my .38 is always a back-up."

"I know that some people will say — 'Why don't you get a phone so that you can get help if you need it?'"

"Well, I can tell you that when I need help I'm not about to sweat out an hour or

so waiting on a policeman. I can take care of myself, and I think that's what more people should do in this country.

"Our country has come to its greatness by pushing on with courage and strength, believing in themselves, asking nothing of anybody, going as far as their abilities would take them. But now, it seems like they want to be led by the hand, letting themselves be herded like sheep. I'm afraid if they don't wake up soon, their sheep-pen fence will be too strong to break down. This sheep is not about to let the wolves disarm her. I'm strictly against gun registration. Stop trying to restrict us all because of a few. I'd rather take the risk of a few bad apples."

Wildcat Spotted In West Crockett

Harding Brothers Oil & Gas Co., Abilene, will drill the No. 1 H. M. Half, a 2,500-foot Queen sand wildcat, in Crockett County, four miles southeast of Iraan and approximately 1,650 feet southwest of the one-well Fergus (upper and lower Grayburg gas) field.

Location, on a 40-acre lease, is 2,800 feet east of the northwest corner (Pecos River) of 69-1-I&GN, thence 900 feet south to location.

The Fergus opener, John H. Chalmers et al, Abilene, No. 1-69 Half Estate, was finished Nov. 27, 1967, from the upper Grayburg for a calculated, absolute open flow of 25 million cubic feet of dry gas through perforations at 1,684-719 feet; and from the lower Grayburg for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.8 million cubic feet of dry gas through perforations at 1,806 to 1,850 feet. It was drilled to 2,392 feet and placed back to 2,200 feet.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:
"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereinafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereinafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."
"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereinafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:
"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of The State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

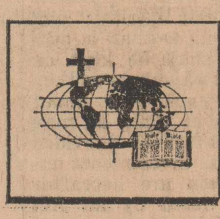

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e.

"1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

Rambling Reflections
By Dr. R. F. Curl

I have been deeply involved in both civil and ecclesiastical (church) politics for almost fifty years.

Now I know this will make me smell unclean to some people, for all too many of us consider that politics are slimy, sly, and slick.

Nothing is farther from the truth. The only dogmatic statement that can be made about politics is that they are necessary.

They may be either clean or dirty, good or bad as the participants make them. But they are necessary for any group life. They begin in the home, properly belong in the school, the church, the community, and all other organized group life.

For in the final analysis politics are simply the strategy by which people learn to get along and work together. The demand is upon us every one to get tangled in political processes.

Abundant opportunity always prevails for political participation. Such has been manifestly thrust before us in this election year with many meetings of many kinds, e. g., the World Council of Churches, the meetings of many national Church bodies, the political conventions and campaigns, and right on down to local and even family groups.

I have enjoyed attending the Uniting Conference for the Evangelical and United Brethren and Methodist churches, where a mammoth 12,000,000 member, worldwide group maneuvered, labored, and counseled together in committee rooms, hall-way confrontations, skirmishing and debate and

action on the conference floor; the Southwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, where much simpler but essentially like processes prevailed in forming and implementing policies in this section, and most recently the South Central Jurisdictional Conference of the United Methodist Church where bishops are elected, retired, and assigned and programs for some nine states in this section are formed.

I enjoyed each of them. Sometimes I won for my view; sometimes I lost; but every time I came out committed to the decision of my group.

I would just as much have enjoyed such meetings of other denominational groups had I possessed long background experience and thorough understanding of their political processes. I always get a keen delight out of the way the Presbyterians, Southern Baptists, Roman Catholics, and others manipulate to form their pattern of life together.

Likewise there is a real kick in the civic political processes and I enjoy watching each group whether Democrats, Republicans, or American Independent Party, work out their differences, come to their agreements, and then proceed to their work.

Consequently I had great fun watching as much of the Republican National Convention as I could find time for and look forward to the Democrats and their political parleyings.

My regret is that I'll not have an unusually alert and perceptive eleven year old grandson to sit up with me until 2 a. m. to watch proceedings in Chicago. He knew his facts, had his preferences, and was as capable as I of predicting outcomes.

This, to me, is symptomatic of what, I believe, is happening to our oncoming generation. I am firmly con-

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Although the war in Vietnam seemingly drags out interminably, there perhaps should be no despair, because the Vietnamese are becoming westernized, or perhaps Americanized is the better term.

The very able Wall Street Journal man in Saigon recently gave evidence of this fact.

In January, which is summer in that latitude, the Vietnam celebrate their lunar New Year's. Traditional is the placing on family altars a pair of watermelons.

Great symbolism is attached to the quality of these melons. They should be round, dark green on the outside, deep red on the inside, with a high sugar content. However, the usual native Vietnam melon does not meet these desired attributes.

However, the always eager U. S. foreign aid people in 1962 brought into Vietnam some 30 different strains of melon seeds, and Vietnamese found the best results both from yield and quality from a strain known as Sugar Baby.

In 1963, 12 acres of Sugar Baby melons were grown. This year an estimated 5,000 acres were devoted to this melon.

For an economy where the average annual income of the individual is very low, and is in fact measured in terms of only a few hundred dollars per year

excluding the politicians and generals, growing of Sugar Baby melons is a tremendously lucrative occupation.

It is estimated the returns per acre from Sugar Baby melons is between \$1500 and \$2000 with the cost of production running between \$400 and \$600 per acre. In addition, as the melons only require three months from planting to maturity, rice lands can usually be double cropped.

The consumer pays about \$3 per melon, which is probably equivalent to an American family paying \$30 for a watermelon. Yet due to ingrained tradition, apparently there is no consumer bucking on prices they must pay for this ceremonial fruit.

Thus, with everything going for them, including what amounts to a forced market, and the largesse of the U. S. foreign aid program, it could be assumed the melon growers of Vietnam are deliciously happy.

But this is not so. Some feel that if there were not now such a big crop the prices could be raised even above the \$3 figure. And the Vietnam growers have the solution for what they view as a problem.

Some of them feel American air forces should use the methods they are employing to defoliate the Vietnam jungles to destroy about a third of the melon plantings. Yes, they are learning. While U. S. military "advisers" may encounter difficulties in teaching them modern combat tactics, they are sure learning other American ideas rapidly. Could it be Vietnam will have a Great Society long before it has peace?

vinced they are going to make better citizens than we have. In this I rejoice.

Although my essential political philosophy would, as best I could assay, differ from that of Congressman O. C. Fisher, nevertheless, I enjoyed his day in Ozona this week and was delighted to watch his political astuteness and his clarity of presentation of his basic stance.

More citizens should have

been at the courthouse Tuesday afternoon to question and hear him. He is our Congressman and our public servant. We need to hear from him and he from us if a democratic political society is to function in our time and place.

Too much on politics; but I do want to register my commitment to politics as the art and science of living together in nation, in

church and in family. We must play this game. To play it well for the good of our land we must know and be committed to our fundamental documents: the Declaration of Independence and the Federal Constitution. In addition we must know the times in which we live, the issues we confront, and the actions possible to us.

So really what I have been saying is simply that our times call for us to be intelligently and diligently involved in life. For as Chief Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes once said: "It is required of every man that he be involved in the action and passion of his time, lest he be judged not to have lived at all."

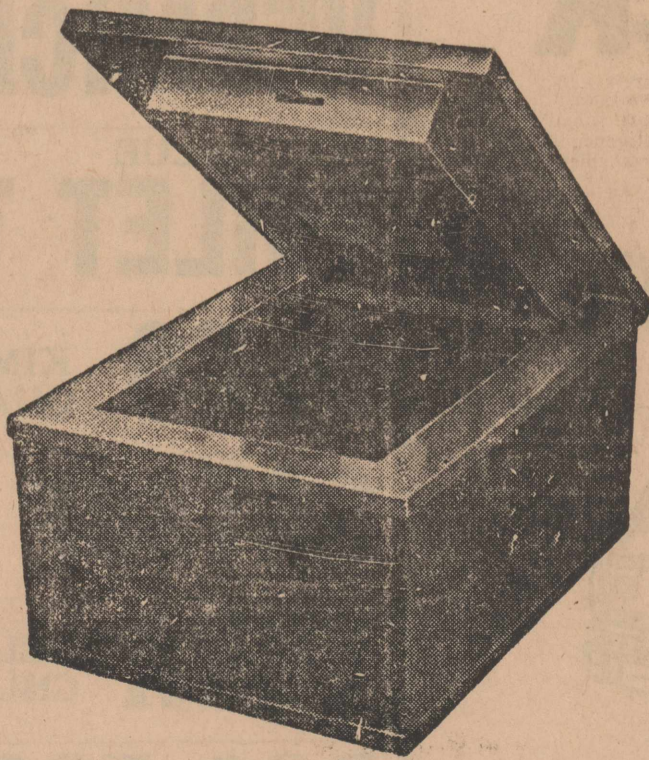

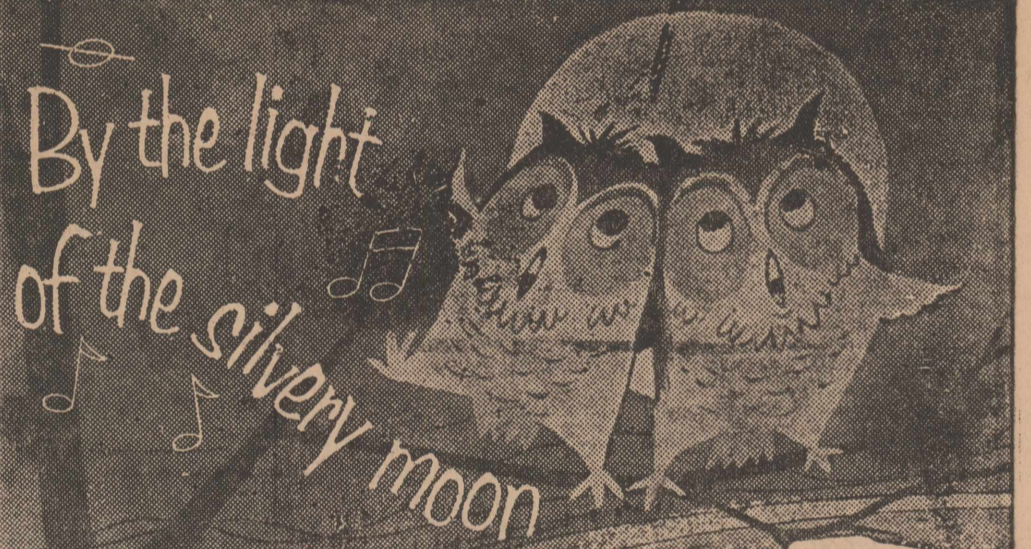

armed their way into various departments and systematically disrupted the processes of government," he said. The march leader told the U. S. Attorney General "We didn't come to play games. If it becomes necessary to turn this capital upside down, I am all for it."

"The Attorney General apparently accepted the insult and threat and didn't throw him out," Congressman Fisher observed, and added, "I think we are in great need of a new attorney general." The remark triggered prolonged applause. He enumerated a number of crimes committed in the city and directly connected with the squatters.

"When the people go to choose their next president, they are going to want to know what the contenders propose to do about lawlessness, rioting, looting and arson in the land," Fisher said. "They are going to ask him what kind of man he proposes to appoint to the Supreme Court should a vacancy appear. They are going to demand that he lower the boom on lawbreakers regardless of color."

"Supreme Court decisions have so hampered law enforcement officers and so protected the law breaker than crime has increased 88

percent in the last two years, nine times faster than the increase in population growth. This trend must be reversed and it cannot be done with pantywaist treatment of criminals. The causes must be analyzed and treated. The hysterical cry for gun registration as a means of controlling crime is ridiculous. Gun registration would not make a dent in crime, in fact, it would tend to place further advantage on the side of the criminal."

Congressman Fisher decried the report of the president's commission to study the causes of crime increase.

"I would rather have one good solid appointment to the Supreme Court than all the president's commissions ever appointed," Fisher observed.

Following the Rotary luncheon, Congressman Fisher met with interested citizens at the courthouse for a brief question and answer session on issues of the day.

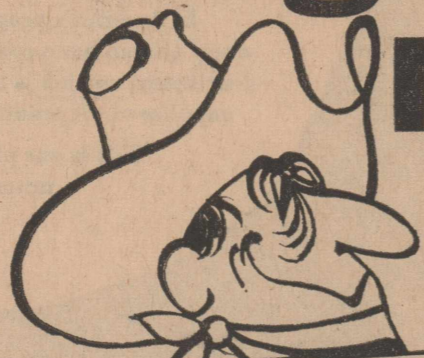

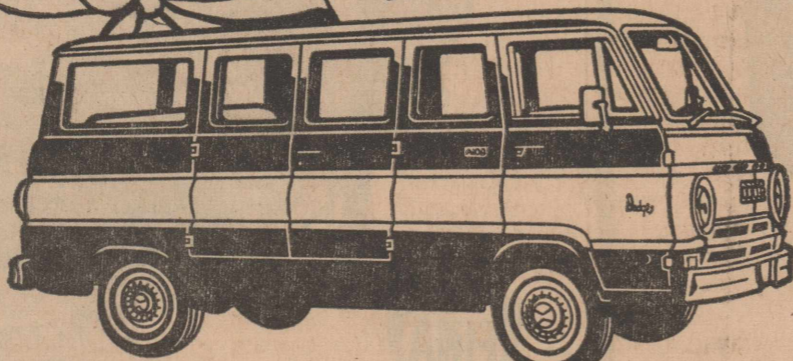
