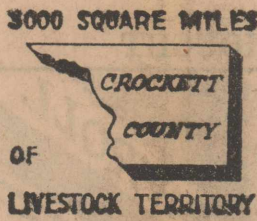

Paul Eggers Coming - GOP Candidate For Governor To Speak In Ozona

Paul Eggers, Republican candidate for governor, will visit Ozona, Tuesday, September 10 as part of a campaign tour through West Texas.

Eggers is expected to be in Ozona 11:45-1 p. m. He will speak at the Rotary Club luncheon after which he will meet people around the downtown business district. "I'm looking forward to meeting people in all walks of life and discussing with them the major problems that confront our state," Eggers said.

The GOP candidate is a 49-year-old tax attorney who has practiced law in Wichita Falls since graduation from the University of Texas School of Law in 1948. He is chairman of the Taxation Section of the State Bar of Texas and a member of the American Bar Association.

In 1966 he received a Sports Illustrated Silver Anniversary Award for former athletes who have achieved successful careers in their chosen field.

Eggers served during WW II in the Air Corps and was honorably discharged with the rank of major.

The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas selected Eggers 1968 Layman of the Year. He is the son of a minister and is a past director of the Wichita Falls YMCA.

"I believe," Eggers said, "Texans want to elect a governor this year who will provide vigorous, responsible leadership. This is what we need to develop the potential of this state."

He and his wife, Frances, have a son, Steven, 10.

Ray Boyd Named To School Board Replaces Carson

Ray Boyd has been named to the School Board to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Bill Carson, president of the board. His appointment will become official at the next meeting of the board.

Taylor Deaton has assumed the duties of president and Charles E. Davidson III filled the vice-presidency.

Boyd was the logical selection, since he polled more votes than the other candidates in the last school board election, which returned the incumbents to office.

For the past six years Boyd has been part-owner and manager of Village Drug, Inc. He is president of the corporation. An Ozona native his wife, Wyna, works with him in the drug store and their son, Kirk, is senior student in Ozona High School.

Saturday Shower Brings .19 Inch Of Moisture Here

A Saturday afternoon shower, which amounted to .19 of an inch of moisture, brought the total rainfall record for August to 2.5 inches. The rainfall total for the year to date for Ozona now stands at 17.94 inches.

Scattered showers in this area have been forecast for the next five days. Temperatures have been considerably lower the past week due to the weak cool front which passed through the vicinity Tuesday afternoon and the weekend shower.

Trailer Overtakes Truck Jumps Fence For \$10,000 Wreck

Highway patrolman Orvil Perry reported two automobile accidents during the week, one in town and the other in the detour east of town on Hwy. 290.

Brenda Brown was driving a pickup south on Piedra St. when she swerved to miss a dog, applied her brakes and skidded into a parked 1966 Chevrolet belonging to Manuel Villareal. Damage to the pickup was \$50 and to the car \$250.

Saturday five miles east of Ozona a 1966 White truck tractor and semi-trailer lost a wheel as the driver, James Webb of Arlington, rounded a curve in the detour around noon. He lost control of the rig and the trailer overturned. Managing to keep the tractor on its wheels, he ran through a fence. Damage was estimated at \$10,000.

Wildcat Re-Entry Confirmer Slated In County Fields

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, will re-enter and deepen to 9,900 feet for tests of the Simpson and Ellenburger at the No. 1 Paul Perner, Crockett County wildcat failure, 21 miles west-southwest of Ozona and 1 1/2 miles southwest of the one-well Perner Ranch (Simpson gas) field.

Originally drilled by Moore Brothers, it was abandoned Feb. 9, 1938 at 9,105 feet.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 37-2-I&GN. On some maps it shows to be 2,300 feet from the north and west lines of the section.

The Simpson discovery, the firm's No. 1 Perner Ranch, was finished Jan. 30, for 13,500,000 cubic feet of gas per day, through perforations at 9,398-414 feet.

Delta-Suburban, Odessa, will drill the No. 3-A Friend at a 1/2-mile northeast out-post to the five-well Ozona, East (Ellenburger gas) field and the same distance northeast and southeast of the Ozona (Canyon gas) field.

Location is 1,500 feet from the south and 1,380 feet from the west lines of 93-GH-GC&SF. Scheduled depth is 8,500 feet.

The Ozona (Canyon sand) field was extended 2 1/4 miles southeast and the Hunt-Baggett (Strawn) field, 1/2 mile southwest, with dual completion of Wallen Production Co., Midland, No. 3 Wallen-Miller, eight miles south of Ozona.

It was finished from the Strawn for a calculated, absolute open flow of 860,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 60-608-1, through perforations at 8,659-788 feet, which had (Continued on Last Page)

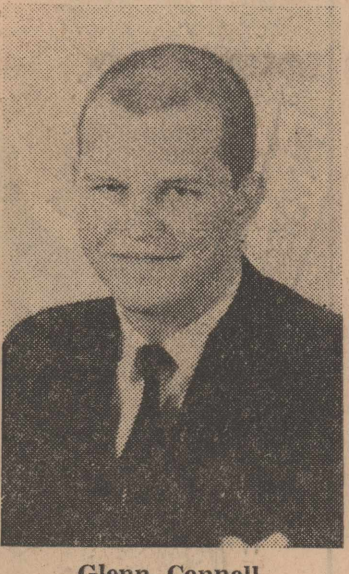

\$438,000 FM Road Work for County In 1969 Program

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$438,800 for improvement of the farm to market road system and for highway safety and betterment in Crockett County during 1969.

District Engineer J. A. Snell of San Angelo said that a total of 42.5 highway miles in Crockett County will be involved in the annual program. Thirty-eight and a half miles of the work will be under supervision of R. N. Jennings, District Maintenance Engineer with the remaining 4.0 miles being supervised by R. A. McCullough, Supervising Resident Engineer.

The work is a part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1969.

40 to 60 Families Expected to Move Here On Pipeline

The O. R. Burden Construction Co. is in the process of moving several families into Ozona. The company is engaged in laying a pipeline across the south part of the county.

Employing 150 men at peak operation, the crew will be in Ozona from three to five months. An equipment lot has been leased from the county at the corner of Ave. J and 14th St.

It is estimated that from 40 to 60 families with children will reside in Ozona when the company completes its move.

A crew of fifteen families moved into town this week with Mobil Oil Co. Most have children of school age.

various companies moving crews into Ozona. Total enrollment was 1,015, exactly 21 students shy of last year's enrollment of 1,036.

High school enrollment was 240, compared with 246 last year. The freshman class leads in enrollment with 81 students registered, followed by the senior class with 56, the sophomore class with 55 and the junior class 48. This year's graduating class will be one of the largest ever, providing all students finish requirements.

Junior high students numbered 175 at the end of the first school day an increase over last year's 153 enrollment. Eighth graders number 91 and seventh graders 84.

South Elementary enrolled 327 students, 5 less than last year. Enrollment at North Elementary was down to 273 from 304 last year. Enrollment for both elementary schools has declined the past three years. The drop in enrollment is more pronounced at North Elementary than at South.

By grades South Elementary has 84 in kindergarten, in first grade, 49 in second grade, 46 in third grade, 37 in fourth grade, 41 in fifth grade and 45 in sixth grade. North Elementary had 33 kindergarteners, 33 first graders, 48 second graders, 39 third graders, 45 fourth graders, 42 fifth graders and 33 sixth graders.

Unless interscholastic league rules are changed, it seems likely the Ozona school district will remain in class AA next year. The high school maintained above 225 enrollment last year and it seems likely that the average will be above that class A figure again this year.

Ozona Lions To Scrimmage Fort Stockton Today

Coach Mosley's Lions will scrimmage Fort Stockton's Panthers this afternoon in Lion Stadium. Coach Fowler's B team will scrimmage the Fort Stockton B at 6 o'clock and the varsity scrimmage will follow.

The team is in good shape and ready to go, except for a few bruises sustained in practice last week. Coaches Mosley and Sewell are impressed with the team spirit, but are hesitant to predict the outcome in the new district.

After a week of two practices a day, the Lions began afternoon workouts Monday. They will scrimmage Robert Lee next week and the first game of the season will be September 13 with Junction here.

THE MESSAGE IS CLEAR

On August, 20, 1968, the dream bridge between Washington and Moscow fell down.

The issue of the Soviet newspaper Pravda for that date, published prior to the invasion of Czechoslovakia said: "Marxists - Leninists are not and can never be indifferent to the fate of socialist construction in other countries and the general cause of socialism and Communism on earth. . . no one will ever be allowed to drive a wedge between the socialist states or undermine the foundation of the socialist structure. The fraternal parties consider it their obligation to insure that imperialist intrigues are nipped in the bud and to strengthen the unity of socialist commonwealth, and all revolutionary forces."

Only hours after that appeared in print, Radio Prague was announcing that "troops of the Soviet Union, Polish People's Republic, the G. D. R. (East Germany) the Hungarian People's Republic and the Bulgarian People's Republic (have) crossed the frontiers of the Czechoslovak Socialist Republic."

The Soviet - watchers in Washington were taken completely by surprise. Said The New York Times in its issue of August 21, on the streets only hours after the invasion began: "Only last week, the State Department

disbanded a special unit that had been set up to keep an eye on the developments in Czechoslovakia. Sources in the department said the disbanding was ordered after tensions between Czechoslovakia and the Soviet Union seemed to ease."

The message from the Moscow end of the bridge is clear. It is precisely as Pravda stated it: the enslaved will be kept in chains, imperialist intrigues will be "nipped in the bud," and the "unity of . . . all revolutionary forces" is paramount.

That means Moscow, and Peking, as well as Poland, East Germany, Hungary, Bulgaria — and blood-stained Czechoslovakia. It also means Hanoi.

Does anyone really believe that Moscow will permit Hanoi to negotiate an honorable peace in Paris?

LAND HO!

Land Ho. The promised land is in sight. The Great Society has arrived.

Some months ago, a certain Miss Juanita Smith, 24, an unwed mother of five children, moved to Philadelphia from Delaware. She applied for relief, and was told that Pennsylvania required a year of residence. This displeased her. She brought suit and a three-judge court then ordered the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare to pay her. Thereupon the State called upon Justice William J. Brennan, Jr., who has jurisdiction over Federal courts in Pennsylvania, to delay the effect of the ruling pending an appeal to the Supreme Court. The jurist denied the plea. Without comment.

More recently, the US Supreme Court has sanctioned "free love". The Court ruled that a woman and her lover of the moment may engage in a continuing affair without fear of losing the Aid to Dependent Children payments.

Now, it appears, no fevered female needs worry about getting carried away

some day and marrying the man of the moment. Another judge has opened a third gate. In Brooklyn, New York, a Supreme Court Justice has ruled that the city must pay all expenses involved in procuring a divorce.

In New York State, a necessary step in procuring a divorce is the publication of legal notices. That's expensive business. A woman who could not afford to pay for such legal notices applied to the City Finance Department. The department refused to pick up the tab.

An enterprising attorney took her case "to establish a precedent for others."

As a consequence of his effort, the Great Society is now complete. If the precedent stands, the partner to marriage who can't afford the price of a divorce can send the bill to the local government — city, or county — and save the trip to Mexico or Las Vegas.

The understanding judge suggested that poor people who want a divorce, and who can prove that they don't have the wherewithal to pay the tab, can trot down

to City Hall and deliver the bill.

And that completes the possibilities: The taxpayer supports those who don't marry, he supports those who live as if they were married, but aren't; and he finances those who did marry and want a divorce.

Take your choice. You can't lose.

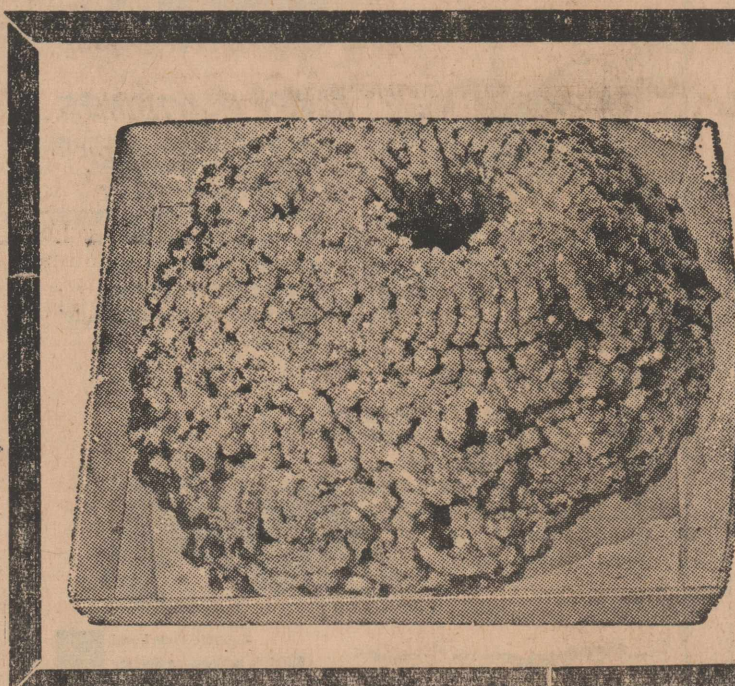

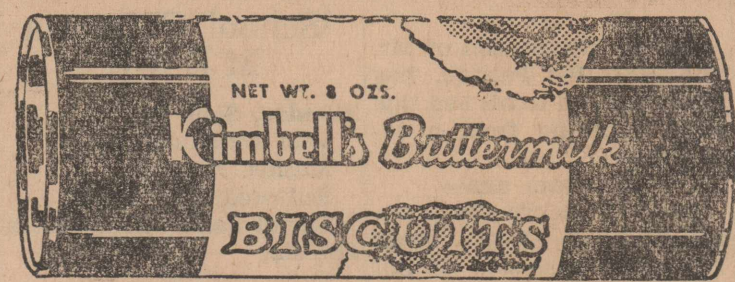

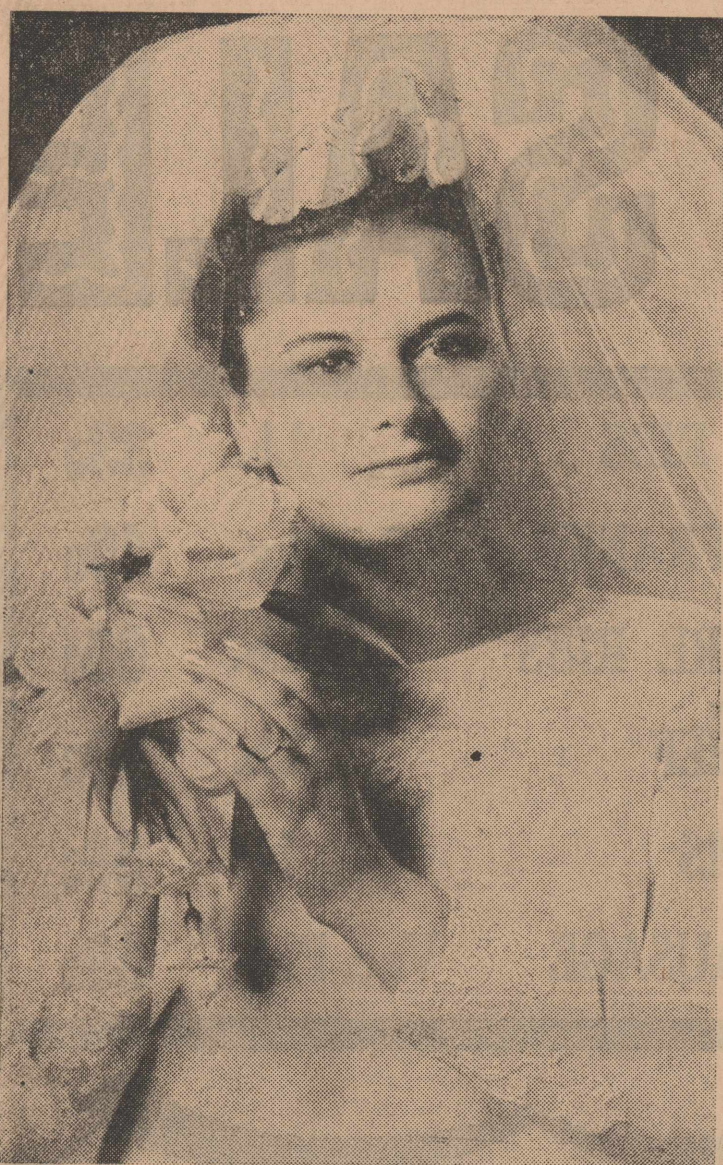

N'west Crockett Strike Assured In Ellenburger

An Ellenburger discovery apparently was assured in Crockett County with the swabbing of new oil plus 1 per cent water, at the hourly rate of 8 to 19 barrels per hour at H. L. Brown, Jr., Midland, No. 1 Ruth Schlinke in 6-BB2-J. A. Stowell, 15 miles south of Rankin, eight miles northwest of the one-well Meek (Canyon) field and 5 1/2 miles northwest of the one well Que Suerte (Pennsylvanian) field.

Operator acidized through perforations at 11,368-386 feet and the project flowed 5 1/2 barrels of load oil in 30 minutes, then swabbed 145 barrels of fluid in 9 1/2 hours and then swabbed the above gauge. Testing continued.

Gulf Oil Corp. will drill the No. 8-E J. H. Tippet as a 3/4-mile east outpost to lower Wolfcamp production and 3/4-mile southwest outpost to 5,050-foot Wolfcamp production in the Tippet, West field and as a 3/4-mile southeast outpost to lower Leonard production in the Tippet multipay field of Crockett County.

Location, on a 1,614.05-acre lease, is 660 feet from the northwest and 660 feet from the southwest (Pecos River) lines of 39-31-H&TC. Contract depth is 6,200 feet.

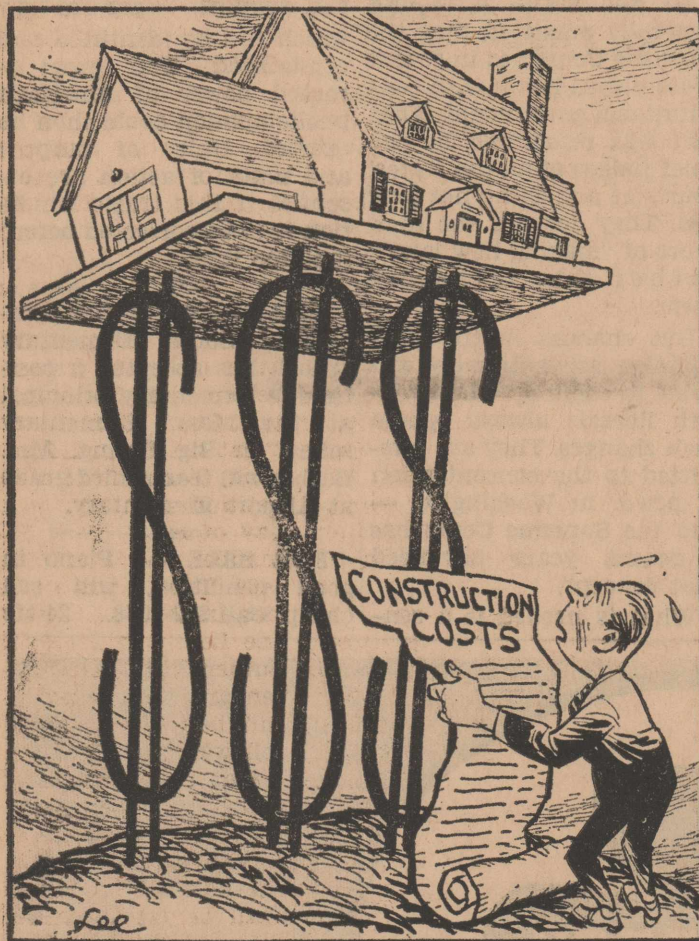

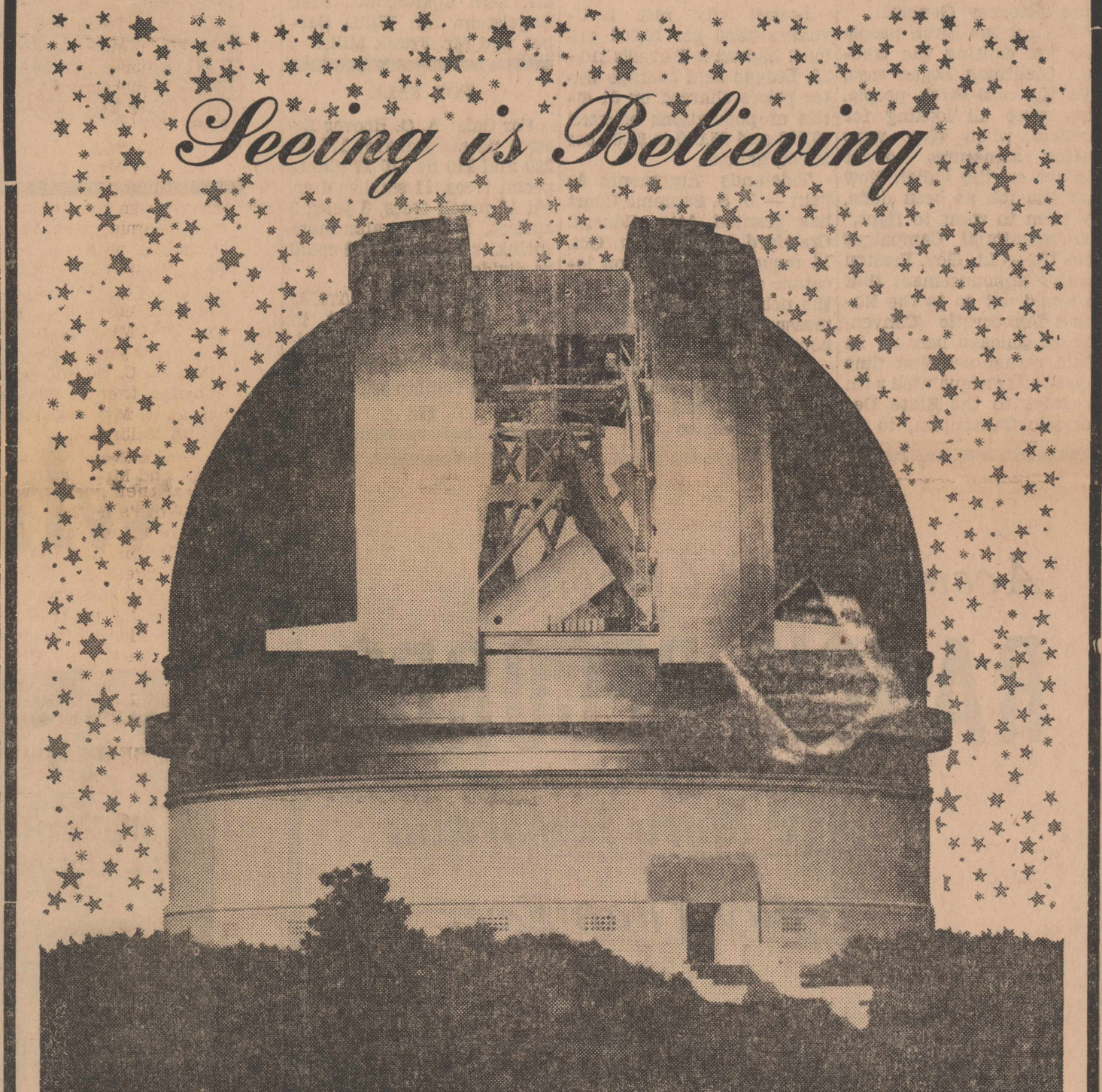

Austin, Texas — Traditionally Austin has been the headquarters site for Texas campaigns of presidential candidates. But George Wallace's official campaign headquarters (American Independent Party) now is located 49 miles to the south, in New Braunfels.

It was moved from the capital city to within 30 minutes' drive of the office of the party's state chairman, Bard Logan of San Antonio. This move is significant — especially to those 600,000 Texans who are expected to vote for Wallace in November.

When the state executive committee of the American Party decided to replace Miss Jane Sumner of Austin with Jack Zengler of New Braunfels; named Sam Rains of Austin as treasurer, replacing Mrs. Margaret Bacon of Austin; and removed Mrs. Jewell Lemons of San Antonio from the committee, charges of "Birch-ism" were hurled. Miss Sumner ran for Congress on the Republican ticket in 1966 and Mrs. Bacon had served as secretary to Liberal Democrat Franklin Spears of San Antonio during Spears' 1966 bid for State Attorney General.

"It's not the Birch people that are causing the trouble," Chairman Logan says, "It's the anti-Birch people. They were all looking for Birchers when they were getting signatures to get Wallace on the ballot. Now that the job as been done, they seem to want to fight."

Gubernatorial Campaigns Heat Up — Lt. Gov. Preston Smith's announcement that he would not go to the National Democratic Convention in Chicago because he would rather use that time to get better acquainted with delegates to the State Democratic Convention, to be

held in Austin Sept. 17, came as something of a surprise.

But it's not the first time Smith instinctively has steered clear of battles within the party — as the Chicago scene was sure to be. He has gained some widespread and rather unexpected support from liberal Texas Democrats because he refused to go with Gov. John Connally, then Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and Speaker Ben Barnes to head off a migrant worker's march to Austin two years ago.

Smith, however, says he is serious about wanting to meet and talk to state convention delegates because he wants to command the convention. The September state convention is known as the "governor's convention." It will be interesting to see who wins control — the man who is governor now or the man who is the Democratic nominee.

There's no doubt among Republicans that the star of their state convention in Ft. Worth on Sept. 17 will be GOP gubernatorial candidate Paul Eggers. Eggers is running a hard race against Smith.

City Water Prices Vary — "Water Service in Texas Cities," new publication by the Texas Municipal League, indicates a wide spread in water prices throughout Texas.

Lowest city rate is Uvalde's \$2.50 per 10,000 gallons; highest is Terrell's \$10.25. League said average water prices charged by 61 cities of populations between 10,000 and 25,000 is \$6.00 per 10,000 gallons.

Tidelands Arguments Again — U. S. Supreme Court has granted Atty. General Crawford C. Martin an Oct. 14 requested hearing on location of Texas shoreline or the point from which Texas measures its submerged land boundaries.

Last December a decision granting Texas ownership of tidelands to 10.3 miles into Gulf of Mexico held that

where shoreline has receded, Texas cannot claim the 1845 historic boundary (which would give Texas more acreage). Federal government also would deny Texas its 10.3-mile area where the shore has built out into the Gulf.

At stake is about 36,000 acres. Since 1950 the undisputed acreage has yielded more than \$100 million in oil-gas leasing for permanent school fund.

Out of it has come several proposed changes in the Constitution, designed to remove such appointments from the realm of political favoritism. In recent years such choices have become patronage plums, with little thought being given to judicial qualifications of those appointed.

One U. S. Senate proposes that vacancies be filled from

a list of five — chosen by a conference of all the chief judges of all the states' highest courts and the chief judges of all 11 U. S. Courts of Appeals. The President would then have to pick one of the five, and the Senate would have to confirm.

This is an excellent approach. I introduced a resolution to accomplish about the same plan several years ago. Such a method would go far toward removing such appointments from politics and favoritism.

Another sound proposal require each member of the Supreme Court to be reappointed and confirmed every 10 years. That would prevent members from becoming autocrats, and would allow their official conduct to be

scrutinized and reassessed periodically.

In any event, it is now generally admitted that the Supreme Court has in recent years played havoc with constitutional government. That fact was recognized by the chief judges of all the states' courts at a meeting not long ago. They accused the high court of "making new laws", rather than interpreting them.

But changes in the Constitution are extremely difficult to come by. The knee-jerk liberals always oppose such changes. They are committed to the concentration of power in Washington — and the Supreme Court has in recent years advanced that concept.

What is needed is a sen-

sible, acceptable remedy which the American people can support — a remedy which can be identified and crystallized. The great aroused power of American public opinion could then be exerted. Unity of purpose and unity of action are essential if this tragic condition is to be corrected before it is too late.



Counter-Movement To Anarchy

Ever since the Franklin Roosevelt era, with the exception of the Eisenhower years when a war hero won the Presidency, American political life has been dominated by a powerful coalition of union chiefs, minority bloc voters and radical elements drawn from the universities. Time and again it has been a winning combination. White basically unrepresentative of the nation as a whole, it nevertheless has been able to capture the White House and many state houses as well.

This year, however, a new coalition seems to be emerging. The successive waves of riots in urban centers, agitation by Vietnams, the spread of civil disobedience resulting in widespread anarchy — all have produced a strong reaction among responsible citizens who know that the nation must have law and order to achieve further progress.

The counter-movement to anarchy is a true grassroots movement. Americans have had to put up with many humiliating reverses at home and abroad. The Johnson administration's "no win" policy in Vietnam has angered great numbers of citizens who believe that victory always should be the American goal when war breaks out. There also is intense bitterness that the humiliation of the United States should reach the point where little North Korea would dare snatch an American warship off the high seas and hold its crew prisoner. At home, the American people have seen their capital invaded by an army of vagrants and thugs who were allowed by the Johnson administration to establish an encampment on the banks of the Potomac. Other good citizens are outraged at the chaos on the campus and at the entrenchment of leftists in college and university faculties. Still others are alarmed at the decline of the U. S. dollar as result of the inflationary spending policies of the "liberal" regime in charge in Washington.

Property owners across the nation are shocked and furious that in many communities police have not been allowed to shoot looters and arsonists and that the Attorney General of the

United States, Ramsey Clark, seems more interested in giving privileges to disorderly elements than he is in helping create a climate of law and order in the nation. In short, great numbers of Americans have had enough. They don't want the Great Society's ruinous policies continued under a successor administration. They are properly concerned that a new defeatist administration dominated by "liberals" will abandon the cold war struggle against communist tyranny and thereby lead the United States to disaster.

Out of this widening public concern has come the counter-movement of responsible Americans manifesting determination that realistic, forceful policies prevail in the next four years. At the heart of the new, emerging political coalition are the two principal streams of American conservatism — the conservatism of the South and the West. What is most significant, however, is that the counter-movement is strongly attracting the industrial working people of the North and the small businessmen of that region. For the first time in decades, the northern industrial worker is rejecting stereotyped "liberal" ideas. They see their neighborhood and their local

schools threatened with ruin by anarchists in the street and by social reconstructionists in the White House and the universities who want to shatter established patterns of living.

The industrial worker, who has scored great economic gains through the growth of U. S. free enterprise, suddenly realizes that these gains will be taken away if militant leftists have their way in refashioning American society along radical lines. They know that American cities can't be improved by subjecting the suburbs to a new form of compulsory association or by agreeing to p. missiveness in handling of protesters. "Law and order" is a theme that touches the deepest concern of the average American in all parts of the country, South and North, East and West. That's why the new political coalition is forming. Once established, it should result in a new orientation of American life and politics and in the process, save the Republic.

To be sure, the "liberals" want to kill the new coalition in its cradle. It already is apparent that they will resort to smear tactics against the leaders who stand for domestic tranquility and victory in Vietnam. What is imperative, therefore, is that

the "stay at home" conservative vote turn out for once and give the American government back to the American people in November.

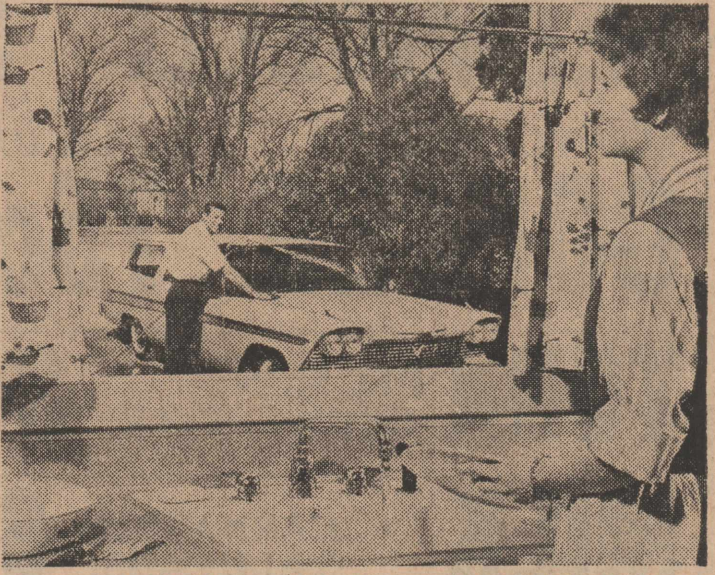

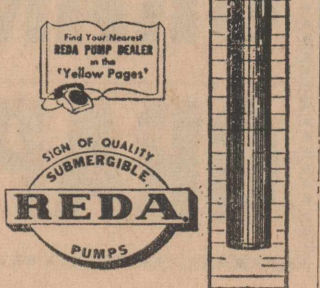

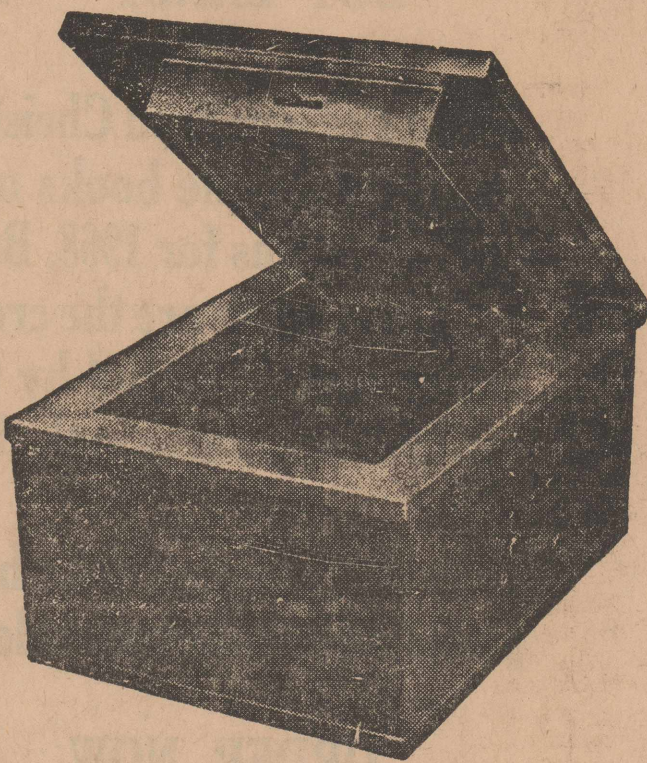
