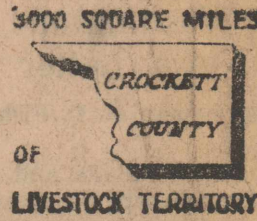

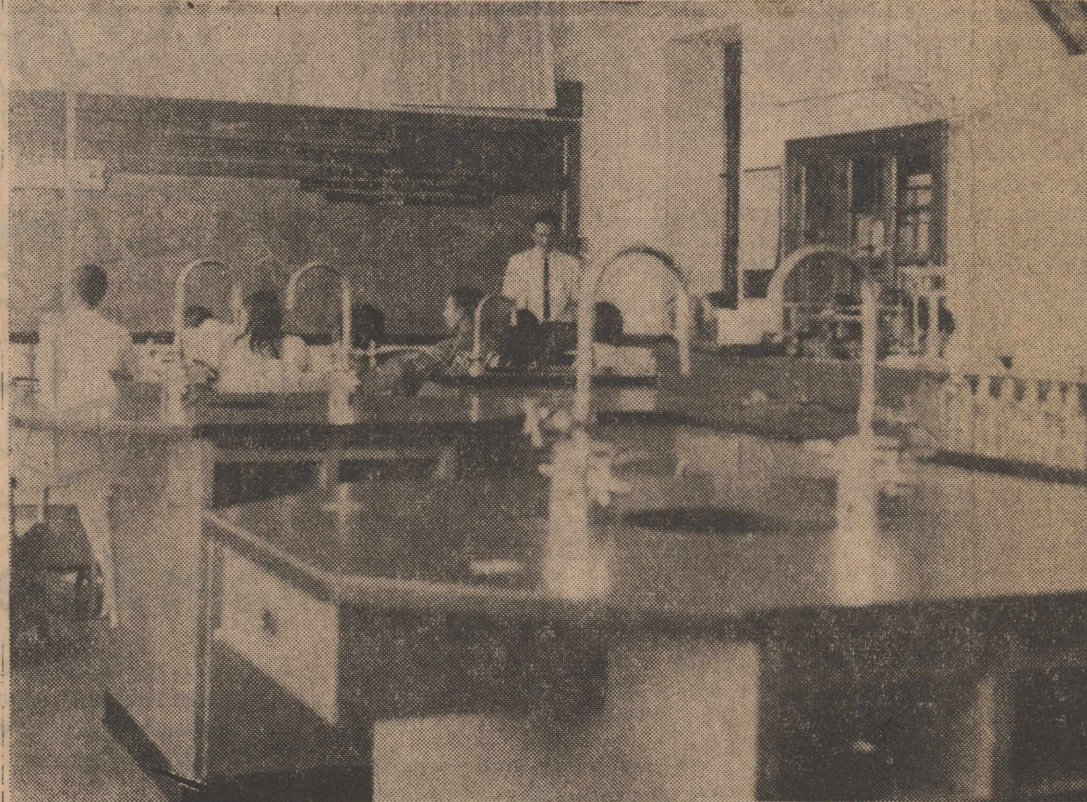

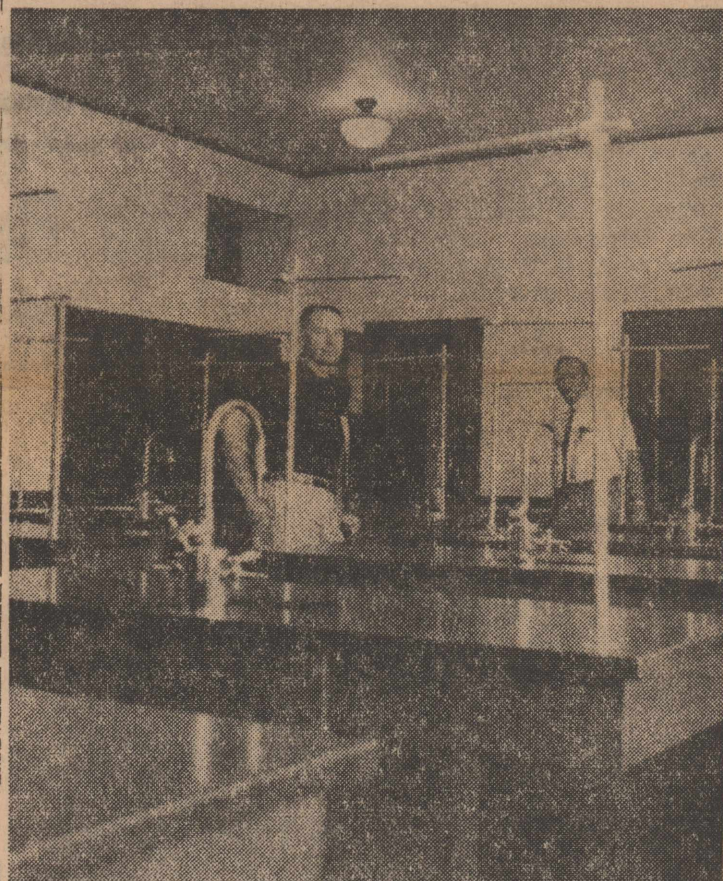

Football Double Header Here Won By Lion B & Cubs

In a double header at Lion Stadium Thursday night, the Cubs won their opening game of the season 40-14 over the Sonora Colts and the Lion B picked up its second win by shutting out the Sonora Broncos 26-0. The teams will host Rankin here tonight.

Coach Chick Womack's Cubs came on strong as usual. Holding the Colts on downs every time they got the ball, the Cubs scored four touchdowns, one nullified by a penalty, in the first half of the ballgame. Gerald Huff qb, recovered a Colt fumble in the first few seconds and Ruben Tambunga ran 26 yards for the td, which was wiped out by a penalty. The Cubs got on the scoreboard just minutes later when Tambunga threw to Huff for 36 yards and a touchdown. The conversion failed and it was 6-0 the Cubs.

Tambunga scored three more touchdowns for the Cubs, Huff passed to Ricky Crawford for 2 points and qb, Gary Whitley carried for two more, widening the Cub

Library To Be Open Noon Hour For School Term

Miss Mildred North, high school librarian, announced yesterday that the library will remain open for book circulation during the noon hour for the remainder of the school term.

She said adult circulation had remained the same since school started and that more students were taken advantage of the library on Monday and Thursday nights.

A new archeology series has been placed on the shelves, "Library of Early Civilization." Miss North thinks the series of books will be of great interest to history buffs. Several new books have been added to the adult library shelves and there are many new memorial books, which will soon be placed for circulation.

The library is open to the public during school hours daily and from 5 until 9 p. m. Mondays and Thursdays.

Ozona Schools Tops In Science Lab Facilities

Ozona High School now boasts a modern up-to-date science facility taking in the entire third floor of the school. Work was finished this summer with the installation of a new biology lab.

Before work began, a year ago this summer, the floor was cut up into small rooms, formerly accommodating the science department, home-making department and a museum room.

The chemistry and physics lab was completed the first summer and consists of a large room with a lecture area in front. A workroom opens off the lab, giving teacher Franklin Reavis and students ample storage and working space.

A lecture room and a new lab for experiments makes up the physical science department. This course introduces the high school student to science. Formerly called general science, the course is taught by Charles Spieker.

The biology department is a combination lecture room and laboratory. Student desks are equipped for complete biology experiments. Ned Fowler is the teacher. Supt. L. B. T. Sikkes rates the new science facility as one of the finest in this area, with the best equipment and supplies available.

County Receives Soaking Rain In Week-End Falls

Ozona recorded .31 of an inch of rain during intermittent showers which fell Saturday through Monday, bringing the total rainfall for the month to 1.65 in.

Other sections of the county reported up to 2 inches. Monday morning a heavy fall at Midway Lane, 15 miles north of town, resulted in 1 inch of moisture. Ranches on this side of the Pecos toward Sheffield reported up to 1.5 inches.

South and southeast of Ozona reports of from 1 up to 2 inches of rain were fairly general.

The recent rainfall brought the yearly total to 20.18 inches so far this year, at least 2 inches above the yearly average.

Three Ozonans Hurt In Crash Friday Night

Three Ozona residents were injured Friday night in a near head-on crash 1.7 miles north of town and officers investigated four more accidents during the week.

The Friday night smash-up occurred around 11:15. Sherman Chappell was driving north on Hwy. 163 in a 1963 Chevrolet pick-up meeting a long line of traffic, when a 1966 Oldsmobile driven by Clinton Strother appeared in his lane directly in front of him. He veered sharply to the right and the front end of the Olds smashed into the left front of the pick-up. The impact caused the pickup to overturn and come to rest near a fence on the right side of the highway. The car careened several yards down the highway before coming to a stop. Chappell, Strother and Bill Taylor, a passenger in the Strother car, were rushed to Crockett County Hospital in a Janes ambulance. Chappell was hospitalized with bruises and lacerations and released Wednesday morning. Strother was treated and released and Taylor was transferred to San Angelo, where he was placed under the care of a bone specialist for treatment of a broken ankle. All three men are Ozona residents. Both vehicles were demolished in the crash. Investigating officer Orvil Perry estimated damage at \$2,000 to the Oldsmobile and \$1,000 to the pickup.

Late Tuesday night, Marvin Armstrong of Lubbock was traveling toward Ozona on Hwy 163 south when he swerved to miss a deer and lost control of the 1963 Plymouth he was driving. He escaped injury but damage to the car was \$350, according to investigating officer Perry.

Del Copeland, DPS, investigated two accidents Sun-

46 New Cases Of Screwworms In Crockett Co.

Screwworm cases continue to increase in the county as forty-six additional cases have been reported since last week. While most of the cases have been found in the southwestern portion of the county, a few were reported South and Southeast of Ozona during the past week. While most of the ranchmen have reported finding evidence of dropping of sterile flies, ideal conditions for screwworm cases exist and the infestation continues.

Ranchmen should discontinue any operations that will provide for screwworm cases to get started, otherwise the infestation will continue or get worse until frost, County Agent Pete Jacoby said.

To date, one hundred and thirty-six cases have been reported in the county this year — this compares to a total of 45 cases in 1967, 12 in 1966, no cases in 1965, and 7 cases in 1964 and 18 cases in 1963 when the program of eradication the screwworm was first started in the state.

Lions Edge Eldorado Host Coahoma Fri. Nite

It was too close for comfort for Coach Sam Mosley's Lions Friday night when they squeaked by the Eldorado Eagles 14-13 in Lion Stadium. The fired up Eagles battled the bigger and more experienced Lions all the way and to the surprise of the Lions and their fans, the

Eagles were ahead at the half.

Tomorrow night the Lions will host the Coahoma Bulldogs and will again have two speedy halfbacks, to hold. Dcan Richters, 190 pound junior, and Ricky Evans, 155 pound senior. Coahoma, Class A, trounced Class AA Winters 36-8 last Friday night.

Neither team scored in the first period Friday night. However, with only three minutes remaining in the first half, the Eagles hit pay dirt when qb Bo Page hit speedy Keith Williams for the six points and the kick for extra point was good.

The Lions came roaring back with only seconds remaining and passed down to the Eagles six yard line. Fleet Coates ran in for the score. But the run for the extra two points was stopped and at the half it was the Eagles 7-6.

There was no scoring in the second half until the fourth quarter. Ozona took the ball and drove 76 yards to set up the score. David Huff passed to his twin brother Donald, who made a diving catch in the end zone for the score. Ozona faked a kick and Coates passed to Donald Huff for the extra two points, putting the Lions ahead 14-6.

Late in the period, Eldorado scored on a pass from Archie Nixon to speedy Wayne Doyle, who ran 75 yards for the six points. The Eagles decided to go for the win, but Doyle was dropped by Lion sophomore David Pagan before he could get the extra two points and that was the ballgame.

Both teams had 279 yards rushing. Ozona had 14 first downs to the Eagles 11, 129 yards passing to 113 for the Eagles, and both teams lost 2 fumbles.

Coates carried the ball 23 times for 104 yards and a 4.5 yards per carry average. R. Pagan carried 8 times for 22 yards, Clepper seven times for 12 yards and Sanchez 3 times for 8 yards.

Child of Former Ozonan Killed In Houston Accident

Funeral services for Brewer Simon, 18-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Simon, were held Monday morning at 10 o'clock from Memorial Chapel, Houston.

The little boy was killed instantly Saturday afternoon when he fell from a car door onto a Houston freeway and was run over by another car. The child's mother is the former Sandra Brewer of Ozona. He was the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Brewer, former Ozonan.

Mrs. James Chapman and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Brewer, the child's aunts and uncle, returned to Ozona Tuesday after attending the service.

Funeral services for Javier Galan, Jr., infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Javier Galan, were held here Saturday afternoon from the Catholic Church. Burial was in Lima Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

The baby died Friday in Children's Hospital in Houston. He was 2 weeks old. He was born Sept. 4 in Crockett County Hospital.

GUILT IN CHICAGO

For years now the television and radio networks have been hung-up trying to decide whether they are entertainment media, or news media. The hang-up was never more clear than during the Chicago donnybrook. Indignant spokesmen for both media are demanding investigations. Devotees of the idiot-box are writing letters to the editor. The sight of unwashed agitators who have been so prominent on TV getting whacked by Chicago police has stirred up the fans.

Our own impression is similar to that voiced by Senator Muskie, he who was nominated for the Vice-President spot on the Democratic ticket. The Senator said he observed the troublemakers from his 7th floor window, and that the very care-

fully maneuvered innocent onlookers between themselves and the police before opening up with barrages of missiles. And the police had to pass through the innocents to get to the perpetrators.

Do peaceful demonstrators usually carry bottles, cans, rocks and assorted containers filled with excrement? Certainly these were not predominantly residents of Chicago. They were imported troublemakers who openly trained for the engagements with the police while TV cameras filmed the exercises. Good entertainment, that.

Probably before the typesetter can finish with this copy they'll be pulling that "collective guilt" business again. In anticipation of that drivel we'll hoist a couple of culprits for the investigators to interrogate. First

there is President Lyndon Johnson who, on August 3, 1965, greeted some college students as "fellow revolutionaries," and who told Americans four years ago that he was going to take money "away from the 'haves' and give it to the 'have-nots' who need it so much." The law defines that procedure as stealing, and we presume the Chicago hoodlums felt it didn't make much difference in the Great Society which laws they broke.

Another culprit is Hubert Humphrey who orated in July, 1966, that if he lived in the slums, "I think you'd have more trouble than you have already, because I've got enough spark in me to lead a mighty good revolt . . ."

We submit the following as the first question to be asked by the investigators who look into the Chicago happenings: "Would you have preferred that the police not be there?"

Congressman O. C. Fisher

The mudslingers and the muckrakers will be at work this election year — as they always are when they lack issues and a sense of integrity. Abraham Lincoln was once quoted as saying that the quality of candidates in political contests can always be determined by the type of campaign they conduct. He went on to say the political scavenger is the one who wallows in the mire of falsehoods and deceit.

Thus, this year while the nation beholds the appearance of the demonstrators, the hippies and yuppies, they witness the surfacing of that other breed, such as Abe Lincoln had in mind—the mudslingers and the muckrakers.

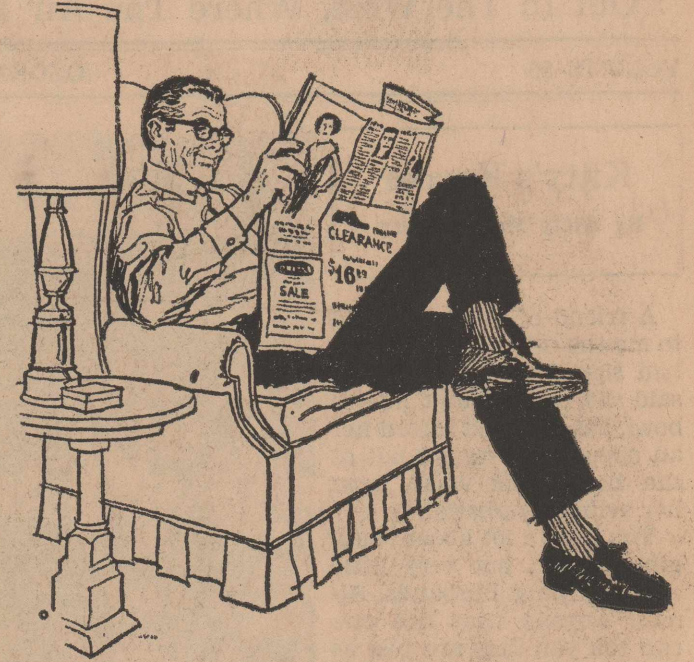

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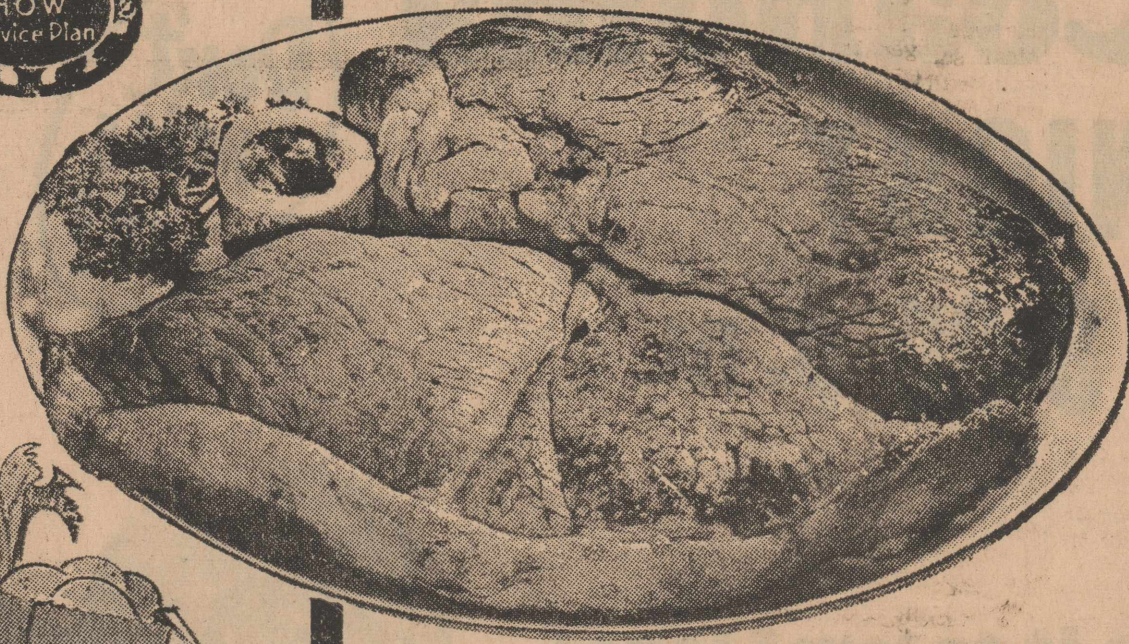

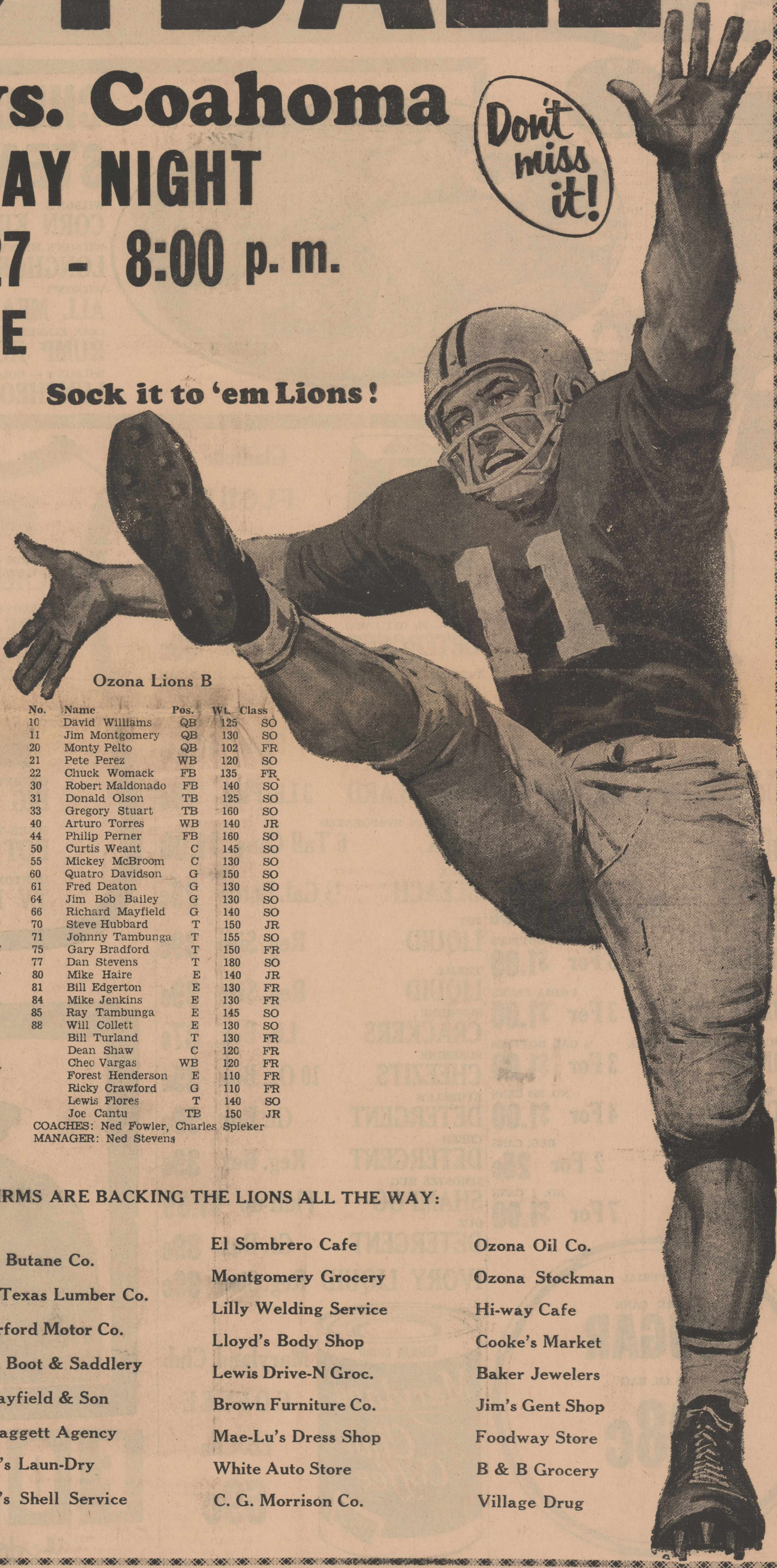

Its more than 8,000 square feet of floor space have been tastefully, artistically, and sturdily constructed to serve many necessary multiple ministries of a local church. Our friends of this parish have wisely invested funds, time, and ability to make possible a continuing ministry of helpfulness.

Then last Sunday, a large group of us from Ozona, Sonora, Eden, Rowena, San Angelo, and other communities joined Pastor Firnhaber and his congregation in a rejoicing dedication of their new building. The church is a gem of beauty and utility for worthy, Christian education, and fellowship. We wish for this congregation in its new facilities a growing ministry of Christian reconciliation which may bring God and men nearer to one another in Christ as well as to break down walls of separation among men that we may all increasingly understand, accept, love, and serve one another.

at Calvary Baptist Church labor largely with their own hands to build a complete church plant adequate for instruction, fellowship, and worship. Their handsome building, when completed, will be an honor to Ozona and, we pray, an instrument of God. By the way, I would suspect that gifts from those of us who do not belong to their congregation would not be rejected. That reminds me I must take a check by and I believe the Lord is going to let me do that very thing this afternoon.

Most outstanding of all is, I suspect, the accomplishment of Delfino Pozos and his congregation at our Spanish-speaking Assembly of God Church, Templo Siloe, in the building of a beautiful masonry House of God on Highway 163 South. Their membership is not large but their new Church would ornament much larger town than Ozona. We are indebted to them for vision and labor in brick and stone that hearts and lives may be changed.

It seems that our friend Jim Hancock and our people at First Baptist Church started this trend to upgrading physical facilities for religious efforts in our community, which are — (Do you really believe it?) — the most important activities in Crockett County, when they installed the beautiful stained glass windows in their auditorium. This act of devotion was followed by chimes, made possible, I understand, by Mrs. Myrtle Mitchell. The sweet singing of heavenly tones from these chimes blesses our whole community as they call us at frequent intervals to stop a moment and forget the things of earth as in a reverent hush we listen for the voice of God.

And now it appears that the Ozona Methodists may stir themselves to complete the original design of their Church as planned in 1948. Plans then called for an Adult Annex. Some 40x50 feet, extending eastward from the ell on the south to match the ell on the north. Such an adult annex would be used daily in varied ways to serve a growing adult activity in the congregation. The Administrative Board plans to present the matter to the congregation for decision and support when 80% of the projected cost has been underwritten. Already more than 60% has been indicated. These Ozona Methodists are likely to find themselves standing in the need of the prayers of all their fellow Christians in this God-given task.

All these church improvements are but symptomatic of the progressive spirit of this community which has in recent years manifested itself in upgraded school buildings, our beautiful Civic Center, the Crockett County Hospital, and such commercial structures as the new bank building and the apartment building as well as many beautiful new homes in the community.

This spirit of looking and acting ahead makes Ozona the unique community she is and assures her continuing growth. While we have abundant natural resources which aid us greatly in our growth, in the long run the future of any community finally depends on the spirit of her citizens.

Ozona Canyon Field Extended By Recompletion

The Ozona (Canyon gas) field was extended 1 1/2 miles southwest with recompletion of The Canyon Co., Ltd., Midland, No. 1-101 Crystelle Childress, former middle Clearfork producer in the V.I.P. (multipay Clearfork oil and gas) field, 23 miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated absolute open flow

of 600,000 cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 5,648-6,398 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons and factured with 47,000 gallons and 70,000 pounds of sand.

Originally drilled to 6,631 feet by B. W. Wiseman, Jr., Midland, it was taken over by The Canyon Co. and finalized June 20 for seven barrels of water, through perforations at 2,350-80 feet.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 1,600 feet from the west lines of 101-WC-A.

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, will drill the No. 1 C Amacker, a Crockett County project, 1,500 feet northwest of dual 5,500-foot Wolfcamp production in the Tippett, west multipay field and Hueco production in the Tippett multipay field, seven miles south of McCamey.

Contract depth is 6,000 feet to test the lower Leonard, 5,500-foot Wolfcamp, in the Tippett field and Hueco in the Tippett, West field.

Location is 660 feet from the northwest and southwest lines (Pecos River) of 35-12-H&TC. Contract depth is 6,000 feet.
