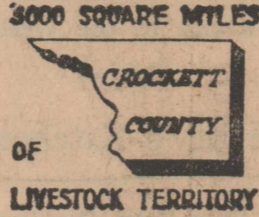

I think she won me over first and when I awoke one morning and found her sleeping under the cover on Tom's chest, it was obvious that he had given in. Jim held out as long as he could, but she finally wormed her way into his heart and under his bedcovers.

Jim was in his room studying, Tom and I were watching the Monday night movie, "How to Murder your Wife," and cat was asleep on the couch when this came about. Suddenly the cat cried out like a baby in pain and went through all kinds of contortions. This brought everybody to her side. After Tom examined her, he decided she wasn't long for this world and rushed for the telephone to place a call to an animal doctor in Sonora.

I was fanning the cat and begging her to speak to me, Jim was blaming me for keeping the cat in the first place and himself for getting attached to it, while Tom was getting the wrong number, then the operator and finally the veterinarian. By this time, the cat was completely still and quite. I fixed her a bed in the back of the car, knowing it was too late. Tom picked her up as carefully as if she were a baby and put her in the car. We jumped in for the trip to Sonora and had scarcely shut the doors when the cat jumped up into the front seat, startling us out of our wits. After a hurried consultation we decided to run by and let my boss, an authority on Siamese cats, have a look at her.

He examined her, gave her some aspirin and we went home feeling rather foolish. She immediately climbed into my lap and went to sleep. Just to be on the safe side, Tom felt she should see a doctor, so he took off to Sonora with her the next day. By the time he got there he was a nervous wreck. The cat sat on the back of the seat and licked his neck all the way. After finding that the doctor wouldn't be in his office for several hours, he just got in the car and brought cat home. On the way back she crawled onto his chest and licked his chin all the way.

I ran home to see about the cat and found Tom in a state of collapse. I gave him a tranquilizer and her a saucer of milk. Jim came in from football practice and asked about the cat the minute he got in the door. I told him the cat was all right, but that his dad was in pretty bad shape. He expressed relief, at finding the cat well and cuddled her awhile before hitting the books. Tom recovered. We still don't know whether it was a stomach ache or a nightmare.

One thing is certain. For a family that doesn't like cats, we've really been taken in.

## 56 New Worm Cases Reported In Co. Last Week

Fifty-six new screwworm cases were confirmed on Crockett county ranches during the past week, County Agent Pete W. Jacoby reported yesterday.

The week's outbreak, largest since the program was initiated, brought the total of confirmed cases to 192 in the county since July 14, Jacoby said.

The new total includes recurrences in a number of sites previously reporting worms plus cases on at least eleven new ranches. The additional ranch operations reporting worm outbreaks in the past week include the A. C. Hoover estate, D. K. McMullan, Vic Montgomery, Sam Perner, Jean Scheuber, Chas. Williams - Henderson ranch, Eugene Miller, James Childress, R. C. Ward, Mrs. George Montgomery and B. B. Noelke.

Although the Screwworm Control Program at Mission is dropping sterile flies at a new high weekly rate, the relentless spread of the pest is indicative of the seriousness of the outbreak and underlines the necessity for continued vigil by ranchmen. Every effort is being made, the county agent said, to reach all outbreaks with fly drops, but the spread has been so rapid that ground marking crews can not keep up with the spread. Cold weather may be the only thing that will stop the present spread, officials fear.

## Historical Survey Committee Plans To Greet Senators

Crockett County Historical Survey Committee members met Monday afternoon at the courthouse in a called meeting. Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chairman, announced the group had added Esccondido Water Hole, 20 miles southwest of Ozona, a water used by trail drivers, Indians and early day travelers, and the Chihuahua Trail as nominees for historical markers. Six markers have already been erected in the county.

It was announced that four Confederate soldier graves in Ozona Cemetery are to be marked with the Confederate grave markers.

The committee made plans to greet the Senate Interim Committee to study parks and recreation areas, which is scheduled to be at Fort Lancaster in west Crockett county Friday morning about 10:30 o'clock.

## Southside Lions Plan Candy Sale For Halloween

The Southside Lions Club received 10 cases of Halloween candy this week and will be selling bags of 100 packaged pieces for \$1. The trick-or-treat candy is being sold now by members of the group. Orders are also being taken for delivery near Halloween.

## Cubs Win, Lion B Loses To Rankin Here Thurs. Nite

Ozona Junior High Cubs picked up a 34-24 victory over the Rankin junior high and the Lion B lost to the Rankin B by a score of 15-8 Thursday at Lion Stadium.

The Cubs have an open date today, while the Lion B will travel to McCamey tonight for its first out-of-town game. Game time is 6:30 p. m.

Scoring the first two times they got the ball, the Cubs took an easy win from the Little Devils. Rankin was able to score only after Coach Womack cleared the benches and his second and third string was in action.

Ruben Tambunga was the big gun for the Cubs, scoring all but one Cub touchdown and passing to Gerald Huff for the other. Huff hit Saul Torres for an extra point try.

For the Lion B it was a replay of last season against the Red Devils. Rankin took the ball on the kick-off and went through the middle for a first down on every play, driving straight downfield for the score. The conversion was no good and the Devils led 6-0 as the first quarter got underway. They scored again in the second quarter after intercepting a Lion pass, kicking a field goal from the Lion 20-yard line. After a Lion fumble on the Rankin 19, the Devils scored again on an 81 yard run, stretching their lead to 15-0. The Lions fumbled on the kick return and Rankin took over again. After holding the Devils on downs, a Lion fumble on the punt return gave the Devils the ball once more and halftime saved another Rankin score.

### Anterless Deer Permits Will Be Issue Oct. 28-29

Crockett county ranchmen who desire permits to take anterless deer on their ranches in the coming hunting season may secure such permits Monday and Tuesday, October 28 and 29, at the Game Warden's office in the courthouse.

Game Warden Raymond Davee said that the two days have been set aside for the issuing of anterless deer permits and ranchers may secure the permits only on those days. Warden Davee will be in his office from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. both days to issue the permits.

The Game Department will announce the rate of anterless deer harvest for the coming season after a meeting in Kerrville on October 14, Warden Davee said. Deer population distribution has changed very little, he said, and he looked for no change from last year's rates permits being issued for so many anterless deer per 100 acres depending on the population density.

Funeral services for Mrs. Katie R. Davis, 78, mother of Mrs. George Russell, Jr., of Ozona, were held Friday at 4:30 p. m. in the Eldorado Methodist Church, with burial in Big Cabin, Okla., under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mrs. Davis died here Thursday around noon at the home of her daughter. She was here recuperating from surgery undergone several weeks ago. Death was due to an apparent heart attack.

Mrs. Davis had lived in Eldorado since 1936.

Surviving besides the daughter are two sons, Ora D. Davis of Detroit, and Charles Davis, and nine grandchildren.

### Ozona Baptist Men Assist With Mexico Program

Rev. Jim Hancock reported that four men from the First Baptist Church took part in the church building program in Mexico along the Rio Grande during the weekend. This was the first participation by the local church in the Texas Baptists' program to build churches and drill water wells in Mexico from Brownsville to El Paso.

The local men, Hanson Clark, Dean Scott, John Thompson and Charles Edgerton, left Friday and returned Sunday from Polaris, Mexico, located over 150 miles west of Presidio. They traveled the 150 miles in a Scout over trails and dirt roads to reach the group of small towns centered by Polaris.

The Castle Gap Assn., made up of Baptist Churches in area towns and including Ozona, is in the process of building the church. Five villages surround the town and the association is drilling water wells in each of them. The church will serve Polaris and the surrounding area when finished and will have a native pastor, furnished by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

They were accompanied by Project Leader Ethel Wolf and organizational leader Dorothy Price.

It was the Lions all the way here Friday night as they roared past the highly favored Coahoma Bulldogs 22-0. Playing outstanding defensive ball, the Lions never allowed the Bulldogs to get any closer to the goal than their 40-yard line. The hapless Coahoma crew did no better in the air than they did on the ground, completing only two of their 9 passes.

After a scoreless first quarter Fleet Coates took the ball 17 yards to put the Lions on the scoreboard. Tommy Connor kicked the extra point and the Lions led 7-0 early in the second period. Later in the same quarter the Lions drove 65 yards to set up a second score on the 2-yard line and Coates powered over for the td. The kick was no good and at the half the Lions had a 13-0 lead.

Ozona scored again in the fourth period when end Donald Huff threw to halfback Rodney Pagan for 32 yards and the td. The PAT was no good and Ozona led 19-0. With three minutes to go, Connor kicked a 28 yard field goal to end the scoring.

Johnny Barbee led the tough Lion defense with 13 tackles.

Ozona was impressive in the statistic department with 17 first downs to Coahoma's 8, 229 yards rushing to the opponent's 107, 61 yards passing to 33 for the Bulldogs. The Lions completed 4 passes out of 8 and the Bulldogs were 2 for 9.

Coates had a 38.1 punt average and carried the ball 126 yards in 26 carries. Pagan carried 13 times for 39 yards; Carlos Sanchez, 24 yards in 24 carries and Randal Clepper 40 yards in 10 carries. David Huff, quarterback, completed 3 out of 6 passes for 29 yards and his twin brother, Donald, completed 1 for 32 yards and a td.

David Pagan caught 2 passes for 23 yards and Rodney Pagan caught one for the 32-yard td.

### Crockett Airport Runway Extension Nears Completion

Shell Oil Co. began casing their gas line, which is located under the strip of the new addition at the airport, Monday. When this is finished, only paving remains to complete enlargement of the runway to accommodate larger planes.

The Commissioners Court agreed to the enlargement when the county took over the operation of the airport several months ago and work was started refencing the area shortly afterward.

## Senate Committee To Inspect Lancaster On Friday Morning Stop

Members of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee and the tourism committee of the Chamber of Commerce will meet members of the Senate Interim Committee to study Parks and Recreation facilities when they arrive at Fort Lancaster in west Crockett county Friday morning.

The Senate Committee is completing a seven-day tour of West Texas historical sites and park facilities to study needs. The tour began in Odessa where the group converged Saturday at the Inn of the Golden West where a reception was held for committee members in the evening.

A local group, headed by Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chairman of the Historical Survey Committee, will greet the touring committee members at Fort Lancaster, where refreshments will be served and the visitors guided over the fort site, now property of the State Park Systems and due for early development under the park program.

The tour by the committee, headed by Sen. Don Kennard of Fort Worth, left Odessa Monday morning, headed west, their first stop at the San Hills State Park at Monahans.

Those making the tour are Senators Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, Joe Christie of El Paso, Roy Harrington of Port Arthur, Charles Herring of Austin, Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi and Murry Watson, Jr., of Waco.

A helicopter inspection of

McKittick Canyon, an area to be included in the Guadalupe Mountains National Recreation area highlighted the first day of the tour. The second day took the sightseers to El Paso with stops at Hueco Tanks, a desert water hole used by pioneers and Indians, Ysleta Mission and San Elizario Mission.

After an overnight stay in El Paso, the group went to Van Horn with inspection stops at Victoria Canyon, Balmorhea State Park and Davis Mountains State Park. A tour of Fort Davis was enjoyed Tuesday, the tourists driving to Shafter, a historic mining town south of Marfa, and to Capote Falls for an overnight stay.

A tour of Fort Leaton, near Presidio, one of the newly acquired state park properties was slated Wednesday, the caravan then traveling Camino Del Rio, one of the nation's ten most beautiful highways, with visits to Polvo Archeological site and Terlingua on the way to Big Bend National Park for overnight. Langtry was on the itinerary for Thursday and Fort Lancaster Friday morning, the Senators concluding their tour with a visit to Fort McKavett, near Menard, another of the newly acquired state historical sites, San Saba Mission at Menard and winding up at Fort Concho in San Angelo Friday afternoon.

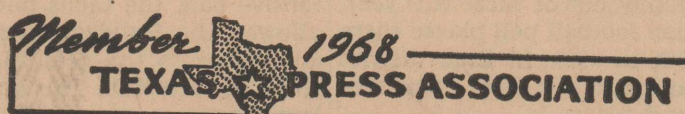

**Motor Vehicle Inspection Period Opened Sept. 1**

Austin — The 1969 vehicle inspection period began Sept. 1 in Texas according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"More than six-million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969 deadline," Speir said. Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 5,500 vehicle stations in Texas, each of which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including power steering) and wheels and rims (not to include removal of the wheel from the vehicle) on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a loaded gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds.

**Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen**

**Rose Petal Cookies**

By Jean Hersey

Take half a dozen fragrant red roses that you are sure have no spray residue. Remove petals and cut off the base of each. Simmer the petals covered for about 1/2 hour in a small amount of water and 1/2 cup brown sugar and strain. The result will make 1 1/2 tall glasses of fluid that looks like wine and tastes the way roses smell. Now you are ready for the cookies.

Mix 2 cups of brown sugar with 1 1/2 cups soft butter. Add 1 pinch of salt and 1/2 teas. nutmeg. Add another 1/2 cup of soft butter and mix well.

Beat 3 eggs thoroughly and add 1/2 cup of rose syrup. Stir this into the first mixture and add 2 cups of white flour and 2 cups of whole wheat flour. Roll on a well floured board quite thin and cut into rounds with a 3-inch diameter cookies cutter. Cook in an oven at about 300 degrees for 15 minutes or until golden brown.

Watch carefully, as they have a tendency to burn.

Use deep red roses for syrup and the most fragrant ones you have. This gives the cookies a slightly pink cast. The flavor is subtle, but delicious. Makes dozens.

This recipe is a collector's you might want to place in your file and try next spring.

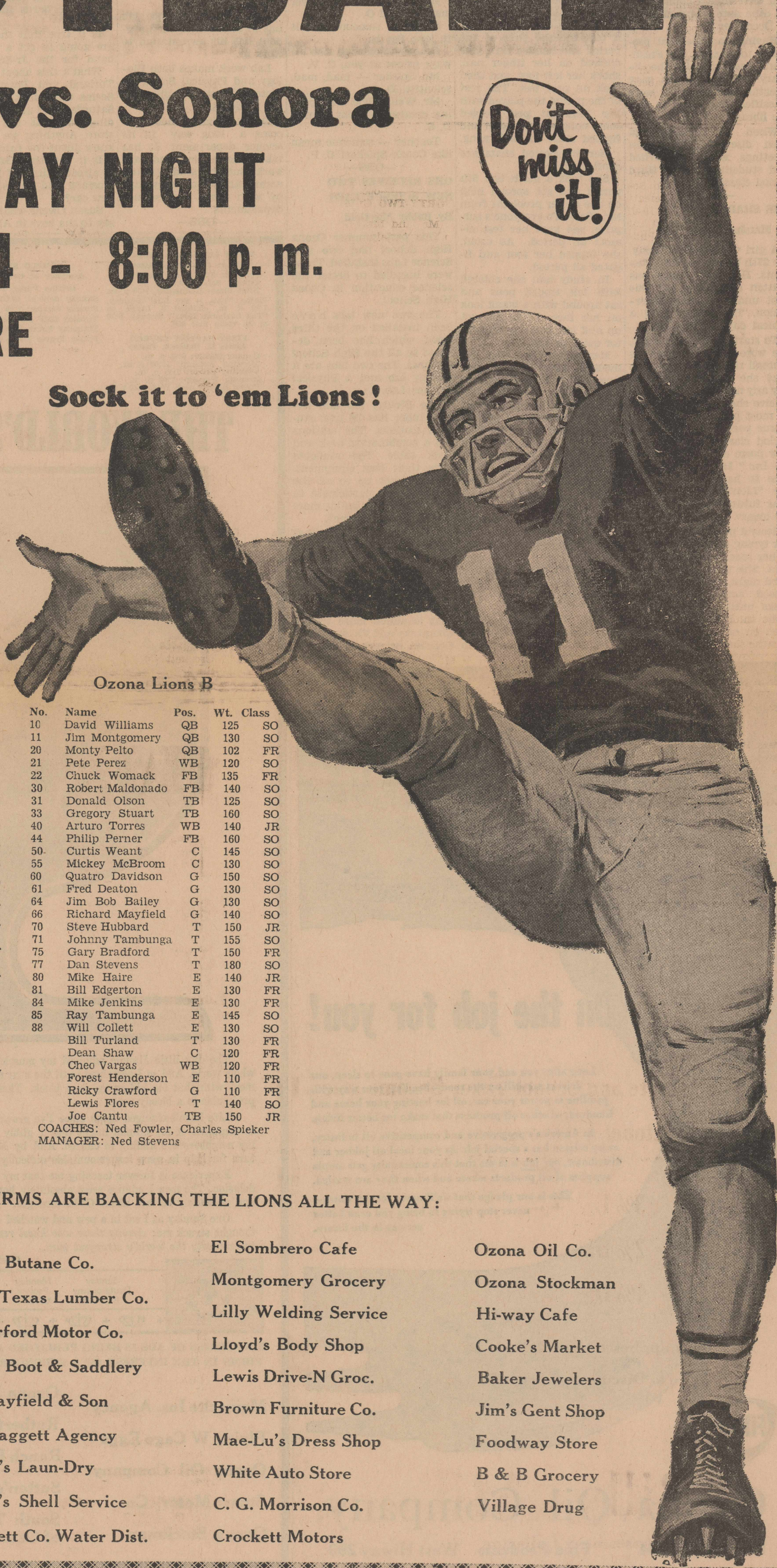

**Early Mailing Campaign Opened By PO Department**

U. S. Postal authorities have launched their annual "mail early" campaign for Christmas mailing to armed forces overseas. Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced.

The following periods have been designated for mailing Christmas parcels to armed forces overseas: Surface transportation, Oct. 14 to Nov. 9; Space available airlift, Oct. 21 to Nov. 23; PAL, Oct. 28 to Nov. 30; Airmail, Nov. 30 to Dec. 11.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double faced fiberboard. All boxes should be tied with strong cord and sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent rattling or loosening. A slip showing list of contents, name and address of sender and of the addressee should be enclosed in the parcel. Information on what can and can not be sent and what require custom declarations may be obtained at the postoffice.

Questions concerning size and weight limitations on all types of mail should be directed to the postoffice.
