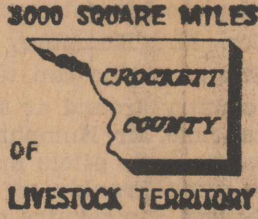

Hunters Offered Valuable Prizes For Biggest Deer

Over \$1350 worth of prizes will be awarded deer hunters in Crockett County this year. For the first time, the Chamber of Commerce is actively promoting the deer hunting season in the county by awarding prizes for the most points, widest rack and heaviest field - dressed deer killed in the county.

Prize for the most points will be a 30-30 Winchester, Bill Cody commemorative model, rifle. The hunter, who brings in the deer with the widest rack, will receive 8x40 binoculars and the prize for the heaviest field-dressed deer will be 8x35 binoculars.

The contest begins the day hunting season opens, Nov. 9. Deer must be weighed and measured at the Ozona Trading Post. Most points will be counted from the brow point up and the widest rack will be measured at the beam.

Winners will be announced at the close of the season, Dec. 15.

Information on hunting leases by the day or by the season is available at the Chamber of Commerce office. Both lists are posted on the front window for the convenience of those wishing hunting lease information after the office closes.

Nov. 1 Deadline For Out Of State Absentee Voting

County Clerk Leta Powell has reminded new residents of the county that they must vote in her office by Friday, November 1, if they wish to participate in the coming general election.

November 1 is also the last day for absentee voting and for voting by persons who qualified to vote in the presidential election as new residents of the state during the 15-day application period in September.

Persons who have lived in Texas more than a year but who have moved from one county to another since May 5, 1968, may vote on all statewide offices, including President and Vice President, and on the 14 proposed constitutional amendments, but they may not vote on local offices. In order to vote, they must be registered as voters for the 1968 voting year.

Miss Powell said that the voter should have his registration certificate with him when he applies for his ballot. However, he will be permitted to make an affidavit of its loss if he has lost or mislaid the certificate.

ON WAY TO TERLINGUA—Famed 2-Alarm Chili Chef, Wick Fowler, Visits

A brief but delightful visit by an old friend, Wick Fowler, the Austin newsman and perennial Gold Medal kitchen-tested chili chef who was on his way to Terlingua to compete in the second annual World Championship Chili Cooking Contest to be held Saturday, brightened the day for the Stockman staff yesterday.

A Californian will compete against Fowler this year and Fowler says he understands they put smog in their chili in California and if that is true he anticipates no trouble in winning the match. The California contender will be Woodruf (Wino Woody) De Silva of Los Angeles.

De Silva, known as Wino Woody because he guzzles champagne from a delicate hollow-stemmed glass while he cooks chili in an indelicate pot called a wok, is chief chili head of the Chili Appreciation Society International chapter at Cucamonga, Calif. Fowler, "who also is widely known for his pot," as Nat Henderson of the Austin American staff, puts it is chief chili chef for headquarters of the Chili Appreciation Society International in Dallas.

"Rooms will be scarce in Terlingua this week as thousands flock to the city near the west entrance to Big National Park," writes the Austin reporter of Fowler's safari, "but rooms are always hard to get in Terlingua. More than 2,000 persons attended the first annual Chili Bowl last year when Terlingua had a population estimated at none. There were no rooms then."

A record turn-out of voters will go to the polls Tuesday to cast their votes for the next president of the United States. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. here in Crockett County. New residents must vote absentee and tomorrow is the deadline for absentee voting.

A check with County Clerk Leta Powell yesterday, indi-

cated that absentee voting had been unusually heavy this election.

Texas voters have a choice this year. Along with the full slate of Democratic hopefuls headed by the Humphrey-Muskie team, the Republican party, topped by Nixon-Agnew, offers opponents for most all the state offices. The only other party on the ballot, The American Party, offers presidential-vice presidential nominees only.

At the local level, Democrat Jess C. Marley is opposed by James M. Baggett, Republican, for Commissioner of Precinct 1, and Republican Charles G. Applewhite opposes Democrat Bill Black for Commissioner of Precinct 2. There are no contested races locally in Precincts 3 and 4.

Voters are urged to place an X in the box beside the name of the candidate of their choice and indicate their position on the fourteen proposed amendments to the state constitution by placing an X in the box for or against box. Those wishing to vote a straight party ticket should place an X in the box next to the party they wish to vote for and check nothing else on the ballot except the amendments.

Residents of Precinct 1 will vote at the courthouse with J. G. Hufstader as election judge. Precinct 2 voters will cast their ballots at the high school where Tommy Harris is election judge. Residents of Precinct 3 will vote at the Civic Center, T. J. Bailey election judge. Precinct 4 voters will vote at South Elementary cafeteria with Joe Couch presiding election judge. The two out-of-town boxes will be at Powell Field, presided over by Mrs. Ernest Dishman, and WTU Power Plant box, presided over by J. A. Carroll.

Ballots will be counted and results announced over a public address system at the courthouse as soon as the polls close Tuesday night.

After a shaky first quarter, the Lions came on to pick up an easy 46-18 victory from the San Angelo sub-varsity last Friday night. The Bobcats scored in the first period when Walter Lewis picked off a Lion pass and ran 40 yards for the score. The PAT was good.

Ozona scored early in the second quarter after a drive from their own 20-yard line. Fleet Coates went in from the five for the score. The PAT failed and the Bobcats led 7-6. The Lions fumbled the kick return and the recovery led to the last San Angelo scoring drive. Unable to get the td., a field-goal try was good and it was 10-6.

Immediately following the San Angelo field goal, the Lions rallied, with Carlos Sanchez returning the kick for 96 yards and a Lion td. The kick was no good, but the Lions led 12-10.

The Lions scored again with 2 seconds to go in the half, when Coates hit Pagan on the 2-yd line of the Bobcats and ran in on the next play for the td. Again the PAT failed, bringing up halftime with the Lions leading 18-10.

Box 841, Abilene, Texas has applied for an amendment to Permit No. 00961 from the Texas Water Quality Board regarding the discharge and retention of wastewater from its Crockett County generating station. The wastewater will be discharged from the plant located adjacent to the Pecos River and approximately 1/2 mile north of U. S. Highway 67 in Section 11, Block 31, H. & T. C. R.R. Survey, Crockett County, Texas via three outlets.

Outlet No. 1, consisting of 37,300 gallons per day of water softener blowdown, filter backwash water, sump discharge, evaporator blowdown, water softener backwash and rinse, and boiler cleaner (20,000) gallons once every one to three years, will be retained in an evaporation pit just southeast of the plant.
