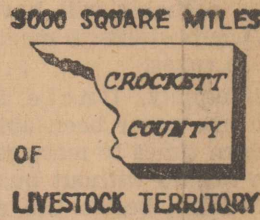

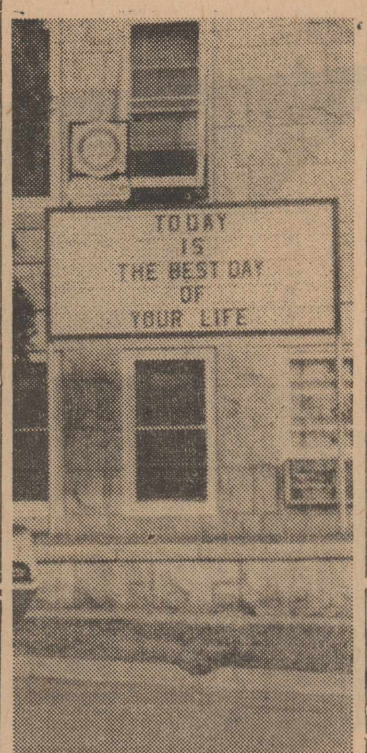

### Medals Presentation Ceremony To Honor Sgt. Gary Pagan Friday At 1:45 In High School Auditorium

A Presentation of Medals ceremony honoring Sgt. Gary D. Pagan, who was killed in the Republic of South Vietnam on November 29, 1968, while serving with the 101st Airborne Division of the U. S. Army, will be held tomorrow, Friday, afternoon at 1:45 at the high school auditorium.

Col. Philip J. Moore, Sector Commander, New Mexico-West Texas Sector, Albuquerque, N. M., will make the presentation to Sgt. Pagan's family, Mr. and Mrs. James A. Pagan and sons. Medals to be presented are the Silver Star for Gallantry, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Good Conduct Medal, Army Commendation, National Defense Service, Vietnamese Campaign Ribbon, Combat Infantry Badge and the Marksmanship badge with automatic rifle and rifle bars.

The ceremony will begin with the Pledge of Allegiance, led by Student Council President Rangel Clepper, who will also give the devotional. Supt. L. B. T. Sikes will introduce Col. Moore, who will present the medals to Sgt. Pagan's parents and brothers. High school principal Foy Moody will be in charge of dismissal.

The public is invited to attend the ceremony.

An Army spokesman brought word of Sgt. Pagan's death to his parents November 22. His body arrived November 30 and funeral services were held Sunday, Dec. 1, from the Ozona Church of Christ. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery with full military honors.

Sgt. Pagan was a graduate of Ozona High School and attended Angelo State College before entering service in February of 1967.

### Now Almost Full Amistad Lake Is Expected To Draw Estimated Two Million Visitors Annually

With water backed up more than 150 feet deep behind the 99 per cent completed Amistad Dam, Ozona suddenly finds itself with a big new fishing hole practically in its own back yard.

The huge dam has been placed across the Rio Grande by the United States and Mexico near Del Rio. That's only 115 highway miles from Ozona, not far at all according to standards by which distance is measured in the wide open spaces of West Texas.

Development of Amistad National Recreational Area is already underway. It is expected to attract two million visitors a year from all over the United States and beyond. Many of these will be traveling through Ozona, which is on Highway 163, a direct route to Lake Amistad. Thus, Lake Amistad will have a healthy impact on Ozona's economy as well as providing new recreational opportunities for the enjoyment of citizens here.

### Allen To Lead Baptist Revival Song Services

Sam Allen of Lubbock will lead the music for the Crusade of The Americas Revival in the First Baptist Church here March 9-16. Mr. Allen has been in the ministry of evangelistic singing for some twenty years. Mr. Allen is an outstanding song leader and soloist each year in many southern assemblies and encampments. He recently served as soloist for the Southern Baptist Pastor's Conference and Southern Baptist Convention. Ozona people know Mr. Allen very well from their annual exposure to his singing at Paisano General Encampment.

Allen is a man of varied abilities and talents. He won the High School World Record in the 120 yd. high hurdles. He has won several World A. A. U. and National Collegiate championships in the high hurdles. He was twice named to the All-A (Continued on Last Page)

James Floyd of Sonora was the lucky winner of \$100 Monday morning at Glynn's Shell Station in Shell's Mr. President Coin Game.

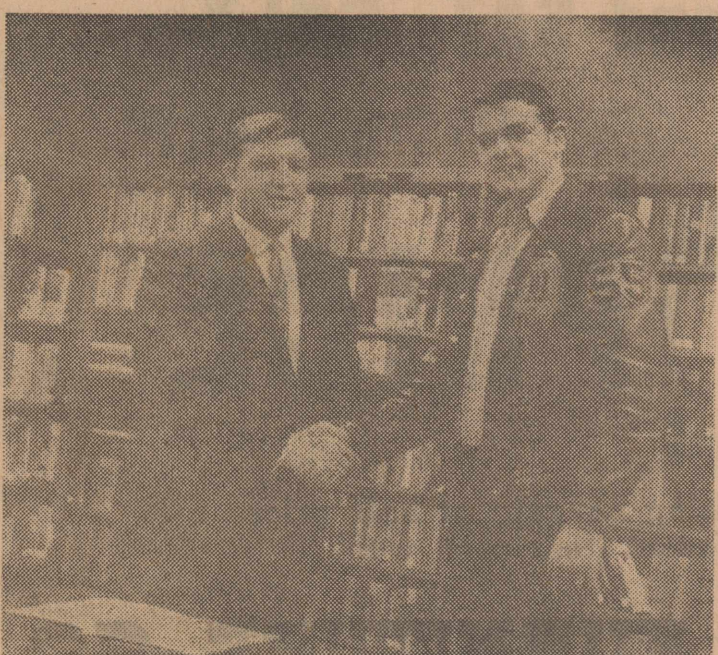

**THE ATTACK ON THE ANTHEM**

For several months our National Anthem has been under attack. It all started when 26-year-old Jose Feliciano gave a "soul" rendition of the Anthem preceding the fifth game of the world series. Something shook up the St. Louis Cardinals that day. They scored 3 runs in the top of the first, and didn't do anything the rest of the day, losing 5-3.

Whether or not it was the Feliciano rendition which did the trick is hard to say, but there is no doubt that a lot of people were rubbed the wrong way. Still a recording by the blind Puerto Rican later became a top-seller, and he now begins every public performance with his "soul" rendition of the Star Spangled Banner.

Many personalities have jumped into the controversy. Frank Sinatra has called it "a terrible piece of music." Joan Baez, who has found nothing that we can recall which she professes to like about this country, calls it "just so much trash." Mitch

Miller calls it "a joke".

On the other hand there are several great stars and composers who defend the song. Marian Anderson is "well satisfied" with it; Irvin Berlin, who composed the great God Bless America, (which is often mentioned as a replacement for the Star Spangled Banner) thinks that it would be a "terrible mistake" to change. Richard Rodgers is on record as saying that "tradition is more important than simplicity," in answer to those who protest the difficulty of singing the Anthem. Duke Ellington commented that the singing of the song is not the issue: "It's the symbol of our great nation — and that's all there is to it."

Meantime, a national magazine is conducting a poll, with coupons for voting, on whether or not the anthem should be changed — and to what. The results are to be submitted to the Congress, the magazine proudly proclaims.

If you feel strongly about this, we'd suggest you write your Congressman and Sen-

ator. If you don't somebody else will.

As for us: Frank Sinatra may have trouble with the range of the Star Spangled Banner; it may be a "joke" to some, and "trash" to others; but it is the most beautiful — and meaningful — piece of music ever composed to so many Americans who were at Bataan, Panmunjon, and a thousand other points of tearful pride, that it would be a travesty and a tragedy even to consider making a change.

Too many men have wept, unashamedly, at the relief of hearing it played.

**ON FAMILY BUSINESSES**

The day of the family business is in the sunset stage, it appears. Over the past few years literally thousands of established and successful family business enterprises have been sold to conglomerates — giant corporate combines which pick the choice fruit of the business world when the family is confronted by Uncle Sam.

Actually, it is the confiscatory taxation imposed by the Federal Government which is forcing the successful family business out of existence. And there is scarcely a community in the country which has not suffered from this problem. The successful family business builds on its community reputation as well as its service to the commercial community. More often than not a major consideration is the goodwill established by the founding family's integrity and fair treatment of customers as well as employees.

But when the founding father of the family business gets on in years, Washington casts its shadow. For example: let's suppose that a provident businessman builds a company worth a million dollars in the course of a lifetime. At death the estate tax on the business would be \$325,000. His heirs would have to hand up that sum, customarily in cash, to the tax men. Rarely will a family or a small business have that kind of cash available. Successful businessmen keep cash invested, in equipment, or expansion plans. The

heirs probably will have to sell the business to meet the estate taxes.

Unhappily, Uncle Sam, who has never been able in modern times to manage his own affairs without buckets of red ink beside the desk, isn't a very good judge of businesses. He never seems to take into account what the founding head of the family business meant to it. The tax appraisal is made without lowering the value when the boss is gone.

Accordingly, successful businessmen who have nursed a family enterprise to profit and fame have had to escape the harsh treatment of heirs by selling the family business.

A conglomerate gives the family businessman stock. The stock is priced in the paper 5 days a week. The government can't appraise beyond the quoted price. The family sells enough stock to satisfy Washington. And a part of the community dies. It is a tragedy repeated endlessly because of a greedy government.

Rep. Doran represents District 65 which includes Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Kenney, Maverick, Menard, Schleicher, Sutton, and Val Verde Counties.

**Girl Scout Arts, Crafts Caravan to Tour Council Area**

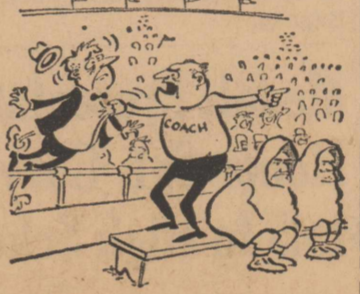

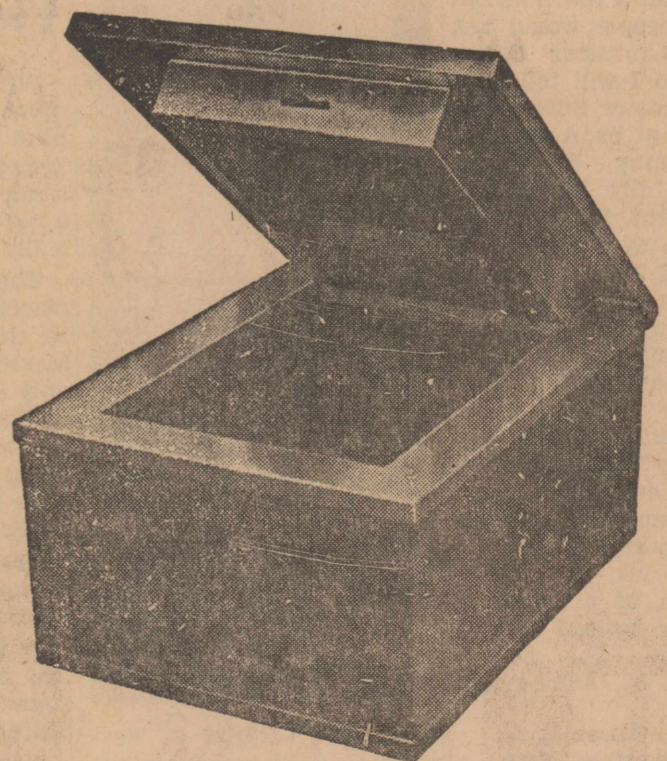

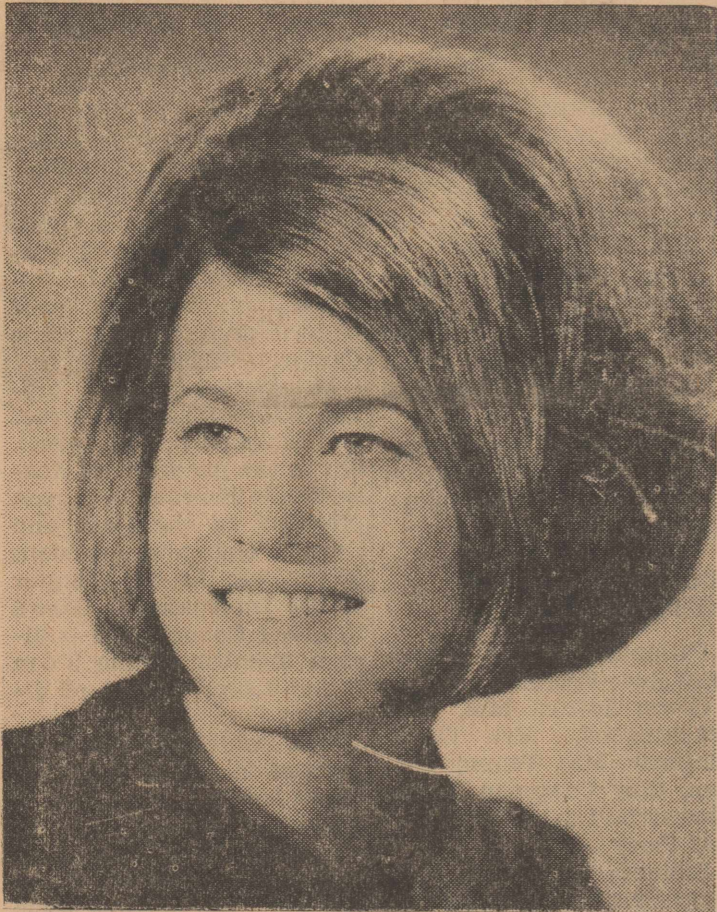

**Pork and Rice Casserole**

- 4 lion pork chops cut 3/4-inch thick
- Seasoned salt
- 3/4 cup rice
- 1 can condensed consomme
- 4 medium onions, quartered
- 2 large carrots sliced diagonally in 1-inch pieces

Trim excess fat from chops and fry out in a heavy skillet. Skim out the fat pieces when they are brown. Brown chops well in the fat on both sides. Remove to a medium casserole that will hold them in one layer. Salt lightly. In the fat remaining in the skillet, brown the raw rice, stirring constantly until it is colored. Stir in the consomme. Arrange the onions and carrots around the chops in the casserole, salt lightly, and pour the rice-consomme mixture over. Cover and bake 1 hour in a 350-degree oven. Serves 4.

**Jean's Easy Rice**

- 1 cup raw rice
  - 1 cup water
  - 1 can beef consomme
  - 1 stick butter
  - 1 teas. salt
  - 1/4 teas. black pepper
  - Garlic salt if desired
- In square pyrex baking dish place rice, water, consomme, salt and pepper. Cut up stick of butter over top. Bake 1 hour in 350-degree oven. Stir once while cooking.

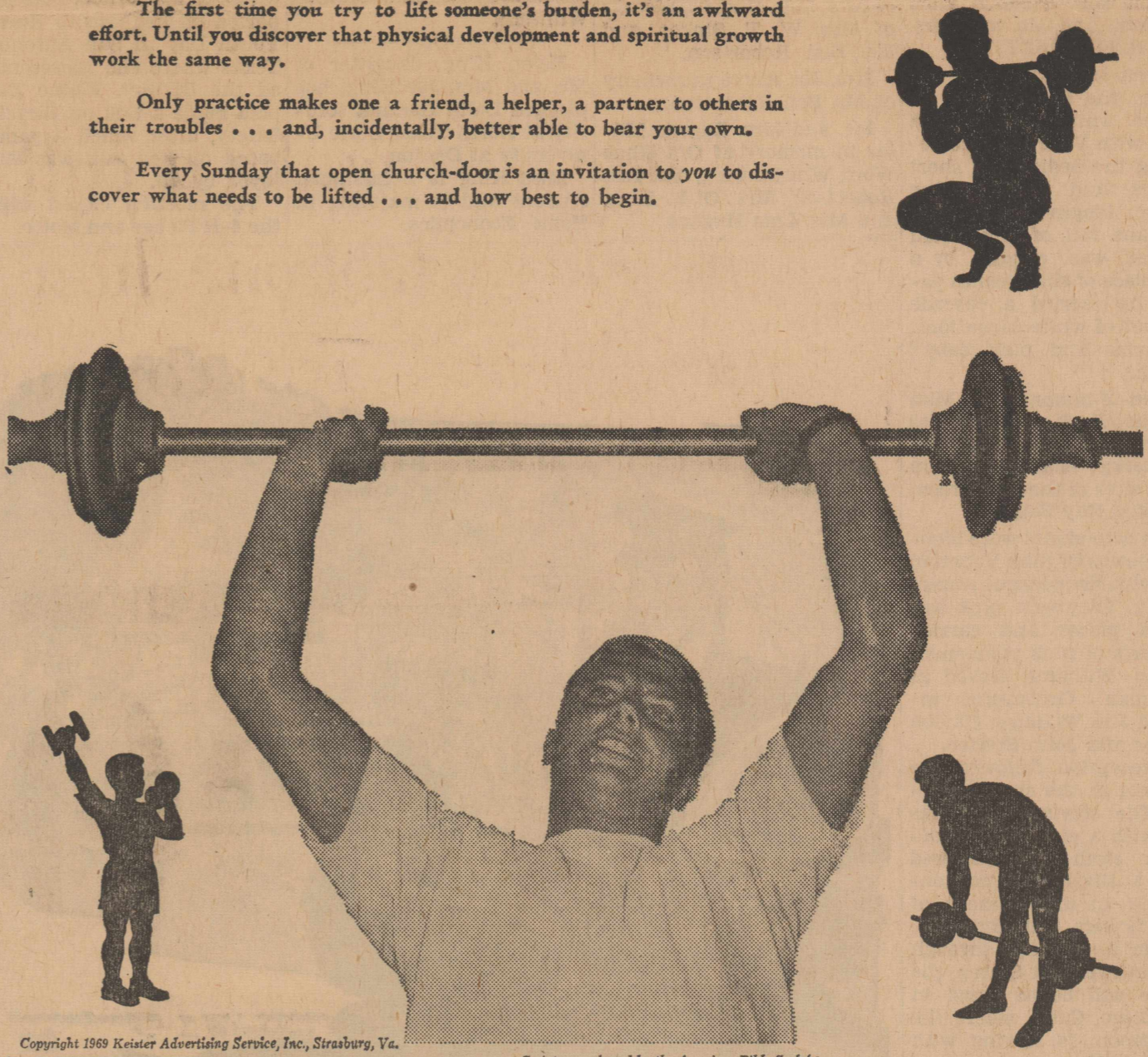

Discovery Noted  
In Crockett Co.**

A Fusselman discovery apparently has been assured in Crockett County with the flowing of oil at the estimated daily rate of 72 barrels at King Resources Co., Midland, No. 1 Continental-Harris, in 14-3-WCRR, multipay prospect, 20 miles southwest of Big Lake, 1 3/4 miles west-northwest of the one-well Escondido, Northwest (Ellenburger and Pennsylvanian detrital) field, but separated by an Ellenburger failure, and 3/4 mile southeast of the depleted one-well Lula (Devonian) field.

Swabbed two hours through perforations at 8,940-46 feet, recovering 77 barrels of load water, it kicked off a 10-64-inch choke and flowed 19 barrels of oil during the first hour and three barrels of oil per hour the was 1,661-1.

Operator shut the well in to repair separator, which was malfunctioning, and will then increase the choke and resume testing.

Drilled to 9,505 feet, it tested the Ellenburger unsuccessfully through perforations at 9,444-49 feet, 9,436-39 feet and 9,385-439 feet.

It indicated production in an unidentified zone while being drilled with the flowing of gas at the rate of 8 million cubic feet daily and oil at the estimate hourly rate of 50 barrels on a drill-stem test at 8,535-545 feet; and reversed out heavily oil and gas-cut mud on a test of the Devonian at 8,570-600

The defleecing of sheep by the use of a chemical drug called vytoxin may soon be a reality. The idea of using this drug developed from work by the National Cancer Institute where it was used in an experiment to stop the growth of cancer cells.

The Agricultural Research Service at Beltsville, Maryland, picked it up and has undertaken extensive tests by using the drug on sheep, under direction of Clair E. Terrill, Chief, Sheep and Animal Research Branch, at Beltsville — one of the best of its kind in the world.

First results were encouraging, after which the scientist observed: "Nothing looks as naked as a chemically defleeced heep."

The chemicals being tested interrupt cell growth in the bulb of each wool fiber, causing a ringlike constriction. The constriction moves up from the bulb of each fiber as it grows and in 6 to 7 days, reaches a position just below the skin surface, it was reported.

At that point, the fiber breaks easily and the whole fleece can be separated at the skinline, leaving the sheep completely bare. An operator grabbing a handful of wool and rolling his wrist along the skin can defleeced a sheep quickly.

The most recent test showed that defleecing can be delayed beyond the 6 or 7 days after chemical treatment, allowing for a short growth of new wool below the constriction point, which would give the sheep some protection against bad weather. The drug would work equally as well on mohair.

But despite preliminary successes, more research and testing is necessary before the process can be used in shearing pens.

me that additional testing is needed for possible harmful side effects not previously detected. This phase of the research is being done by Dr. J. M. Shelton of the Livestock and Forage Research Center at McGregor, Texas.

"We are hopeful," Mr. Terrell recently wrote me, "that chemical shearing can be developed for practical use in a relatively short time. It offers hope of reducing the cost and difficulty of an essential job of sheep production. Our research is aimed at this objective for all phases of sheep production and this progress is certainly encouraging."

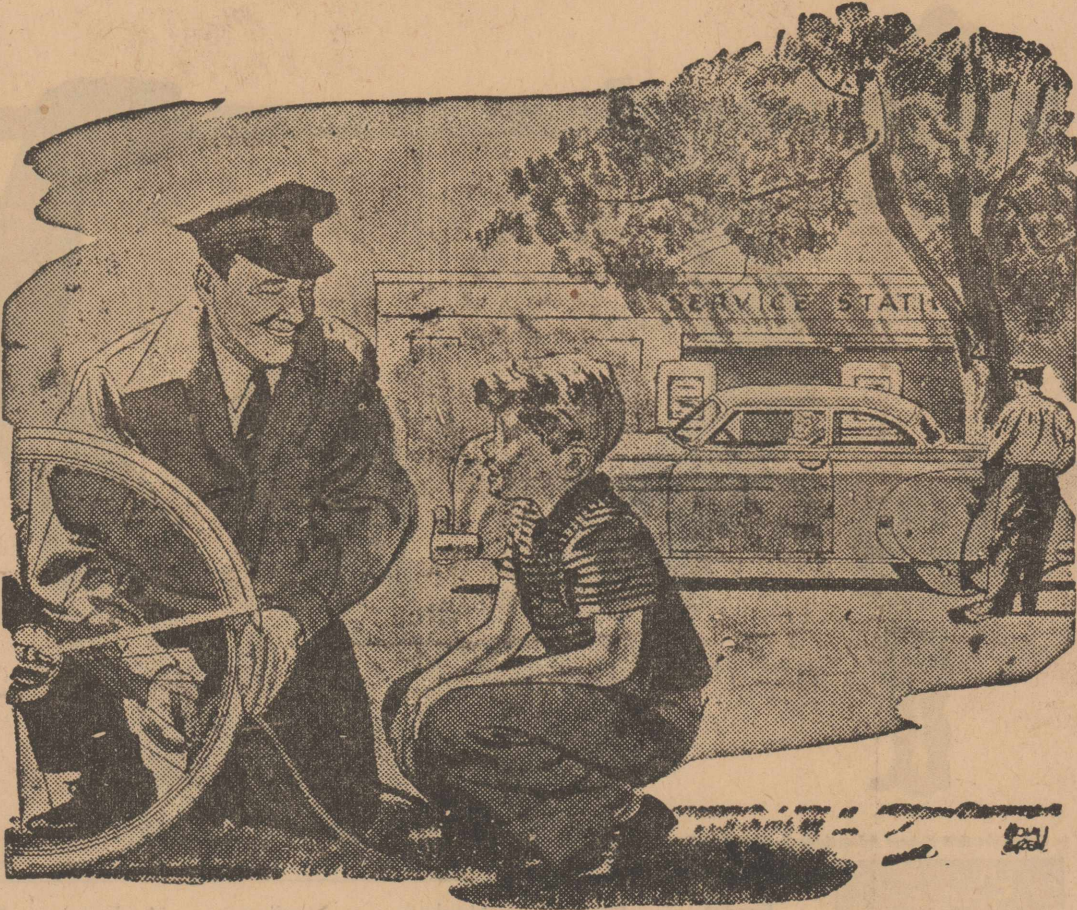

**Research Center At San Angelo To Study Livestock**

College Station — A Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center will be established at San Angelo, with construction of facilities expected to begin within a year.

The West Texas center, which will be oriented toward sheep and goat research, was authorized Saturday by the Texas A&M University System Board of Directors.

A&M President Earl Rudder promised during a San Angelo speech last month that he would recommend formation of the center.

He said the facilities will cost approximately \$300,000. San Angelo's Board of City Development, an organization similar to a chamber of commerce, has agreed to provide \$150,000 for building costs, with Texas A&M furnishing remainder of the funds.

The facility, which will be operated by A&M's Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with Angelo State College, will be located on range land now leased by ASC on the north side of North Concho Lake.

While primarily oriented toward sheep and goat research, the center may be used for other research activities benefiting the Edwards Plateau region of Texas, noted Dr. H. O. Kunkel, A&M dean of agriculture and acting TAES director.

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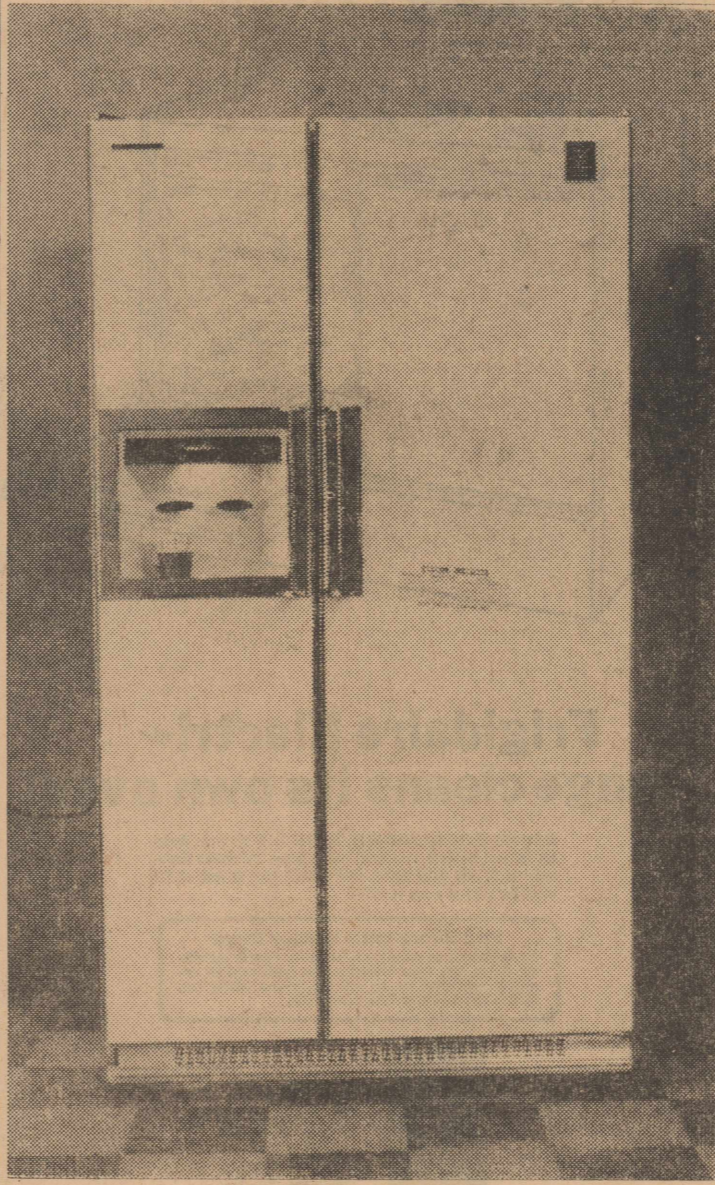
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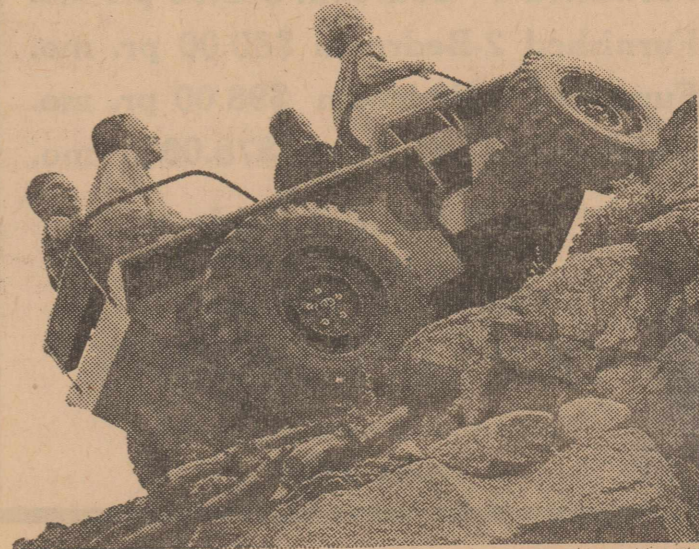

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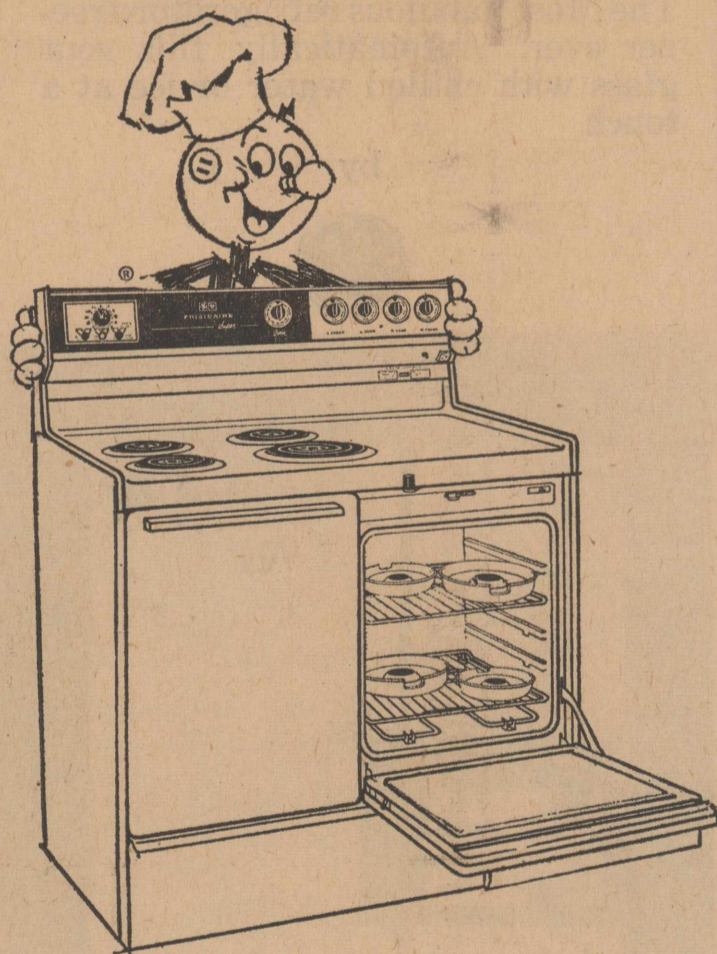
