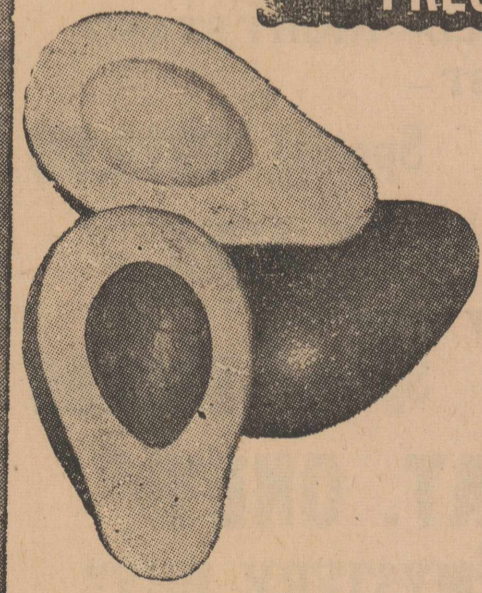

With 110% effort from everyone in the band, a first division rating can be made at contest this year, stated Mr. Sanders, director of the Lion Band. Slated for April 25, the contest will be held at Cisco Junior College in Cisco.  
The band is presently working on three pieces, two of which will be played for judging. The three are: Toccata for Band, by Ericson, Chant and Jubilo, by Mavbeth and Symphonic Overture, by Carter. A march, to

be selected later, will also be played.

The band will receive ratings for both concert and sight reading. In the past five years, the band has not gone down a rating from the one received the year before. Since Ozona High has advanced to the AA rating, competition will be much stiffer. Mr. Sanders said that if a band only drops one rating as a result of this re-assignment, it is doing quite well. However, he has high hopes that this will not hinder the Lion Band.  
Joe Bellama, currently director of bands at Texas A&I in Kingsville, will come to Ozona March 25 to work with the group to help prepare team for the contest. This will be the fifth year in a row that he has held a one day clinic here.

Section rehearsals will begin in a few weeks, announced Mr. Sanders. Rehearsals will be held at night due to conflicting afternoon schedules.  
Twelve students will be going to Brownwood March 15 for solo and ensemble contests to be held at Howard Payne College. They will participate in nine events.

It was decided that the band will not attend the Brady festival this year because of the Ozona Invitational Track Meet is scheduled for the same day. However, another trip is planned for later in the year.  
The annual Spring concert will be held in the High School auditorium on a date to be announced later.  
There are seventy-four in the band this semester, sixteen of whom are seniors. Between sixty-five and seventy members will travel to the regional contest. Mr. Sanders states that next year he is expecting to have between eighty-five and

nine-one students in the band.

The Lion Band has gained three new students this semester: Chesta Wilson, Sadie Tillman and Bonnie Saegeri.

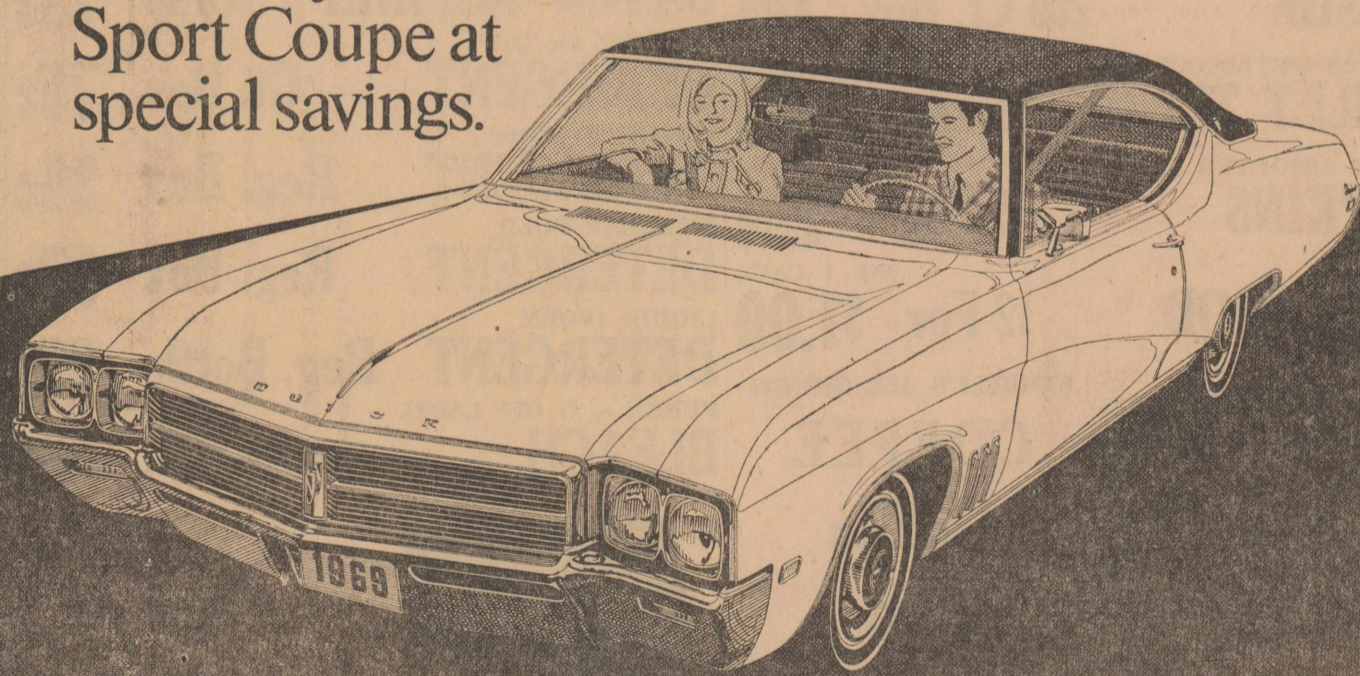

The outstanding devotion to duty and tremendous courage displayed by Sergeant Pagan, in the face of extreme personal danger that cost him his life, were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army."

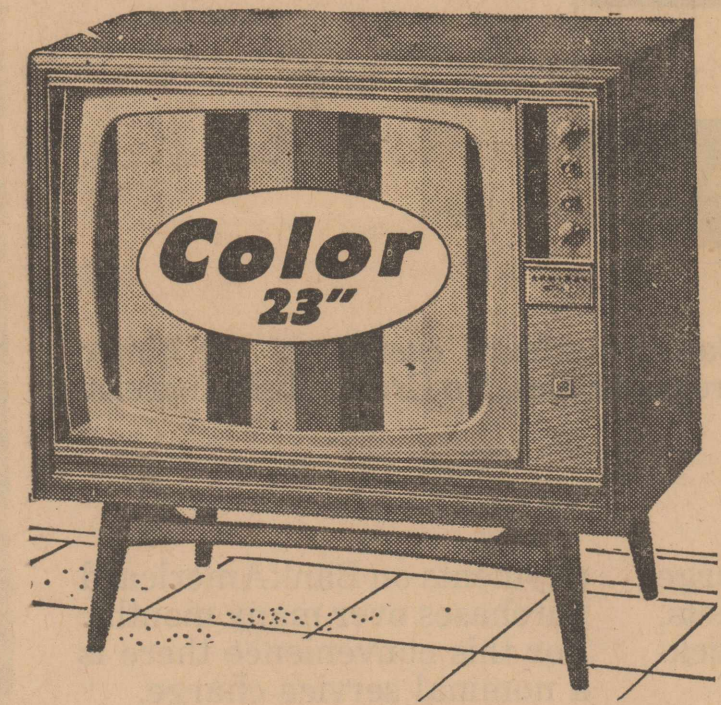
door. Damage to the pickup was \$100.

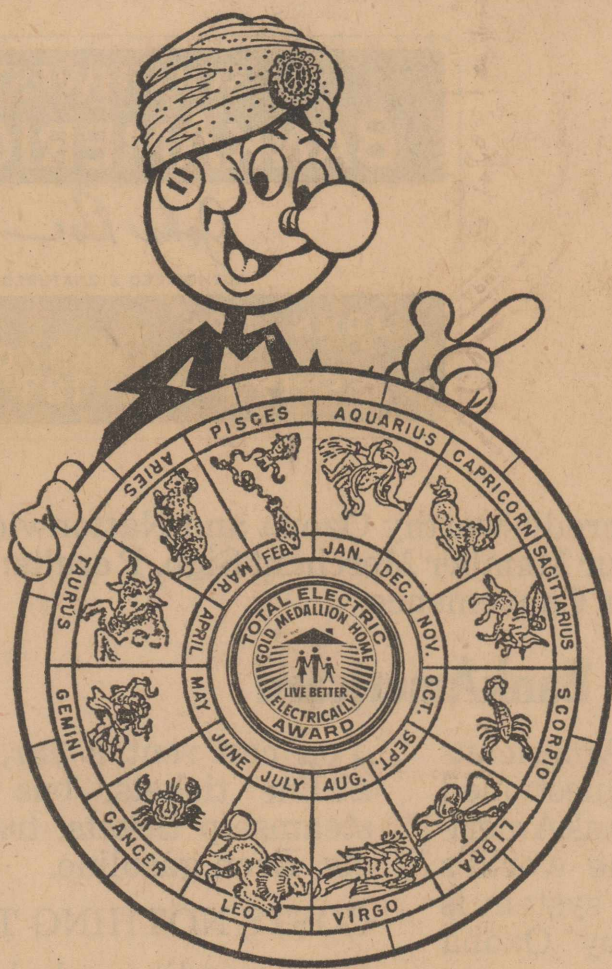
