17th Annual Quarter Horse Show Saturday

Ozona's 17th Annual Quarter Horse Show and Performance Contest will be held Saturday at the rodeo arena. John Stotts of Matador will be the show judge. The annual affair, which has earned the approval seal of the AQHA and QHA of West Texas, draws may out of town visitors each year.

Second Worm Case Reported In Crockett Co.

Crockett county came up with its second screwworm case of the year Monday of this week when a sample from the Eugene Miller ranch was confirmed. The first case confirmed was on the C. L. Williams "Henderson Ranch" on Taylor Box Draw on May 1. The Miller case on Monday was the only case reported in Texas on that date, according to information received by county agent Pete Jacoby from officials at Mission, which brought the total cases for the state to 94 for the year.

Crockett county is in the grid system for sterile fly drops while the two confirmed case areas are being hot-spotted to curb the outbreak. Ozona itself became the target for a fly-drop last week when a box of sterile flies landed on the North Elementary school grounds during a morning recess period. Students spotted the box as it was dropped from the plane flying over and eagerly awaited its arrival on the ground. Survival of sterile flies in that box is unknown since many inquisitive little boys eagerly examined the box.

Ranchmen are urged to use preventive practices to reduce case outbreaks and to send in suspected samples when found. Sample bottles can be picked up at the Ranch Feed and Supply, the Ozona Wool & Mohair Company or the county agent's office.

An estimated total of 450,000 to 500,000 pounds of both eight months and twelve months wools will be displayed for the sale. The wools this year are extra clean and bright, warehouse men say due to the generous spring rains and good pastures.

Heart Attack Claims Life Of Dr. L. Sherrill

Funeral services for Dr. Lloyd Haggard Sherrill, 59,

were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Ozona United Methodist church with Rev. Bill Fleming of Corpus Christi conducting services, assisted by the pastor Dr. R. F. Curl. Services were conducted at 10:00 a. m. this morning from Settegast-Kopf Funeral Home Chapel in Houston with burial in Brookside Cemetery in Houston. James Funeral Home handled local arrangements.

Dr. Sherrill died Monday morning about 6:30 of an apparent heart attack at his home here.

Dr. Sherrill was born Dec. 5, 1909 in Caldwell. He was married to Mildred Smith in Houston Feb. 17, 1944. He moved to Ozona thirteen years ago and opened his medical practice. He had been practicing medicine in Houston for eighteen years prior to moving here.

He did his pre-medical work at Tulane University and received his medical degree from the Tulane University School of Medicine.

Dr. Sherrill was a Past Master of the Ozona Masonic Lodge, and a 32nd degree Mason of the Scottish Rite. He was a member of the board of directors of the Ozona United Methodist Church.

He was a member of the Tom Green Eight County Medical Society, the Texas Medical Association and the American Medical Association. He had held all offices in the West Texas Academy of General Practice.

He was a member of the Texas Academy of Medical Practice and had served on the board of directors. He was a member of the American Academy of General Practice. He was on the staff of Crockett County Hospital and was a member of the local chapter of the Texas Heart Association.

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. Alice Lowe Sherrill of Houston; three sisters, Mrs. Leonora S. Hawkins of Lubbock, Mrs. R. E. Martin of Beaumont and Mrs. Alice S. Crow of Houston; two brothers, Dr. Douglas B. Sherrill of Pasadena and Dr. William M. Sherrill of Houston.

Ozona Athletes Take 4 Firsts In San Angelo Meet

Four Ozona boys brought home first places in various events Saturday at the San Angelo Area Junior Chamber of Commerce Track Meet held in Bobcat Stadium.

Boys were divided into age groups with four divisions, 12-13 years olds, 13-14 years, 15-16 years and 17-18. Winners in the final two divisions advance to the State Jaycee meet in Arlington June 26-28.

Representing Ozona were Chuck Womack, Ruben Tambunga, Gerald Huff and Tim Evans. Womack earned a berth in the State meet by winning the pole vault event with a 12-ft. leap. He also placed second in the high jump. Tambunga will be on hand at the State meet by virtue of a win in the 100-yd. dash with a time of 11.3 against the wind. Huff and Evans will not be able to attend the state meet, being in the lower age group, but both placed in several events. Huff won the high jump, placed second in the 220-yd dash and 100-yd dash and fourth in the pole vault, 13-14 age division.

Evans won the 220-yd dash in the same group with a 26.6 time. He placed second in the pole vault and fourth in the high jump.

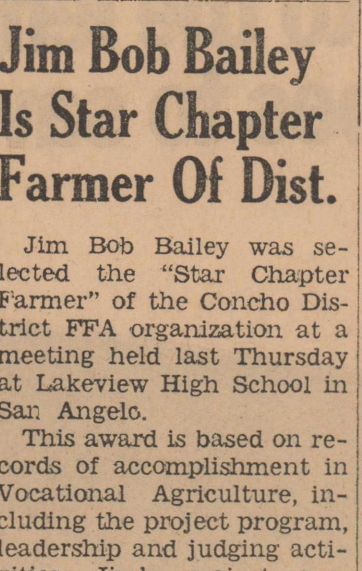
Each of the four boys collected a ribbon in every event they entered against some stiff competition from all the San Angelo schools.

LEST WE FORGET

On May 30th, we celebrate Memorial Day. This is the day set aside to pay tribute to the men and women who have given their lives for us. They made it possible for us to take for granted the liberty they died to preserve.

In gratitude to Abraham Lincoln, and to the men and women who preceded and those who followed him in death under the nation's flag, we invite you to read again these immortal words, first delivered at Gettysburg:

Four score and seven years ago our father brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate — we cannot consecrate — we cannot hallow — this ground. The brave men, living and dead,

who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or to detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us — that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion; that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom; and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

Rambling Reflections
By Dr. R. F. Curl

Two years ago on June 8th, Mrs. Curl and I arrived in Ozona to take up residence. We had passed through the city in the early fifties en route from El Paso to San Antonio and stopped for lunch; we had visited the Church during the ministry of Rev. J. Troy Hickman and I preached at the morning service. And then once again on a snowy March morning in 1958 going from Big Lake to San Antonio, we had passed through Ozona. These had been our only contacts with the community.

Nevertheless, it had been our good fortune to know several of the Ozona Methodists through various meetings and we knew the very fine reputation the Church bears throughout Southwest Texas Methodism.

Hence we were well pleased when Bishop Slater told us on the day before the 1967 Annual Conference session opened that he planned to appoint us to serve this community. We came gladly, joyously, and expectantly.

We have been in no way disappointed. Both congregation and community immediately made us welcome and we have never found a more understanding, united, and concerned people than those of Ozona. All anticipations we had formed have been exceeded.

In 1941 we had left the pastorate from Del Rio to spend 26 years in administrative, promotional, and educational work for the Church. We had found Del Rio a rich, warm community of acceptance and concord. We left with deep regret.

We have been fortunate to return to the pastorate in a community which, if possible, exceeds the Del Rio of thirty years ago.

The Ozona United Methodist Church is a great Church: Rich traditions, adequate physical plant, a capable, generous, and de-

voted membership join to make a church able to answer the call of the community and the world.

The wonderful way in which the community as a whole has received us, the many opportunities that have come to enter into the lives of many people, the friendly greetings and the wide-open door into the life of the whole county has enriched and blessed us permanently.

We shall leave Sunday afternoon, May 25th, to take up residence in our own home at 517 East Lane, Kerrville. We shall take with us high appreciation and blessed, fond memories of these days and you people, both Methodists and others. The years can never rob us of these days for they shall live in a renewed inner strength and peace that you have given us.

At 517 East Lane there are three doors — a front, a side door through the garage, and a double glass door at the back onto the patio. All three of them will be open always to all of you and we shall look for wayfaring friends to be stopping by. Just don't all come at one

time!
On June 5 a new Methodist pastor and family will come into Ozona. I do not know who it shall be; neither does any one else at this time including even the Bishop who will make the appointment.

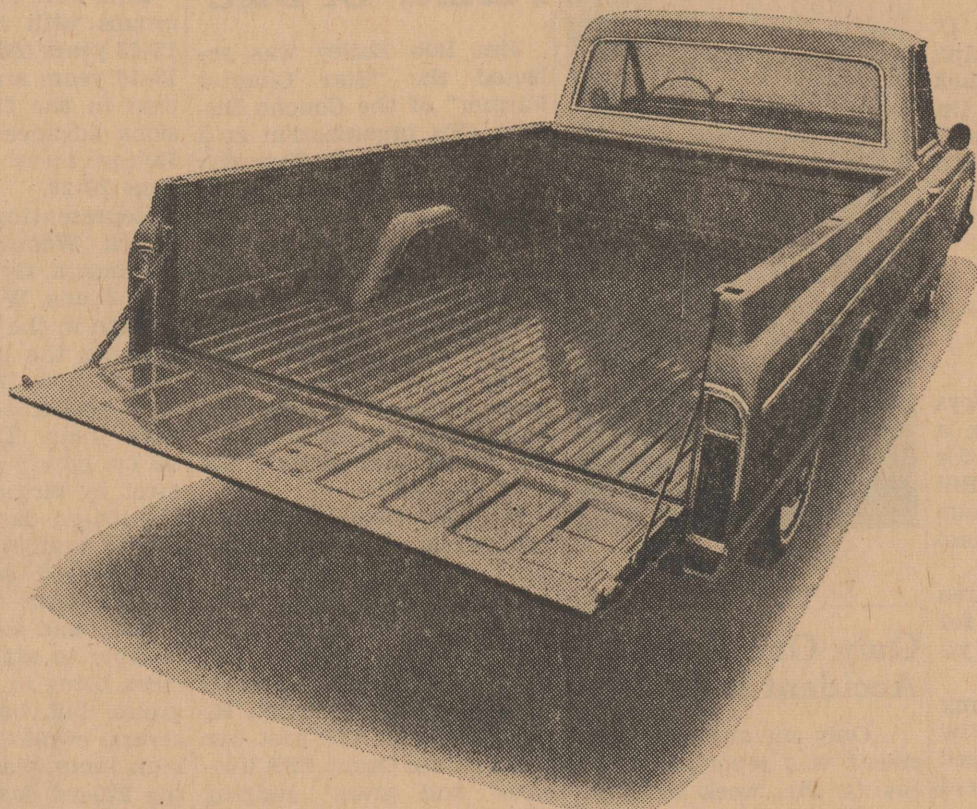

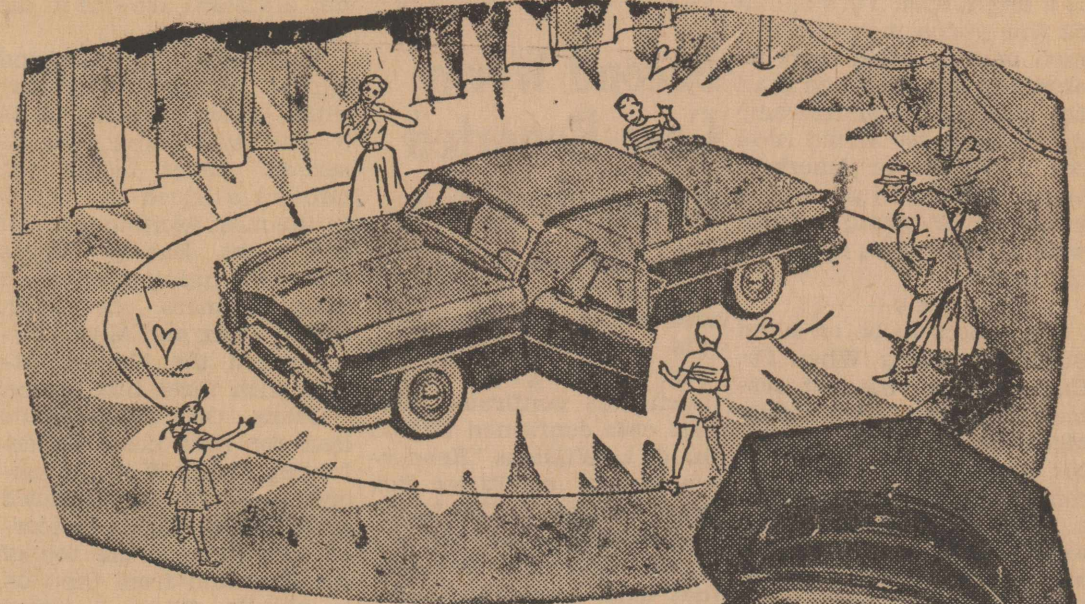

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

"Section 51-d. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

Sec. 2. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency matters as provided by law, and the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending, and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature. (f) The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR5)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.

PUBLIC NOTICE the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

A sense of relief and expectancy gripped Washington as Justice Abe Fortes, under suspicion for indiscreet involvement in the affairs of the Louis Wolfson Foundation, decided to resign from the Supreme Court.

Who will President Nixon appoint? The type of men chosen to fill this and other vacancies which will soon occur can change the course of our history.

As a candidate Nixon was quoted as saying: "I believe in a strict interpretation of the Supreme Court's functions. . . . In essence this means I believe we need a Court which looks upon its function as being that of interpretation rather than of breaking through into new areas that are really the prerogative of the Congress. . . ."

Thus, the President has a great opportunity to give the Nation relief from a long series of decisions which have, under Chief Justice Warren, adversely affected law enforcement, stricken down anti-subversion and espionage laws, and engaged the Court in sociological and political policy-making actions never contemplated by the Constitution. For a decade and a half this Court has run rough-shod over court precedents, as it has in many respects rewritten the Constitution and become another legislative body.

It is reassuring to know, by his own pronouncements, that President Nixon recognizes this development. By picking properly qualified men to fill the Fortes vacancy, and another when Chief Justice Warren retires soon, Nixon can bring order out of chaos and restore the court to its proper role in our tripartite form of government.

The present court is so constituted that the appointment of even two new men may tilt the scales in the right direction. And there will probably be more vacancies during the Nixon Administration. Justice Hugo Black is now 83, Douglas is 69, and Harlan is 68.

The Gallup Poll found that nearly two-thirds of the American people were critical of Supreme Court decisions. And the Chief Justices of the States branded a series of Supreme Court actions as being "without proper judicial restraint," and insisted that tribunal had been acting as a "policy maker" in national affairs. Now, at long last, relief is in sight. It all depends on who Nixon appoints.

Athlete May Be Disqualified For Accepting Prizes

After discussing the Intercollegiate League Award Rule last week, coach Sam Mosley deemed it important to impress on young athletes the League's Amateur Rule. Ignorance of this rule often causes disqualification of a high school athlete.

Any pupil who receives cash or valuable consideration for teaching, violation of the rule. Further, the student may not allow his name to be used to promote the sale of any product, plan or service.

Neither may a player compete on an athletic team with a paid player. He may play against a paid player, but being on the same team with a paid player is a violation of the Amateur Rule.

Accepting golf balls, bags or clubs would, for instance, be a violation of this rule, as would playing on a golf team with another player who was being paid.

Activities which are considered athletic sports include baseball, basketball, bowling, boxing, football, golf, rodeo, softball, swimming or diving, tennis, track and field, weight lifting and wrestling.

Violation of the Amateur Rule does not result from participating in a rodeo event, but from accepting cash or valuable consideration. In other words, a boy or girl may enter a rodeo contest,

as an individual, and may win the event without violating the rule. However, if the pupil accepts cash or valuable consideration, or is on a team with a person who is paid, he is in violation of this rule.

Under the provisions of the Amateur Rule, the signing of a letter of intent for athletic ability is a violation. However, an athlete may sign a pre-enrollment application without violating the rule and forfeiting his eligibility.

Academic Freedom?

Who are the people? Of course, they are occasionally joined in this clamor by some politicians, but it is usually a politician seeking the job of the man who had to order out the forces of law. . . . On some campuses, so reluctant are the administrators to ask for peace officers that it is not until some of the students are set upon, beaten and hospitalized, that they ask for protection. This is nothing less than a callous disregard for human safety no matter how much the employment of force is deplored as contrary to "academic freedom."

This is a most peculiar manifestation of human perversity in action. On public property, nontaxpayers feel perfect liberty to destroy and main because the operation of the institution with which more than ninety-five per cent of the people are happy, does not meet their demands, on the basis that their ragged bobtail handful constitutes "the people."

And even more strangely, some of the presumably educated people who are in the faculty, uphold this sort of nonsense. It is ironic that one of the major demands of rioting students is to determine what shall be taught, how it will be taught, and by whom it will be taught.

The irony of this seems to escape them. After all, if they, the students, are competent in these areas, then they should not be students, but educators.

But the silliness does not stop there. If some office holder outside the campus sends in law enforcement officers to keep the peace, many of the faculty are astounded over this violation of academic freedom, thus equating a broken skull with academic freedom.

Will it reach a point whereby fire engines will be held off the campus while something called an Academic Senate debates whether or not permitting fire fighting rigs on the campus would be an intrusion on "Academic freedom?"

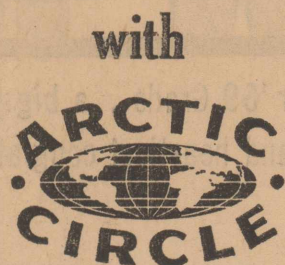

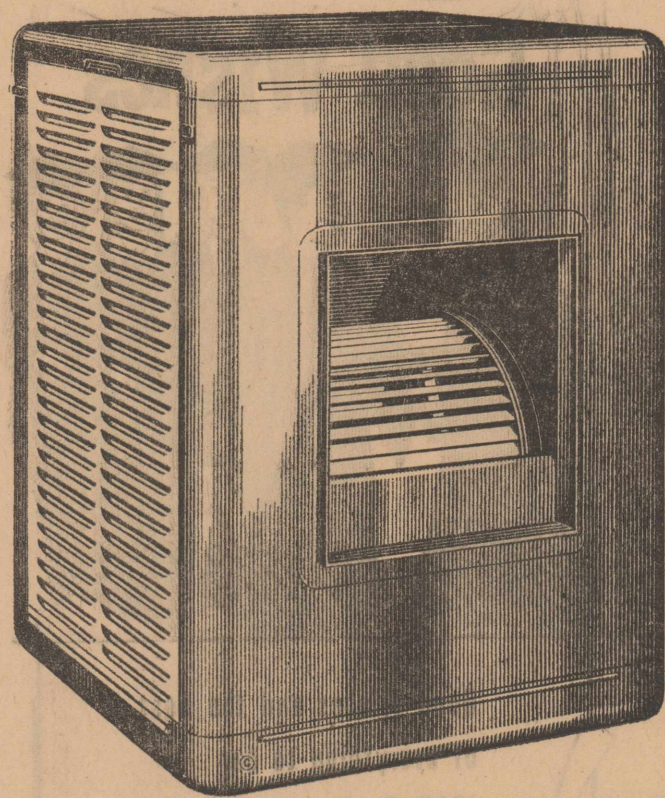

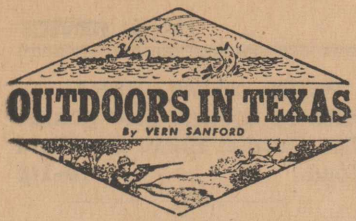

You've heard that axiom: two heads are better than one. Well, it's true about eyes, too. Especially when applied to the sport of shotgun shooting.

Aiming and firing a shotgun with both eyes open is one of the most basic fundamentals and important principles that novice shooters should try to follow from the very beginning.

One eye gives a picture only in one perspective. Our two eyes act as windows for the brain, and since these eyes are located some distance apart, each one sees objects from a slightly different angle because of their different viewpoints.

Nature has taken care of this situation by giving one eye mastery over the other, or what is commonly called the "master eye." This controlling eye pulls its partner into focus, transmitting a single image to the brain when both eyes are open.

In most cases, the master eye follows the master hand (e.g., a righthanded person has a right master eye.) But there are exceptions and thus it is of prime importance to the beginner in shooting to find out which eye is the master one.

A simple test is to close one eye; the one left open is the master. Some people can close either eye, but few can close the master eye and leave the dependent one open.

An alternate and more foolproof method is for the shooter, if he is righthanded, to close the left eye, raise the gun to the right shoulder and take aim at some object 15 or 20 feet away, sighting along the top of the barrel with the right eye. When the aim is established, the left also should be opened.

If the air remains clear and the appearance of the mark is unchanged, then the right eye is the master eye and the shooter should do his shooting from his right shoulder.

If, on the other hand, when the gun is at the right shoulder and sighted with the right eye, the appearance of the picture changes with the opening of the left eye in such a way that the left side of the gun is seen and the mark appears to be to the left of the muzzle, then the left eye is the master.

Even if you're shooting from the wrong shoulder, don't be afraid to change. Probably you'll see almost immediate improvement. Same thing also applies to shooting a rifle or a bow-and-arrow.

Some right-handed people must, by necessity, shoot southpaw since their master eyes are the left.

Kingsville — Thirty three teachers from seven states have won National Science Foundation scholarships to the eighth annual Summer Institute in Physics July 13-Aug. 22 at Texas A&I University.

Dr. Olan E. Kruse, Physics Department chairman and institute director, said that enrollment would include 24 teachers from Texas, three from Kentucky, two from Oklahoma and one each from Massachusetts, Arkansas, Pennsylvania and Nevada.

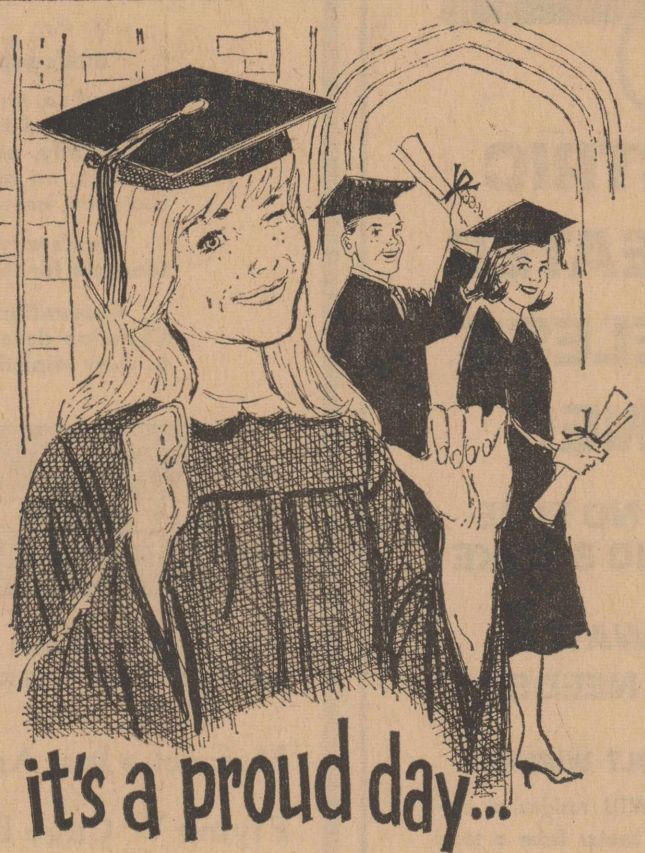

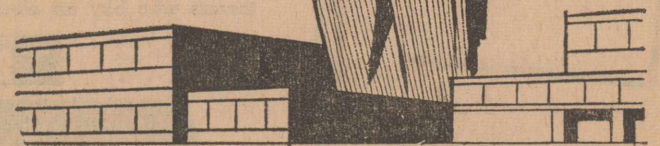

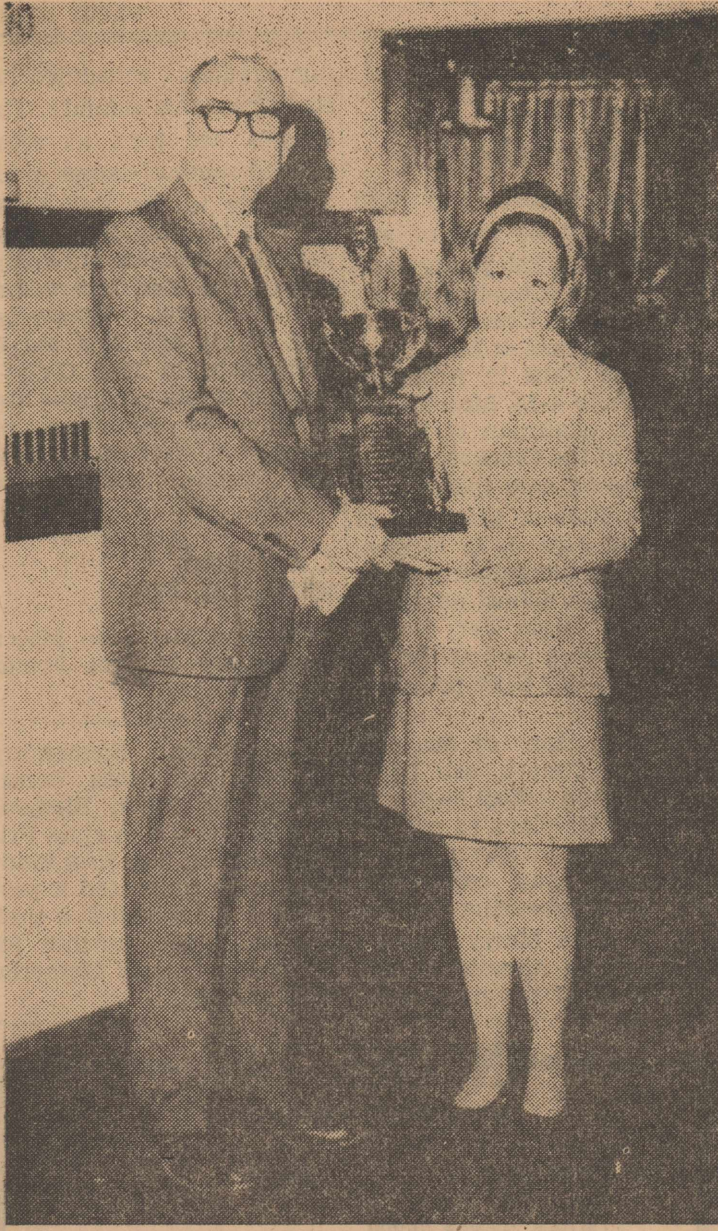
