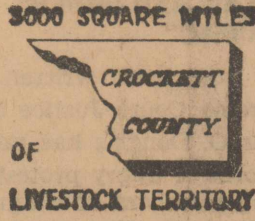

Weird Shooting Incident Wounds Former Ozonan

James G. Armentrout, son of Mr. and Mrs. Allie Armentrout, was wounded in a shooting incident last week in Eunice, N. M. He is presently at his home in Midland awaiting surgery.

Armentrout and two other men, who were working together in the Eunice area, were sitting at a table in a restaurant when they were shot by a Mexican-American man. One man was shot just above the right eye, the other in the left shoulder and Armentrout was shot in the elbow.

All the victims of the shooting survived. None had seen their assailant before he walked up to their table, pulled a gun and began shooting.

Cancer Society Hears Dr. Browne, Plans Crusade

Members of the Crockett County Unit of the American Cancer Society met at the Civic Center Tuesday evening. Many volunteers, who will work in the April crusade, were also in attendance. Mrs. Charles Williams presided.

In addition to crusade chairmen named previously, Mrs. Savannah Wright was appointed as a neighborhood chairman.

Mrs. M. E. Nicholas, crusade chairmen, introduced Dr. Charles F. Browne of Sonora. Dr. Browne discussed the various types of cancer. He also brought the group up to date on the latest treatments being used to combat the disease and stressed the importance of supporting the Society's research program. Dr. Browne, who has worked as an ACS volunteer for 21 years and is a director-at-large in the State organization, concluded the program by answering questions.

Rotary Club's Annual Easter Egg Hunt Sunday

What has become a town tradition, what with the many, many years it has been observed, will be the Ozona Rotary Club's annual Easter Egg Hunt to be staged Easter Sunday afternoon in the Cleophas Cooke pasture at the south edge of Ozona.

More than 100 prize eggs, each one with a \$1 cash award, donated by Ozona merchants and individuals, will be hidden, along with several hundred gay colored eggs which are being prepared by Rotarians this week.

Managers of the hunt ask that parents keep their children from the hunt area until the beginning time, 2 p. m. Rotary members will be busy with their preparations right up to the last minute before the hunt begins.

The hunt area, as in past years, will be divided into age groups. Children from tiny tots to 12 years of age are invited to take part in the hunt. Children will be divided into three area groups to equalize their chances of finding a share of the eggs.

Incentive Pay Checks Go Out After April 3

Wool, unshorn lamb and mohair incentive payments for the 1969 marketing year will be mailed to the Crockett and Sutton county producers soon after April 3, Cliff Elder, office manager for the two counties, reported in a letter to producers.

Separate drafts will be issued for wool, unshorn lambs and mohair payments, the local said. Payments will cover sales made Jan. 1, 1969, through December 31, 1969.

A report of conservation practices completed in the two counties under the Conservation program was made in the same letter. Ranchers in the two counties deferred from grazing 330 acres, adopted brush control practices over 64,948 acres; drilled 4 wells, built 8 concrete storage structures lead 30,390 feet of pipeline and built 13 miles of cross fences.

Justice Fields Completes A&M Training Course

College Station — A. O. Fields of Ozona was among 80 members of the Texas Justice of the Peace and Constable's Association attending the three-day school at Texas A&M University this week.

Fields is the Justice of the Peace of Crockett County. He was awarded a certificate of completion by the Police Training Division of the Texas Engineering Extension Service during closing ceremonies Wednesday.

The Justices, who date their position to the first magistrate appointed in 1327 in England, took part in studies of changes and procedures in Texas law.

A highlight of the meetings was a presentation calling for certification of JP's under a bill to be introduced during the 62nd Legislature.

The bill would require Texas' 946 justices to complete an educational program within one year after taking office. Educational funds are available through the Texas Criminal Justice Council.

A&M's Police Training Division has committed itself to the training program. Certification would be under the Texas Commission for Law Enforcement Education, which already certifies Texas' law enforcement officers.

A check with the county clerk indicated that very few absentee ballots had been cast, forecasting very little interest from local voters on election day.

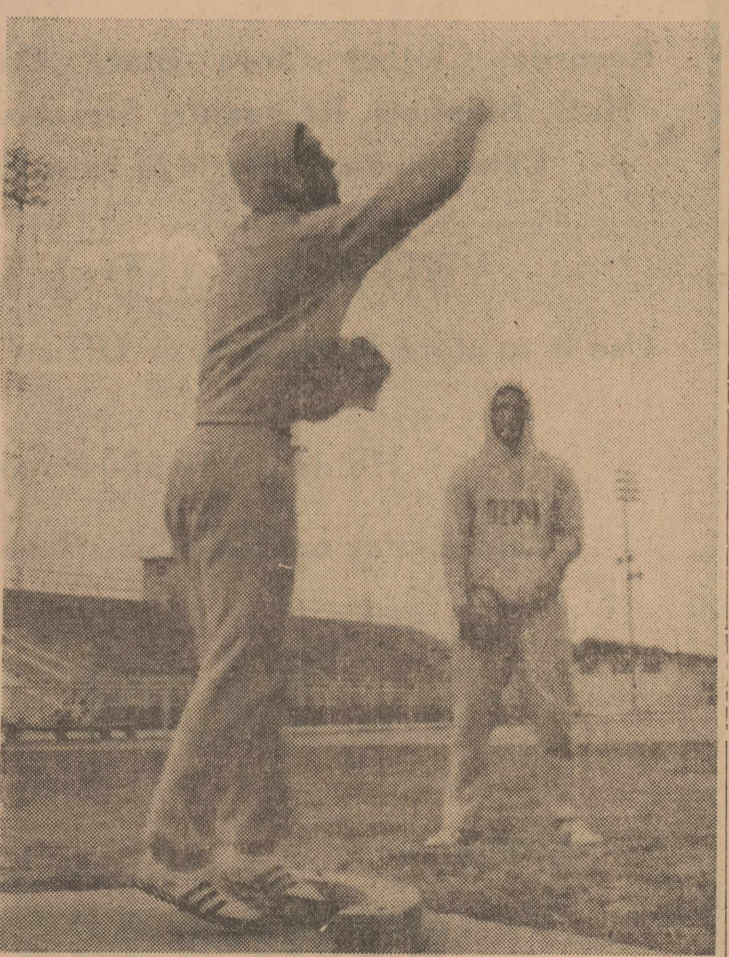
Lions Capture Second Place In Eldorado Relays

A QUESTION OF JUSTICE

Let us suppose that you are a rather average, middle-class American. You own property, or perhaps your own business, or you have an investment in our private enterprise system, either through stocks, bonds, or savings accounts. You participate in the political life of our country, having voted as a Republican or a Democrat; you belong to and attend a local church, you are active in the PTA, or some other civic organization. According to current definition, you are very much a part of "the Establishment."

Now let us further suppose that you are called upon to appear as a litigant in a court of law. But the judge sitting on the bench has already publicly pronounced these views: "The truth is that a vast bureaucracy now runs the country, irrespective of what party is in power. . . . The two parties have become almost indistinguishable; and each is controlled by the Establishment. . . . If history is a guide, the powers — that — will not respond until there are great crises, for those in power are blind devotees to private enterprise. . . . the use of violence

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FRAUDS BELONG IN JAIL

We have checked several dictionaries, and there appears to be common agreement that a "church," whether a building (the Lord's house), or public worship (he goes to church regularly), or a particular denomination (the Baptist Church, the Catholic Church, etc.) has to do with the love of, or worship of, or belief in God.

Not necessarily. In Austin, Texas, the militant atheist and independently wealthy Madalyn Murray (now O'Hair) has organized the Poor Richard's Universal Life Church. Mr. O'Hair is best remembered, of course, for the sympathetic (and legal) support she received from the United States Supreme Court in 1963 to protect her poor little boy in public school from being offended by school prayers. The sympathy of the Court extended to the point of banning the right of any group of students to pray in school if they should so desire.

But now Mrs. O'Hair, who boasts her use of four-letter words ("They're direct, arnt' they?") and Mr. O'Hair, who is proud of his ability to consume alcohol ("I'm very raw this morning, so I'm drinking straight gin") operate a "church." To procure the trappings commensurate with their grave responsibilities as "church" leaders, both of the O'Hair obtained \$20 "doctor of divinity" degrees by mail. Thus, Mr. became Bishop, or the Rev. Dr. Richard O'Hair, while Madalyn adopted a more restrained title of Reverend O'Hair. With this and nothing more in hand, however, the Murray - O'Hair with no building, no congregation, no theology except for the apparent belief that religion is bad for people, applied for and claim to have received tax - exempt status from I. R. S.

It seems to us that for the protection of those who indeed do worship God "in spirit and in truth," steps should be taken to eliminate the imposters. You cannot put the label "malted milk" on a bottle of arsenic; you cannot write a check for \$1,000 if you have nothing in the bank; you cannot sell beef if the meat, in fact, came from the carcass of a horse. We suggest that the fakes, frauds and phonies who call themselves "ministers", "priests," or "rabbis" when they are, in fact, nothing of the sort, should be dispatched to the same place we send other crooks — to jail.

IS "LAW AND ORDER" FASCISM?"

A new book written by Supreme Court Justice Williams O. Douglas has raised a storm of angry protest among members of congress. In the book, "Points of Rebellion", the 72 year old jurist appears to justify the use of violence and disregard for law and order by anti-American demonstrators. He describes our nation, loosely, as "the Establishment" without defining exactly what he means by the word. For example, on page 53 he writes, "The major parties are controlled by the Establishment and the result is a form of political bankruptcy." He charges that our country is not controlled by the people, but by "special interests" who "use its powers to favor themselves and to perpetuate regimes of oppression, exploitation and discrimination". On page 56 he declares:

"The two parties have become almost indistinguishable, and each is controlled by the Establishment," and then follows with the accusation that "the powers that be faintly echo Adolf Hitler, who said in 1938: 'The streets of our country are in turmoil. The universities are filled with students rebelling rioting. . . . We need law and order.'"

Of course Mr. Douglas does not explain that the rioting youth in Germany were in fact the racist youth who helped bring Hitler to power and later became his Storm Troopers and Gestapo agents. But it seems to us to be altogether shocking that a man who is an official in the highest court of law in the land, should equate "law and order" with fascism.

Could not Justice Douglas just as easily have quoted Daniel Webster, who in a speech before the U. S. Senate, described our country as "a great, popular, constitutional government, guarded by law and by judicature, and defended by the affections of the whole people."? Or could he have not recalled that President Calvin Coolidge, in his inaugural address on March 4, 1925, declared that "In a republic the first rule for the guidance of the citizens is obedience to law. . . . Those who want their rights respected under the Constitution and the law ought to set the example themselves of observing the Constitution and the law. . . ."

If Mr. Douglas has lost faith in a lawful society, governed by the people and for the people, then we must agree with some members of Congress who have already declared that he should be replaced.

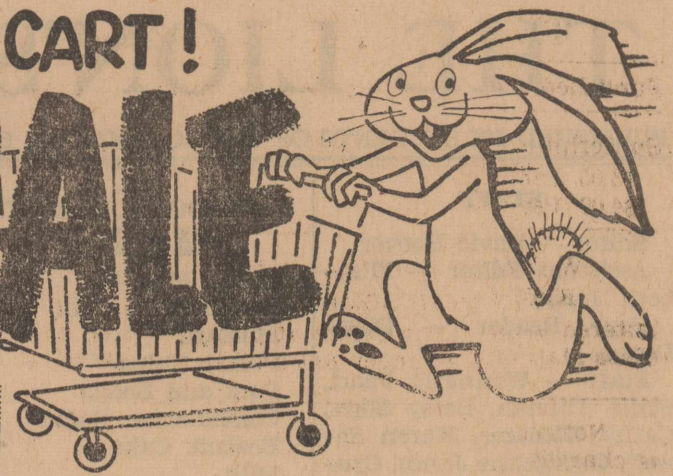

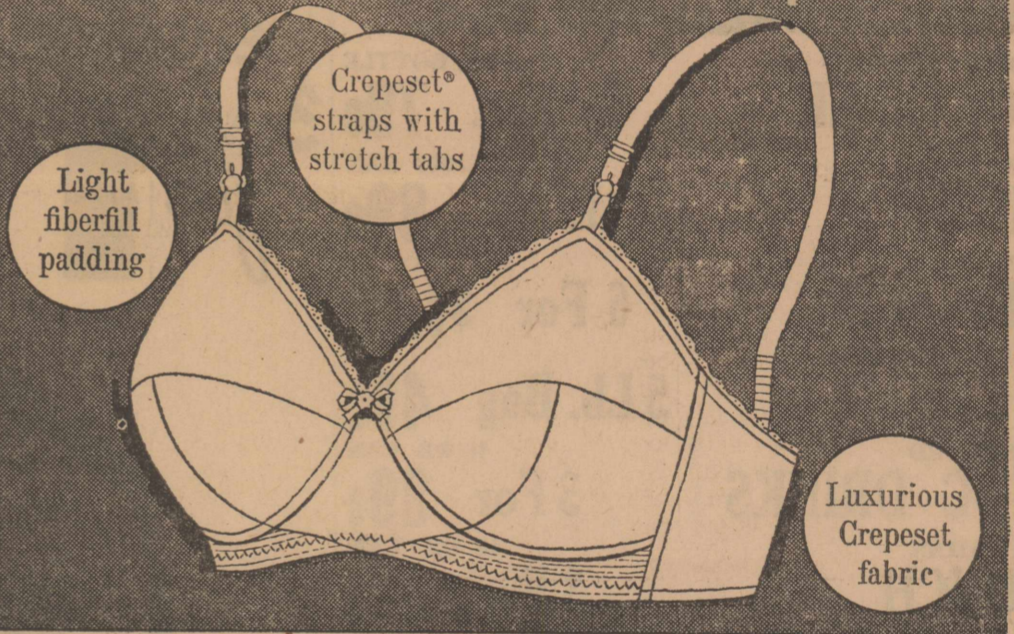

Sensing The News

For Reason on Rhodesia

In voting the Nixon administration into office, the American people undoubtedly hoped that a new team would return common sense to the country's foreign relations. For almost a decade, emotionalism and liberal ideology had been substituted for considerations of national interest. Nowhere was this more evident than in State Department and White House policy towards the so-called "merging" African countries.

The Nixon administration has sought to apply common sense to some foreign relations problems and areas, but in other areas its efforts have fallen short of the mark. The pernicious influence of the State Department, which hasn't received the housecleaning that is needed, is clearly visible. It was visible in recent days when Secretary of State William P. Rogers announced that the U. S. consulate in Salisbury, Rhodesia, would be closed. During his recent swing through black African countries, Mr. Rogers heard much criticism of Rhodesia — and the U. S. Consulate there — from several of the African dictators and strongmen.

Now, obviously, the closing of the consulate isn't the administration's biggest decision in the area of foreign policy, but it has a symbolic importance that will be noted throughout Africa and around the world. The action shows 1) that the Nixon administration is as susceptible as the Johnson administration to the influence of the British Labor government and 2) that the State Department is still eager to appease the black African regimes that were catered to by the Kennedy and Johnson administrations.

In the process, the U. S. national interest has suffered. If the Nixon administration wanted to signal to the world that it sought a more reasonable and constructive policy towards Africa, it would have kept the Salisbury consulate open. Moreover, it would have gone ahead and recognized the new Republic of Rhodesia.

On the African scene, Rhodesia is one of the success stories. Self-governing and self-supporting since 1923, Rhodesia in 1965 declared its independence of Britain. The circumstances were very similar to the American colonies' declaration of independence in 1776. The Rhodesians chose the path of independence because they knew that was the only way to safeguard and maintain civilization in their country. They looked around them on the continent and saw the emergence of black dictatorships. They saw much of the continent sinking into its ancient savagery.

Instead of being helped by other civilized countries the Rhodesians were lambasted. Nevertheless, the Rhodesians showed what self-reliance can achieve. The U. N.-imposed sanctions honored by the Johnson administration, only served to help Rhodesia build up its home industries and commerce. Trading nations such as France, West Germany, Italy and Japan have continued to do business with Rhodesia and invest in its future.

Every consideration of practicality dictates U. S. recognition of a country that is working and prospering — and that is committed to the struggle against communism. It is impossible to give a logical argument for non-recognition, for support of sanctions, or for withdrawal of the U. S. Consulate.

The United States recognizes Nigeria, though its forces killed over one million Ibo tribesmen. It recognizes the revolutionary government of Lybia, which is forcing the U. S. Air Force to evacuate the vital Wheelus Air Base. The United States

recognizes Kenya, though the black Kenya regime imprisons its political foes and is busy squeezing out the Indian population. The U. S. recognizes Zambia which is nationalizing foreign-owned mines; and Tanzania, which is a one-party nation with close political ties to the Communist Chinese.

If the U. S. State Department can accept recognition of these brutal, demagogic and anti-American countries, then it should be able to favor recognition of Rhodesia, which is populated by veterans of World War II and which is capitalist in its economic system and firmly on the Western side in the cold war. That the State Department opposes recognition is evidence of its irrational bias against civilized, European-led governments in Africa. In short, emotionalism rules over considerations of American national interest. This rule endangers America's security, for the nation's foreign policy ought not to be made on the basis of the personal prejudices of policy-makers in the State Dept.

The tragedy is that President Nixon has gone along with this State Department emotionalism. Realistic citizens can only hope — and insist — that the promised reforms of the State Department foreign and policy-making be put into effect and that formal U. S. recognition be accorded the Republic of Rhodesia, as clear evidence that the Nixon administration intends to inaugurate a new era in foreign policy.

Sanderson Flood Control System Given Approval

Formal acceptance of the work submitted by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service for flood control measures on Sanderson canyon was announced last week in Sanderson after five years of planning and study.

Officials of Terrell, Pecos and Brewster counties signed the agreement calling for construction of 11 water retaining structures on tributaries of the draw which courses through the city of Sanderson and which caused millions of dollars damage and took many lives in a flash flood five years ago.

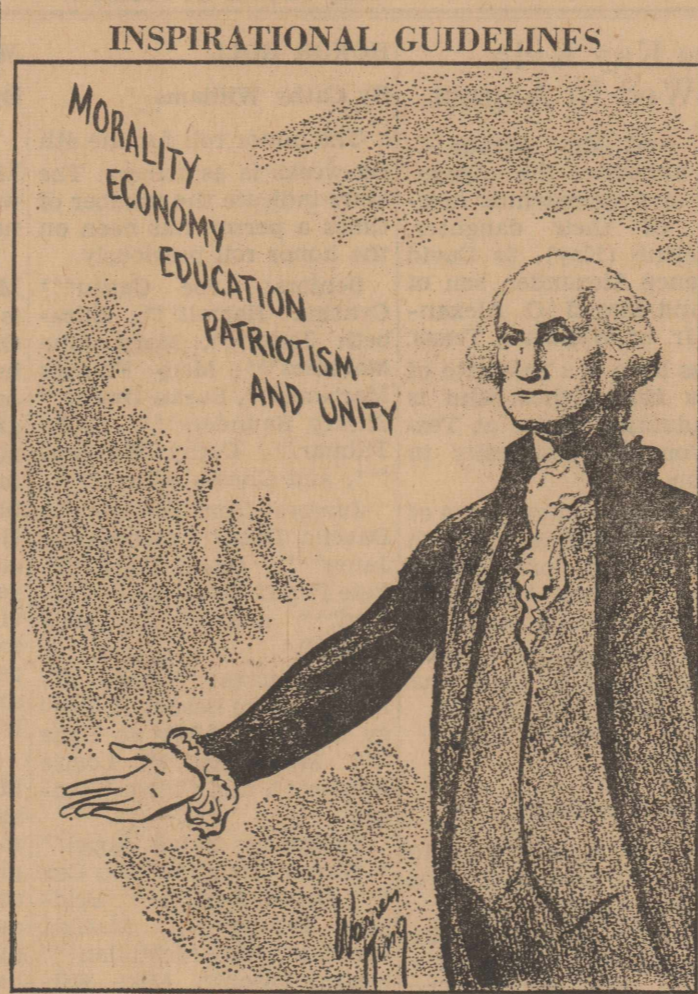
The retaining dams will control run-off from a 216-square mile area. With an investment of \$4,668,350 in the project by the federal government, local government has a share of \$85,655 and Terrell county has assumed the obligation of maintenance of the structures at an estimated annual cost of \$7,000.

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 cup crushed potato chips
Combine first 8 ingredients and mix well. Spoon into a 2-qt. greased casserole dish. Sprinkle top with paprika and spread crushed potato chips on top. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 25 to 30 minutes. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

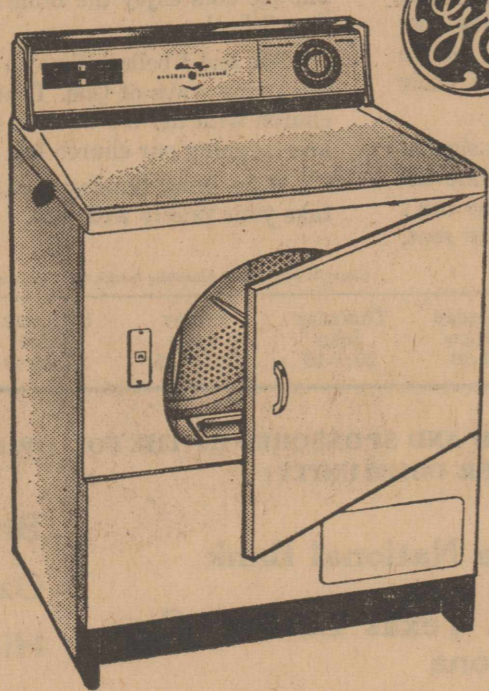

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

A balanced supreme Court, controlled by members who believe the Constitution means what it says, may not be very far off. In two split (5 to 3) decisions handed down by that court recently Chief Justice Burger sided with the dissenters, who are considered "strict constructionists." There is another Justice White, who often sides with the latter.

Thus, when another Justice is confirmed to fill the court vacancy, a conservative-Burger court may begin to emerge.

It will be recalled that the Senate refused to confirm the appointment of Judge Haynsworth — an eminently well qualified man. Both the AFL-CIO and NAACP opposed him because he in the past had shown some independence on issues affecting these partisans. A majority of the Senators followed the same line, replete with political overtones.

The second appointee, Circuit Court Judge Harold Carswell, is now under fire in the Senate where confirmation should be acted upon within the next two weeks. Again, both the AFL-CIO and NAACP have objected, but observers report that some of the Senators who voted against Haynsworth have been hearing from home, and this may make the difference in Carswell's favor.

It is becoming increasingly evident that a good many Senators simply will not confirm any court appointee who is not cleared by these special interest groups. They raised no objection, of course, to President Kennedy's choice of Arthur Goldberg. He had been general counsel for AFL-CIO. Nor did they object to LBJ's

appointment of Thurgood Marshall. He was a Negro and he had been chief counsel for NAACP. Apparently these sensitive objectors use rather strange reasoning in determining objectivity of appointees to the Supreme Court — as disclosed by the latter's prior convictions and expressions.

The odds are, however, that Judge Carswell will be confirmed, and all indications are that he will make a good one. It is believed that his general philosophy coincides with that of Chief Justice Burger and at least two or three others now on that tribunal.

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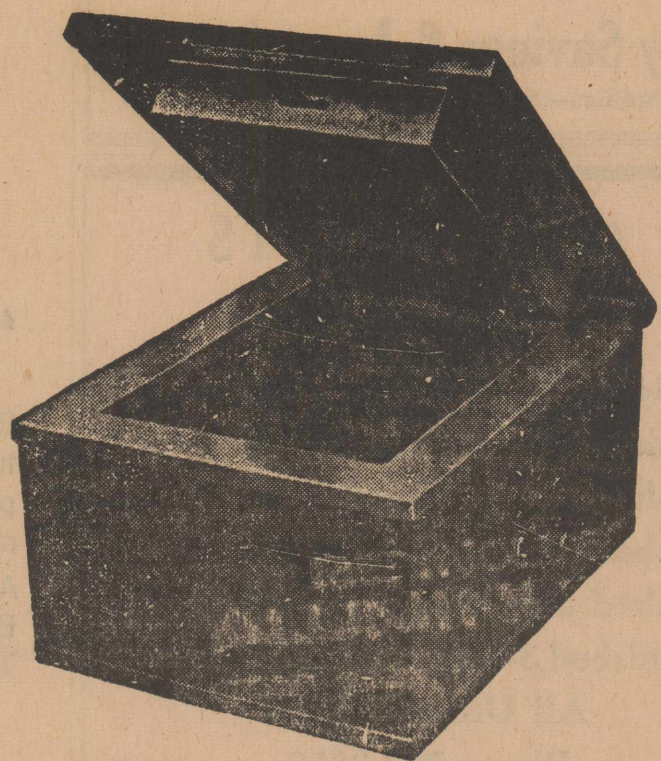

Hiway Department Distributing 1970 Official Tex. Maps

Austin — The 1970 Official State Highway Map of Texas' released today by the Texas Highway Department, invites all motorists to "Drive the Texas Travel Trails."

Pictured on the map cover is a portion of the Transmountain Loop at El Paso, a starting point for the Mountain Trail. Completed in 1969, this spectacular highway is officially designated Loop 375. Its construction through the Franklin Mountains involved the largest earthmoving project in the history of the Texas Highway Department.

More than a half million copies of the 1970 Official State Highway Map rolled off the presses in the first printing, and they are now being distributed by the Department. Before the end of the year another million copies will be printed to meet the ever-growing demand for this popular map. More than a million 1969 maps were distributed to motorists through Highway Department District offices, tourist bureaus and visitor centers, and on written request to the Department in Austin.

The Texas motorist will find the new highway map easier to read because of an enlarged type face. Area inset maps on the reverse side of the map have been enlarged, and more towns are shown by outline rather than by a circle.

Added this year are more than 100 miles of the Interstate highway system. Long-

est sections are of IH 10 and 20 in Culberson County west of Kent, IH 45 in Leon County from Centerville to Buffalo, IH 10 in Sutton County and IH 35W completed from Fort Worth to Denton.
