Some portions of the south part of the county have received good rains, but the remainder of the county and the area around Ozona is dangerously dry.

Fire Chief Jim Marks warned residents to be careful when

burning off vacant lots or burning trash.

So far this year the local fire department has been able to extinguish grass fires and trash fires without heavy property damage and they have not been forced to call in help to fight range fires. However, Chief Marks warned that the continued dry weather is an ever present threat.

Local officers are trying to identify the body of a man found Monday morning on the Joe Bean Ranch west of Ozona.

From the condition of the body it was evident that he had been dead for several months. Exposure had eliminated all clues to the man's identity. The remains have been sent to Austin in hopes that the state laboratory can come up with some clue as to his identity.

Bean found the body in an open pasture as he was working sheep Monday morning and notified authorities.

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Safety Awards To Hiway Dept. Truck Drivers

The Texas Highway Department has awarded certificates and pins to accident free truck driver employees in this area.

Receiving the award and pin in Ozona were Otilio V. Duran, who has been with the department 16 years, and Enemecio S. De La Rosa, with the department for 17 years.

Truck driver awards are issued for accident free driving records for one year through as many years as districts have drivers who qualify. Beginning with the tenth year, a pin is issued in addition to the certificate.

LARGE CROWD AT JULY YOUTH DANCE

A larger number of young people were on hand for the July youth dance which was held Saturday night than for the dance held last month.

Around 75 couples were on hand with many from neighboring towns. Big Lake, Sonora and Eldorado were well represented.

The annual "Back to School Dance" will be held around Aug. 21 or 22 and will be the last scheduled dance until after school starts.

H Rodeo Co. of Odessa. Bill Watson, general chairman of the Lions Club sponsored event, announced that rules would be very much the same this year as last with the exception of some changes in the steer and bull riding events.

This year for the first time contestants in the steer and bull riding events will be limited. In the 13-15 age group steer riding event, contestants will be limited to the first 20 entrants. Boys bull riding, 16-18 age limit, will be limited to the first 40 contestants to enter the event.

Interest in these two events has grown so the past few years that stock contractors are insisting that entries be limited in order that stock will not be overworked. Also, officials feel that the limit will give each cowhand a better chance.

Judging in the two events is based one-half on how the stock performs and the other one-half on how the contestant rides. If a contestant gets a tired bull that has been overworked, he may not buck at all, eliminating the rider's chances at winning even if he is a top hand.

Otherwise, the rules are the same as last year as well as the three age divisions and events. Entry fee is \$4 per event in each division. Entry blanks may be secured at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce office or at various retail stores around Ozona.

A contestant may enter no more than three events in his division. Trophies will be given average winners in all events with a best all-around trophy presented in each age group.

All entries must be in by midnight Monday, Aug. 3. Drawings for places and go-rounds will be held Wednesday. Married contestants are not eligible. A minor's release, signed by parent or guardian must accompany each entry blank.

The rodeo will get underway at 4:30 p.m. Friday, Aug. 7 with a downtown parade. Performances begin at 7:30 nightly.

A dance will be held at the concrete slab on the grounds each night following the show. Music will be furnished by "The Border Beats," of Comstock.

Judges for the show will be Buck Owens of Barnhart and Jimmy Powers of Sonora. L. D. Kirby will be the show announcer.

WHAT SPEECH IS FREE SPEECH?

A Federal district court recently ruled that the postmaster general cannot refuse to deliver foreign produced communist literature advocating violence, sabotage, and other crimes against the people. The case in point involved "The Crusader," a vicious hate-sheet which bore the name of Robert Franklin Williams (an American). It was printed, produced, paid for and distributed by Red China. The art work for the material was communist-produced, and there is reason to believe that some of the hate material was actually written by the Reds, using the name of Williams.

Is that what the founding fathers had in mind when they guaranteed the right of Americans to free speech?

We wonder—because the Constitution also guarantees (in the Preamble) that the entire purpose of the Constitution is "to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility . . . and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity . . ."

Further, the Fourth Amendment guarantees "The right of the people to be secure in their persons, homes, papers, and effects (property) . . ."

Does allowing a criminal psychopath (as Williams has been described) to teach and advocate violence "insure domestic Tranquility"? Does such permissiveness under the rule of "free speech" do anything to "secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity"? Does it not, in fact, gravely endanger our blessing of liberty?

When a member of an extremist group, whatever the label, shoots you and kills you, or burns down your home as a direct result of the teaching and advocacy of such acts, have you not lost your guarantee to be "secure" in your person and your home? Was the Constitution, in the long run, meant to protect the rights of would-be criminals and foreign enemies, or the rights of law-abiding citizens?







Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club
By Mrs. Bailey Post

The extended drought reminds us everyday of the old saying "hot and dry as a firecracker." Everyone is kept busy with gardening activities such as weeding, watering, mowing, and spraying for insects to keep yards from looking neglected.

We are not the only busy bodies about the place these days, especially if you have noticed the birds. Cardinals, wrens, mocking birds and quail have been kept busy feeding and raising their young and have provided entertainment for us. Other birds we see occasionally are the oriole, rain crow, purple martin, towhee, Mexican canary, road-runner and Western bluebird.

The first requisite for attracting birds to your garden is water, so invest in a bird-bath. Place it near a shrub or a tree where the birds can light and survey the territory before flying down for a drink or bath. A large flat or shallow container of some sort may be placed on the ground for the quail.

July and August are the months to plant Oriental poppies if you have a good place or room for them. They will thrive in most any good garden soil with sufficient drainage. Once established in the garden, they need little but clean cultivation. No strong fertilizer is required, their favorite food being leaf mold. Since they are deep rooted, they rarely suffer from lack of water after the first year or they are well-established.

Clumps increase in size with age and may be left in the same place for years. Mulch new plants under the leaves the first winter. The poppy season may be extended over a period of nearly six weeks with different varieties. Seed pods should be removed as soon as the petals have fallen and the entire top cut back as soon as it has turned brown. The pods are quite often used as dried arrangements. There are a number of poppies that will harmonize with other garden flowers and make a beauty spot in front of evergreens.

The summer flowering hibiscus are bearing beautiful single blooms at this time. The blooms only last one day but are well worth the space they require. They bloom on new growth, so keep them growing with water and a light feeding of plant food. There is an exotic display of them each morning at the Cecil Hubbard home.

Fall gardens may be planted now or next month if you are optimistic and want to wait for rain.

Cut hollyhocks off at ground level, fertilize and water. Keep verbenas clipped.

Shrubs, especially evergreens will benefit from a strong spray to wash off the dust and perhaps prevent red spider and aphids.
