Dedicate Markers For Civil War Vet Graves

Grave markers placed on the graves of five Civil War veterans buried in Cedar Hill Cemetery were dedicated at ceremonies Sunday afternoon under the leadership of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, which sponsored the project.

Mrs. Ira Carson, a member of the committee who was one of the leaders in gathering data leading to the grave markings, made the dedicatory address in which she stressed the need for a united America and a renewed sense of love for country. These men and all other Americans who have fought in all wars, were patriots willing to give their lives that freedom might be secure, she said.

"Let all of us acknowledge our debt to all the soldiers who have served through the years that these freedoms might be preserved," Mrs. Carson said.

Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chair-

man of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, recognized relatives of the Confederate veterans who were present for the ceremony.

Graves of the following five Confederate veterans were marked: Pharis Hurst, William Mathias Miller, Henry Street Hudspeth, Samuel Theodore Smith and Joseph L. Casbeer.

Coach Jim Williams' junior varsity took a 12-6 win over the Junction JV Thursday night for their second consecutive victory of the young football season.

The juniors looked great on defense and were much improved offensively as they ran up 142 yards rushing and passed for 75 yards.

Tim Evans scored both touchdowns for the junior Lions, the first on a one-yard run and the second on a spectacular 35-yard dash. The try for extra points failed both times.

Junction's lone score came on a Lion penalty and fumble that put them on the 4-yard-line and enabled them to run it over. Again the try for points failed.

Monty Pelto completed 7 out of 10 passes for a total of 75 yards. In the pass receiving department, Dean Shaw caught 2 for 20 yards, Jesse Ortiz was 2 for 25 yards, Mike Wellman, 2 for 15 and Pete Maldonado, 1 for 15.

Leading rusher for the Lions was Evans with 78 yards on 19 carries, followed by Wellman with 51 yards on 11 carries. Other ground gainers were Oliver Payne, 11 yards on 1 carry; Cheo Vargas, 3 yards on 2 carries; Maldonado, 2 yards on one carry and Rick Hunnicutt, who was 1 on 1.

The junior varsity will be in Big Lake tonight for a game with the Big Lake B team.

Crockett Segment of Chihuahua Trail Gets Historical Marker

A newly erected historical marker on U. S. Highway 290, 27 miles west of Ozona, marking a segment of the Chihuahua Trail and the Escondido Water Hole, an important spot on the Chihuahua Trail, was dedicated Tuesday afternoon by members of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, headed by Mrs. R. A. Harrell as chairman.

The marker, provided by the State Historical Survey Committee and designated by it, was erected in the highway right of way by the local State Highway Department maintenance crew last week and dedication ceremonies were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday at the site.

Mrs. Joe Clayton of Ozona, marker chairman of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, and Henry Meadows of Midland, a member of the

Crockett county committee, who assisted in doing research on the trail and the lost water hole, took part in the dedication ceremonies.

The Chihuahua Trail did not come into being full blown as did the Santa Fe trail but was put together in bits and pieces over hundreds of years until the necessity for its extensive use was created by the California gold rush of 1849.

In its essence the Chihuahua Trail was an overland route from a seaport on Matagorda Bay through San Antonio de Bexar to Chihuahua, a wealthy and populous center in northern Mexico.

The Chihuahua Trail was extensively used by the '49ers en route to California as they came to Texas by ships to Indianola on Matagorda Bay then overland to San Antonio, Castroville.

Lions Stumble Before Coleman Cats 16 to 12

Coach Rip Sewell's Ozona Lions went down to defeat at the hands of the Coleman Bluecats here Friday night in their first defeat of the season. The score was 16-12. They will take on the Sonora Broncos in Sonora tomorrow night and their prospects of bringing home a win look dismal.

Although the Lions played a terrific defensive ball game here Friday night, Coach Sewell has yet to come up with an offense that can get the ball moving and the Lions had no really

sustained drives. Both Lion scores came in the second half with Ruben Tambunga romping over from the eleven and again from the seven, after little Pete Perez broke for long runs to set up the scores.

Coleman failed to score in the first quarter even though they had excellent field position at least three times. A short outside opening kick gave the Bluecats the ball on the Lions' 48-yard line and throughout the quarter the Lion defense successfully defended their goal line.

Coleman's first score came after Ozona's Jim Montgomery punted to the end zone and forced the visitors to start from their own 20. They marched 80 yards in twelve plays and scored on a pass play. The extra point was no good, but the Bluecats held a 6-0 lead at halftime.

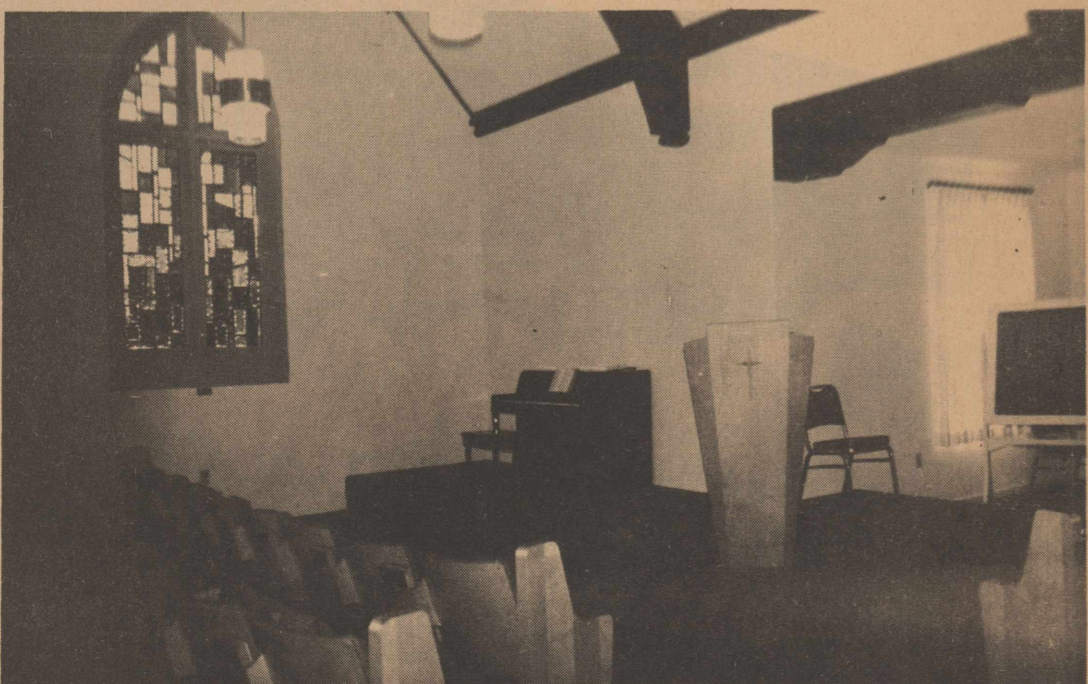
Going into the game neither team had been scored on and both were unbeaten.

Ozona evened the score in the first series of downs after the half with Tambunga hitting paydirt from 11 yards out. Pagan's kick for extra points was no good. Perez set up the score, breaking for 40 yards.

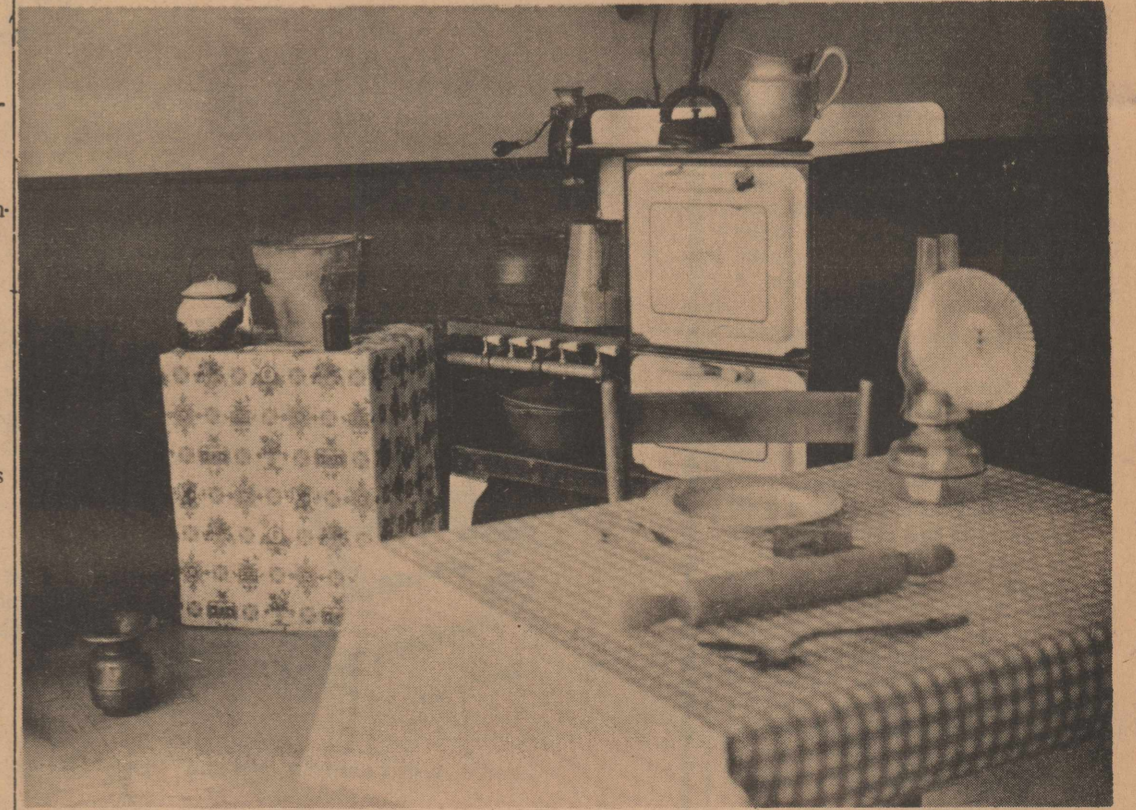
Neither team could muster an offensive threat in the third period until Coleman hit for a field goal in the final few minutes to go ahead 9-6.

The Lions could not get close enough to try for a field goal in the second half and pass attempts on fourth down and short yardage failed. The front dropped temperatures and sent residents scurrying for blankets and lighting furnaces.

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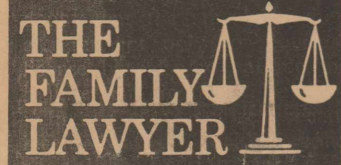
WISE WORDS—LEAVE AN UNANSWERED QUESTION

At the 1970 Lions International convention, Past President Frank V. Birch offered a few thoughts which, if not headline-makers, invite our thoughtful consideration.

"You and I," Mr. Birch told the Lions, "are a part of what some folks call 'the silent majority.' We don't march up and down the streets, tipping over cars or breaking windows. We don't start trouble in our schools, or playgrounds, or in other people's houses.

"But sometimes I feel that we are too complacent, too self-satisfied. All of us, young or old, liberal or conservative, have for too long been silent on the issue of violence. We have seen fighting on the streets, arson in our schools, degrading behavior by men and women and by boys and girls who should know better. But we have stood by and done nothing about it. We have closed our windows and pulled our shades, and kept out of it—and sometimes even in fear.

"Let us, as good Americans, find once again our ability to distinguish between protest and revolt; between dissent and chaos; between demonstration and destruction; between non-violence and violence.

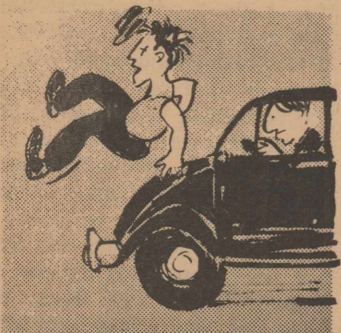


Driving Without a License

When Jeff's car knocked down a pedestrian he felt no great sense of guilt. After all, he had been driving properly, well within the speed limit. Clearly it was not his fault that the man had stepped out suddenly from behind a parked car.

Then Jeff remembered, with a sinking feeling, that his driver's license had expired. Sure enough, the pedestrian seized upon this point in suing for damages.

"Anyone without a driver's license," he argued at a court hearing, "has no business driving a car in the first place."



Nevertheless, the court decided Jeff could not be held legally liable. The judge said his lack of a license, even though wrongful, had no connection at all with the accident.

Generally speaking, the mere fact that a motorist has no license does not make him automatically responsible for accidents. For this would be imposing an extra penalty upon him, in addition to the regular penalty the law already imposes for driving without a license.

Furthermore, an unlicensed driver is himself entitled to collect damages, if someone else negligently injures him. Otherwise, noted one court, he would become a helpless target for any other driver on the road.

On the other hand, there is no doubt that the state does have a right not only to require a license but also to enforce that requirement rigorously.

In one case a citizen became incensed at the idea of police roadblocks, which were used from time to time to check up on the licenses of passing motorists. Finally he went to court for an injunction demanding an end to this practice.

"Until a motorist has done something wrong," he said, "the police have no authority to stop him. He has a right to use the public streets without any interference."

But the court rejected his demand, saying that the right to use the public streets is subject to restrictions necessary for the public safety. A roadblock, said the court, is a logical and prac-

COURT STREAMLINING NEEDED



Crockett Crude Output Reaches 197 Million Bbls.

Dallas -- Texas oil fields have produced more than 32 billion barrels of oil during the past 80 years of recorded production, according to the latest compilation of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Last year's production of 1,151,775,000 barrels produced an income of \$3.6 billion for Texas which was distributed widely as 198 of the state's 254 counties produce oil.

Crockett County, which has had recorded oil production since 1925, has had a total crude oil output of 196,961,327 barrels up to the beginning of 1970. Crockett county production in 1969 was 7,951,393 barrels at the rate of 21,785 barrels a day.

Thirty-four counties in the state produced more than 25,000 barrels a day.
