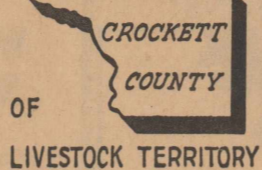

were only able to manage 179, but the scoreboard told the final tale, and it gave the nod to the Indians.

The Lions got on the scoreboard first with a 74-yard drive following the opening kick-off with Greg Stuart and Ruben Tambunga punching out most of the yardage. Stuart scored on a 17 yard run. David Pagan kicked the extra point and the Lions led 7-0.

However, Haskell cut into the Lions' lead on the next series of downs when they scored in only four plays. The Lions and fans were stunned when the Indians' highly touted Charley Franklin broke through the Lion line on the 40 and without any downfield blocking faked out almost every defensive man on the Lion team before cutting into the end zone for the first Haskell score. The PAT was no good and the Lions' still held a slim lead.

Franklin was held in check very well by the Lions' defensive unit for the remainder of the night except for the final 30 seconds of play in the first half. He again broke through to catch a Terry Pringle pass

and outran the Lion secondary for another Indian touchdown. Franklin also ran for the two points.

With ten seconds left in the second period, Haskell recovered an inside kick on the Ozona 31 and four plays later the Indians Randy Stone kicked a field goal with no time remaining on the clock, giving the Indians a 17 to 7 halftime lead.

The Lions dominated the second period of play in spite of being unable to score. They mounted several serious threats and on one occasion moved to the Haskell four yard line before a fumble on the hand-off stopped the drive.

Ozona forced Haskell to punt following the second half kickoff and starting from their own six, they used only ten plays to score. Tambunga ran in from the three for the touchdown. However, the fake kick and pass for the two points, which has worked well for the Lions this season, failed.

The Lions had several opportunities to score in the final two minutes of the game, but Lady Luck chose to smile on the Indians. Gerald Huff scored for the Lions, only to have it called back on a holding penalty, placing the ball on the Haskell 20. Two passes fell incomplete and the Indians took over.

After holding the Indians and forcing them to punt, the Lions were back in the ballgame. A bad snap from center went over the head of Indian punter Bill Cox and he was tackled in the end zone for a safety. Had he been tackled at the one, the Lions would have had 41 seconds and four downs to score. As it was the Lions took over on the Haskell 40 and were unable to overcome the deficit.

To sum it all up, the Indians won the game by getting the breaks. They played near flawless ball and certainly came up with the right plays, but the Lions were by far the better team.

Tambunga was the leading rusher, picking up 269 yards on a fantastic 45 carries.

The Lions defensive line was magnificent as well as the offensive line, with about the same personnel playing on both offense and defense and they did an outstanding job of containing Charley Franklin, who is reputed in some quarters to be the best running back in the state.

Sixteen senior ball players ended their high school football careers when the final whistle blew. They are David

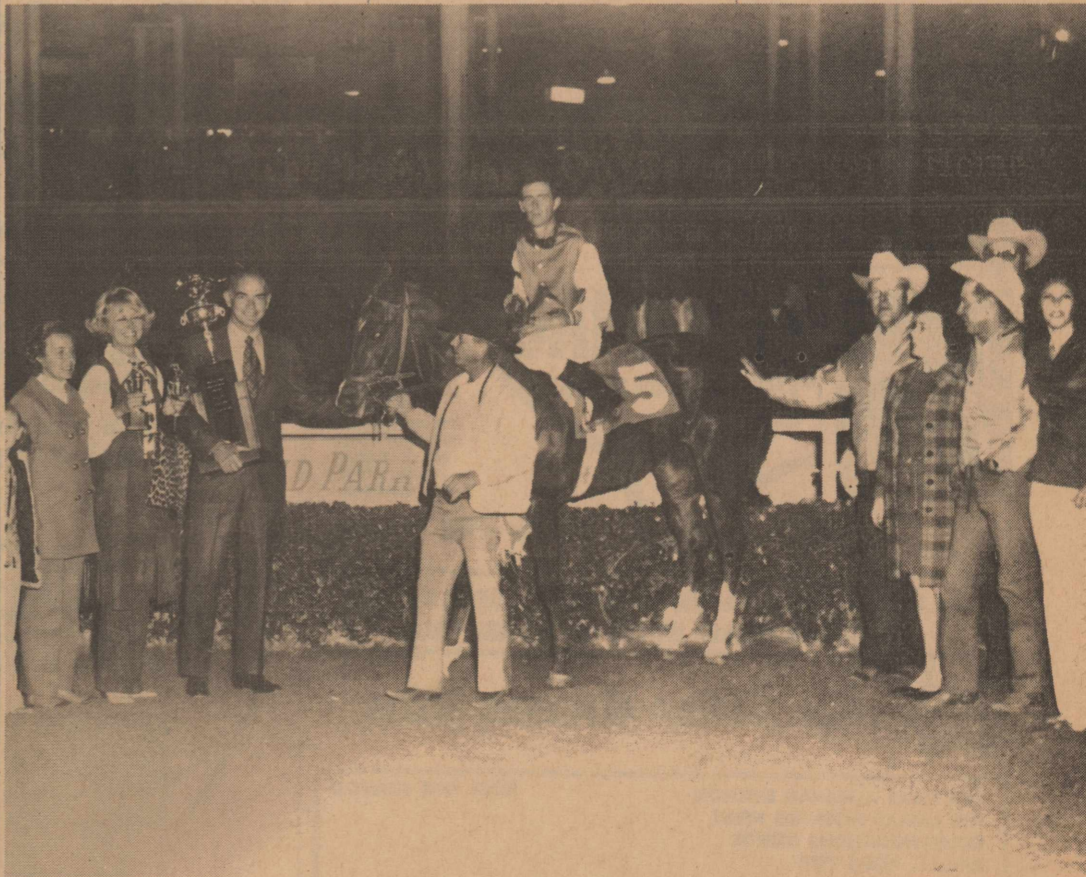

**ANOTHER "BIG LIE"?**

The alleged "Khrushchev memoirs," a matter of much speculation in the press these days, raise more questions than they answer. The publishers in this country declare that the memoirs are authentic — which was to be expected; the Soviet Union, however, has officially declared that they are a "form of forgery" — which was also to be expected.

One widely distributed news story declared that Khrushchev himself had declared the memoirs to be "a fabrication." On closer reading, however, it turns out that this was simply a claim made by the Communist propaganda periodical (we disdain to call it a "newspaper") called Tass. Since Tass has itself fabricated many propaganda stories in the past, there is no reason for us to accept, on faith, that Khrushchev said anything on the matter one way or the other.

It has always been difficult to judge the reliability of information from behind the iron curtain. In 1956, Nikita Khrushchev, then top boss of the Soviet empire (General Secretary of the Communist Party) told the Central Committee of the USSR that thousands of innocent victims had died during the purges because they had confessed. The reason, said Khrushchev, was because the confessions "were gained through the help of cruel and inhuman tortures."

But nearly fifteen years earlier, and at the very height of the mass murder "eye witness reporter" in Moscow decided that all of the accused were guilty, as charged. "No one," he wrote, "who watched the hearing and heard the statements (of the accused) could think for a moment that they were either terrorized or drugged." The "expert" was Walter Duranty, New York Times Moscow correspondent whose adulation of Stalin helped to mislead millions in the free world as to the reality of Communist tyranny and terror.

One current guess is that the "Memoirs" may have been deliberately "smuggled out" from behind the curtain by the Soviets as part of a massive propaganda campaign designed to convince the world that the crimes of communism were all due to the evil nature of only one man — Stalin. But Stalin's own daughter, Svetlana Alliluyeva, who has written two excellent books published in the United States (*Twenty Letters to a Friend* and *Only One Year*) has declared that it is "wrong to put the blame on one person (Stalin) for those wrongs which were the responsibility of the Communist Party as a whole."

While we may read the "Memoirs of Khrushchev" with interest, we must remember that the evils of Communism are due to the system of Communism; and that the crimes perpetrated by the Soviet Dictatorship against the people are as much the responsibility of Khrushchev, Brezhnev and Kosygin as they were of Stalin.

**Palatable Food For the Hungry Proves Popular**

Food companies and government agencies have found that some of the new foods designed to alleviate hunger and malnutrition are not eaten by those who need them, according to General Foods News.

Most of the foods developed to help solve world hunger problems have been in an unfamiliar form (usually flour or meal to be baked with or mixed into other foods), and often they have an unfamiliar taste. Poor people who know little about nutrition prefer to spend their meager food money on extra potatoes rather than for what seems a small quantity of high-protein food. And finally, most of these products have carried the stigma of being "poor people's food." Even the terribly poor man says, "I'm not so poor I have to feed my family that!"

GF came up with an answer. To a large percentage of the hungry and malnourished throughout the world, this new food looks like an old friend. The food is pasta — elbow macaroni. It looks, cooks and tastes much like regular pasta. It's hard to

tell from "regular" macaroni. Results of the feeding tests in Brazil, showed that in almost every instance, the high-protein GF product, eaten daily, eliminated most signs of malnutrition in 90 days. With most people tested, it has already proved to be more than just nutrition in a package. This nutritious food does get eaten.

**WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER**

Criticism by certain war protesting Senators of daring efforts to rescue mistreated American prisoners of war, is difficult to understand.

Some of the doves harp about possible effects of the risky mission on the progress of the Paris peace talks. What progress? Up to this time the enemy has shown no interest whatever in ending the war. Because of the intransigence of the Hanoi delegates, the Paris meetings have been a total farce.

The gallant attempt by volunteers to pick up ailing American prisoners is hailed by all patriotic Americans as a magnificent display of devotion, courage and skill, even though unfortunately it turned out the POWs had been removed from the camp where until recently a number of them had been held.

The helicopter flights by volunteers to the prison stockade, located only 20 miles from Hanoi, exemplified the very highest attributes of the American bravery and resolve. History will undoubtedly record it that way.

Although the rescue mission failed to achieve its objective, it may serve to impress the Communists that American patience is running out -- that Hanoi's persistence in violating the Geneva conference in the treatment of prisoners will not continue to be tolerated by this nation.

It is heartening to know that the Secretary of Defense is not dismayed by the Senators' protests. He made it clear that other efforts will be made, other strategy will be employed, in American determination to obtain humane treatment and the release of those imprisoned heroes. --0--



**Corn Meal Pound Cake**

3 cups sugar  
1 cup butter  
1 teas. vanilla  
6 eggs, separated  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1 1/2 cups corn meal  
1/2 teas. baking powder  
1 cup sour cream  
Grease and flour tube pan. Cream butter and sugar, add dash of salt, add egg yolks one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift flour, corn meal and soda three times, add alternately with sour cream. Add a dash of salt to egg whites and beat until peak forms. Fold

into cake mixture. Bake one hour in pre-heated 350-degree oven.

**Tips For Gardeners**

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

At last the gardener may relax and enjoy your garden library. In December you can take things easier than during almost any other month, so it's a good time to catch up on horticultural reading. Garden books and subscriptions to garden magazines make good Christmas gifts for friends who are interested in growing and arranging flowers and plant foliage.

Poinsettias will be in full flower fairly early in the month. When selecting them, consider maturity of plant. Look for yellow pollen on the true flowers which are at the base of the colorful bracts. If flowers are green or red-tipped and fresh looking, the bloom will hold longer than if pollen is covering the flowers. They are generally offered for sale when pollen is just showing around the edges of the flowers. Place the pot in a sunny location and water once or twice daily. The blooms usually last from two to four weeks. Keeping your room temperature higher than where grown will slightly shorten the life of the bloom. Night temperature may be dropped to 55 degrees. Keep out of drafts and not exposed to either exceedingly low or high temperature. A few branches of mountain laurel or other evergreens may

be placed into the pots to provide foliage if the Poinsettia leaves drop off the lower part of the stem. Water all Christmas plants regularly.

The Poinsettia belongs to the genus Euphorbia or common spurge, the most familiar being "Snow on the Mountain" and "Crown of Thorns." Dormant spraying to combat scale insects and certain other insects and diseases may now be given attention. Do not spray if there is danger of the temperature dropping below freezing. When fruit and other trees have dropped their leaves they may be given a first dormant spray. Also, pruning may be started at this

time. Feed pansies liquid manure this month for larger blooms.

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**

**"Found" Life Insurance Policy**

When a man dies leaving life insurance, notice of his death should of course be given to the insurance company.

But suppose the family simply doesn't know the policy exists. If they find out about it weeks, months, or even years later, could they still collect? Or have they lost their rights because of the delay?

Insurance policies usually say that the notice of death must be given "immediately" or promptly. Sometimes they even fix a specific number of days as a limit. Nevertheless, most courts are



willing to overlook this requirement if there is a reasonable excuse for the delay.

In one case, a woman had never been told about an insurance policy bought by her husband's employer. Several months after his death, she happened to find out about the insurance—and put in her claim at once.

Even though the policy called for "immediate" notice of death, the court held she could still collect. The judge said "immediate," in these circumstances, meant right after she learned of the policy's existence.

On the other hand, courts do recognize the importance of promptness to the insurance company. The company should have a fair chance, if it so desires, to inquire into the cause of death before too much time has gone by.

Accordingly, a delay due to negligence will not be excused. One widow just didn't bother to go through the "junk drawer" in which many of the family papers were kept. When she finally found an insurance policy there, years later, her claim was turned down because of her own negligence.

Even if there is a legitimate excuse, the delay may be so extreme that the policy will lapse anyhow. Take this case:

An insurance company was started to receive a claim for a death that had occurred 33 years earlier. The widow did have a plausible explanation for her tardiness, but a court ruled she could not collect anyhow.

"Witnesses may have died, memories faded," said the court. "The claim has grown stale."

**WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS**

**Expensive Tuition**

As is well known, the cost of college tuition has taken some abrupt bounces upward. But it is to be hoped that the education that today's young people receive will justify the cost.

Equally as fervently, it is hoped that the government, and especially the Congress, will learn from the recent \$2,000,000 expended by the commission on pornography. If it is recognized that this money was really tuition, and if the lessons have learned from this lesson, a great deal of the taxpayer's money could be saved in the future.

Some three years ago a commission was set up to study the impact unbridled pornography has on the national life, with the possible intent of passing Federal laws on the subject.

But to the astonishment of both the White House and the Congress, the blue ribbon commission came up with a report speaking quite highly of pornography and recommending that there be no restrictions on adult access to pornography.

As the saying goes, "the feathers hit the fan." The Administration rejected the report and the recommendations out of hand, and with only five votes opposed, the Senate voted to ignore the report.

There is probably little merit in discussing the fact that in this latter third of the 20th century presumably intelligent people in these United States would uphold the rights of some to peddle all types of pornography.

garphic material. Enough has perhaps already been said on this subject.

But the \$2,000,000 will not have been wasted in vain, if a lesson is learned.

And that lesson is that there are many areas into which the Federal government really has no business intruding. Local community moral standards and customs should prevail on many of these issues, as they are not Federal issues. It is significant that the five senators who voted to accept the recommendations are primarily big city oriented, where the viewpoints of the residents are dissimilar from those, for example, in the rural Dakotas.

Even the French, with their reputation of less than always puritanical outlooks, have long understood there are some things to which national laws should not apply.

In Paris, the gendarmes make little effort to apprehend the seedy characters who furtively try to sell erotic postcards on the Rue de la Paix, or the Place de Concorde. But out in the provinces, it's a different story because the people there do not believe what is good for Paris is good for them.

Thus, this report may have served a good purpose, if its import sinks in.

And that is while all must pay tribute to Rome, it is not necessary to do as the Romans do, if one is not in Rome.

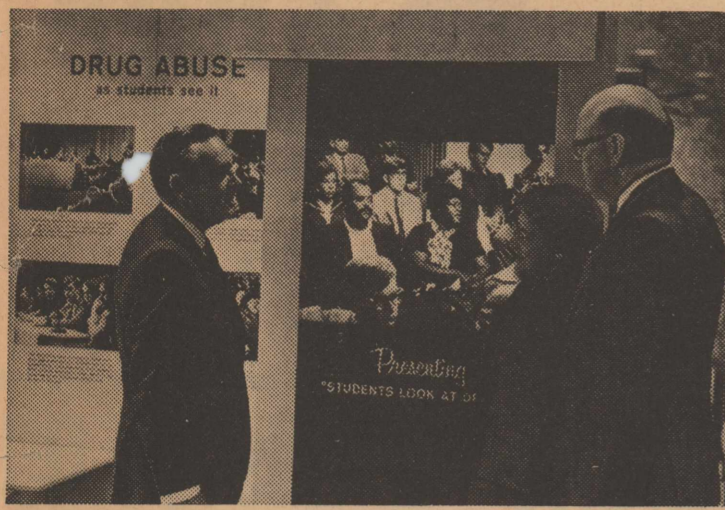

### 4-H Fights Drug Abuse Through Education



Over the years drugs have been associated with healing, health and the well-being of people. Today the word frequently has a new, distasteful and frightening meaning for the parents of young people.

It is not surprising then that youth organizations such as 4-H are giving high priority to drug education programs. Neither is it surprising that 4-H has enlisted the assistance of its national 4-H health sponsor, Eli Lilly and Company, in the development and execution of a drug education program.

"Knowing the facts about drugs, the consequences of experimentation and addiction must receive major attention in a program of drug education," says Norman C. Mindrum, director of the National 4-H Service Committee.

At National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 29-Dec. 3, drug abuse is to receive the attention of 1,600 of America's top 4-H'ers. The topic will fit into the Congress theme "We Care" and hopefully motivate this group of young leaders to carry on education programs in their local communities.

Eli Lilly and Company which has supported the national 4-H health program for 15 years will take an active part. The company will have an exhibit about drug abuse on display and show a movie, "Students Look at Drugs," which has been previewed by numerous 4-H groups. Moderator of the youth panel featured in the film, Dr. Ivan Bennett, staff psychiatrist at Lilly, will conduct an informal discussion with 4-H Congress delegates.

The company also will award seven \$600 scholarships to national 4-H health program winners and host a recognition event for some 50 state winners at the national 4-H event.

In further reference to 4-H education efforts Mindrum points out that leaders and parents of 4-H members generally are confident that their youngsters will resist temptation to experiment with drugs. He notes, however, that complacency has no place in fighting the problems of drug addiction. "Telling it like it is" continues to be the core of our education program, Mindrum stressed.

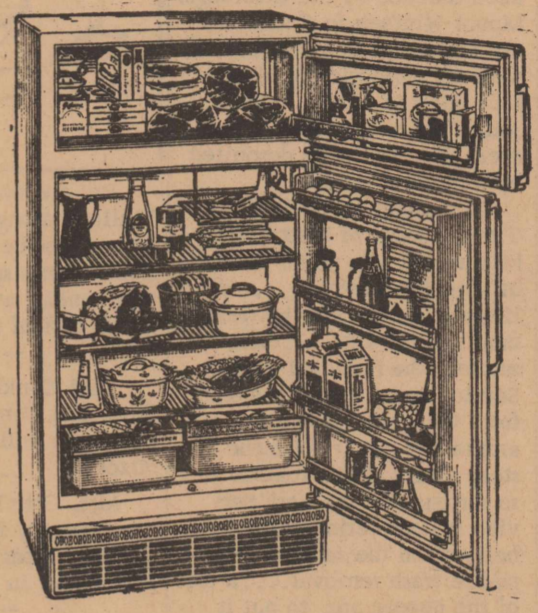

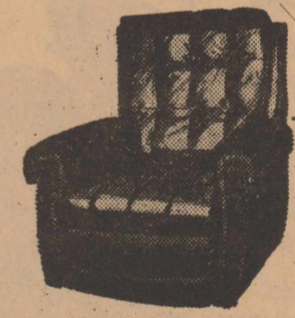

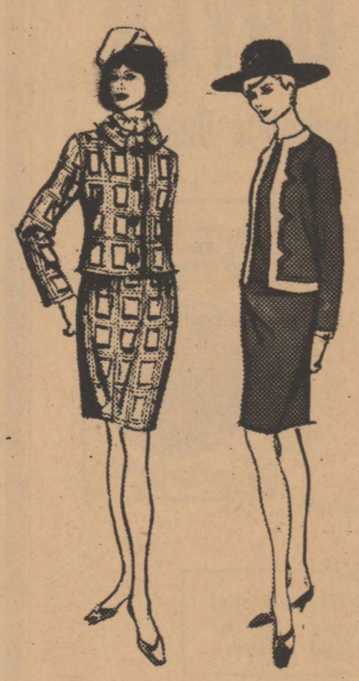

**Information On Holiday Mailing Given By Hokit**

Postmaster Floyd Hokit urged patrons of the post office to avail themselves of the special services offered by the department during the Christmas peak mailing time.

Special services such as airmail, special delivery, insured mail and special handling assures the patron that mail and packages will be delivered faster and in better shape.

Hokit again urged that Christmas parcels be mailed as early as possible. Parcels for nearby should be mailed not later than Dec. 11, to insure Christmas delivery and cards no later than Dec. 15. After these dates airmail should be used.

Legible addresses and return addresses and proper packing of parcels is a must as well as the use of the zip code in both the address and the return. Parcels should be packed in good sturdy boxes, covered with heavy paper and tied with strong cord. It would be wise to include another address label on the inside of the parcel. Be sure to insure all articles mailed at their proper value.

Zip code books will be available in the lobby for patron use. Also, sacks will be provided for separation of mail during the peak period.

Pressure sensitive bands will be provided by the post office for separating local and out-of-town mailings.

The office will be open Saturday, Dec. 19, for at least four hours, 9 a.m. until 1 p.m.

Hokit urged that greeting cards be mailed early and that first-class postage be used as the cost is the same. He asked that anyone having questions regarding any type of mailing call the post office for information before preparing the mailing.

**FORMER OZONA PHYSICIAN DIES IN LAMESA TUESDAY**

Dr. Noble H. Price, 65, died Tuesday in a Lubbock Hospital of an apparent heart attack. Funeral services were held Friday in Lamesa, where he had been a general practitioner and surgeon since 1933, with the exception of about a year spent in practice in Ozona.

Dr. Price was a native of Big Spring and was the first physician to be appointed Chief of Staff of the Lamesa Medical Arts Hospital. He held degrees from Harvard and Tufts Medical School in Boston.

Survivors include his wife of Lamesa; a daughter, Mrs. Pamela McMinn of Galveston; a son, Dr. John V. Price of Scotland, and two brothers.

**HIGH-CLIMBING LITTERBUGS**

A new high in littering has been reached by the litterbugs. Mount Whitney in California-- the highest peak in the nation with the exception of Mount McKinley in Alaska -- has joined the ranks of the scenic areas that are being despoiled by a careless public.

According to the Daily Times Leader of West Point, Mississippi, the noble summit of Mount Whitney ".... is littered with paper, bottles, cans and the like.... Each summer the National Parks Service hauls tons of the stuff from the peak using pack animals to get it down the steep trails. 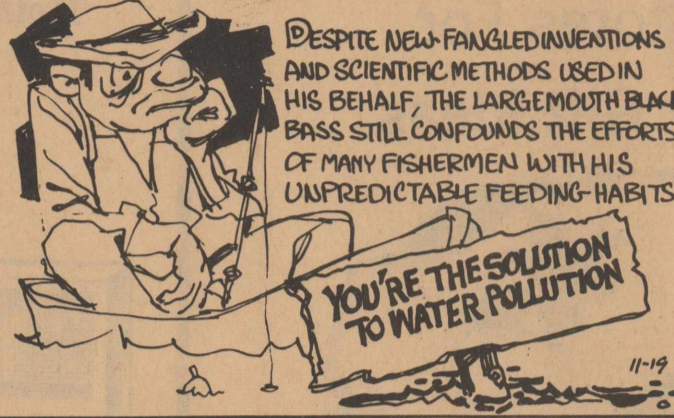

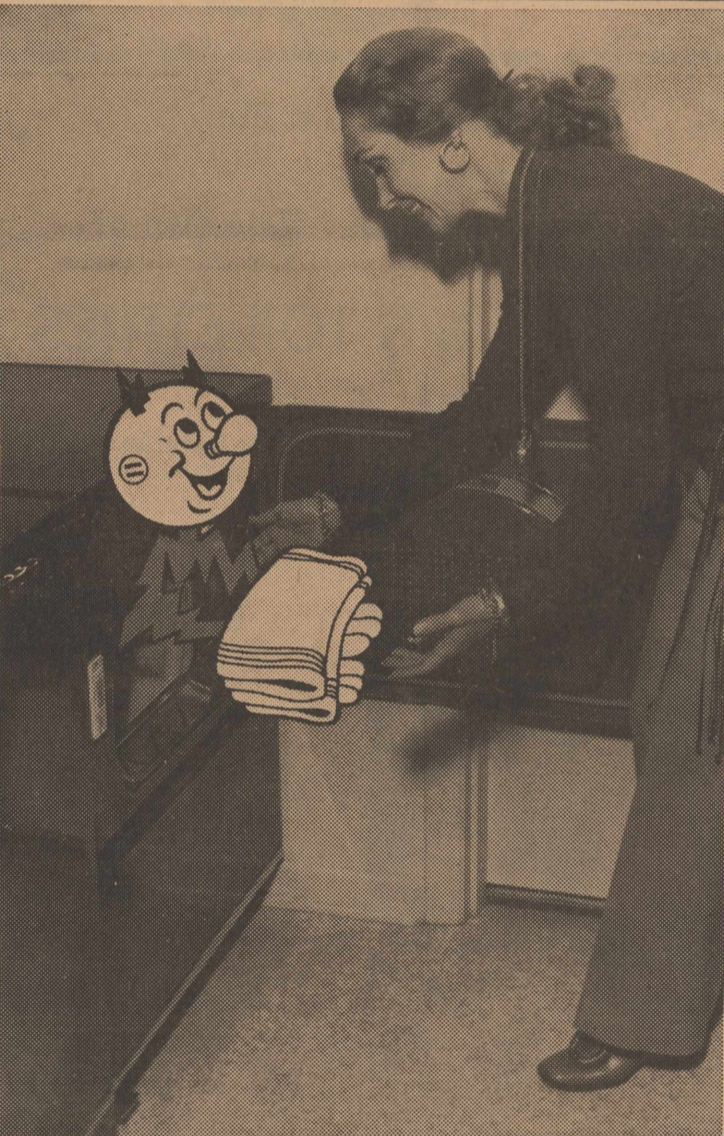
