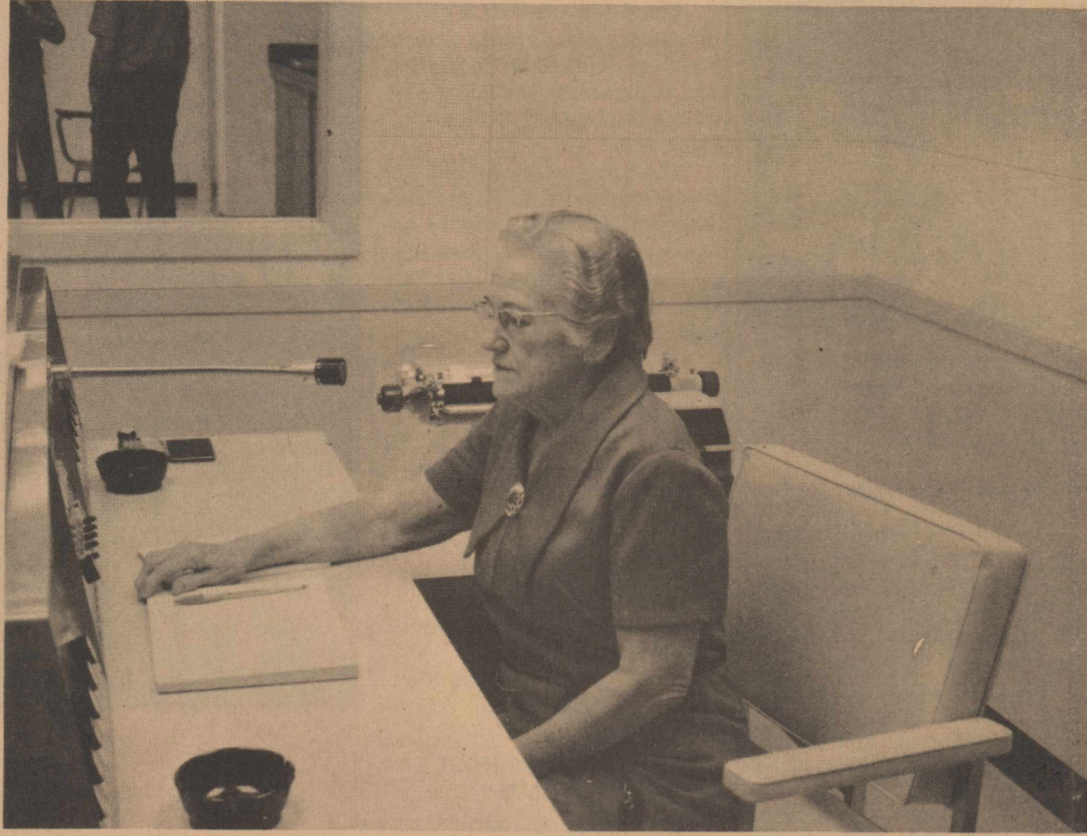
A big Ozona welcome to the new crew at the recently opened DPS building and their families. At least four families have moved to Ozona as a result of the new facility, and possibly more on the way.

Ozona Lion cagers dropped their first district game here Friday night to the McCamey Badgers 44-40 after winning the first half of district play with a 5-0 record.

The Lions led throughout the game, only to see the Badgers tie it up and go ahead in the final two minutes. David Pagan led the scoring with 18 points. Other Lions scoring were Collett 7, McBroom 5, Montgomery 4, Sewell 4, Jenkins 2.

The junior varsity also lost, 35-33. Bill Edgerton was high point man with 13 points. Monty Peltos scored 7, Gerald Huff 5, Webster 2 and Whitley 6.

Since the Lions won the first-half of district play, a tie in the second half would see them in the district championship without a play-off. However, if McCamey, Crane or Coahoma should win the second-half, there would be a play-off at the end of the season. Stanton and Big Lake lost their first game in the second half of play and are not considered contenders.

The Lions won the first-half championship with a perfect record after beating Stanton a week ago Tuesday night in Stanton. The score was 51-39, but the game was much closer than the score indicates. The Buffalos were ahead 6-5 at the end of the first quarter, but the Lions outscored them 21-13 in the second frame to take the half-time lead. By the fourth quarter, almost all the Lions were in foul trouble and fans breathed a sigh of relief when the final whistle blew.

DPS Communications Center Goes On Air Monday Morning

A voice familiar to law enforcement officers throughout West Texas for the past 21 years crackled over the ether waves at 8 o'clock Monday morning to officially open the new Ozona Department of Public Safety communications center.

Mrs. Gertrude Perry, office deputy under Sheriff Billy Mills, who has manned the sheriff's

department headquarters radio under three Crockett county sheriffs, was given the honor of officially putting the Ozona DPS station in service.

Promptly at 8 a.m. Monday, Mrs. Perry pushed the on-the-air button on the huge radio console and spoke into the microphone: "Ozona to All Officers and Stations: Ozona DPS KSO 940 is 10:8 at 8 a.m."

February 1, 1971." The 10:8 was informing all officers and stations that the Ozona DPS station is now "in service."

The Crockett county sheriff's radio station was launched by Mrs. Perry at 11:40 a.m., May 27, 1950, the local log shows. She was reporting to officers at Midland the theft of a car at McCamey.

The new DPS station will close the gap between existing stations at Kerrville, Del Rio, Midland and Pecos. A teletype receiver will be installed at a later date.

Personnel manning the station, all new residents of Ozona, will include the Supervisor, R. B. Babbitt, and operators R. L. Brown, Bob Falkner and Bill Price, with a fourth operator to be assigned later for around-the-clock operation.

The DPS station broadcasts on a frequency of 42.9 while West Texas sheriff's office radios operate on a frequency of 37.180. The new DPS station here will monitor all sheriff's bands and can broadcast on the sheriff's frequency when occasion demands. All local sheriff's cars and headquarters radios can receive DPS broadcasts but do not broadcast on the state frequency. Heretofore, one Ozona car had been capable of broadcasting on the State DPS frequency in case of emergency.

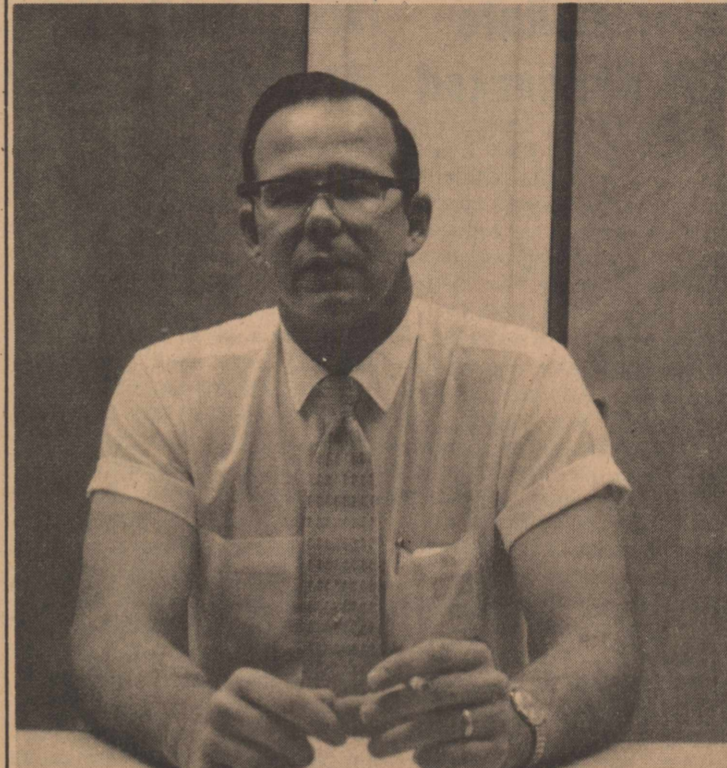
The newly completed Department of Public Safety Building in Ozona will not only provide a radio headquarters, but will be headquarters offices for DPS personnel here. It will furnish offices for local Highway Patrolmen James Cumby, Royce Hightower, John Harris, and Jack Derrington and Ranger A. Y. Allee. The license division, presently headquartered at Sonora, is expected to be moved here in the near future.

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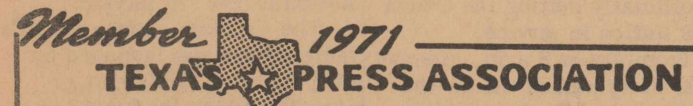

Crockett Fields Gets Extensions

Second producer and a 1,204-foot northwest extension was indicated in the Double R (Crimoidal) field of Crockett County with the recovery of 305 feet of oil and heavily gas-cut mud, along with 90 feet of drilling fluid, on a drillstem test at J. S. Abercrombie Minerals Co., Inc. Houston, No. 3 J. S. Todd, in 17-YZ-EL&RR, 18 miles east-southeast of Iraan.

Tool was open two hours on the test taken from 6,750-65 feet. Flowing pressures were 29.4-44.1 pounds; 30-minute initial shut-in pressure was 1,630 pounds; and one-hour final shut-in pressure, 1,660 pounds.

The project was bottomed at 7,141 feet and operator was waiting on completion unit after setting 5 1/2-inch casing at 6,874 feet.

The discovery, the same firm's No. 1 J. S. Todd, was finalized May 12, 1970 for a daily pumping potential of 147 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 953-1 through perforations at 6,808-20 feet.

The Crockett (Grayburg) field of Crockett County gained a 1,500-foot north-northwest extension with completion of Amini Oil Corp., Midland, No. 3-B University Section 18, 15 miles northwest of Iraan, for a daily pumping potential of 15 barrels of 28.1 gravity oil, no water, and gas-oil ratio unreported.

Production was through perforations at 1,529-39 feet and 1,512-20 feet, which had been acidized with 250 gallons and fractured with 20,500 gallons and 18,200 pounds of sand.

Location is 330 feet from the south and 990 feet from the east lines of the southwest quarter of 18-14 University.

Fed. Land Bank Interest Rate Cut Announced

A. E. Prugel, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora, has received word that the Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8%.

"This reduction affects more than 90 million dollars of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers throughout Texas," Mr. Prugel stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969 lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in prices which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the Bank had over \$529 million in volume of loans outstanding.

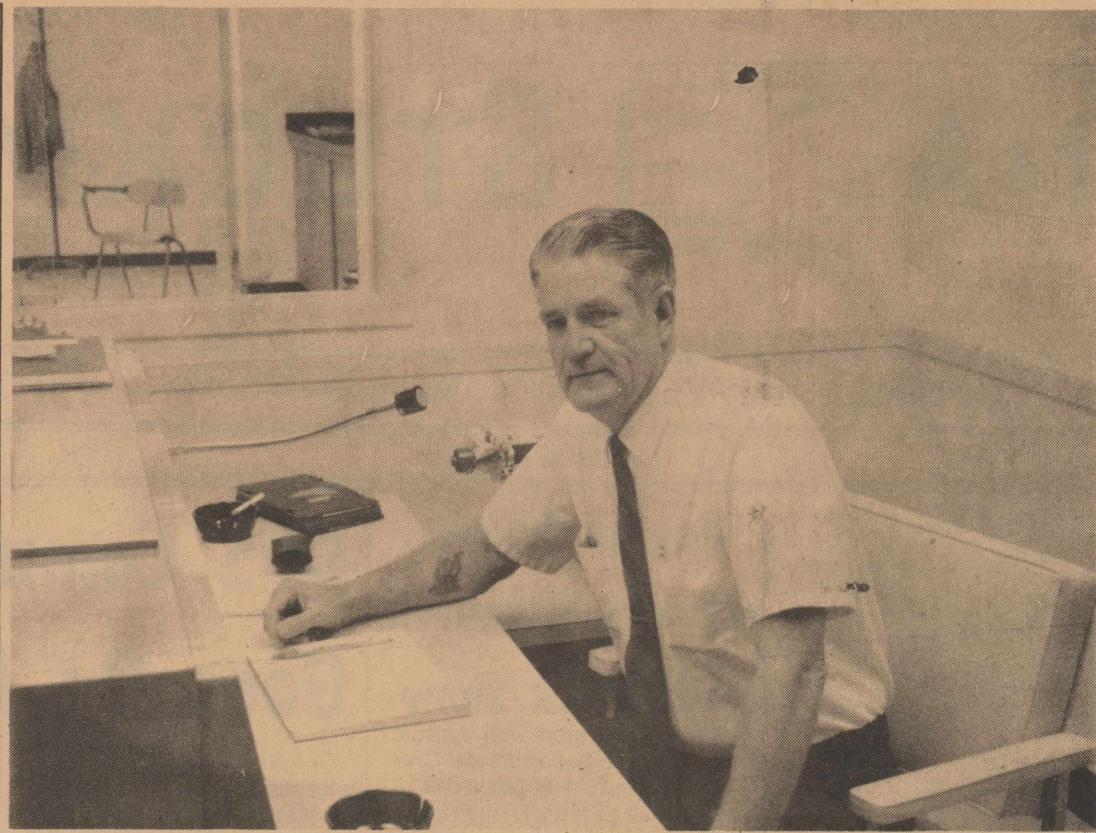

Two Outposts For Ozona Field

Delta-Sururban, Odessa, will drill two outposts to the two-well Clearfork oil area of the Ozona Southwest multipay field of Crockett County, six miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 2-C Ozona Oil Unit, 2,300 feet south and very slightly east, is 1,860 feet from the north and 1,560 feet from the west lines of the same section.

Both wells, on a 332.25-acre lease, are contracted to 3,400 feet.

The Ozona Cubs Basketball team, coached by Doug Fisk, continued their successful basketball season, picking up the championship trophy at the Iraan Jr. High Tournament held last weekend.

After a 44-35 loss to Sonora earlier in the week, the Cubs entered the tournament trying to prove themselves. In first round of play, they completely demolished the Imperial five, by a score of 57-5. The first string retired after playing 3 minutes and earning a 20-0 lead. The Cubs were led by Elpidio Martinez and Armando Reyes with 8 points each, Tommy Hoover 5, Donald Higginbottom 4 and Hector De-Hoyos 3.

Saturday's game was a little more difficult. The Cubs managed to get past a tough McCamey team before facing Big Lake in the finals. Against McCamey, the Cubs trailed the entire game until the fourth quarter when David Bean and Romaldo Cervantez hit four straight free throws each to give the Cubs a well-earned 45-38 victory. Credit must be given in this game to a stout Ozona defense. McCamey was

a high-scoring team in previous games. David Bean was high-point man with 19 points, followed by Cervantez with 11, Richard Gongales 8, Richard Sanchez 5 and Jimmy Tambunga 2.

In the championship game Ozona showed great poise, remaining cool under fire and pulling away from an excellent Big Lake team to win by a score of 55-39. This win was led by the defense, coming back at the half leading by two points, they held the Owls to only one point in the third quarter. Scoring honors were shared by Richard Sanchez and Romaldo Cervantez with 14 points each, Gonzales with 9, Bean and Tambunga 6 each, Parker 4 and Martinez 2.

The tournament wins bring the Cubs record for the season to 13-2 with two games left to play, both against Big Lake. February 4 at Big Lake and February 8 at Ozona.

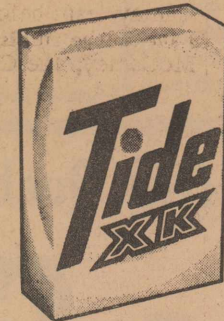

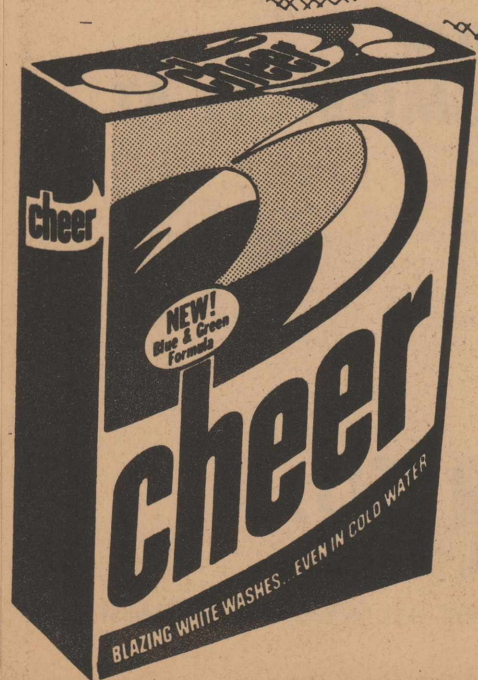

FAMILY ASSISTANCE FIASCO

In recommending drastic overhaul of California's welfare system, Gov. Ronald Reagan rightly termed welfare "a cancer eating at our vitals." He also called for elimination of "the cloak of secrecy" around welfare cases. This recommendation by the Reagan administration in California constitutes genuine reform of the welfare system, whereas the Nixon administration's Family Assistance Act would only spread the "cancer" of welfare.

The hurtful effect of the Family Assistance Act was ably spelled out some time ago by U. S. Rep. Phil M. Landrum (D-Ga.) in a speech on the floor of the House of Representatives. The congressman made these telling points:

"We now have about two million people on the welfare rolls, as I understand it, but we are, with this bill (FAP) about to add 15 million as a minimum estimate, but as a maximum estimate in my judgement between 25 and 30 million. And to administer the law for all these new welfare recipients literally thousands of new employees will be required.

It is hard to believe that President Nixon, who in 1968 promised to reduce the welfare load, truly understands the effects of the FAP legislation he is pushing so hard.

Consider two men working side by side, with the same skills and drawing identical wages:

One of these men, let us say, has five or six children. He hasn't given thought to how he will feed and clothe them and pay family bills over the years. The other man has one or two children. He and his wife are mindful of family responsibilities and the limits on their income.

Under the Nixon administration's Family Assistance Plan, the man who has paid scant attention to his income limit will draw a welfare check from the federal government to sup-

plement his income and bring it up to the level the government says he should be at.

This supplement, however, will come from the wages of the other, more responsible citizen who works alongside him on the job. The latter pays the tax, while the irresponsible citizen gets a subsidy. In other words, the Family Assistance Plan, by its very nature, is unfair to responsible, working citizens.

Costly as the Family Assistance Plan would be in dollars, it would be even more costly to the nation in terms of lost incentive. The plan would take from the working man his incentive to acquire skills. As Congressman Landrum observed the administration is proposing a statute "that does something we have never done before by telling a working man that because you make less than so much you are in poverty and the government is going to take public money and pay you a subsidy."

In other words, the Nixon administration's Family Assistance Plan is completely out of character with the way America has done things. The administration is proposing to guarantee -- whether or not a man works -- an annual income equal to the amount the federal government decides he should have. If that's the way we are to do things in the future, many people -- the indolent element in the country -- won't work in the future. They will say: "I don't need to work. I've got federal Family Assistance."

The Family Assistance Plan would be heaven to those very real human types referred to in the "Welfare Cadillac" song. And those men and women who want to work and be self-reliant surely will be embittered when they see lazy individuals assured a permanent handout existence at taxpayer expense.

Traditionally, the American way has been for a man to work in order to make money. Now, the Nixon administration

comes along and promises money without work. Certainly, that's not reform. On the contrary, the Family Assistance Plan would undermine the work ethic fundamental to the well-being of this nation. It would turn the loafers, under-achievers and plain irresponsible people into a privileged class. That is why it is so important that the Family Assistance Plan be defeated.

Tips For Gardeners
From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

The month of preparation for outdoor planting: "The February sunshine steeps your boughs and tints the buds and swells the leaves within" William Cullen Bryant
Don't delay longer those tasks that could have been done in January and that must be done now if your garden is not to suffer.

Continue to check regularly all bulbs that are being stored. Remove any that show signs of rot promptly, or cut out the decayed part and dust the cut surfaces with sulphur.

If you have cold frames, they require very careful attention now. They can be put to good use now for raising plants of vegetables and flowers that will be needed for setting in the open ground later. Among these are tomatoes, peppers, onions, dahlias, verbenas, salvia, penurias, snapdragon, aster, calendulas and many others.

Avoid ventilating in such a way that cold sweeping winds enter the frame. Make sure the sack is closed and the plants protected against excessively low night temperature. Try to maintain conditions that duplicate the kind of good spring growing weather - ventilate freely in mild weather.

The dividing and replanting of perennials that are to be given this treatment should be done before new growth has made much headway.

Apply fertilizer to perennials, including bulbs that have been planted a year or more and new growth appears above the ground. Scatter the fertilizer evenly and, except in grassed areas, cultivate it shallowly into the surface. Apply fertilizer to shrubs, trees and evergreens, but delay fertilizer for azalae and camellias until they are through blooming.

The remarking of perennial borders should be given attention before new growth gets underway.

Dormant sprays should be used now if this has been neglected.

Also, I notice aphids are appearing on live oak leaves. Use a spray suitable for this insect.

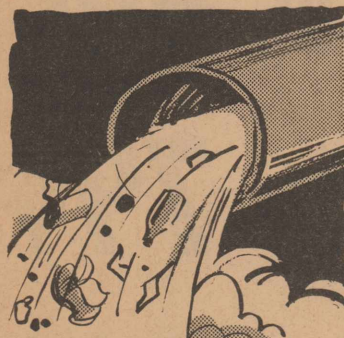

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Clean Water Laws

One-and-a-half centuries ago, the poet Byron wrote: "Till taught by pain, men really know not what good water's worth."
 Today, taught by the pain of pollution in a thousand lakes and streams, we are becoming acutely aware of what good water's worth. Clean water laws are being enacted with new urgency and enforced with new vigor.



Yet, serious objections may be raised by those who are affected adversely. How do the courts look upon such objections?

To begin with, there are indeed limits as to how far the government can go in fighting pollution. Take this case:

A state water commission tried to halt the discharge of sewage into a certain river. But the sewage was being discharged so far from the nearest community, under such carefully controlled conditions, that the chance of any harm to public health was almost nil.

Under these circumstances, a court ruled that the water commission was overstepping its authority. The court felt that even in the name of clean water, there has to be some reasonable basis for government action.

Nevertheless, the vast majority of clean water laws have been upheld, even when they impose real hardship on a particular city, a particular industry, or a particular individual.

Consider the case of a factory owner who had been discharging raw pollutants into a local brook. When a new law banned this practice, he took the matter to court.

"I don't challenge the law itself," he said. "But the fact is that because of the ban, my factory is suddenly worth about \$100,000 less than it was before. Why shouldn't the government reimburse me for that loss? Otherwise, this is taking private property without compensation, which is unconstitutional."

However, the court denied his claim, saying this was not a "taking" in the constitutional sense.

"The design is not to take property for public use," said the court. "It is to regulate the use of property so as to protect the common right of all citizens."

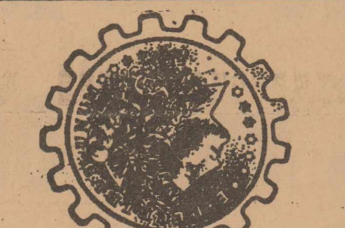

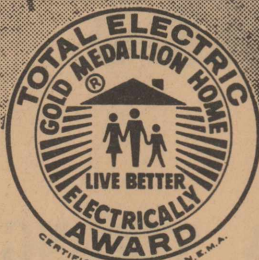
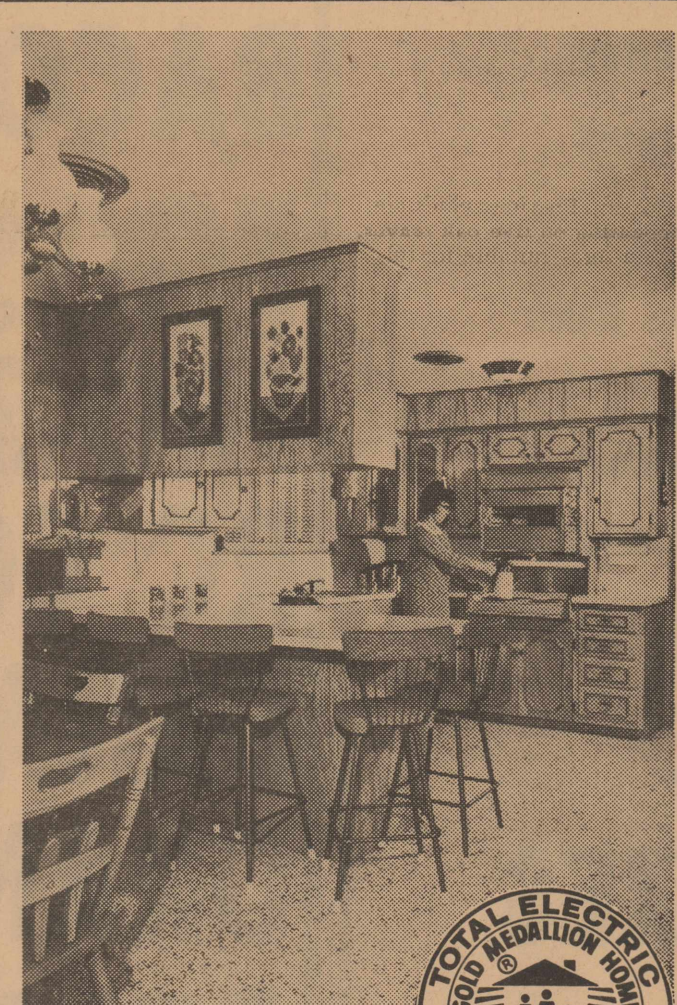
