Think of it! In the old neighbor a note or sent a greeting card, posted it at the local post office, the local postal employee retrived it from the box, cancelled the postage and stuck it in the proper post office box. Probably this all happened in the space of a few hours time.

Now, if you post a piece of local mail on Saturday, a big postal van picks it up and dumps it in with the rest of the mail, it travels to the sorting center in San Angelo, if it has city on it and no return address it goes on a trip to the dead letter office, if not and you do have a return address, it is returned to the sender. Anyway you look at it, it gets quite a trip for a 6¢ stamp and accomplishes nothing. On the other hand, if you have written "Ozona, Texas," plus zip and return address, it will be handled in San Angelo and sent back to the addressee in Ozona by at least Monday or Tuesday of the following week. So in the long run, you would get your local mail delivered much faster if you just waited until Monday and mailed it inside the post office.


Since I don't particularly care about my local mailings making a hundred and sixty some odd round trip over the weekend, I shall make it a point to post local mail during the week,

Local postal patrons are asked to use "Ozona" instead of "City" on all mail, especially that mailed during the weekend.

According to a directive from the local post office "Our mail is not worked in Ozona on weekends. Mail deposited in the local box will go into San Angelo on weekends if this mail just has City on it and no return address. San Angelo does not know where to return the mail."

Patrons are also asked to use the zip-code on all mailings and return address. Mail which is undeliverable is sent to the dead letter office, so local patrons are warned to use name of town and return address regardless of whether it is local mail mailed locally or out of town mail.


Seek Donations For Sagging Welfare Fund

The Crockett County Welfare Fund, which is handled through the Sheriff's office, is low on funds and donations are being solicited. The fund, which is used for emergencies, depends entirely on donations from local organizations and individuals.

Last year 175 persons were helped by the fund at a cost of \$1.83 per person. For years the fund has been used to help those who were stranded in down while traveling to a distant state for work, juveniles who have run away from home, the ill and elderly have been

served by the fund. A total of \$420.79 was used to help transients last year. Broken down \$144.03 went for gasoline; \$89.97 lodging for families stranded here; \$14.46, groceries; \$12.08, meals; and \$60.25 transportation for the ill and run-away children.

Those wishing to donate to the fund may do so at the Sheriff's office or at the Ozona National Bank. The fund has dwindled to \$100.

BEWARE OF REPORTING ON CHINA

Some of the media have done a complete flip on Red China after the U.S. ping-pong players were let in. Time magazine heralded the event as a "Whole New Game," while Newsweek headlined it: "A New Game Begins." Meanwhile, back at the ranch in Washington, diplomats are doing their best to avoid any reference to "Red China," or "Communist China," or even "Mainland China." They now insist on using the official Communist terminology: "The People's Republic of China," despite the fact that the People's Daily in Peking is keeping up its vicious headline attacks on the U.S.A.

Some of the worst reporting was done, not by the ping-pong players, but by Life magazine's Hong Kong Bureau Chief, John Saar. Some of the best reporting was done by the New York Times' correspondent, Tillman Durdin. For neophytes, some of the tabletennis squad did quite well in sizing up the situation.

Reported Life's Bureau Chief: "The Chinese are obviously healthy... They seemed very content within themselves, content with their lot and sure of themselves, knowing where they are going." He went on to say that there is "absolutely no misery, no hunger" in Communist China.

The Gallup Poll had better fold up, when Life magazine has a man who can come to such detail edconclusions without the need to take any polls or talk to anyone but government stooges. He learned so much about 24 percent of the earth's population in just a few days! Gallup had better quit.

Contrast the sweeping testimony of Life's Hong Kong Bureau Chief with that of 17-year old Olga Soltesz, a ping-pong player from Orlando, Florida: "It is very primitive... Even a big city like Peking wasn't anything like Orlando...There were no cars, only a few

buses, and everybody rode bicycles." Tillman Durdin, the New York Times reporter visited a nursery in Shanghai and reported that the 5year olds were singing: "We unite and struggle in Asia, Africa and Latin America; people join to defeat the U.S. aggressors and their running dogs." The children stay in the nursery all day while their parents work. Many stay there all the time, he reported, except for a visit home on weekends.

At one point in the discussions with Red China's Chou-En-lai, the Premier asked the table-tennis team: "Now criticize our country." But no one would. There was not one American to ask why Chou's government had never freed the 345 American POW's after the Korean War, or whether any of them are still alive. There was no one willing to ask about the Four Freedoms and when Chou and his regime would finally start extending them to the 750 million Chinese people. All our table-tennis players saw was the smile on the face of the tiger.

NO LICENSE TO LIE

CBS Television has come under strong attack from many quarters for its controversial "documentary," "The Selling of the Pentagon.

Vice President Agnew described the program as "a subtle but vicious broadside against the nation's defense establishment."

Congressman F. Edward Hebert, Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, said it was the "greatest disservice to the military" that he had ever seen on television.

Barron's, the financial weekly published by Dow-Jones, charged that "The Selling of the Pentagon" was just one of several examples of misleading and dishonest "documentaries" aired by CBS. Barron's concluded that CBS had forfeited its right to use the nation's airwaves, and it suggested that CBS-owned television stations be challenged when they applied for license

The most thorough analysis of "The Selling of the Pentagon" that we have seen is one made by Accuracy in Media. (AIM) a non-partisan, non-profit organization devoted to promotion of accuracy in news reporting. AIM has asked CBS to explain some 23 specific flaws that it found in "The Selling of the Pentagon." The most serious of these related to the creation of "synthetic" quotations by means of electronic editing. CBS took sentences and parts of sentences that were widely separated, and it put them together to make what appeared to the viewers to be a bonafide quotation. CBS deliberately distorted what the machinery problems may be, source for sales and repair speakers actually said, and in doing so, it portrayed them in an you can consult the Bad- of all types of magnetos. unfavorable light.

N'west Crockett Field Producer From Fusselman

Fusselman production was opened in the Encontrado (Pennsylvanian and Strawn) field of Crockett County with the completion of J. C. Barnes, Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-C Harris, 15 miles northeast of Iraan.

It was finaled to pump 85 barrels of oil, gravity unreported, plus 150 barrels of water with gas-oil ratio 320-1 through perforations at 8,821-36 feet which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons.

Drilled to 9,365 feet, it tested unsuccessfully through Ellenburger perforations at 9, 291-327 feet which have been blocked off. Casing (51/2inch) was set at 9,360 feet. It was plugged back to 9, 331 feet with a bridge plug set at 9.100 feet.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of 11-3-

The field has two Pennsylvanian detrital and two Strawn wells.

The field opener, King Resources Co. 

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

This is the month you can almost see spring-to-summer transition in your garden. Early bulbs and shrubs have bloomed. Later varieties are coming into flower. Many sh shrubs are showing new shoots to bloom later in summer.

Pinch back annuals to stop terminal growth, making bushier plants and encourage formation of more flower heads Also pinching out tip buds extends the flowering period.

Coleus are grown for their colorful leaves. Pinching out the bloom spike just above the first two leaves promotes stockiness and prevents the plant from going to seed.

Annuals that respond to pinching back tips are, petunia zinnia, claendula, phlox, pinks, snap dragon, verbena and agratum. Don't pinch back main stem of cockscomb, poppy or strawflower. Seedling dahlias may be pinched back until August 1 to induce fall

with an application of 5-10-10 or 8-8-8 commercial fertilizer to stimulate plants, causing full clusters of blooms during the summer. Use about three cups to a large mature plant, 1 cup to smaller newly set plants. Work fertilizer into soil and water well. Soak soil once a week if there is no rainfall. This is one of the most colorful and durable plants for our area, blooming most of the summer. Everyone should plant a group or at

least one in their landscape. Spring-planted deciduous trees and shrubs, including fruit trees, need additional top pruning now if new shoots appear weak or plants show no sign of growth. You should tip prune each branch a few inches. retaining natural form of plant. This equalizes root-top balance.

Plant zinnias, marigolds, salvia, portulaca and periwinkle for heavy bloom during the hot months, also dahlias for fall bloom. Apply mulches to conserve moisture in flower-

If climbing roses, that bloom only once a year, have finished blooming, prune now and remove all dead limbs.

There is still plenty of time to plant gladiola bulbs for early summer blooms. It takes about 6 weeks for them to bloom after planting. Watch for drive, collecting over \$200 insects on shrubs and plants. If not successful with a strong spray of water to wash them off. use an insect spray.

WASHINGTON **NEWS LETTER**

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

Spearheaded by an array of crackpots and militants, a mass demonstration in Washington is planned for two weeks, weeks, beginning on April 24.

The big march was first disclosed at a news conference by David Dellinger, who was convicted with the Chicago 7, and Sidney Peck, a onetime Communist party official. Sponsors listed included the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice and the National Peace Action Coalition, along with several others that were lined up for the big push.

Announced purpose of the march is to plug for a \$6,500 a year guaranteed annual income for every family of four; freedom for all "polical prisoners," and immediate unconditional withdrawal of U. S. Forces from Vietnam.

Incidentally, the National Peace Action Coalition is an offshoot of the Socialist Workers Party, which has been officially cited as a Communist front. In addition, the pro-Communist Young Socialist Alliance is throwing its weight behind the outburst.

Called the "Spring Offensive" the Washington blowout was hatched originally as a pro-Communist meeting in Stockholm last November, at which David Dellinger was a speaker.

It is of interest to note

that four out of the five of the announced national coordinators have known affiliations with revolutionary Communist organizations.

Indications are the convergence will include the biggest aggregation of kooks, ex-convicts, hooligans, extremists, subversives and anarchists ever assembled at one time and place in this country.

There is every reason to believe the antiwar angle is being used as a gimmick designed to such in some of the more naive war protesters.

Rather, it is to be a concerted pro-Communist effort to mold a revolutionary movement in America, sprinkled with plenty of hate-America propagan-

The case for censorship of the pornography now sweeping across America in a filthy tide has been ably stated by Irving Kristol, editor of "The Public Interest" journal and professor of urban values at New York University.

In a recent essay published in the "Chicago Tribune," Prof. Kristol asserts -- and right- acy. ly so--that "if you care for the quality of life in our Amerion self-expression. It has a can democracy, then you have to be for censorship.

This is a point of view currently unfashionable in liberal circles, and Prof. Kristol is to be commended for taking a principled stand.

In explaining his position, Prof. Kristol points out that in the United States censorship "has to all intents and purposes ceased to exist." The the traffic. The U. S. Supfederal courts have lowered virtually all the legal barriers to the distribution and showing cisions, gave the pornographers -- smut-peddlers -- a green of pornographic material.

Civil libertarians of the past, he says, wanted freedom for serious literary works that sus on the subject of printed and filmed filth, emphasizing were not wholly in keeping with public standards. "They got that, of course," he notes. But they have also got a world in which homosexual rape takes place on the stage, in which the public flocks during lunch hours to witness varieties of professional fornication, in which Times Square in New York City has become little more than a hideous market for the sale and distribution of printed filth that pand ders to all known perversions.

It is this condition that makes clear the need for censorship in some form. "We are, after all, " as Prof. Kristol notes, not dealing with one passing incident -- one book, or one play, or one movie.
We are dealing with a general tendency that is suffusing our entire culture."

In city after city, one finds stores that sell pornographic books, magazines, films and so-called "novelties" that deprive people of their specific human qualities, that have the effect of degrading human beings. This enormous traffic in filth is a gold mine for the

The re-opening of Ellenburger oil production was indicated in the Buckhorn (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County with the flowing of new oil along with load at Tamarack Petroleum Co., Inc., Midland, No. 2-16 Smith, deepening operation and for-mer gas producer 3/8 mile northeast of the former Ellenburger oil opener, which was recompleted as a gas well, and $13\frac{1}{2}$ miles northeast of

recovering 44 barrels of load and two barrels of load oil. At the end of the test it was making fluid, 50 per cent new oil, at the hourly rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ barrels.
