Texans will go to the polls next Tuesday to vote for or against four more proposed amendments to the State Constitution. I say four more, because there have already been 331 amendments proposed to the voters over the years. It has become an annual patch job and surely the Constitution has been amended so much and so often that it's coming apart at the seams.

Amendment Number 1 is a sham, nothing more nor less. It is strictly a political move to cover up the current stock fraud scandal. The legislature already has the authority and responsibility to establish ethics and standards of conduct under existing statutes. It is apparent that the house leadership only hopes to stall further investigation by passing the buck of policing itself in asking Texans to approve an "ethics" Commission.

The ethics commission, if created can only recommend its findings to the legislature for their veto or approval. It would have no power of enforcement. And this state doesn't need a powerless committee to watch over our state government. Responsible voters can manage that quite well at the polls.

However, that is by no means all that is wrong with this particular amendment. The big hypocrisy in this proposed amendment is that in addition to the phony commission, its primary purpose is simply to give the legislature a pay raise. The voters have refused to allow the legislative body control over their own salaries several times in the past, the last time in 1969. The pay raise has been neatly tucked into the wording of the proposal, so that you would hardly notice it. So this is sheer trickery and an insult to the intelligence of Texas voters.

As for proposal Number 2, I thought all the legislature did was propose amendments and raise taxes at any session, regular or called. If they are given permission to propose amendments at will, all Texas voters will be doing is voting for or against amendments and the legislators will be too busy proposing to ever accomplish anything concrete.

And then there is proposed amendment No. 3, lifting the ceiling on welfare payments. If this proposal passes, we should be able to increase the population of Texas considerably with the influx of professional welfare recipients.

As for proposal number 4, passage of this amendment would permit cities and towns to pass on to the state a burden which is rightfully theirs. Why increase the revenue of the State when it is already experiencing financial difficulty and taxation problems which it doesn't seem to be able to solve.

I can't remember when I've voted "for" a proposed amendment to the State Constitution, and it looks like I won't be changing my habits any for this election.

4 Amendments Up For Vote In Election Tuesday

Ozonan's will go to the polls next Tuesday to vote on four constitutional amendments to the state constitution. Voters will cast ballots in the precinct in which they reside.

Polling places in town include the Civic Center for Precinct 3 voters, the high school for voters who live in Precinct 2, the courthouse for Precinct 1 voters and the Ozona Primary School cafeteria for Precinct 4 voters.

Proposal Number one asks voters to vote for or against the constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules for members of the Legislature, state officers and legislative officers and to recommend compensation, that is raises in salaries, for members of the Legislature and Lieutenant Governor, to the Legislative body itself, as well as recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process.

Proposal number two, provides that the legislature may propose an amendment to the constitution at any session of the Legislature.

Number 3 has to do with removing the limitation on how much the state can spend on welfare.

Proposal Number four asks voters to vote for or against authorization of the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum.

Voters are asked to vote for or against the proposed amendments by placing an X in the box beside the statement indicating the way they wish to vote.

Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. Tuesday, May 18, and close at 7:00 p.m.

Weekend Mail Distribution Plan Clarified

To clarify a misunderstanding concerning weekend mailings in the Ozona post office arising out of an article submitted for publication in last week's Stockman, Postmaster Floyd Hokit this week issued a statement of correction.

"Last week's article stated that Ozona mail deposited in local box will go into San Angelo on weekends," Hokit said.

"This should have read 'Local mail deposited in the out-of-town box on weekends will go into San Angelo.'"

The postmaster explained that the contract mail carrier does not have a key to the outside local box and that only mail in the out-of-town box is picked up on weekends when mail is not being processed in the local office. If mail destined for local delivery is mistakenly placed in the out-of-town box, it will be picked up and taken to San Angelo for processing. If the mail has only "City" and not Ozona, Texas, and no return address, it will be sent to the dead letter office. Mr. Hokit explained. Mail placed in the local box over the weekend will remain here and be processed locally.

Higher Postage Rates In Effect Monday May 16

Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced this week that new postage rates will go into effect May 16, 1971.

The first class rate will be increased from 6¢ to 8¢ an ounce or fraction for pieces weighing 12 ounces or less. Pieces weighing over 12 ounces are subject to the priority mail (heavy pieces) rates.

The rate for postal cards will be increased to 6¢ each and airmail cards will be 9¢.

Air mail will be increased from 10¢ to 11¢ per ounce or fraction, over 8 ounces will be subject to priority rates.

All second and third class mail, plus some fourth class rates will be increased. Special delivery and registered mail costs will also go up.

SHOULD WE UNILATERALLY DISARM?

Some people will never be content until we disarm completely, throwing ourselves on the mercy of Moscow and Peking. But does anyone know who will be the leaders in the Kremlin a few years from now? Can anyone guarantee they will not try to take over the world if we abandon the role that history has thrust upon us, the role of leader of the Free World?

The present Kremlin leadership is bad enough. In the words of Senator Henry Jackson (D-Wash.): "I regard the Soviet Union as an opportunistic hotel burglar who walks down the corridors trying all the door handles to see which door is open."

In the past we have always been able to count on our ability to defend ourselves against attack. Today however, we are less and less able to defend ourselves. General Arthur Trudeau warned some years ago that we are "the world's greatest nuclear nudist colony." Dr. Edward Teller urged six years ago that we should put "the greatest possible stress" on a defensive missile system. Yet we have none.

General Curtis LeMay, as Air Force Chief of Staff, urged that we develop a 100-megaton nuclear weapon because Russia already has it, and that we need it as a deterrent against aggression. But we have failed to keep up with the Soviet Union, and she can now destroy more than 95 percent of our nuclear power in one all-out attack.

General Thomas Power, former head of the Strategic Air Command, feared before his death a few months ago that the United States would be subject to a "yield-or-else" ultimatum in the next few years if we let Moscow continue to get further ahead of us in the nuclear field. Now General LeMay has come out with the same prediction. LeMay predicted recently that "within 18 months" Russia will serve a "capitulation-or-else" ultimatum to the United States, and that President Nixon will have no choice but to succumb to Soviet demands.

Russia already has "the finest strategic weapons system in the world," said LeMay, while "we have become a second-rate power." It is wrong, he said, to believe we have a strong national defense system. "Like it or not," he said, "we are at war with the Communists—and we'd better do something about it fast, before it's too late."

The oceans used to protect us, but now they are full of subs with nuclear missiles. At a moment's notice the skies can be even more deadly. We had better heed the experts. Our only security is a strong defense.

PORNOGRAPHY AND THE PRESIDENT'S COMMISSION

When President Johnson wanted to set up a commission to study pornography a few years ago, the American Civil Liberties Union was opposed to it. The President set it up anyway, but the powerful ACLU took the Commission over. It used Commission funds to hire an executive of the ACLU as its chief counsel, Charles Keating, the only member on the Commission appointed by President Nixon, said putting an ACLU lawyer in charge was like "putting a burglar in charge of the jewels," since the ACLU had such a long record of opposing laws that curbed obscenity.

The results of the Commission were predictable: it called for the repeal of most of our existing laws against obscenity, arguing that pornography did not cause criminal behavior.

To sit back complacently and reason that smutty literature has its place is to condone national suicide. As columnist James Kilpatrick pointed out: "The heart and soul of this racket is not the grown-up sucker. It is the curious child..."

Psychiatrists and police officials point to the results: rebellion against authority; venereal disease; illegitimate children; the shattered lives of unwed parents; an expanding population of sick perverts; a philosophy of self-indulgence that condones adultery, destroys the home, and threatens our whole society.

For the damaging results of salacious literature you need only look to the judges manning the juvenile courts of our nation. They pointed out at their national conference how pornography has had such a profound effect on our society that it is changing the very nature of juvenile delinquency. Said the chief psychiatrist of the County Court in Philadelphia: "The greatest single cause of sexual immorality in adolescents is pornography." Inspector Herbert Case of the Detroit Police Department said he has never yet seen a sex murder case where obscene literature was not involved. So testify the other experts, right on down the line. Let's find out how bad the smut is in our area and see what we can do about cleaning it up.

TAXPAYERS OPERATING IN THE BLACK

To the average taxpayer, May 10 is a "red-letter" day, or rather, the day he gets out of the red ink as far as paying taxes are concerned. That is the day Mr. Average Taxpayer starts working for himself, says the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, providing he has worked steadily since January 1 and given every dollar to the government: federal, state and local.

We have all been spending some of our hard-earned cash on food and other essentials since January 1, so we should look at it on a daily basis: the average wage-earner works more than one-third of every eight-hour day — two hours and 51 minutes, to be exact — before his daily income covers his tax bite.

Unless we stop demanding more services of government, we are in danger of losing half of our income to the Infernal Revenue, pricing our products out of the market, and bringing the wheels of industry to a stop. As it is now, the greatest single cause of inflation is higher taxes.

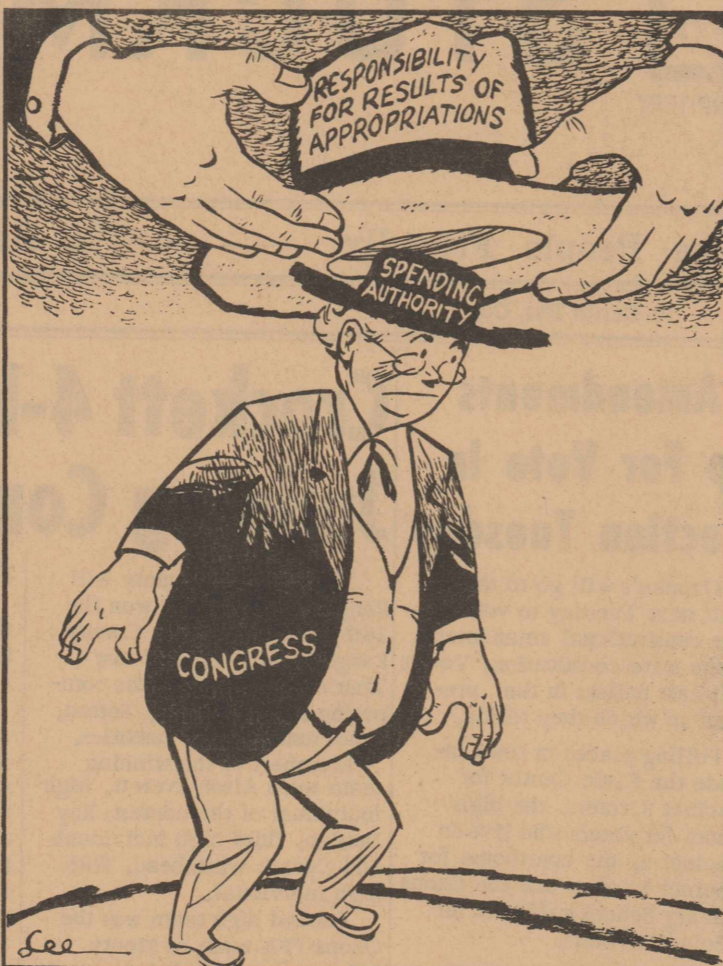

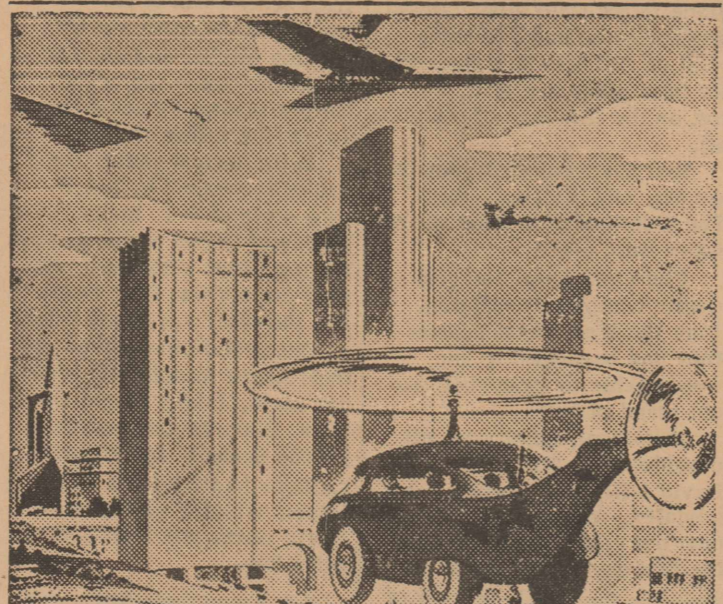

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THE RED APPLE

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

The Washington war protest turned out to be a flop when thousands of invading radicals who tried to block all traffic into the city on May 3 were confronted by 3,000 policemen and 6,000 troops who had been called in to help maintain order. Several thousand protesters were hauled off to jail.

Rennie Davis, the notorious radical who was convicted with the Chicago Seven, along with two of his Chicago Seven cohorts, directed the demonstrations. Now out on appeal bonds, these three and a number of others are likely to be indicted on felony counts growing out of their Washington protest activities.

Narcotic users were in abundance among the throng of protesters. It was reported that more than 1,000 of them were admitted to local hospitals for treatment due to over-use of drugs.

Washington breathed a sigh of relief when the mobsters left the city. Serious property damage and probable violence were prevented by the mass arrests. It was a big plus for police efficiency.

Can an in-take of chemical compounds cause sheep to produce more wool? The Soviets claim they have developed a concoction which promises to do just that. In the April, 1971, issue of SOVIET LIFE is the following:

"Synthetic furs and wool substitutes are excellent, but the natural varieties are still much in demand. Soviet Specialists have a new method for getting sheep to produce more wool. Two or three grams of methionine, a sulphur containing amino acid, are added to sheep rations each day. The result is promising. The wool fibers grow longer by as much as 22%, which boosts the total wool yield 15-20%."

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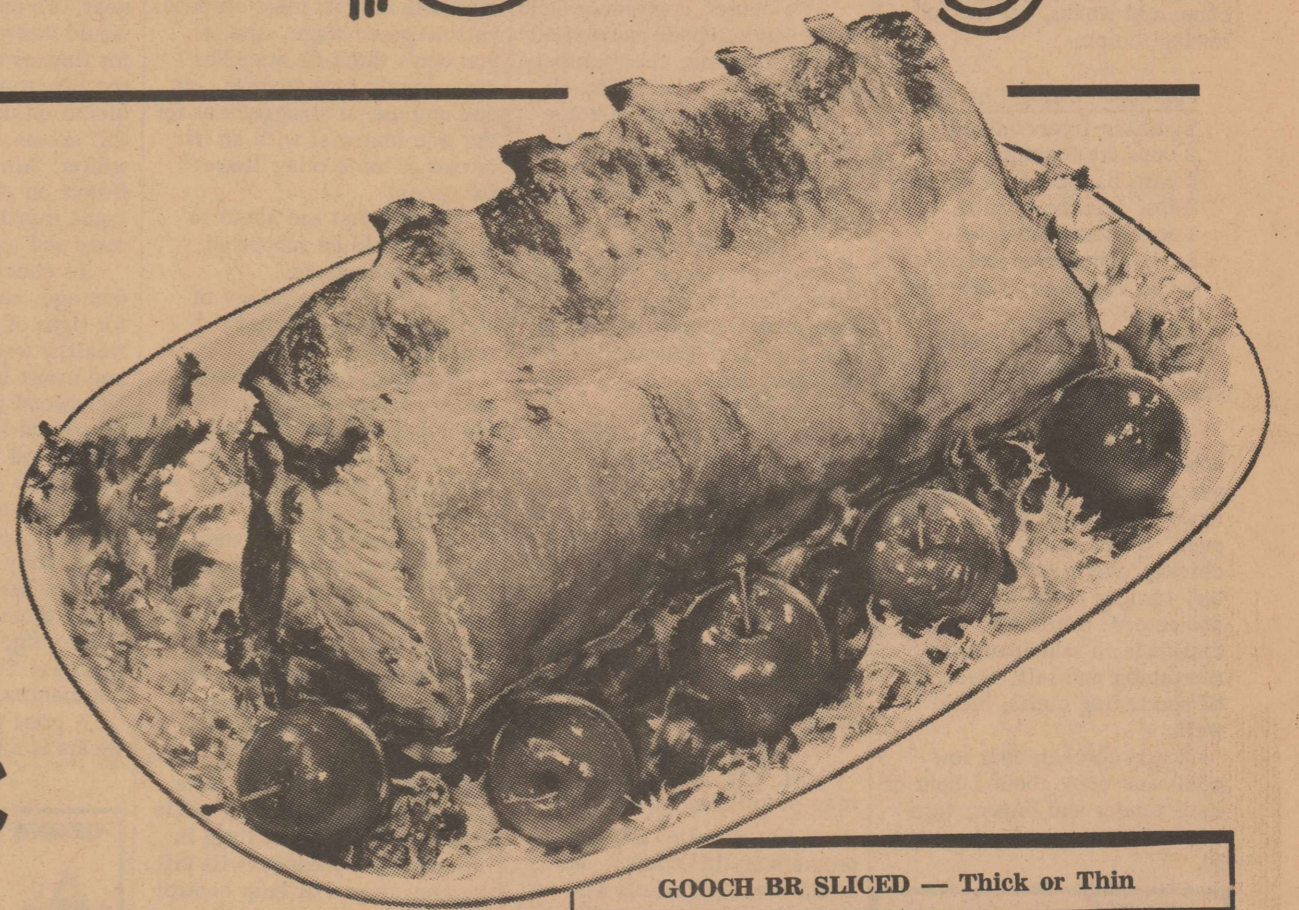

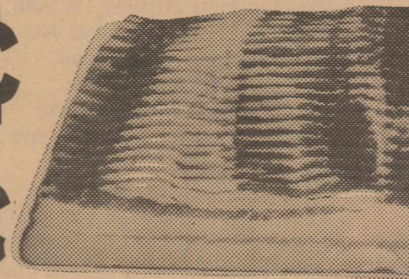

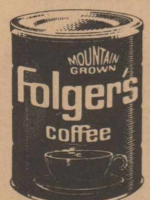

Flavored Festive Chicken

- 2 broiler-fryers halved
- 2 cups dry Sauterne
- 2 plgs bacon-onion dip mix
- 2 tbs, Worcestershire
- 1 teas, lemon-pepper
- 1 teas, barbecue spice
- 1/2 cup vegetable shortening
- 1/2 teas, salt

Prepare chickens. Wash and halve, removing the back bone and breast gristle on each

Combine wine, dip mix, Worcestershire, lemon-pepper and spice. Place chicken in container and pour marinade over. Cover and marinate chicken overnight in refrigerator, turning a few times. Drain and reserve marinade. Place marinade in saucepan with shortening and salt. Heat until shortening melts; blend well.

Place chicken over low coals and cook about 1 hour or until tender and brown, turning and basting quite frequently.

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

It seems only a few days ago that our area was a drab winter brown and now the whole countryside is a beautiful refreshing green. The mesquite is at its most colorful yellow-green stage, and if you don't think its branches are a lovely lacy texture, cut one and use in arrangement for the line material with an iris or two or some other flower for accent.

Gladoli that are about to bloom should be supported with a strong stake.

Be sure to give plenty of water to plants that have recently been set out.

Continue to spray roses at weekly intervals to prevent blackspot and mildew and to control insects. Pyracantha and loquat also have aphids present I have noticed.

There have been several inquiries on how to control thrip (small insects that scrape and rasp). They scar and streak foliage and can deform buds so that flowers never open. Now they are attacking the roses and iris especially. Some authorities say nothing but a hammer will kill them, while other companies list thrip in insects their products will kill. Perhaps they will help control the tiny bugs anyway. Before buying, check the label to see if thrips are included.

Quoting from a U. S. Department of Agriculture Bulletin No. 25, given to me by Mr. Pete Jacoby, "No fully satisfactory control is available because of the daily influx of things to the rapidly expanding flowers, which cannot be kept adequately covered with an insecticide. The combination spray or the demithoate spray applied to flowers and buds every 2 or 3 days

will destroy many thrips as they alight on flowers. Cheese-cloth cages or bags around prized blooms may protect them from damage."

Some of the shrubs, trees and vines are just now showing where the extent of the severe freezes and hair were damaged. These plants form their flower buds during June and July for the following year. To prune after this time would destroy all possibility for flowers next year. It's too late to prune shrubs that bloom on new wood produced this season. Wait until next winter. Among those that flower on annual wood are crepe myrtle, hybrid tea roses and abetice.

To check for cold or hail damage, scratch bark and look for signs of life underneath. Healthy wood will be green and moist beneath the bark. Deadwood is brown, tan, or black and looks dry. Cut back dead wood to live growth or to healthy side shoots just beginning to emerge down the stem. Severely damaged plants may take two seasons to grow back to normal. Among those hit hard are gardenia, fig, pittosporum, Japanese Yew (Eallicarpa), pyracantha, rose and ligustrum.

A good pair of pruning shears is a wise investment. --0--
