Spot wasn't much good for anything. He would never have won a blue ribbon at a dog show, he was an inveterate thief and a coward to boot. He would never have saved the family jewels, but the girls raised him on a bottle and loved him like a baby. His mother was killed before he had his eyes open and since he was the runt of the litter, it's amazing that they managed to keep him alive. However, keep him alive they did until he fell victim to the poisoner. I don't think any kind of puppy could take Spot's place in Jennifer and Jacinda Marley's hearts at the moment, but I do think a new wiggly, waggly puppy would help them dry their tears. Anyone who has a litter of short-haired mutts or is expecting one might give the girls a call.

I might add, if you have a pet, it might pay to keep him close at home. Spot's death was at least the third pet poisoning I've heard of in the past two days.

We have been asked by the State Department of Health to remind parents and students of the recently passed legislation which makes it mandatory for all school children entering elementary or secondary school to be immunized against specific diseases.

This new law applies to all students attending public, private, or parochial schools, for example: kindergartens associated with elementary schools, elementary or secondary schools, academies, colleges, universities, and schools for the blind, deaf, mentally ill and mentally retarded.

The six diseases students must be immunized against include diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella, and smallpox.

As you can see, this takes in all youngsters of school age from kindergarten through college. I would assume that most children have had most of the immunizations. However, students will be allowed to enter fall and summer semesters, 1971, with the provision that their immunizations are...

**Sixty-Five Driver Ed Class Starting Tests**

Sixty-five Ozona youngsters wound up classroom work for drivers education Tuesday morning and took the written part of the state drivers test Tuesday afternoon.

Coach Jim Williams was the classroom instructor this year and will be assisted by Walter Spiller in the driving instruction. The driving part of the program started yesterday with Williams taking 32 drivers and Spiller taking 32. Each youngster must have 12 hours of driving and observing before taking the state test for a provisional license. Coach Williams said he expects the session to end in mid July with driving sessions scheduled for 6:30 a. m. and 6:30 p. m. each week day.

**Ozona Gets .89 Inch Moisture In Weekend Falls**

A three-day rainy period over the weekend dented the drought situation somewhat and left .89 of an inch of moisture on the city.

Some areas in the north part of the county reported up to 2 inches for the same period while south of Ozona up to an inch and a half was recorded.

The rain was by no means general and the western part of the county received hardly any or no rain at all over the weekend. Heavier rains fell east toward Sonora.

Friday night's rain shower amounted to .34 of an inch in a slow falling rain. Saturday showers amounting to .52 of an inch fell and early Sunday .03 was recorded before skies cleared.

The rainfall brought the monthly total to 1.07 inches and the yearly total to 6.38.

**Ozona Woman's Death Cause Is Still Mystery**

Mystery surrounds the death of 25-year-old Mrs. Luis Tijerina early Sunday morning in the bedroom of her home. Preliminary autopsy findings ruled out heart attack or brain hemorrhage, but cause of death cannot be determined until lab work has been completed.

Mrs. Tijerina apparently died of natural causes around 6:30 Sunday morning in the bedroom of her home here. Her husband, Luis Tijerina, was awakened by an alarm clock at 6:30 a. m. and at the same time noticed that his wife was making a choking, gasping sound. He tried to awaken her and when he failed to do so, he ran to a neighbor's home to call an ambulance. The ambulance attendant attempted to revive Mrs. Tijerina and failing to do so, rushed her to the Crockett County Hospital where she was dead on arrival.

Her family and friends said she was apparently in the best of health before her sudden collapse.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church with burial in Lima Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mrs. Manuela Fierro Tijerina was born March 12, 1946 in Ozona and was married March 12, 1960, also in Ozona to Luis Tijerina. Survivors include the husband, two daughters Marcella and Aleta Tijerina; a son, Adrian Tijerina, all of the home; eight brothers, three sisters, and her mother, Mrs. Urbano Fierro.

**Five Auto Accidents On Rain Slick Hiways**

Ozona highway patrolmen investigated five accidents in the county over the past week with heavy property damage and at least one serious injury and another hospitalized.

Late last Wednesday night a 1967 Volkswagen driven by Reggie Kerby was totaled when he hit a parked car in front of the Wheeler residence on Ave. I. There were no injuries.

Rain-slick highways were the contributing factor in two wrecks Friday night and two again Sunday.

Around 7:45 Friday night 16 miles north of Ozona on Hwy. 137, Jose Ontiveras of Odessa, driving a 1970 Chevrolet pickup, rounded a curve and lost control, overturning twice and coming to rest on its top. Jose Sanchez, a passenger, also of Odessa, was injured and taken to Crockett County Hospital in a Janes ambulance.

At 11:40 the same night, Joe Crain of Phoenix, Ariz. was driving a wrecker and pulling a tank truck when he lost control on Lancaster Hill about 35 miles west of Ozona on Hwy 290. He ran into the rock wall and both vehicles overturned. Crain was seriously injured and was transferred to a San Angelo hospital after being hospitalized in Iran. Both trucks were totaled.

At 12:30 Sunday morning David Coffman of Odessa narrowly escaped injury when the Texaco transport he was driving jackknifed in the intersection of Hwy's 137 and 163 as he was turning toward Big Lake on a rain slick highway. There was only minor damage to the truck.

Later the same morning at 1:20 a pickup truck overturned six miles west of Ozona on Hwy 290. David Norwood of Austin was driving the pickup and towing a car when he lost control and the pickup flipped over, causing minor damage but no injury.



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

**Tips For Gardeners**  
From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

With the summer winds and no rain, we are reminded daily there are numerous chores to be done regularly in the garden. We are optimistic enough to believe those showers are still in the offing.


The floribunda roses will beat the heat, for they are well adapted to hot weather. They continue to bloom profusely after the hybrid tea roses begin a dormant period in mid-summer. Floribundas make good long lasting cut flowers. To conserve growth energy, always snip off flower clusters as soon as they fade. I cut back far enough to keep the height I want, and to just above a good five-leaf group. If there is no rainfall, water them every week or ten days.

If weeds have grown so large that pulling them is sure to disturb the roots of plants in your garden, do your weeding in late afternoon, or on a cloudy day. This will give the plants time to repair root damage. Young specimen evergreen trees and shrubs should be pruned or sheared every year if you want them to retain their shape and develop into attractive plants. Between now and July 15, is the best time for this. If allowed to grow unattended for two or three years, evergreens often develop lop-sided and open

spaces, sometimes producing two or more central stems. Those pruned now will set buds around the fresh cuts. These buds will grow and develop new stems and branchlets to help make a dense plant. When your evergreen trees reach the desired height, cut the tops back to keep the trees compact. Pine or needle-leaved evergreen branches should be removed from one-third to one-half to control growth.

If you are interested in gathering plant material for dried arrangements to use in winter or flower show designs, now is the time to begin collecting seed pods of all kinds, grasses and dock which may be gathered in green, light brown and brown stages of its growth. Many flowers may be preserved in several different ways. Hang the dock and grasses up side down to dry naturally. Also zennias may be done the same way and retain their color. One easy and economical method is the use of sand. It should be sifted and dried in the sun or a slow oven for at least twenty-four hours before using. Place about an inch of the sifted dry sand in a cardboard box or baking pan, then arrange flowers with at least an inch between each bloom. Gently sift an inch or two over the material. Daisies, zennias, roses, etc. should be placed face down or face up so sand sifted into crevices will hold the blossoms in shape. --0--


