

SLANTED REPORTING

Some of the media are finding a lot of fault with the way elections are being run in South Vietnam these days, yet the "re-election" of Marshall Tito was reported with a straight face. For example, the Christian Science Monitor reported that everyone "breathed a sigh of relief" when Tito won the latest election in Yugoslavia. There was not much doubt, since there is no free press in Communist Yugoslavia, and the slightest criticism of Tito is considered a crime against the state.

How wise we were to back Tito to the tune of \$2 billion, said the Monitor, lamenting we did not do the same for – you guessed it – Ho Chi Minh! Tito is bad enough, but it is seriously dishonest to compare Tito to ity of rights of any person shall ford, Lubbock. Ho Chi Minh. Tito killed several thousand anti-Communist patriots, but he did not kill 100,000 people indiscriminately like Ho did. Tito did not send out a "Viet Cong" to conquer neighboring countries. Nor is Tito's the Senate. The title is rather regime nearly as bad as the regime in North Vietnam, misleading. The measure which compares with North Korea and Communist China for its savagery.

A TIME OF SHAM AND GIMMICKRY

The late W. R. Inge, dean of St. Paul's cathedral in London, once wrote that the Dark Ages at least had the merit of knowing that they were dark. In our own time, we seem to have great difficulty recognizing or acknowledging ignorance sham and the abandonment of intellectual and moral stand-

Many opinion-makers and leaders today strenuously avoid logic, refuse to examine political proposals in the context of history, and engage in sophistry -- making the worse cause appear the better.

Thus some medical colleges yield to political pressure and admit unqualified students, explaining such admissions in terms of "democratic opportunity." A great religious denomination takes money from the collection plate and sends it to revolutionary terrorists who have engaged in armed insurrection against public authorities, characterizing this as "social justice." Innumerable family counselors and writers discuss marriage as though it were simply a psychic relationship between a man and a wothe survival of the race and the well-being of society as a whole. "Civil rights" in our time are interpreted as pertaining to the rights of the agressor elements in a community, not the rights of the law-abid-

ing majority. It is no exaggeration to say that our institutions are drench ed with sentimentality about the ignorant and the hostile. The tone of our society, within a short span of years, has

degenerated. Discussion of community and national problems is characterized by an almost unprecedented banality. Henry Fairlie, the well-

known British journalist, cited these conditions in a recent essay in Encounter magazine. Conversation, he said, "is increasingly being conducted at one level, in one tone of voice, about so limited a number of subjects that they are in effect, or are made to seem, one. Viet Nam, the Blacks -- the Young: in America, but not only in America, these sometimes seem to be the whole of our range. The false prophets, the apostles of a phony "liberation," must be rejected, or our country will end, as T. S. Eliot once

Tips For Gardeners

Some of the trees and vines that I mentioned last week are beginning to show some color. The tallow, sumac and some oak trees are the first I have noticed. The Boston Ivy which dresses up school buildings and jail walls in the fall will be at its peak of color soon. Also, the Arizona cypress in the front do best here before it gets too yard of the E. F. If you were successful with caladiums last summer, you may save the tubers for another perennials when not too severe year with proper c. re. As the leaves begin to dry up, lift clumps, remove as much soil dry, well ventilated, shady spot for three weeks to cure. After the tubers are dry, remove dead leaves and inspect tubers to be sure they are free of problems. Dust thoroughly with a combination of Captan and Sevin to protect them from insect pests and disease. Pack

the tubers in dry peat moss or vermiculite and pack in a container so they do not touch. Store in a dry place where the temperature will stay as near 60 degrees as possible. Check once in awhile and remove any that may rot.

Sanitation is important to pecans, so help keep down insect and disease problems of pecan trees next year. Prune to remove all dead wood and proken branches. Pick up all branches and twigs from under rees and rake thoroughly. Leaves packed down by rains



He is noted for his ability to handle wild horses. This, he explained, was due to the fact that over a long period of time he was given mare's milk with black pepper to cure a chronic cough. His ability to handle rattlesnakes is legendary and he is convinced that no snake wants to tangle with people. "Crockett County" he said, " is the only county where all the farmers were killed by a bear and the only one," as far as he knows, 'that has an onyx mine."

He has worked on the Todd and Schneemann ranches in Crockett County. He was a friend of Doc Green, writer and humorist and spoke of Wash Forbes, early cowboy known to many in Ozona. An entertaining evening was enjoyed by those present.
