Crockett Historical Committee Honored

Del Rio--Kudos for an outstanding local history preservation program were recently bestowed upon the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, headed by Mrs. R. A. Harrell of Ozona.

At the October 29-30 Annual meeting of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee in Del Rio, 35 county survey committees received the Distinguished Service Award for organizing progressive and well-rounded local history programs during the past year.

Among the rigorous requirements for the Distinguished Service Award are that the local survey committee (1) sponsor at least four official historical markers or spend \$600 for markers during the year, (2) present at least six talks on local history to other civic groups, (3) conduct at least three historical tours in the county, (4) publish a pamphlet, brochure, etc. showing sites of local historical interest, (5) sponsor at least \$100 in investments in the Texas Historical Foundation (private affiliate of the Survey Committee), and publish a county committee newsletter at least quarterly.

Members of the Crockett County Committee attending the annual meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Harrell, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Clayton, Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Childress, Mrs. Fred Hagelstein and Mrs. Lowell Littleton.

Some 450 history buffs from all over the state were present to cover a wide range of historical topics. One of the highlights was a tour of prehistoric Indian pictographs at the Fate Bell Rock Shelter not far from Del Rio.

Among the talks and discussions given was "Archeology in the Amistad Reservoir Area," by Dr. Curtis Tunnell. Dr. Tunnell, Texas State Archeologist, will be remembered by local residents for his work on the Fort Lancaster Project.

General James U. Cross, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department, spoke on the special parks fund as it relates to the acquisition of historic sites, and spoke of additional plans for the development of such sites, which include Fort Lancaster.

Funeral Service Wednesday For Mrs. Joe S. Pierce

Funeral services for Mrs. Joe S. (Gladys) Pierce, 78, were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. from the Ozona United Methodist Church with Rev. John Berkley, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mrs. Pierce died at 6:30 Monday morning in Crockett County Hospital where she had been a patient for several weeks.

Mrs. Pierce was born Gladys Moore in Ashby, Texas April 3, 1893. She was married to Joe S. Pierce, Jr., prominent Crockett county rancher, in Ozona August 15, 1913.

She met Mr. Pierce while visiting with his sister, the late Mrs. Tom Smith. They had been roommates at San Antonio Female College, now Trinity University, and it was a summer romance that led to a later marriage for the couple.

In her 54 years of residence in Ozona, she was active in nearly all phases of community life, a leader in civic, school and church activities throughout her life.

She worked in the PTA in early years, serving that organization as its president. She was president of the Ozona Womens Club, the first affiliated club in Ozona, disbanded a few years ago.

Mrs. Pierce was a lifetime member of the Methodist church and a faithful worker in the local church. She had served as president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, had served on the church's governing board and on many committees, and sang in the church choir for many years. She was a former member of the local Eastern Star chapter.

An avid golfer, Mrs. Pierce was active in promoting the Ozona Country Club and played golf regularly until shortly before her final illness. She was a past president of the Ladies Golf Association and was president of the Ozona Duplicate Bridge Club.

Often called on for civic duty, Mrs. Pierce had served on numerous local boards and committees. She had served on the Civic Center board and the community center board in recent years.

Surviving are one son, Joe S. Pierce, III, and one daughter, Mrs. Dempster Jones, both of Ozona; one brother, W. A. Moore of Bay City; two sisters, Mrs. J. E. Clement and Mrs. George Fullingim, both of Bay City; four grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Coach Sewell says the Lions have a good chance to pick up a district win and that whoever gets the breaks and wants the win the most will more than likely come out with the victory.

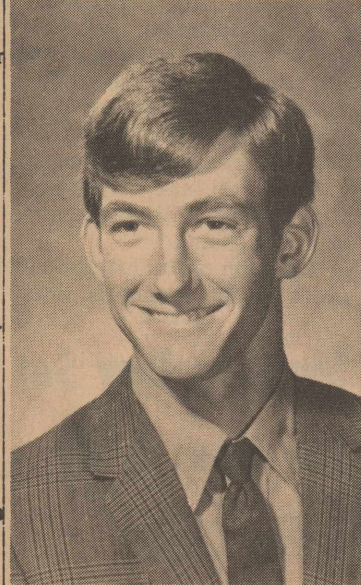
The Lions were badly bruised in the Crane game last week and have three starters out with injuries.

Nearly Half Taxes Collected During October

Crockett County taxpayers took advantage of the three percent discount in October by the drows. As of last Friday, collections totaled \$735,526.82.

Total assessments for the county this year amount to \$1,586,049.35 while total valuations for tax purposes total \$52,221,120.

Taxpayers are assessed at the rate of \$3.11 per one hundred dollar valuation. Of this amount, 32c is collected for the state, 95c for the county, 30c for Farm to Market roads, and \$1.54 for schools.

The three percent discount was allowed in October. Those paying taxes in November will be able to take advantage of a two percent discount and a one percent discount will be offered in December. The total tax bill will be due in January with penalty and interest being charged for those waiting until February to pay taxes.

FREE CHINA BETRAYED

The expulsion of Free China from the United Nations exposes the worthlessness of that organization as an agency of peace and freedom in the world. Red China, which fought U.N. peace-keeping forces on the battlefield in Korea and which sponsored aggressive warfare in Southeast Asia, is rewarded with membership in the international body. The Free Chinese on Taiwan, who have bravely opposed communist tyranny for more than two decades, are treated as outcasts.

In these circumstances, the United States Congress has every reason to withdraw all financial assistance from the United Nations. Indeed, there is strong by-partisan sentiment in Congress to do precisely that. For years, the United States has financed the U. N. while the organization worked against American interests and the cause of freedom. Now is the time to take decisive action. Free nations throughout the world should know that the American people do not countenance rewards for aggressor states. While signaling their convictions to other countries Americans also should clearly understand the background of the betrayal of the free Chinese who are allies of the United States.

The Nixon administration must take full blame for the disaster at the U. N. In recent weeks, the Administration had an opportunity to warn the U. N. that it would cut off funds for the organization's operations if a free nation were expelled to make a place for one of the most tyrannical and dangerous governments of modern times. Numerous members of Congress called on President Nixon and urged him to voice such a warning. He did not heed their request -- instead Secretary of State Rogers issued a special statement, announcing that the U. S. would not cut off funds.

The expulsion of Free China has deeper roots than that, however. From the beginning of his administration, Mr. Nixon made it plain that he sought a new "understanding" with Communist China. When he announced his mission to Peking it was apparent that he would seek this understanding at the expense of Free China. The announcement of the mission was de facto recognition of a country responsible for thousands of American deaths in Korea and which still holds Americans captured in that war. It is no wonder, therefore, that Pakistan's ambassador to the U. N., who voted to admit Red China and

expel Free China, said: "I would like to acknowledge that President Nixon's new policy contributed to the victory." This is a true statement worthy to be remembered when Mr. Nixon's presidential record is assessed.

Now, unless the administration changes course, Red China will have a seat on the Security Council as President Nixon suggested. Red China's representatives will be based in New York where they will have abundant opportunities for propaganda and subversion. Can anyone doubt that formal recognition of Red China, with Peking's ambassador stationed in Washington, will be far behind? The status of Free China in American official circles is likely to diminish to that of the shadow representation of such captive nations as Estonia and Latvia.

It is incredible that these developments should take place in an administration once regarded as hard-line anti-communist. It seems unlikely that a liberal Eugene McCarthy or Hubert Humphrey would have dared abandon the Free Chinese as readily as Richard Nixon has abandoned these reliable allies. The real losers in this diplomatic disaster are the American people, for the Red Chinese are determined to humiliate and cripple the United States. President Nixon in recent months has conferred enormous political advantage on Peking. The Chinese Communist regime has achieved a new great power status in the world as the result of Mr. Nixon's abandonment of a containment policy maintained by four presidents.

The American people are likely to pay dearly in blood and national treasure for Mr. Nixon's appeasement of Red China. As for the U. N., it most probably will go the way of the League of Nations after that organization appeased fascist Italy in 1935 by ignoring the plight of Ethiopia.

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club
 By Mrs. Bailey Post

"When chill November's surly blasts made fields and forests bare."
 --Robert Burns

In the southwest this is a busy month. Preparations for the fall planting of trees and shrubs are underway. After the good rains, proceed with basic soil improvement work until frost. When soil is dry enough to fork and turn over, it should be left rough to benefit from winter rains.

There is still fall cleaning that should be completed this month. Clean gutters and drains of fallen leaves that may prevent their functions.

Always there is need to look after bulbs and other plants in storage, to care for equipment.

Make plans to plant your spring flowering bulbs for a colorful display in your landscape.

If your roses have grown tall and leggy, it may protect them from strong winter winds if you cut them back some now.

When selecting new shrubs and trees for your home, become familiar with its growth habits. By learning how large the plant will normally grow, you can avoid planting too close to walks, drives or buildings. This will eliminate frequent pruning to keep them in scale with the space provided.

One of the most brilliant mid-Nov. blooming plants is the scarlet sage or salvia. Plants set out in April bloom

until light frost. Another is the Amaranthus, you may have noticed it in the San Angelo park just west of the bridge on Bearegard. It has been in color since summer. It is recommended to wait until July to plant the seed or plants for the best growth.

Insufficient aeration is caused by too much water. It compacts the soil of houseplants, and encourages the moldy surface growth. Repot plants with fresh soil and cultivate soil surface occasionally with the tines of an old fork. Houseplants fare better without leftover coffee grounds and tea leaves.

Branches of dogwood and other shrubs or trees that have trailed the ground and rooted can be cut off and replanted. Get a ball of dirt if possible. After placing the new plant in its planting hole give it plenty of water.

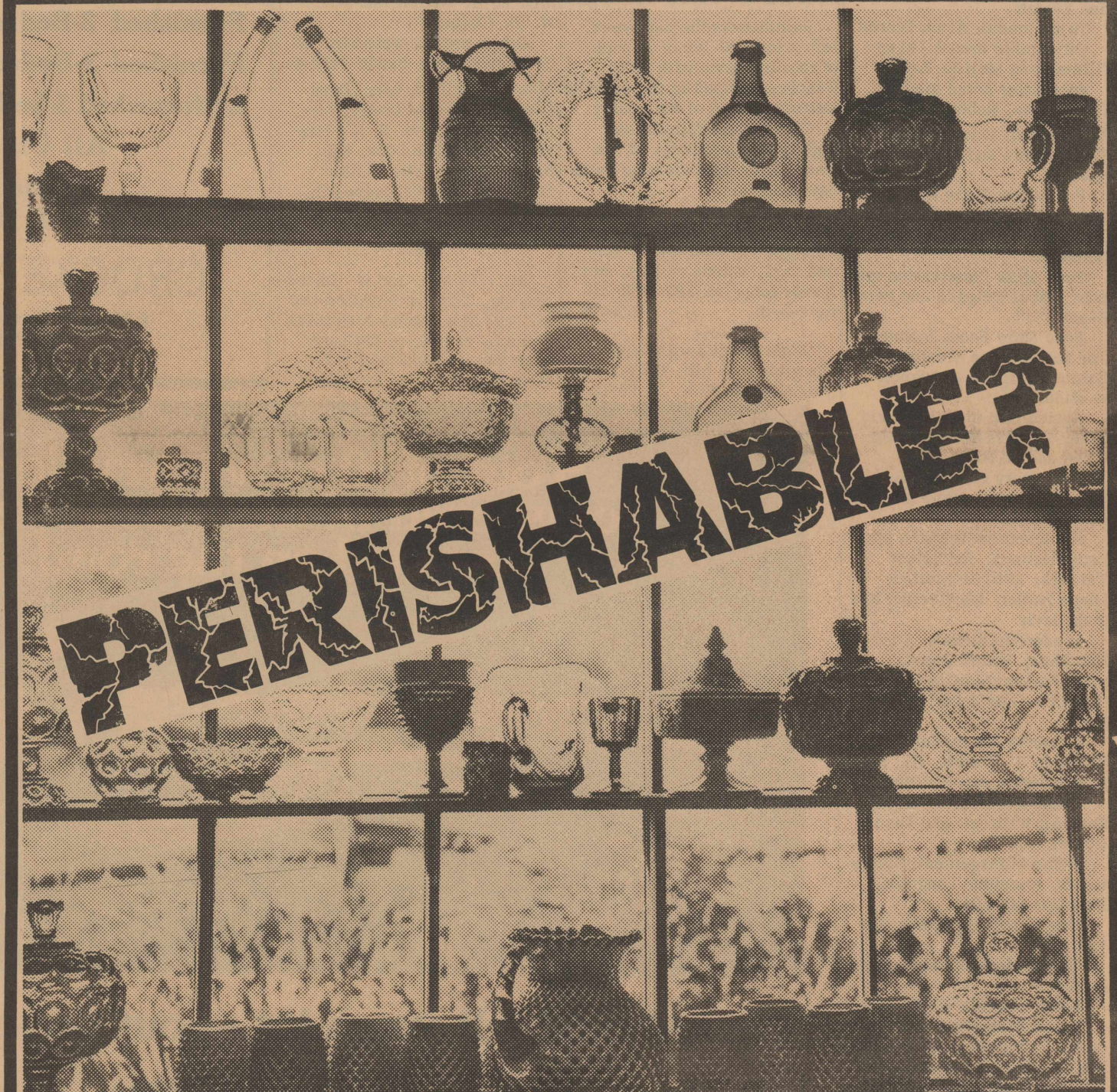

Crockett Well Where Fire Destroyed Rig Is Producer

A new and unidentified pay was indicated one mile east of the one-well Tripoli (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County with the flowing of 60 barrels of 39 gravity oil in one hour on a straddle packer drillstem test being taken at Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 H. J. Cowden, in 22-36-H&TC, eight miles south of McCamey.

Gas surfaced in five minutes and fluid in 15 minutes, flowing the above gauge on a 3/4-inch choke on the 105-minute test at 6,446-448 feet.

Earlier a one-hour straddle packer drillstem test at 7,232-350 feet recovered 126 feet of drilling fluid.

An Ellenburger failure, it recovered sulfur water on a drillstem test at 8,340-440 feet, the total depth.

The well erupted and caught fire Sept. 12 at 7,440 feet, totally destroying a \$300,000 rig belonging to Hillin Drilling Co., Odessa. The five crewmen escaped without injury. The fire was extinguished

Sept. 15 by representative of Red Adair Co., Houston, internationally known firefighting firm.

The discovery, Humble's No. 1 Weathered was finalized July 13 to flow 267 barrels of 38 gravity oil, plus 46 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 102-1, through perforations at 8,032-8,209 feet.

The Tippett, West multipay field of Crockett County gained its seventh 5050 Wolfcamp producer and a location southeast extension to that pay with re-completion of Gulf Oil Corp., Crane, No. 1-G J. H. Tippett, former Wolfcamp oil and gas producer and more recently Devonian gas producer, 10 miles southeast of McCamey, for a daily pumping potential of 14.33 barrels of 39.1 gravity oil, plus 31.9 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,117-1.

Location is 3,501 feet from the northeast and 330 feet from the northwest lines of 40-31-H&TC.--0--

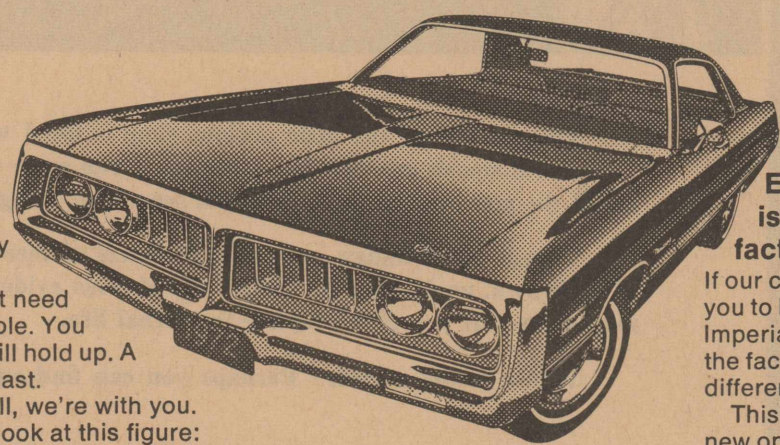

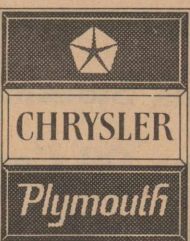
