I've been saving it for a long holiday weekend, and I think this might be as good a time as any to use it. Too often we breeze down the highway hoping we won't be stopped by a Highway Patrolman in our haste. I wonder how often we pause to realize that these men, overworked during heavy holiday weekends, are actually more dedicated to saving lives than giving tickets.

Are you one of the people who call me on the telephone or write me a letter to tell me my troopers are stopping motorists and giving them tickets for "no reason at all"? I wouldn't know. You never give your name.

You tell me you're a good citizen and a safe driver just using Interstate 64 for what was intended - speed. And that "dumb cop" gave you a ticket. You break my heart! I hope the next time you're tearing down the road at 85 mph that a trooper catches you before you smash into a concrete bridge abutment and he has to help pry your lifeless body out of that crushed speed machine of yours. I hope you can teach you a lesson with a ticket so maybe you don't cause a wreck and cost somebody else his life or her life.

You really break my heart telling me you don't have time to go to court about that ticket. I wish you could come with me to the scene of a wreck sometime. I wish I could make you stand and watch a man write in the gravel on the shoulder of a highway while he waits for an ambulance that will get there too late to do anything but carry him to the morgue. I wish I could make you help scrape the bits of bone and flesh of a whole family off the asphalt and into baskets. You'd vomit just like my troopers do, but you'd think differently the next time you climbed into your car.

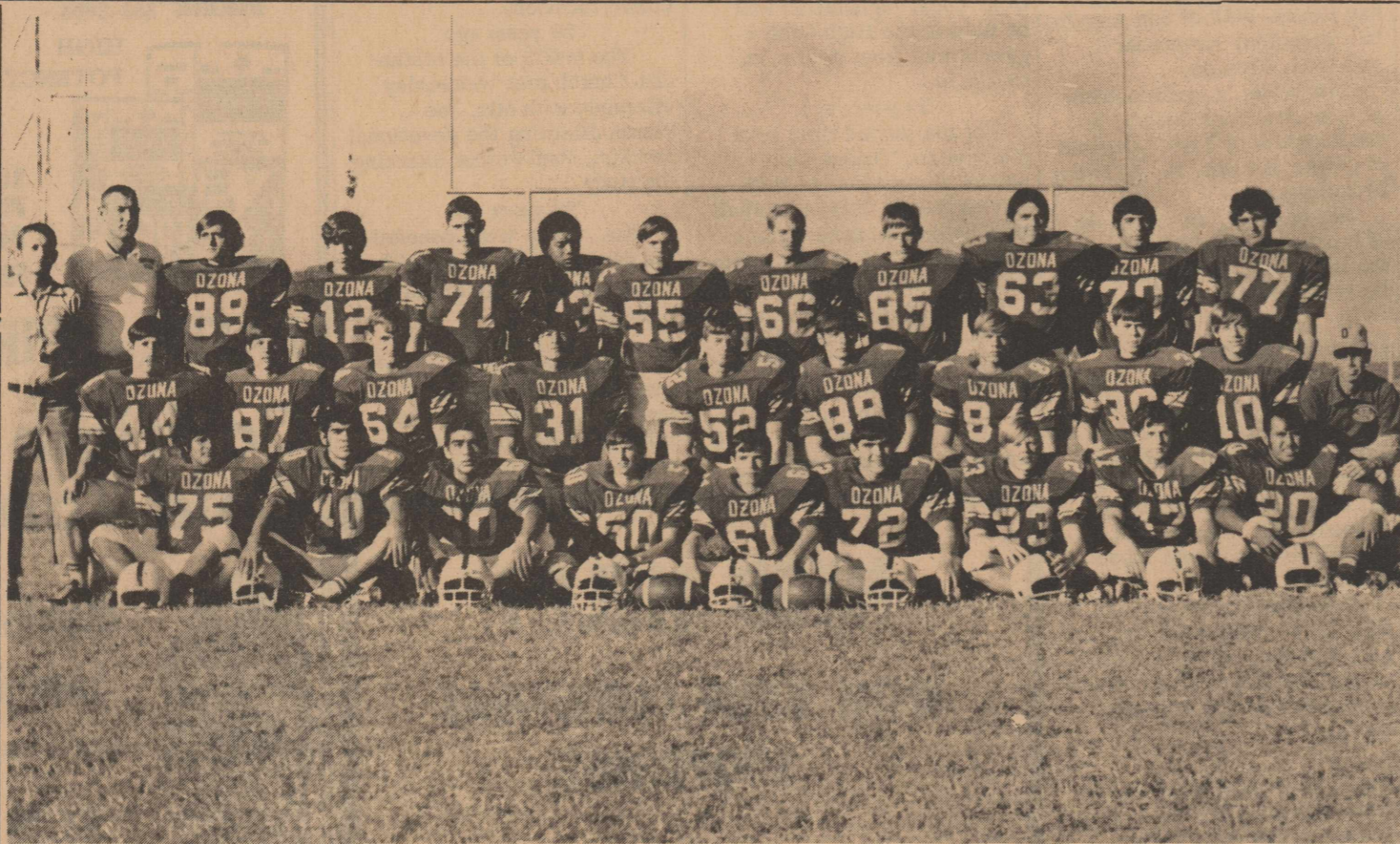
You said you were driving safely when the trooper stopped you. The road was clear and there was no harm in edging over the speed limit a few miles per hour, you said. I'm really impressed with your ability to judge road conditions. I'm only sorry a trooper wasn't at that same place a few months ago when a man with a wife and four children had a blowout at over 80 mph. He might have slowed him down, and his children would still have a father, and his wife a husband.

Oh, am I getting you mad again? That man might have been mad if a trooper had stopped him. He might have written me a letter. But he'd be alive. Your letter doesn't bother me, friend. What bothers me is that you apparently haven't learned your lesson. You're probably going to get back behind the wheel of your car, thinking you own the road and nothing can happen to you. You don't think about the other people on the road who want to go on living.

And who gave your kid driving lessons? You? Then he's probably got a couple of tickets, too. It's no wonder he weaves in and out of traffic, speeds and leaves strips of burned rubber at stop lights. I hope we catch him, too, mister; before we have to call you and your wife to identify his body at the morgue. I don't want to catch you crying and wishing you hadn't let him have a car until he learned to drive maturely.

You say you want my troopers to let you off with a warning. What you really want is for us to stop doing our jobs. You want us to let you go until you meet another guy just like you - head on.

You're mad because you got a ticket, and you have to take time off from work to go to court. You break my heart, mister.

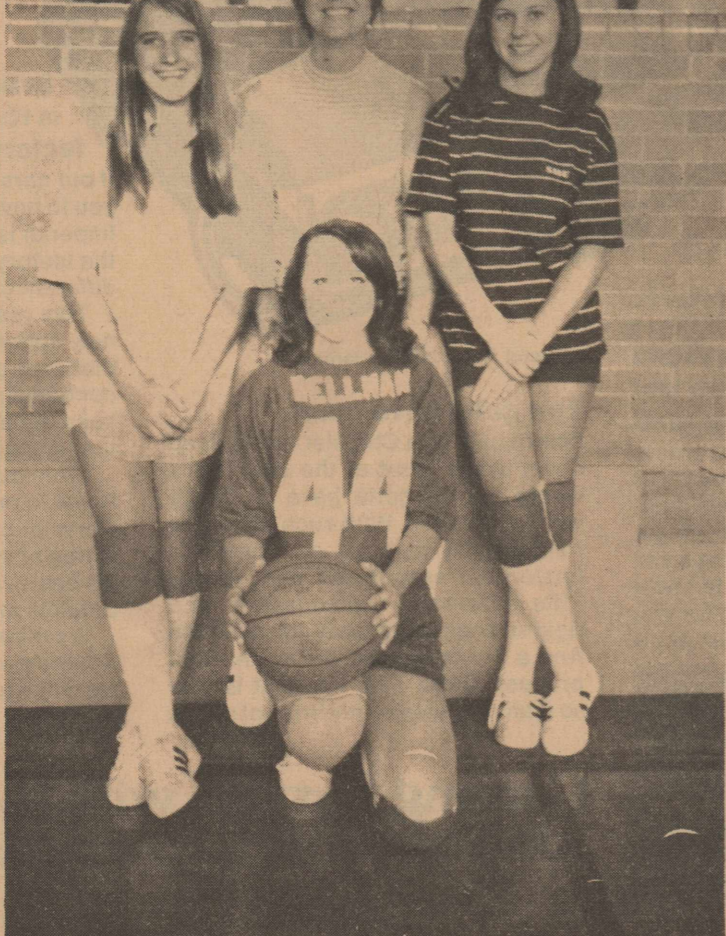
Coahoma wrapped up the championship, downing Crane for a perfect district record, and will represent District 5-AA in the play-off with the Alpine Bucks.

Deep Wildcat Set In Crockett

Pioneer Production Corp., Amarillo, will drill a 9,400-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 15 miles southeast of Big Lake, 1 1/2 miles southwest of a depleted West Ellenburger area of the Block 44 (Shallow) field and 2 miles east of the Block 47 (S in Andres) field. It is the No. 1-15 S. Barnhart University.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 15-47-University.

Ellenburger production in the Block 44 field was at 9,028 feet.

Property Loss Heavy In Rash of Auto Accidents

Local officers investigated a rash of automobile accidents during the week which resulted in heavy property damage, but no personal injuries.

Tuesday evening around 8 o'clock a collision in front of Maness Texaco Station caused slight damage to the auto but the pickup involved was not damaged. Neither drivers were injured. Rudy Huereca, traveling west in a 1964 Mercury, was turning into the station drive from the center lane when a pickup driven by Giles Luckett of Pecos, traveling west in the outside lane, struck the car.

At 11:00 p.m. Saturday at the intersection of IH 10 and Hwy 290 Clyde Dorey of Irving lost control of his '69 Chrysler and plowed through a fence and into a pasture on the Davidson ranch five miles east of Ozona. The car was heavily damaged, but Dorey escaped injury.

Antonio Villereal narrowly escaped injury just after noon Sunday when he lost control of his old model Chevrolet 2.2 miles north of Ozona on Hwy 163 and crashed through the Hagelstein ranch fence, breaking a telephone pole. The car was demolished.

A Phoenix man was treated and released at Crockett County Hospital Monday afternoon when a blow-out caused a pickup to overtake 5.7 miles west of Ozona on Hwy 290. Jack Sosa was the injured man. Jerry Roessler was the driver of the pickup. He was pulling a heavily loaded trailer at the time of the blowout but it remained upright.

Lupe A. Fierro, 36, was dead on arrival at the Crockett County Hospital where he was rushed by ambulance early Sunday evening after he was wounded in a roadside shooting incident about three miles east of Ozona.

Charged with the shooting was Felipe Vargas, III, of Ozona. Vargas is under guard in the Crockett County Hospital where he is receiving treatment for a heart condition.

Funeral services for Mr. Fierro were held Tuesday afternoon from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church in Ozona, with burial following in Lima Cemetery.

He was born Dec. 12, 1934, in Ozona, and had lived here all his life. He was an employe of the Crockett county road department.

Survivors include his wife, Juanita; two daughters, Mrs. Shawnee Diaz and Sharon Fierro, both of Ozona; a son, Lupe Fierro, Jr. of Ozona; four brothers, Juan Fierro, Refugio Fierro, Maclovio Fierro, all of Ozona and Sipriano Fierro of Marble Falls, and two sisters, Mrs. Jesus Perez and Mrs. Hilario Gonzalez, both of Ozona.

That the shooting was the culmination of a long-standing feud between the two men was indicated in statements made to officers following the shooting by Felipe Vargas, III, and his son, Raul Vargas, 14, who, with his six-year-old brother was riding with his father in a pickup truck.

Both statements alleged that Fierro "tried to run over us" in another pickup when the two vehicles were in the vicinity

of the colored swimming pool in southeast Ozona. In his statement Felipe Vargas told officers that he and his children were out riding and that Lupe Fierro "stepped on his brakes and akidded and almost ran over us." "I got mad because he had been threatening me and had already had a fight with him. I followed him east about three miles and stopped to tell him not to bother me anymore."

"I asked him if he was drunk and he just kept coming. I fired a couple of shots at the pavement. He kept coming and I wrestled away and got in the middle of the pavement and started shooting at him. When he started swinging at me I shot at him until there were no shots left. And then he got hold of the gun and said 'You s.o.b. you shot me a bunch of times.' I told him to stay away from me and he wrestled the gun away from me and pushed me into a ditch and pointed the gun at me and started firing. I heard a shot come out of that gun."

"Lupe leaned against the pickup and put the gun in the bed. I told him 'I wasn't going to shoot you. You kept coming at me and I didn't want to shoot you.'"

Vargas recounted subsequent events while waiting for the ambulance and officers to arrive. The son, Raul Vargas, had caught a ride with a passing tourist and reported the incident to the Department of Public Safety here.

Young Raul Vargas in a statement to officers told essentially the same story of events leading up to the shooting. "This trouble between my father and Lupe has been going on since Lupe has been going with my mother," he said in his statement. "My father got mad when he tried to run over us and said a lot of cuss words and said 'I am going to get that s.o.b.'"

They followed Fierro out east and stopped across the highway from where Fierro

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club
 By Mrs. Bailey Post

Since we barely escaped a killing frost last week, be sure to make preparations to protect tender outdoor plants, and move houseplants inside on short notice. While the days are so beautiful and warm, I am reluctant to bring everything in or cover them up.

Chinese hibiscus needs to be protected from freezes. Hardy one's growing in the ground outside should be cut back and mounded with soil.

Dahlias should be cut back to 2 or 3 inches above the ground immediately after the tops are killed by frost. Allow them to remain in the soil for about a week, then dig them up wash, dry in shade, and store for the winter. Keep from freezing and prevent their drying out by storing in peat moss or vermiculite. Mound plants left in the ground with soil to prevent freezing. For early spring color be sure to plant daffodils now. Locate beds so they will receive sunlight and good drainage. The large bulbs should be planted about six inches deep and small bulbs, three inches. Space eight to ten inches apart.

Cotoneasters are one of the most popular shrubs used for landscape plants. They range from low-growing ground cover to 20 feet tall. Give plants plenty of space to grow naturally and spread. Don't plant near a walk where branches will have to be cut back and become unsightly. Evergreen, semi-evergreen and deciduous types are available. The red berries make cotoneasters attractive during fall and winter, and furnish food for the birds.

Keep pansies fertilized and watered if no rain, to keep them growing well.

Pecans are being harvested in Ozona now, with some having a good crop and some not so good. If not gathered, predators may get a share of the crop. They say one squirrel eats about a pound and a half of pecans each week, and destroys or burys many more. Also the blue jay has a healthy appetite for pecans. Harvesting the pecans as soon as possible will reduce the losses of so many.

Drive over our city and enjoy the colorful foliage, roses and mums that are bright spots in so many yards.

Tex. Celebrates Food And Fiber Abundance Week

Texas is a giant in the agricultural industry, and its agricultural products will receive special notice during Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week, November 15-21, according to county agent Pete W. Jacoby. Crockett County is a major producer of agricultural products in this area and marketed over five million dollars worth of agricultural products in 1970 according to census reports by the Texas Department of Agriculture, reports the county agent.

"Special observances are planned to emphasize that the people of Texas have a large stake in the vast amount of food and fiber produced by those in agriculture," explains Charles K. Baker, agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which is assisting in promoting the week-long event. "Texans benefit both as consumers and as residents of this state due to the tremendous contributions of agriculture to the overall economy."

Agriculture in all its phases adds almost \$10 billion annually to the Texas economy, points out the economist. Cash receipts from farm marketings during 1970 were \$3.1 billion and are expected to reach the \$3.76 billion mark by 1976. Every dollar produced by agriculture has a multiplier effect of 2.7. This means that a \$1 million increase in agricultural income results in an increase of 2.7 million in the total Texas economy.

Texas is the leading state in the production of cotton, grain sorghum, beef cattle, sheep and wool, and goats and mohair, and is the second in rice production and third in peanuts, pecans, and citrus. The state generally ranks third after California and Iowa in total crop and livestock cash receipts.

Baker emphasizes the fact that agriculture is one of the most efficient sectors of the overall economy. In 1970, each farm worker supplied himself and 46 other persons with food and fiber needs. Output per man-hour of farm work has increased 223 percent since 1950 due to improved technology and management. The benefits are passed on to the consumer who now spends 16.5 percent of his disposable income for food--a drop of 19 percent in the past 10 years. Per capita food consumption increased six percent during that same decade.

The economist urges all Texans to participate in the observance of Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week the week prior to Thanksgiving. "This is an excellent opportunity for all of us to reflect on the bountiful harvests that agricultural producers over the state reap each year to provide for us high quality, yet economical food and fiber products."
