The Lakeview game Saturday night was a cliff-hanger. The Lions were behind 11 points early in the third quarter and roared back to take a 45-44 lead with about six minutes remaining in the game.

Ozona Schools Win Continued Accreditation

Ozona High School has been continued as an accredited school by the Commission on Secondary Schools of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The action was taken at the annual meeting of the Association held November 28-December 1, in Miami Beach, Florida, and was announced by Principal Foy A. Moody and L. B. T. Sikes, superintendent of the school.

Membership in the Association is official recognition that a school is committed to school improvement through the accreditation process. Each member school periodically conducts a thorough self-study and is visited by teams of competent educators who help determine the school's strengths and indicate areas needing improvement. Only those schools which voluntarily enter into these self-improvement programs and commit themselves to compliance with accepted educational standards are admitted to membership.

"The regional accreditation program has been in operation for 76 years and has demonstrated, by concrete educational achievements, that the process is of value to students, teachers, parents, and communities throughout the South," according to John Guyer, Chairman, and H. E. Phillips, Executive Secretary, of the Texas State Committee.

Seminar On Predators Set

Sheep and goat producers in Crockett County are encouraged to attend one of the upcoming meetings regarding a referendum on predator control proposed by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Meetings have been scheduled throughout the area, the closest scheduled meeting for Crockett County ranchmen is San Angelo, Dec. 16, at University Center, Angelo State University. The meeting will begin at 2 p.m.

The meetings will be a joint venture by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the TSGRA, according to County Agricultural Agent Pete Jacoby. The role of the Extension Service is to explain the provisions of the Texas Agricultural Check-off Act of 1969. This will be done by John J. Seibert, Extension economist at Texas A&M University.

The district agricultural agent in each of the respective Extension districts will preside at the meeting and will explain Extension's educational responsibility as related to the check off act.

Hunters Break Records In Big Trophy Kills

All records were broken in the Chamber of Commerce sponsored hunting contest this past week.

Allen Graham of Sheffield checked in a 16-pointer at Cooke's Market Sunday. The same deer had a 20 1/2 inch rack which would top the widest rack so far in the season. However, only one prize is given per deer, and a 20 1/2 inch rack was recorded at the Trading Post Sunday by Jay Holt of Big Lake. Graham killed his deer at the Liveoak Ranch in the western part of Crockett County and Holt got his trophy on the Vic Pierce ranch.

The heaviest deer, which broke all previous records, was weighed in at Cooke's Market and topped the scales at 147 pounds field dressed. It was killed by Joe Everett of Big Lake on the Buck Owens ranch north of Ozona.

Cooke said he had processed exactly twice as many deer this year as he had this time last season, skinning 37 deer Sunday alone.

FLOOD OF MONEY CAUSES INFLATION

In the coming weeks and months (we hope not years) there will be much discussion about decisions of the Cost of Living Council and the Price Commission. Inevitably we are all at last going to have to come to grips with the facts of economic life. Inevitably we are going to be asking.

“What really causes inflation? Which come first, wage rises or price rises? Will we ever be able to break free of the Government controls vested in the Living Cost Council and the Price Commission? Why can't we be free—and have free markets for labor and commodities the way it was before?”

First of all, United States Government spending, authorized by the Congress, is the basic and chief cause of inflation. In the last year of the Johnson Administration the budget totaled \$185 billion. The current budget of the Nixon Administration is \$230 billion. Next year it is expected to run above \$250 billion, with a deficit of \$27 billion.

The pressures of these vast sums upon prices, directly and indirectly, drive them up. Even so, the measurable yearly increases in the cost of living in the United States have not been above 5.6 per cent in the last six years. Therefore, when wages rise generally above that figure a new pressure is exerted upon prices, causing a wage-price spiral above the rise in prices brought about by the surging money supply.

No one has all the economic answers, but we believe the President's Phase II should be given a chance, and that the Congress of the United States and the Administration itself should cooperate by reining in expenditures. John Maynard Keynes never dreamed of deficits such as those now being piled up. Let's not put all the blame on him, but let us work hard to regain our free economy.

DID HE LOSE ANYTHING?

You can argue whether or not smoking marijuana leads to the use of other drugs, or whether the high cost of buying “pot” causes other crimes, but if this article from a Texas college newspaper, the Eagle Grove Eagle, does not shake up every user or potential user of marijuana and the parents of both, then there is no hope.

The article, entitled “The Case of a Youth Arrested and Convicted for the Possession of Marijuana,” poses the question: Did he lose anything when he was convicted?

“All he lost was the right to vote, the right to own a gun and the right to run for public office. He lost the opportunity to ever being a licensed doctor, dentist, CPA, engineer, lawyer, architect, realtor, osteopath, physical therapist, private detective, pharmacist, school teacher, barber, funeral director, masseur or stock broker. He can never get a job where he has to be bonded or licensed. He can't work for the city, county or federal government.”

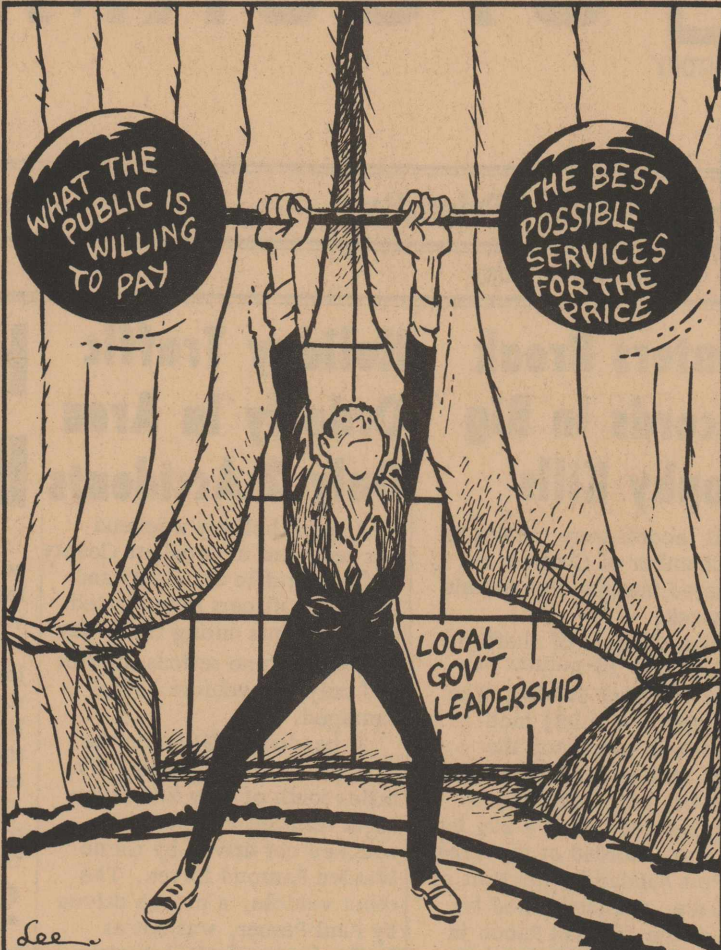

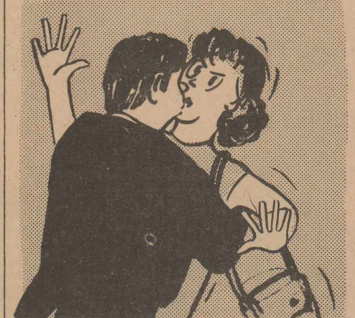

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Fresh Salesman

Shopping for a studio couch, Myrtle followed the friendly salesman to an obscure nook at the back of the furniture store. Suddenly, while they were talking about fabrics, the salesman seized her in a violent embrace.



Myrtle was so outraged that she not only had the man fired but also sued the owner of the store for damages.

“This was a clear case of assault and battery,” she charged in court. “And every employer is responsible for the acts of his employees.”

But the court disagreed and rejected her claim. The judge said the owner was not responsible for an act that was so completely separate from the job of selling furniture.

This is a general rule of law, that an employer is not liable for an employee's personal miscon-

duct outside the scope of his job. Thus, the owner of a bar was held not liable when a mischievous waiter gave a customer a painful hotfoot.

It is a different story, however, when the employee's duties do include a certain amount of physical contact with the public. Take this case:

At a movie matinee, a noisy teen-ager was ejected from the theater by an irate usher. In doing so, the usher used considerably more roughness than was necessary.

This time, when the teen-ager sued the management for damages, the court pointed out that policing the customers was part of the job of ushering. Even though the usher overdid it, the court said that the theater, as his employer, would have to pay damages.

Furthermore, certain employers may be held liable because of an extra duty they owe the public. For example, a railroad had to pay damages after an amorous conductor forced several kisses on a reluctant woman passenger.

To be sure, kissing passengers was not within the scope of a conductor's job. But the court said that the railroad, as a public carrier, owed an extra duty to protect its passengers from harm—a duty which in this case it had clearly not performed.

SURRENDER OF PANAMA CANAL?

Current negotiations concerning the future of the Panama Canal could lead to another setback for the cause of freedom in this hemisphere. Public attention has been focused on the Nixon administration's new Asian policy, which has resulted in expulsion of the free Chinese from the U. N. and American appeasement of Red China. But the U. S. is in danger of surrendering strategic advantage much closer to home. In Washington, many observers believe the Nixon administration is prepared to turn over much of the Panama Canal Zone to the Panamanians.

No need exists for such action. The United States purchased the Canal Zone and dug the canal. It has been generous, perhaps excessively generous, with Panama. The U. S. has a right to the Canal Zone in perpetuity.

Control of the Canal Zone is one of the few strategic and political advantages the U. S. possesses in Latin America after a decade of retreat from a position of unquestioned power in this hemisphere. Indeed the Panama Canal is essential for interfleet mobility for major U. S. naval vessels. Effective operation of the canal wouldn't be feasible if an unstable, left oriented Panamanian government controlled the Canal Zone. Panama, unfortunately, is a notoriously unstable country.

Sen. Strom Thurmond (R-SC) recently pinpointed the strategic importance of the Panama Canal, saying: "As an artery of marine transportation, the Panama Canal enterprise became, and still is, a part of the coastline belonging to the United States. As such its exclusive control by the United States is necessary for national defense just as the control of the Chesapeake Bay or New York Harbor is necessary for national defense."

The senator added: "It is discouraging to report that negotiations are once again underway with Panama, even though the present government is a revolutionary regime with little prospect of stability and with no procedures for ratifying a new treaty." It is shocking that U. S. officials would contemplate giving away a U. S. strategic advantage and throw away the vast sums American taxpayers have invested in the Canal Zone. Transfer of the Zone to Panama would deprive the United States of significant military and economic protection. It is doubtful that the U. S. could use the canal in a time of international crisis if an antagonistic regime were in charge of the Canal zone. Indeed whoever controls the Canal Zone is in a position to exert leverage on all countries using the canal, especially the South American countries whose

goods must transit the canal to reach U. S. and European markets. Panama is not a suitable country to exercise this leverage. The world already has had bitter experience with another unstable country-- Egypt -- controlling a key waterway. Today, the Panama Canal Zone is an island of freedom in a region ridden with demagogic or totalitarian regimes. Central America, in particular, has a long history of petty dictatorships and violence. In World War II the free world narrowly avoided Axis political domination in Panama.

An American resident of the Canal Zone recently protested in a letter to The New York Times any sell-out of the U. S. control of the Zone, noting "the rule of terror under which the people of Panama exist." The author of the letter asked: "Is this the kind of life we are expected to live in the Canal Zone? Are we Americans, who have fought for freedom since the birth of our country, going to surrender now?"

Now is the time for American people to let President Nixon know that they are opposed to any surrender of U. S. sovereignty in the Panama Canal Zone or any lessening of American control over the "Crossroads of the World." If the American people don't assert their convictions on this point, the U. S. security interest in the Panama Canal Zone may fare as the cause of the Free China has fared at the hands of liberal advisors in the White House and State Department.

Operation Build America

For some time, the nation's independent business people, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have strongly supported what is known as "Operation Build America."

This is centered on legislation pending in the Congress by Congressmen Joe Evin of Tennessee and Keith Sebelius of Kansas, Senators James Pearson of Kansas and Fred Harris of Oklahoma and many co-sponsors to give tax incentives to new employment generating enterprises that locate in rural areas.

Recently the Western Conference of Governors, in one of the strongest documents of the second half of this century, took up this matter. The resolution follows:

The United States needs to develop a national policy on voluntary population distribution. It is now projected that the population of the United States will rise from 200 million people at present to more than 300 million people by the year 2000.

Our nation has practiced population distribution incentives in the past through such devices as the Homestead Act. A new and fresh approach to population distribution at the present time is needed.

The social and economic problems of overpopulated areas include ghettos; poverty; mass transit demands; overloaded educational, health, and

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

George Meany's recent rudeness to President Nixon in Miami has given rise to inquiries about how polite people are supposed to be to a White House occupant. Many observers have referred to the incident as being without precedent. A Miami editorial said: "Never in our memory has a President... received such loutish treatment..." Others were equally as critical.

Researchers say that from the time of George Washington, with very few exceptions, a President -- regardless of party -- is accorded esteem and respect at public appearances. This profound reverence is related to the office itself even more than to the one who occupies it, although the two are inseparable. Known discourtesies toward a President have usually come from hot-tempered partisans during the heat of a political campaign, and then from rowdies in a crowd.

Mr. Meany appears to have pursued a planned course of action in the treatment he ac-

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corded President Nixon. He tried -- in vain -- to have his AFL-CIO board of directors vacate the stage before the President arrived for the speech. He banned TV coverage of the speech, seated the visitor at an obviously awkward spot on the platform, and banged down the gavel, ordering delegates to take their seats, as some of them sought to shake Mr. Nixon's hand as he was leaving, then snapped: "We'll now proceed with Act 21"

In defense of the 77-year-old Meany, many believe his age and temper got the better of him, as indicated by his efforts later to explain he really didn't mean what the public read into his actions.

Be that as it may, the incident served to focus nationwide attention on a cherished American tradition of respect for a President and the office he holds.

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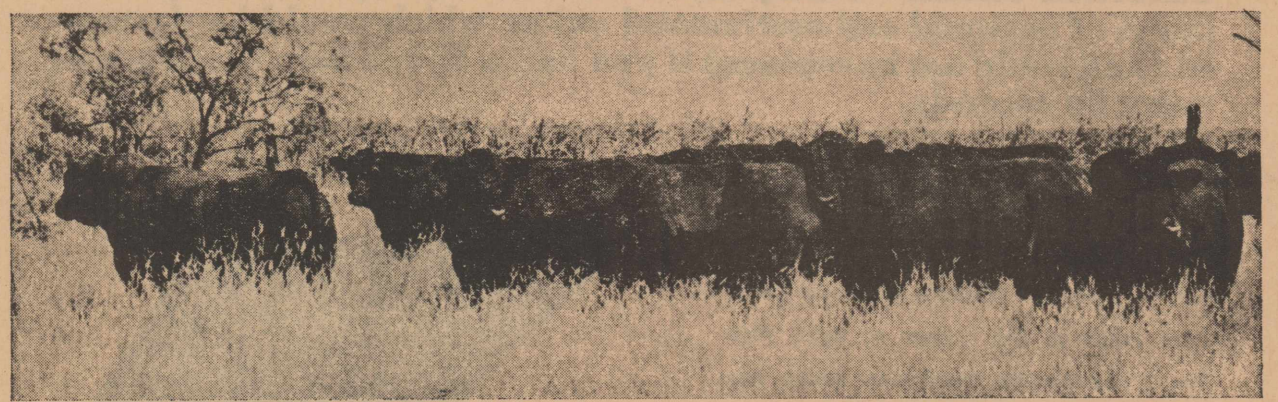

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**STATES' RIGHTS:
AN UNEASY GHOST**

When I was a boy of 14, I knew Confederate history from Bethel Church to Saylor's Creek. And I knew the arguments, too, that justified secession. If there was anything I ever believed in, it was The Lost Cause. I believed, deep down in my heart, when I was a boy of 14.

And now that a lifetime and a thousand books are behind me, I marvel that a boy of 14 could have been so wise. I still believe.

And oft times, when I was 14 and older, I would ponder the luck that bedeviled The South: How often we came within a hair's width of winning, only to fall short.

One such instance was the battle at The South Ana, early in '64.

General Lee had foxed General Grant into dividing his

forces, half on one side of the little Virginia river, half on the other. Lee had him, then, right where he wanted him. And had it not been for food that roiled Lee's stomach, food that knocked him out of the saddle for the only time during all those bitter years, he would have utterly destroyed the Army of the Potomac.

And had that come about, there would have been no Second Cold Harbor, no siege of Petersburg, and no Appomattox, either. Nor any Little Rock, if you please, nor any of a thousand other demeaning things that have plagued us ever since.

Another near miss comes to mind; in early '62.

That first full year of the conflict, Judah Benjamin was

our Secretary of War. He had been, one will remember, in the U.S. Senate. He and a man named Slidell had represented Louisiana.

Cagy Judah wisely wanted to bring England in on our side. To that end, he commissioned his old colleague, Slidell, and a man named Mason to get the job done.

That was how, eventually, those two Confederate emissaries found themselves aboard the British vessel *Trent*, en route to England.

While bobbing along, a Federal warship stopped the *Trent*, boarded it, and arrested the Southerners.

Well, siree. Nobody went about kidnapping people from vessels sailing Seas Britannia ruled, not with impunity, not so long as Henry Palmerston

was running the British Foreign Office. Palmerston was the man who invented Gunboat Diplomacy. Didn't the Yanks know that?

When word of the incident reached the Foreign Secretary he ordered his fleet to get up steam. Then he wrote a note to the U.S. government to the effect that the emissaries were to be freed, right now, or the fleet would be on its way.

But, being a dutiful subject of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, he first sent his draft to Buckingham Palace. Queens, one understands, like to be advised whenever their government assumes the posture of a belligerent.

That was Palmerston's mistake and the Confederacy's mis-

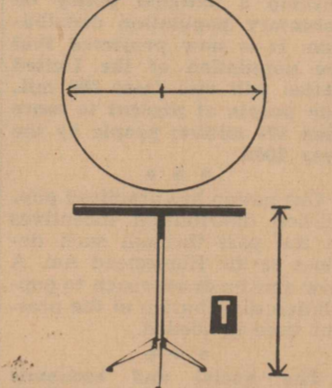

Do I mean I would like to see our Southern States independent of the rest of the federated republic?

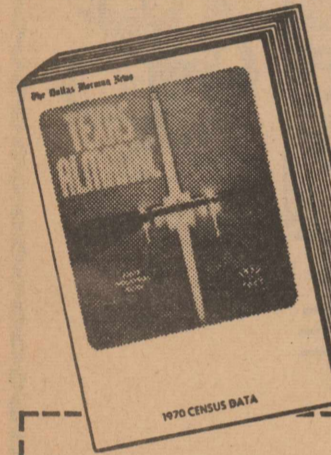

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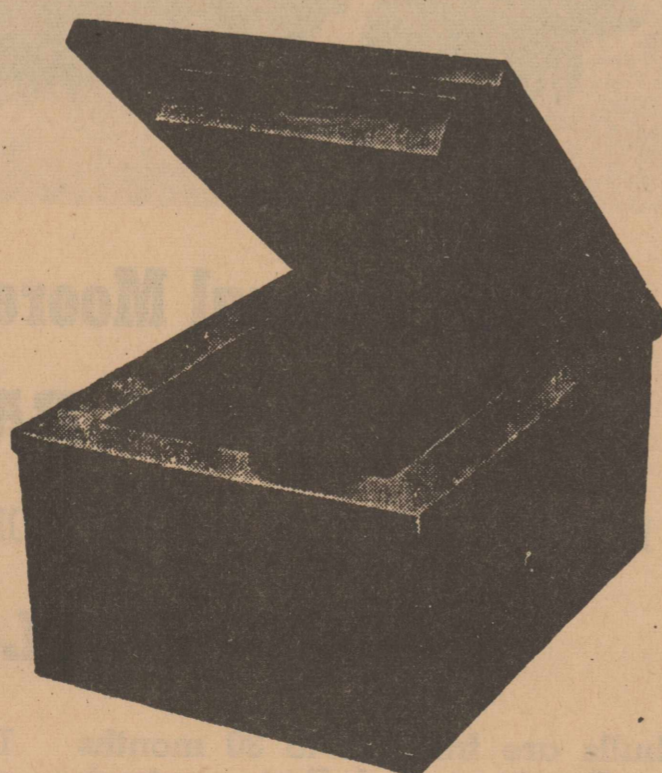

Tips For Gardeners
 From The Ozona Garden Club
 By Mrs. Bailey Post

"Autumn to winter, winter into spring, spring into summer, summer into fall, so rolls the changing year, and so we change. Motion so swift, we know not that we move."
 -Dinah Mulock Craik

The gardener can now take things easier than during almost any month in the year. Once the outdoor garden is tucked away for winter, there is comparatively little to do, though planting should continue until very cold weather.

When fruit trees have dropped their leaves they may be given a first dormant spray, and pruning may be started. Dormant spraying to combat scale, insects and certain other pests and diseases may now be given attention for evergreens and other plants. Do not spray if there is danger of the temperature dropping below freezing. Some of the fruit trees that do well in this area are (check with nursery for others):

Plums - Santa Rosa, a large red plum that ripens in late June seems to be the best. Methley, a purple plum ripens in early June. Bruce is a large red plum that ripens in May, it needs a pollinator to produce fruit.

Figs - Texas Everbearing produces large yellow figs. Celeste has small purple fruit of high quality.

Pear - The Kieffer is dependable and productive. LeConte does especially well in our area.

Pecans - Check with county agent Jacoby for best variety to plant here.

Hardwood cuttings of deciduous shrubs may be made and planted in a sheltered border, or buried in sand, to be taken out and planted where you want them in the spring. Among

these that can easily be increased in this manner are, flowering almond, Forsythia, Privet, Philadelphus, Crepe Myrtle, Dogwood, and Weigela.

Evergreens may now be transplanted. After they are moved, water them thoroughly and mulch the soil around them.

Tulips may be planted now through December. Those that have been refrigerated (as they must be if they are to be successful in warmer sections) should be planted when received from the dealer, or stored in refrigerator until you do plant them.

Start planning for your outdoor Christmas lighting contest entry. More information will be given at a later date.
