The mercury plunged to 16 degrees above zero before sunup Tuesday and temperatures warmed considerably under a bright sun.

Voters May Register Any Time Of Year

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said today that despite some newspaper articles and radio bulletins to the contrary, voter registration does not end on January 31.

Secretary Bullock said, "Apparently there is confusion about the new voter registration law passed by the last legislature. Under the new law, voters can regiater any time during the year. However, persons must register at least 30 days prior to an election, to be able to vote in that election."

January 31 is the deadline for a voter's name to appear on the initial list of registered voter's. Those persons registering after January 31 will appear on supplemental lists, which will be prepared 20 days prior to an election. Every person who submits an application to the Tax Assessor-Collector or a duly appointed deputy at least 30 days prior to an election will appear on either the original or supplemental lists which will when the Alpha-Omega Players be sent to the polls. surgery, but doctors have made BIG MACHINES DO BIG WORK, AND this is one whale of a machine doing a tremendous job four miles south of Ozonalast week. The machine pictured is driving a bit which is boring a hole through solid rock under State Highway 163 to carry the 36inch pipeline being laid across this county by McVean and Barlow, contractors. The pipeline is part of the line being laid from New Braunfels to the Coyonosa area north of Fort Stockton in Pecos County. The pipe following the auger is 42 inches in diameter and will remain under the road as a carrier for the 36-inch pipe. The machine augers the cuttings out of the hole (note cuttings beneath operator) and drives the pipe ahead as the hole les is cut. The boring machine, held up by a winch line from a bulldozer parked on the side of the big ditch, drives the auger by gear wheels. The big driving gear may be seen beneath the machine. It took more than two days to drill the 100-foot plus tun-



We regret the Dear Mr. White: cessity of parading this before our readers, but the letter presumes to dictate to this newspaper and this publisher what can and can not be published in Ozona's newspaper.

ial edict but we'd like to point out another presumption on his part--the presumption that he has the powers of a district judge to issue an injunction. This newspaper refuses to grant him that

Until we received the above letter we were not conscious that we were engaged in any sort of hassle with the doctor. We did shrug off a telephoned threat to "sue" us recently when we reported the condition of a person injured in an accident here, as reported to us by members of her family, after examination by physicians in a neighboring town. Neither that article nor any other article dealing with accidents, injuries or sickness appearing in this newspaper has used this doctor's name--not because we had any hesitation about doing so, but because we felt no need to do so. Nor have we intentionally or consciously written anything derogatory about the doctor in any such articles. If he has read such into the news stories then he has his own reasons.

To get back to the above letter, we would like to remind the doctor of two things--the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, the one that guarantees freedom of the press, etc. -- and the second, the fact that the writer is the publisher and sole owner of this newspaper and as such reserves the right to determine what will and will not be published in same. As publisher, however, we seek to remain conscious of the community we serve and love so dearly and in justice to the people here we have served for some 45 years we shall always resist misguided efforts to divert us from faithfully reporting the legitimate and flour together thoroughly. news. We have always been willing to listen and learn but we also have been somewhat stubborn about our privilege and duty to print what is legitimate news in the columns of this newspaper, And, if you will forgive the personal reference, we feel that with a degree in journalism from the University of Texas and over 50 years of experience in newspapering, we know something about the obligations and privileges of the news columns. And, we might add, that in those fifty odd years in the newspaper business, this type of letter is a "first."

We wanted no fight with the doctor, we asked for no fight. Now, this we would like to pass along to Dr. Cole---if he still feels the urge to dictate what goes into this newspaper each week, all he has to do is put enough money on the line and we'll sell him the sheet. Meanwhile, he's had his say and we've had ours and if he'll promise not to run our newspaper we'll promise not to doctor his patients.










Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Plants are already awakenng in the Southwest, so make February the month of preparation for outdoor planting. Make an inventory of tools and implements. Repair any

that are broken and put all into first-class condition. Before the end of the month, while there isn't very much yard work to do, carefully examine lawn mowers, send

out for repairs and to be sharpened. Choose experienced and reliable people to do this for you. By avoiding the last minute rush, you are likely to get better work done. Look over garden furniture

and ornaments in storage, clean them and where needed give them a fresh coat of paint, varnish or other appropriate

Continue to check regularly all bulbs that are being stored. Remove any that show signs

of rot promptly, or cut surface They will be useful later on with sulphur.

Geraniums, Lantanas and Hibiscus may be pruned back quite severely now in prepration for repotting next month. After cutting them back, keep their soil on the dry side. Cuttings of Geraniums, Fuchsias, Lantanas, Begonias, Verbenas and Coleus will root readily now in a 60-degree night temperature. Many tropical foliage plants such as Dracaenas, Dieffenbachias, Philadendrons and others root easily from cuttings set in a close propagating case where 70-degree

temperature is maintained. Perennials, including bulbs that have been planted a year or more will benefit from fertilizing as soon as new growth above ground becomes active. Scatter the fertilizer evenly, and except in grassed areas, cultivate it shallowly into the

The severe freeze killed some of the early blooming bulbs, but later blooming varieties may not have been da-


