WINTER COMES TO OZONA and when school let out Monday the kids took full advantage of it. In spite of freezing weather, they gathered in the downtown park for an old-fashioned snowball fight. With several inches of snow on the ground, there was plenty of ammunition. Snow and freezing rain arrived in Ozona at mid-morning Monday and temperatures dropped to below freezing before dark. The mercury plunged to 16 degrees above zero before sunup Tuesday and temperatures warmed considerably under a bright sun.

Crockett Discovery, Confirmers Indicated

Crockett County gained a discovery and a confirmation. Also a confirmer was indicated in another area and location staked for an outpost.

W. A. Moncrief Jr., Midland, No. 1 University, unidentified discovery, 15 miles north of Ozona and 1-7/8 miles east of the two well Midway Lane, Northeast (San Andreas) field, was finalized to pump 56.02 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, plus 5.43 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 2.633-1.

Production was through perforations at 7,377-388 feet. Top of pay was picked at 7,377 feet on ground elevation of 2,619 feet.

Drilled to 8,205 feet, with 4 1/2 inch casing set at 8,037 feet, it is plugged back to 7,991 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of 13-42-University.

Second Ellenburger producer and a 2,300-foot south-southeast extension to that pay was indicated in the Tripoli multipay field with the swabbing and flowing of 16.5 barrels of oil and emulsion, along with 72 barrels of load water, in 11 hours at Humble Oil & Refining Co., Midland, No. 2 J. S. Weathered, in 20-36-H&TC, seven miles southeast of McCamey.

Recovery was through perforations at 8,398-492 feet which had been acidized with 3,200 gallons.

Swabbing continued.

Billy Mills Seeks New Term As Sheriff

She was born Dec. 4, 1884 in Rockdale and was married to B. O. Alford Dec. 2, 1902 in Rockdale. They lived in the Wall community and farmed there until 12 years ago when they moved to Ozona. He died in 1963.

Mrs. Alford had made her home in a San Angelo nursing home the past few years.

Survivors include two sons, former Ozonan, Quebe Alford of Snyder, and Bruce Alford of San Angelo; a sister, Mrs. Laura Aldridge of Rockdale, seven grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Voters May Register Any Time Of Year

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said today that despite some newspaper articles and radio bulletins to the contrary, voter registration does not end on January 31.

Secretary Bullock said, "Apparently there is confusion about the new voter registration law passed by the last legislature. Under the new law, voters can register any time during the year. However, persons must register at least 30 days prior to an election, to be able to vote in that election."

January 31 is the deadline for a voter's name to appear on the initial list of registered voters. Those persons registering after January 31 will appear on supplemental lists, which will be prepared 20 days prior to an election. Every person who submits an application to the Tax Assessor-Collector or a duly appointed deputy at least 30 days prior to an election will appear on either the original or supplemental lists which will be sent to the polls. Every person who registers as of April 5, 1972, will be eligible to vote in the May 6 primary; likewise, every person who registers by October 7, 1972, will be permitted to vote in the November 7 General Election.

Let Contract In Feb. For First Segment IH 10 West Of Ozona

Texas Highway Department will receive bids for grading and drainage structures on the first segment of Interstate Highway 10 West of Ozona on February 23, 1972.

Advertisement for bids on grading and structures on a 6.4 mile segment of IH 10 west of Ozona appears in this issue of the Stockman and in other publications reaching contractors. The first stretch of the new super highway to be built west of Ozona in Crockett county will be from a point 7.2 miles

west of Ozona to .8 of a mile west of State highway 163. This will put the east end of the new construction at a point somewhere just west of the Early Chandler pens. The job will include an overpass over the Pandale highway five miles west of the city.

This is the first contract for IH 10 work in this county in over a year. The first work on the highway in this county was on a section of about 10 miles from 5 miles east of Ozona to the county line. Two contracts in Sutton county carried

the highway to Sonora. At the present time another contract for grading and drainage structures has been let and the work is underway to carry the highway through the town of Ozona and about four or five miles east of that city.

Indications that further contracts were contemplated on the Interstate west of Ozona this year and next were contained in a recent communication to County Judge Troy Williams from Highway Department officials. A further optimistic note is contained in Sunday's edition of the Fort Stockton Pioneer in George Baker's "Baker's Dozen" column.

"It is gratifying," Baker wrote "to Fort Stockton residents to note that a portion of IH 10 construction west of Ozona is included in plans for immediate letting by the Texas Highway Department. That will mean that construction has started from each end of a 110-mile gap--the largest single open span on the transcontinental route.

"True that will take many months to complete the two projects, and that years will be required for building all the gaps on the segment in Pecos and Crockett counties--but once a start is made from each end of a gap on any major route there seems to be a pattern of continuing progress. This should assure that funds will be forthcoming to close the gap in the next few years."

Jerry Hayes Injured In Pickup Accident

Jerry Hayes escaped serious injury last Wednesday afternoon when his pickup overturned several miles west of town on Hwy 290.

He was traveling west when he rounded a curve and found an oncoming car in his lane of traffic. He took to the borrow ditch and might possible have maintained control of the vehicle, but it hit a concrete culvert and overturned. The cab of the pickup was badly smashed and Hayes managed to crawl out through the back window. He suffered lacerations and back injuries and was hospitalized later. He was released early this week.

Two accidents Monday were the result of ice and snow on

the highways. About 11:30 a. m. 8 miles west of Ozona on Hwy. 290 a San Francisco man and his wife were injured when he lost control of his car on an icy bridge. Mrs. D. J. Avad Mir-moez was hospitalized, and her husband, the driver of the auto, was treated and released at Crockett County Hospital.

The second accident occurred red 20 miles north of Ozona on Hwy 137 shortly after noon Monday. Bruce Grady of McCamey lost control of his late model Chevrolet on the ice-covered road and hit a bridge. He was not injured, but the car was heavily damaged.

Highway patrolman Dean Watson, DPS, of Iraan investigated the Hayes accident, and Patrolmen John Harris and Gary Hill investigated the other two wrecks.

Lion Cagers Trim Stanton For First Win

The Ozona Lions won their first district basketball game here last week, beating Stanton 63-57. The B team lost to the Stanton five 56-35.

Coach Spieker had four Lions in double figures with Mike Jenkins leading the pack with 13, Monty Peltow with 12, Randy Crawford and Gerald Huff, 10 each.

Romulo Cervantez was high point man for the Lion B with 11 points.

In McCamey Friday night the Lions lost the first game of the second half to the Badgers by a score of 56-45. Again four Lions were in double figures. David Sewell had 12 points and Jenkins, Rick Webster and Ruben Tambunga had 10 points each.

The B team lost 61-52. Oliver Payne led the effort with 11 points, followed by Gerald Olson with 10.

The freshman team beat Stanton, but lost to McCamey.

The Lions played Crane Tuesday night here and will be in Coahoma tomorrow night.

Crawford Child Released After Burn Treatment

Two-year-old Teresa Crawford, who was seriously burned about the head and face at her ranch home near here a week ago Saturday, was released from a San Angelo hospital.

There was some fear for the little girl's eyesight, but according to her father, Bill Crawford, specialists in that field think full vision will be restored in time. Her eyelids might possibly need corrective surgery, but doctors have made last week.

The child was burned when she tripped over an open can of gasoline near a flame at her home. Her 12-year-old brother, Clifford, extinguished the flames. She was brought to the hospital here and when medical help was not available, Highway Patrolman James Cumby rushed the family to a San Angelo hospital where she was admitted in serious condition.

BIG MACHINES DO BIG WORK. AND this is one whale of a machine doing a tremendous job four miles south of Ozona last week. The machine pictured is driving a bit which is boring a hole through solid rock under State Highway 163 to carry the 36-inch pipeline being laid across this county by McVean and Barlow, contractors. The pipeline is part of the line being laid from New Braunfels to the Coconosa area north of Fort Stockton in Pecos County. The pipe following the auger is 42 inches in diameter and will remain under the road as a carrier for the 36-inch pipe. The machine augers the cuttings out of the hole (note cuttings beneath operator) and drives the pipe ahead as the hole is cut. The boring machine, held up by a winch line from a bulldozer parked on the side of the big ditch, drives the auger by gear wheels. The big driving gear may be seen beneath the machine. It took more than two days to drill the 100-foot plus tunnel under the highway.

Dear Doctor:

Reproduced above is a letter received by the publisher of this newspaper last Friday afternoon by Certified Mail. We regret the necessity of parading this before our readers, but the letter presumes to dictate to this newspaper and this publisher what can and cannot be published in Ozona's newspaper.

The good doctor uses the word "enjoin" in issuing his dictatorial edict but we'd like to point out another presumption on his part--the presumption that he has the powers of a district judge to issue an injunction. This newspaper refuses to grant him that authority.

Until we received the above letter we were not conscious that we were engaged in any sort of hassle with the doctor. We did shrug off a telephoned threat to "sue" us recently when we reported the condition of a person injured in an accident here, as reported to us by members of her family, after examination by physicians in a neighboring town. Neither that article nor any other article dealing with accidents, injuries or sickness appearing in this newspaper has used this doctor's name--not because we had any hesitation about doing so, but because we felt no need to do so. Nor have we intentionally or consciously written anything derogatory about the doctor in any such articles. If he has read such into the news stories then he has his own reasons.

To get back to the above letter, we would like to remind the doctor of two things--the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, the one that guarantees freedom of the press, etc.--and the second, the fact that the writer is the publisher and sole owner of this newspaper and as such reserves the right to determine what will and will not be published in same. As publisher, however, we seek to remain conscious of the community we serve and love so dearly and in justice to the people here we have served for some 45 years we shall always resist misguided efforts to divert us from faithfully reporting the legitimate news. We have always been willing to listen and learn but we also have been somewhat stubborn about our privilege and duty to print what is legitimate news in the columns of this newspaper. And, if you will forgive the personal reference, we feel that with a degree in journalism from the University of Texas and over 50 years of experience in newspapering, we know something about the obligations and privileges of the news columns. And, we might add, that in those fifty odd years in the newspaper business, this type of letter is a "first."

We wanted no fight with the doctor, we asked for no fight. Now, this we would like to pass along to Dr. Cole--if he still feels the urge to dictate what goes into this newspaper each week, all he has to do is put enough money on the line and we'll sell him the sheet. Meanwhile, he's had his say and we've had ours and if he'll promise not to run our newspaper we'll promise not to doctor his patients.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

From Kitty's Kitchen

OZONAS

1/2 pound butter or margarine 13 ozs. cream cheese 1 cup flour 3/4 cup brown sugar (Pack- ed) 1 egg, slightly beaten 1 large tablespoon butter 1 teas. vanilla 1 cup Texas pecans, chopped

Cream butter, cream cheese and flour together thoroughly. Line muffin tins with the mixture. For a cookie, line toy-sized muffin tins; for dessert tarts, use a medium-size tin.

Bland brown sugar, egg, butter, banana and pecans. Fill lined muffin tins with the mixture. Bake in 350 degree oven for 25-30 minutes. Lower heat to 250 degrees and bake 10 more minutes. Cool before removing from tins.

To carry for the weekend, leave in tins. Makes 48 toy-sized tarts or 16 dessert tarts. May be made 2-3 days in advance.

The above recipe appeared in the February issue of House and Gardens with the descriptive sentence, "These pecan tarts are named for a little town in west Texas."

Several people brought it to my attention and Lottie Lee Baker was kind enough to type it up and bring it over to me. We are all curious and wonder if the recipe came from an Ozonan and if so, who? Maybe someone can help us out with this puzzle.

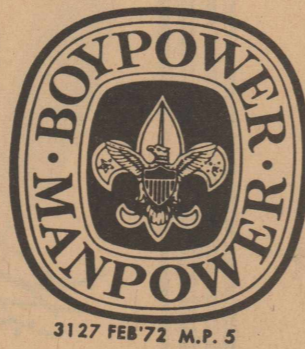

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club
By Mrs. Bailey Post

Plants are already awakening in the Southwest, so make February the month of preparation for outdoor planting. Make an inventory of tools and implements. Repair any that are broken and put all into first-class condition.

Before the end of the month, while there isn't very much yard work to do, carefully examine lawn mowers, send out for repairs and to be sharpened. Choose experienced and reliable people to do this for you. By avoiding the last minute rush, you are likely to get better work done.

Look over garden furniture and ornaments in storage, clean them and where needed give them a fresh coat of paint, varnish or other appropriate finish.

Continue to check regularly all bulbs that are being stored. Remove any that show signs

of rot promptly, or cut surface with sulphur.

Geraniums, Lantanas and Hibiscus may be pruned back quite severely now in preparation for repotting next month. After cutting them back, keep their soil on the dry side. Cuttings of Geraniums, Fuchsias, Lantanas, Begonias, Verbenas and Coleus will root readily now in a 60-degree night temperature. Many tropical foliage plants such as Dracaenas, Dieffenbachias, Philadendrons and others root easily from cuttings set in a close propagating case where 70-degree temperature is maintained.

Perennials, including bulbs that have been planted a year or more will benefit from fertilizing as soon as new growth above ground becomes active. Scatter the fertilizer evenly, and except in grassed areas, cultivate it shallowly into the surface.

The severe freeze killed some of the early blooming bulbs, but later blooming varieties may not have been damaged.

If you buy milk in the waxed cardboard containers, start saving all the empties.

They will be useful later on to protect tender plants from the cold and wind.

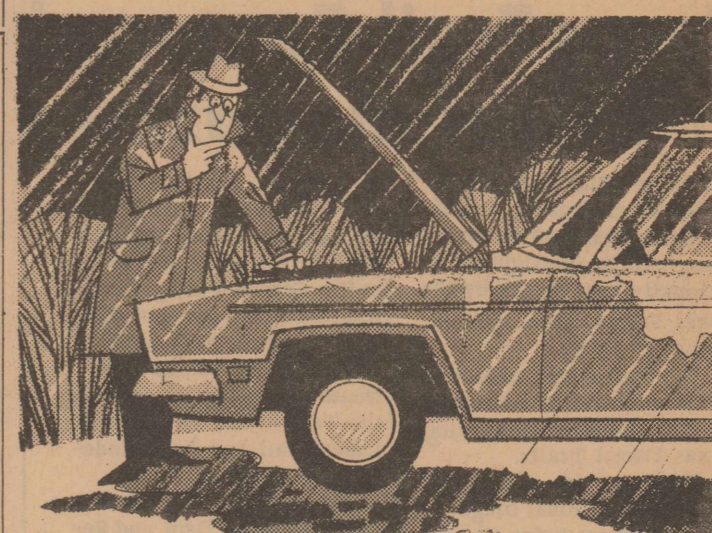

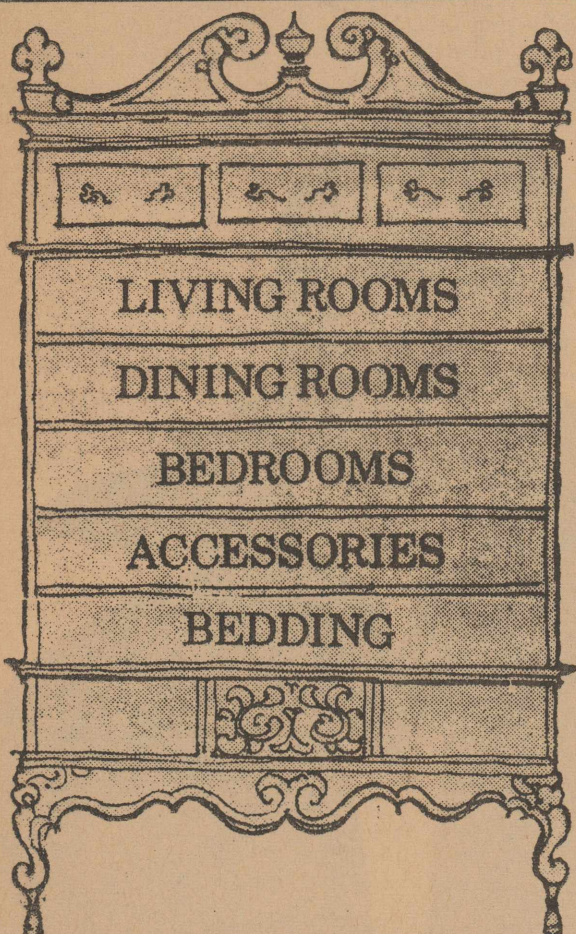
