


#### THAT'S THE WAY THE DOMINOES TUMBLE

The general scramble of nations to improve their relations with Communist China following President Nixon's revolutionary move to visit Peking is bringing more surprises. All those persons and groups who have been poohpoohing the domino theory of international events must be doing some serious headscratching.

On top of the demonstrated rage to live with the Chinese Communists in the United Nations, even to the point of expelling the Republic of China (the Nationalists), it is now believed that Eisaku Sato will resign as Premier of Japan this summer to permit the installation of a political leader more acceptable to Communist China. Peking is said to have demanded such a sacrifice by the Japanese as the price of better relations. This undoubtedly means more trade, but what else?

Thailand, one of the best friends of the United States in Asia, and a country with a small but growing Communist problem, is also seeking some modus vivendi with the Chinese Reds. On the other hand, the Soviet Government has sent its Foreign Minister to Japan in an effort to counteract Tokyo's bent toward Peking. The return of the Kurile Islands to Japan is said to be the Soviet bait.

The dominoes are tumbling, and the end is nowhere Berry from the Beta Sigma to be seen. From Singapore to North Korea and from Tokyo to Moscow the pieces in this deadly game of international politics are falling into new patterns. The aim of the game for the free world must be never to surrender - never, never, never. More positively, it must be to press the rights of free men everywhere.





(Continued from page 1) will be large enough for two beds if necessary, thus providing a 40-bed facility. The present hospital build-

ing can be expanded by addition of a wing to the north or to the west. but the west expansion was considered more practical because present kitchen facilities would serve the new unit conveniently.

Various requirements of Medicare have made it necessary to make certain alterations and additions to the hospital plant, but others are being de-manded and the court feels that the necessary modernization can be accomplished along with the nursing home project if the voters approve the project when the bond issue is submitted at a later date.No cost estimates have been made pending completion of preliminary work by architects.

the American taxpayers 100 billion dollars a year. Welfare may need reform but I don't go for that kind of stuff. Those in actual need should be helped but I don't believe that one cent of relief money should go to an able bodied man who won't work."

Bussing may not have much significance in this area, Mr. Fisher said, but in much of the country it is the number one issue. The courts have gone wild, the Congressman said, in expanding the Supreme Court's anti-discrimination stance. It is not a civil rights issue, it is purely a flair of arrogant power that the courts are exercising. He said that he is co-sponsor of a resolution calling for a constitutional amendment clearly outlawing bussing for the sole purpose of mixing the races. Neither whites. blacks nor Mexican-Americans favor such disregard of their right to send their children to neighborhood schools, he said.

terior Secretary Rogers Morton to delay implementation of an executive order banning use of poisons for predator control on federal lands until a study of other possible means of con-




trol is completed. Tower said he also had been in contact with officials of the u. S. Department of Agriculture on the problem, which he described as "most serious" for sheep and goat raisers in Texas and other parts of the nation. The senior Texas senator suggested that the ban on predator control could be delayed at least until the livestock industry is given a review of the government's Cain Report

on predator problems. "There is some research now going on in the use of sterilants and chemical repellants, but nothing conclusive is yet known of their effectiveness," Tower pointed out.

Tower said some livestock raisers already are talking about a "population explosion" of coyotes in the western parts of the United States, and many fear that sheep losses may double within a year unless some form of predator control is practiced.


"Certainly I am interested in protecting our environment, ' Tower said he had told Secretary Morton, "but we must consider the effect such a restriction will have on the protection of sheep and goats from predators. "Federal lands which have been leased for grazing will now be open to predators except for the protection of big game for trapping and hunting. Needless to say, these methods will fall short of offering the needed con-
