## Crockett Ranchers Pocket Near Million & Half In Incentive Pay

Approximately 150 Crockett county sheep and goat ranch operators have just pocketed nearly a million and a half dollars in payment representing the 1971 incentive checks, supplementing the sale of wool and mohair in 1971 under the National Wool Act incentive program.

Payments to Crockett county

producers reached approximately \$958,000 for wool sales, \$177,000 for wool sold on the backs of lambs marketed and \$350,000 for mohair sales, according to figures compiled by Cliff Elder, County Executive Director, Crockett-Sutton ASCS office. The payments reached a total of approximately \$1,485,000, according

to the director's figures.

Mailing of checks in this amount to Crockett county producers was completed during the past week. The payments were based on the national average sale price per pound of 19.4 cents for wool and 30.1 cents for mohair. The support price for wool is set in the National Wool Act at 72 cents per pound and for mohair at 80.2 cents.

Crockett producers, counting the incentive payment, received a net price of 64.6 cents per pound for 2,103,153 pounds of wool, and mohair producers received 82 cents per pound for 705,265 pounds of mohair. A total of 150 producers had wool sales and 107 had mohair sales. The county's average price received for the products was 17.4 cents a pound for wool and 30.8 cents per pound for mohair.

The incentive rate was set at 27.1 percent of net proceeds of sales by producers for wool and 166.4 percent for mohair sales. A deduction of 1 1/2 cents per pound in each case was retained for use in promotion of wool and mohair. For wool sold on lamb's backs the rate was \$2.10 per hundredweight. The deductions for promotion from producers in this county amounted to \$31,547 for wool promotion, \$6,562 for lamb and \$10,579 for mohair promotion.

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## Charges Filed In Abduction of Woman Near Here

A San Antonio man was charged here with sodomy Wednesday following a kidnap and attack on a woman hitchhiker west of Ozona on Hwy. 290.

Berry Gullo was picked up by officers in San Antonio after officers here discovered his identity through a master charge number at a local service station. He is in jail in San Antonio charged with passing bogus checks.

Mrs. Delores Cox, 30, was allegedly attacked by the man after her husband got out of the car about 20 miles out of town to look for a lost hub-cap, and the man drove off with her. Lynn Cox, 26, and his wife caught a ride with Gullo in Junction, as they were hitch-hiking to California.

After the couple drove off, Cox flagged down a truck driver and asked him to report the kidnap when he got to Ozona. He then caught a ride west and finding no trace of the car or its passengers, he got off at Bakersfield and retraced his path. Meanwhile a truck driver found Mrs. Cox by the side of the road about five miles south of Sheffield and brought her into the town.

Gullo will be placed in the custody of Crockett County officials after charges in San Antonio are dispensed with, and the charge against him will be investigated by the grand jury.

## Nursing Home Still Under Court's Study

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in regular session. The group spent the morning hours with John Childs Allen, Austin architect, who presented plans for the nursing home wing to be built as an addition to the present hospital facility. Allen presented preliminary plans to the court last month.

The court made some alterations and asked Allen to make the changes in the plans and present them at the May court meeting.

An application for Hill-Burton funds will be made, although the court was told at a previous meeting that it is unlikely that funds will be granted the county because of the surplus of nursing homes in the area.

Application for funds must be made by May 15, or possibly before. Mr. Allen offered to confirm the deadline and report back to the court earlier if the deadline is before that date. In either case, time for discussion and the gathering of information by Crockett County voters will be brief, as a bond election must be held early in June. Voters will vote for or against the building of a nursing home with the county to furnish half the money or the building of a nursing home with the county to furnish all the money. Cost estimate is \$400,000, without furnishings.

Judge Troy Williams was the only hospital board member present. Hospital administrator Sonny Kirkden met with the group.

The court agreed to keep the youth center open on Monday night with Mr. Garland Young on hand as acting director. The youth center and civic center director Jerry Payne is off on Sunday and Monday. (continued on last page)

Rev. Byrd died at his home here at 5 p.m. Sunday. He and his wife moved to Ozona about ten months ago from Sanderson after he retired from many years as a Presbyterian minister.

Rev. Byrd was born Feb. 10, 1893 in Renick, W. Va. He was married to Helen S. Beverly June 4, 1927 in Chillicothe, Ohio. He lived in Renick 21 years and served as a Presbyterian minister in Richmond, Va. three years. He served as minister at Pecos 13 years, in Sanderson 23 years and Van Horn eight years. Rev. Byrd was a 50-year Mason.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. R. W. (Joan) Vissotzky of Seattle, Wash. and Mrs. H. E. (Virginia) Schroegler of Santa Fe, N.M. and seven grandchildren.

Rev. Byrd is a graduate of Elkins College in West Virginia and finished Union Theological Seminar in Richmond in 1927.

**Crockett Test Flows Oil And Gas On Test**

One Crockett County wildcat flowed gas and recovered oil on a drillstem test and another was plugged.

Southeast Royalty Co., Fort Worth, No. 1 Meadows, in 43-GG-HE&WT, Crockett County wildcat six miles northeast of Sheffield, 4 1/2 miles west of the Lancaster Hill (Strawn gas) field and 1 1/2 miles southwest of shallow production in the Half field and six miles northeast of the Sheffield Townsite (Pennsylvanian, Connell and Devonian) field of Pecos County, flowed gas at the Maximum rate of 200,000 cubic feet daily and recovered 300 feet of mud and gas-cut oil, plus 60 feet of drilling water, on a drillstem test in an unidentified zone.

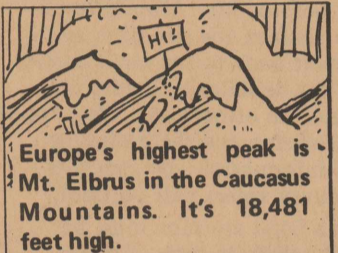
Gas flowed at the above rate on a 1/2-inch choke and decreased to 170,000 cubic feet daily after 30 minutes on the one-hour test taken at 6,513-40 feet. Flowing pressure was 85-170 pounds; one-hour initial and final shut-in pressures were 2,762 pounds.

The project, slated for 7,000 feet was taking a drillstem test at 6,540-580 feet. The firm abandoned at 7,114 feet its No. 1-17 Todd-ARCO, Crockett wildcat, 20 miles west-northwest of Ozona and 2-3/4 miles southwest of the Todd (San Andres and Ellenburger, Deep and Crinoidal Deep) field.

It recovered 200 feet of gas, 60 feet of heavily oil-and-gas-cut mud and 120 feet of slightly oil-and-gas-cut mud on a drillstem test in an unidentified zone at 7,020-064 feet.

Ranchmen and farmers whose sheep, goats, or poultry are destroyed by government-protected predators would be indemnified for such losses, under terms of legislation proposed by Congressman Bob Poage, Chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture -- in which I and several other members have joined.  
Recent federal restrictions on the use of poisons in the mounting battle against predators is the basis for proposed compensation. It would apply where the growers are by government policies prevented from the use of customary means of protecting their animals. Any loss claims would have to be proven, and payment would be based upon reasonable market value. ---0---

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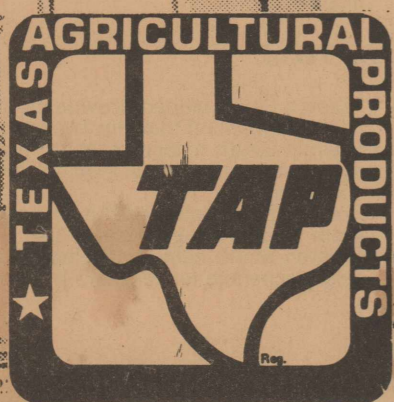

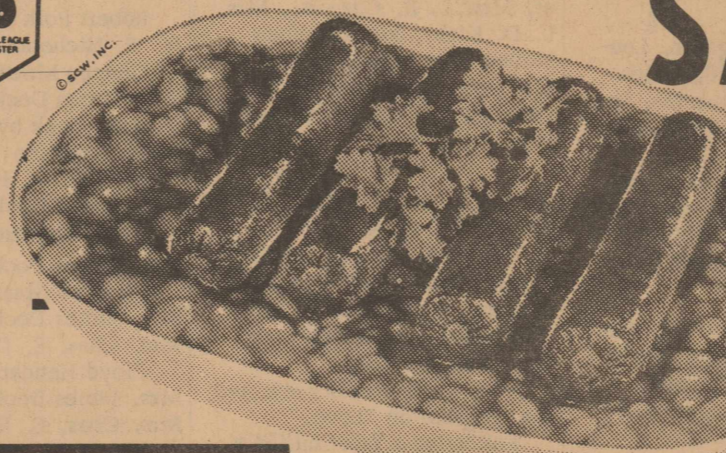

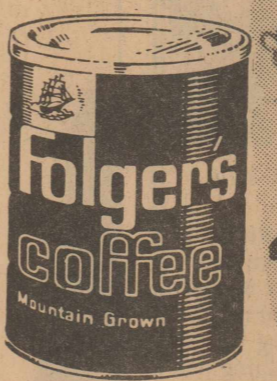

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, THAT METEOROLOGY RESEARCH, INC., OF 464 WEST WOODBURY ROAD, ALTADENA, CALIF. 91001 (State of Texas Weather Modification License #72-3), intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change

by artificial methods the natural development of any and all atmospheric cloud forms or precipitation forms which occur in the troposphere, for and on behalf of Texas Water Development Board located at P. O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711, and will conduct a program of weather modification involving research, development, and associated investigations in atmospheric water resources

2. The primary target area will be: Concho River Drainage.

aircraft for making meteorological measurements in clouds.

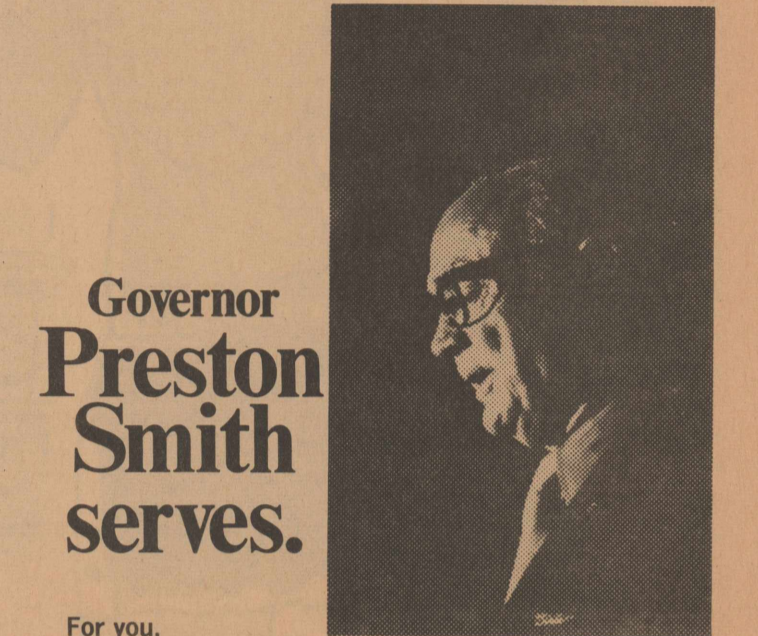

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Cheer up! Maybe the pre-Easter freeze didn't do as much damage in our area as first thought. Wishful thinking of a bountiful fruit crop will be the biggest disappointment, and perhaps a small pecan output.

There is plenty of time to replant vegetable gardens and replace tender blooming plants. Fortunately I waited until after Easter for both.

Continue to plant annuals this month for summer color. Plants for containers include begonia, dwarf zinnia, portulaca, petunia, and verbena. Those that require little attention and are less particular as to soil type include cockscomb, globe amaranth, periwinkle, cleome and gailardia. For here it is better to wait until the soil is warm to plant the amaranth, periwinkle and cockscomb. Some advise waiting until June and July, as they need full sun.

Old clumps of cannas may be lifted and divided. Plant them in deep, rich soil. You may still plant gladioli with successional plantings made every 10 to 14 days until June.

Keep up with the spraying and dusting programs. In this way you can be sure to have healthy plants. Baits for snails and slugs must be used at the first indication that these creatures are becoming troublesome.

Spring blooming shrubs that need pruning should receive this attention as soon as they have finished blooming. One that the freeze didn't damage at all is the Mississippi Dogwood.

If plants are purchased in flats or trays, remove them by slicing downward in the soil between the plants. Lift out each plant with a block of soil and place it in a planting hole in well-prepared soil. Water immediately after planting, but do not fertilize until plants show signs of new growth. Once established and blooming, summer annuals will provide unsurpassed enjoyment and beauty to your home grounds.

During this dry period, supply water to all plants that have recently been set out. Add mulch if you haven't already done so. This makes watering less of a chore.

Spring usually presents the greatest danger of poisoning from plants. Avoid letting the skin come in contact with poison ivy especially.

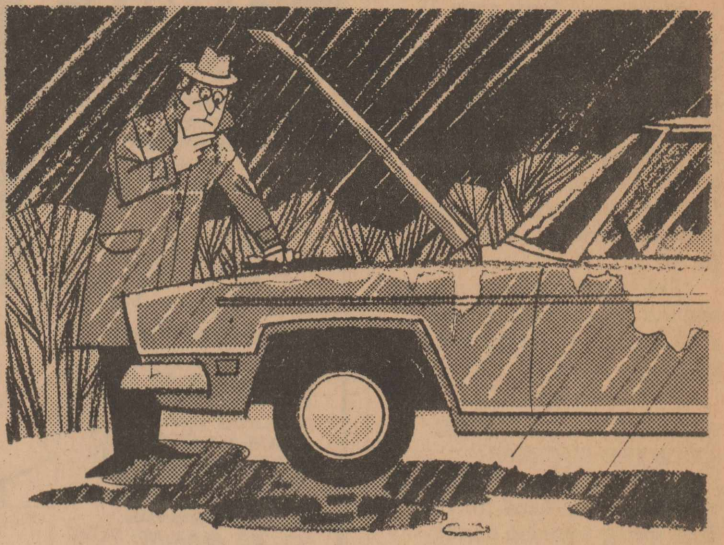

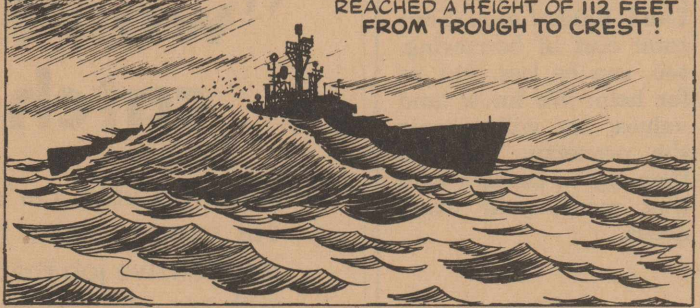

**Ranchers Urged To Keep Watch For Screwworms**

Livestock producers are urged to be on the lookout for screwworms, collect and mail in samples of any suspected cases, reminds county agent Pete W. Jacoby. Screwworm cases literally exploded across Texas in March, with 101 outbreaks confirmed in 30 counties

in the state. This compares with only 21 cases reported through April last year.

Animal Health officials are really concerned that this may be one of the worst years in history of the screwworm program, and urge producers to do everything they can to prevent a screwworm case. Navels of newborn calves and the man-made wounds from castration, dehorning and dockings are the most susceptible, along with shearing cuts. These wounds should be treated and watched closely until they have healed.

Screwworm officials report that there are not enough sterile flies to hold the line as in previous years, so producers will have to do a better job of preventing screwworm outbreaks.

Crockett county has not had a screwworm case confirmed so far this year, however, several neighboring counties have had confirmed cases. Sample kits for collecting and mailing screwworm cases can be obtained at both wool houses and at the county agent's office.

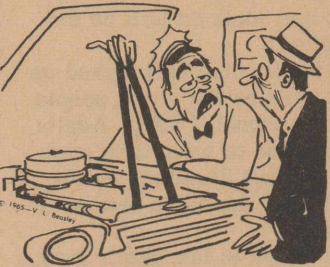
Co-chairmen of History Appreciation Week are Mrs. Pleas Childress and Fred Baker, representing the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee.
