Our congratulations to the winning Lion Track Team. May they do every bit as well or better at the State Meet in Austin next week.

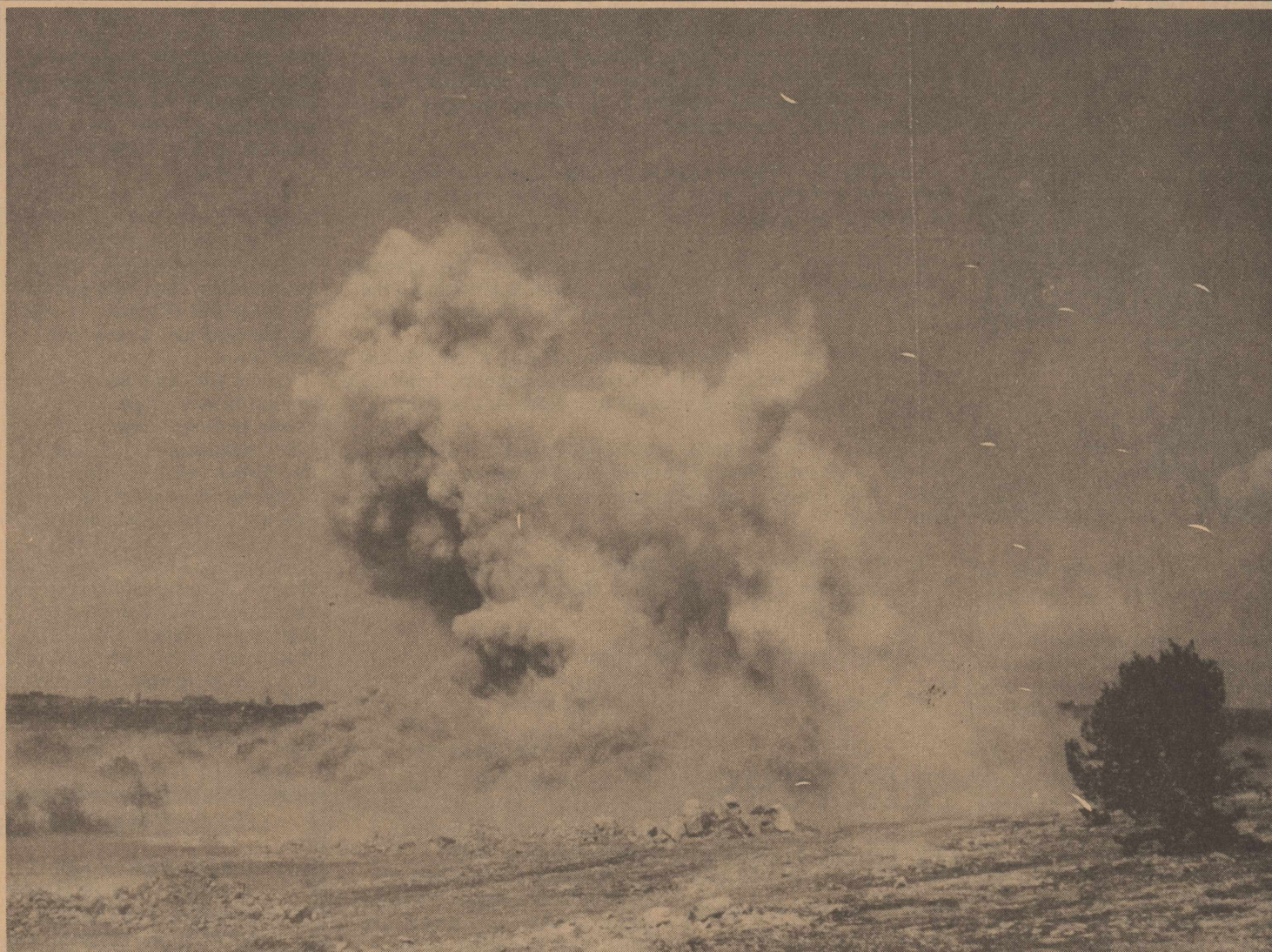
Both relay teams have run faster in each meet through the year, and the boys going to state in individual events have consistently improved, so maybe we'll come up with a state winner.

## Trail Marker Dedication Highlights History Week

Crockett County History Appreciation Week closed with a program at the civic center Friday night to dedicate the Ozona-Comstock Stage historical marker.

Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chairman of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, introduced the program.

Mrs. Joe Clayton, marker chairman, interviewed Mrs. Steve Coose and Mrs. Rufe Everett, who were both closely related to the early stage line.

Mrs. Everett's husband drove the stage at one time. Both her husband's family, the Everetts, and her family, the Patricks, were pioneers in the county and both families were connected with the stage line.

Mrs. Coose, the former Medina Taylor, daughter of G. F. Taylor, grew up in the then thriving town of Juno and remembered well seeing the stage in operation. She said the hacks were two-seated with side curtains which could be let down when cold or raining.

Mrs. Marshall Montgomery gave some interesting facts about the stage told by her mother, Mrs. Paul Perner, the former Elizabeth Odom. Mrs. Perner rode the stage back and forth between Ozona and San Antonio four times a year to continue school after she finished the 10 grades offered in

the Ozona school.

R. A. Harrell dedicated the marker which will be placed on the Ozona-Comstock highway, about 20 miles south of Ozona on Highway 163. The remains of the old stage stand will be east a short distance from the marker on the Harrell ranch.

## Funeral Service Here Tuesday For Mrs. McMullan

Funeral services for Mrs. Asiby (Alice Henderson) McMullan were held Tuesday afternoon from the Ozona United Methodist Church with Rev. John Berkley, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mrs. McMullan, 61, died early Monday morning in Morningside Manor in San Antonio after a lengthy illness.

She was born in Ozona November 22, 1910, the daughter of Crockett County ranching pioneers Mr. and Mrs. Lee Henderson. She was married to Asby McMullan in San Angelo November 25, 1929.

Mrs. McMullan graduated from Westmoreland High School in San Antonio and attended Penn Hall College in Chambers, Pa. before enrolling in Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

Following her marriage, she and her husband moved to their ranch near Big Lake where they lived until 1946 when they moved to Ozona. She was active in school affairs during the years her sons were in school and was a past president of the Ozona P.T.A. She was also a past president of the Ozona Golf Association.

Following the death of her husband in 1957, she operated the ranch holdings in Crockett and Reagan counties. She was active in the ranching business until her final illness.

Survivors include three sons, Dr. James A. McMullan and Ronnie McMullan, both of San Antonio, and Joe McMullan of Corpus Christi; two sisters, Mrs. Jack Wilkins of Ozona and Mrs. Jean Scheuber of San Angelo, and six grandchildren.

## Lions Win Regional Track Meet; Eight Contestants Go To State

The Ozona Lions won the Regional Class AA Track championship Saturday in Odessa in a one-point victory over second place Floydada.

Led to victory by their two first place relay teams, the Lions scored 56 points for the win. Floydada was second with 55, Hamlin came in third with 44, and Tahoka had 42 for the fourth place.

Eight Lion qualifiers and

two alternates will be in Austin for the State track meet May 5 and 6. The 440-relay team of Cheo Vargas, Timmy Evans, David Sewell and Gerald Huff with alternate Pete Maldonado, plus David Sewell for the 120 high hurdles, Mike Wellman for the 330 intermediate hurdles and the mile relay team of Ricky Crawford, Oliver Payne, Timmy Evans, Gerald Huff and Rick Hunnicutt as alternate.

The Lion 440 relay team took first place at regional, tying the regional record set by Stamford in 1971, with a time of 42.9, and breaking the Ozona school record. The 42.9 is among the top 20 times in the state for all classes.

In the 880 run, Randy Crawford ran fifth in his heat in the preliminaries Friday with a time of 2:06.1, but only the fastest four in each heat went on to the finals.

David Sewell placed second in the 120 high hurdles with a time of 15 flat, his fastest of the year.

Mike Wellman came in second in the intermediate hurdles with a time of 40.4 and ran a good race in spite of the handicap of drawing the outside lane.

Rick Hunnicutt had the fourth best time of the meet in the intermediate hurdles, but did not qualify for the finals since only the first two in each heat qualify.

The mile relay team took first place with a 3:24.5, only 1.5 seconds off the regional record, and set a school record. They broke the old

**FULBRIGHT HOLDS ENEMY WILL WIN**

Senator J. William Fulbright was quoted by The New York Times' radio station, WQXR, on April 9 as saying that he disagreed with Gen. Creighton W. Abrams that the North Vietnamese offensive in South Vietnam would prove "disastrous" to the enemy. The chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee must, therefore, believe that the Communist foes of the South Vietnamese and the United States will succeed in overrunning the Saigon Government and blotting out freedom in South Vietnam.

This position of Mr. Fulbright is hardly different from many another he has taken on matters involving the Communists. His view that the United States' effort to help halt the Communist drive is a "re-escalation" of the Vietnam War happens to be precisely the same as that of an editorial in The New York Times of April 9. The re-escalation of the war is exactly what the Communist North Vietnamese are doing, but in the strange upside-down language of Senator Fulbright and The Times it is the United States, not the Communists, who are guilty.

This is pretty sticky, even from sources so well established as Leftists as these. We believe the country as a whole is satisfied with the effort of President Nixon to wind down the war without disaster to South Vietnam or the foreign policy structure of the United States. The left-wing views presented here, however, suggest that nothing less than a disaster both for South Vietnam and the United States will be accepted by the defeatists.

**CONGRESS SHOULD KILL THIS ONE!**

No matter how much power is concentrated in the Federal Government in Washington, there are always those who want to give it even more power. This time a small but very vocal "super-consumer" lobby in the nation's capital is pressuring Congress to establish a "Consumer Protection Agency." The legislation is now in the Senate Government Operations Committee. The measure would establish a new government bureau (yes, another one!) with sweeping authority that makes the powers of the FBI, the CIA, the IRS and the Treasury Department seem pale by comparison—in a country that has, up to now, avoided becoming a police state.

If this seems an exaggeration, hear this: under the proposed "Consumer Protection Agency" measure, the head of the new bureau (with the innocuous title of "Consumer Advocate") would be granted:

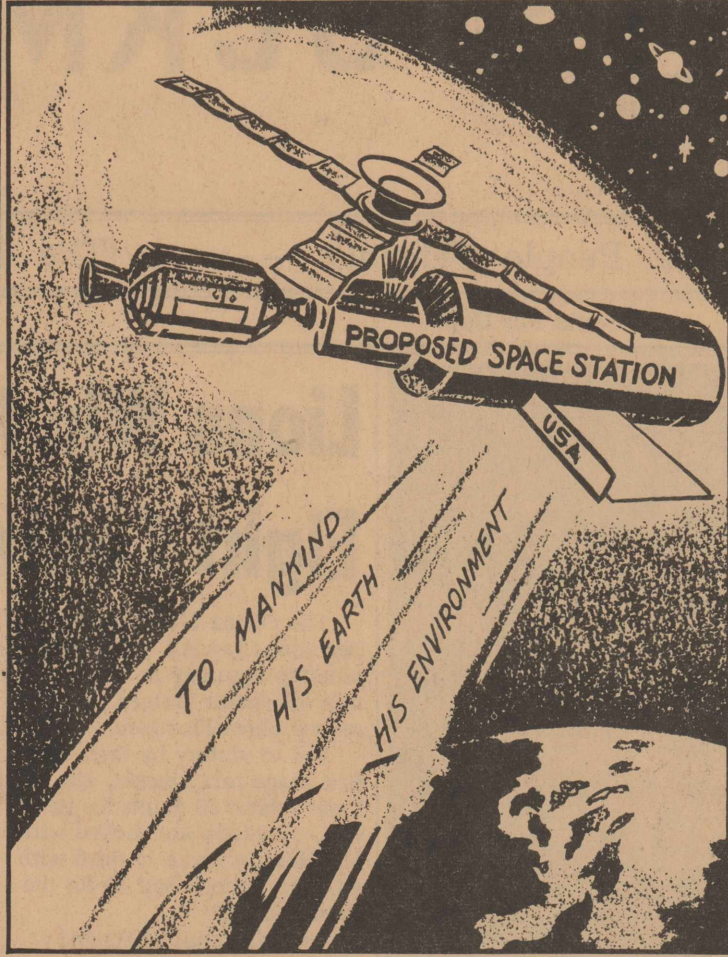
- authority to intervene as a full-fledged party in all formal proceedings of existing government regulatory agencies;
- sweeping subpoena powers that would enable him to force other government agencies to turn confidential files over to him;
- similar power to force information from private individuals and companies;
- unlimited authority to release such information (whether true, or proven, or not) at his whim and will;
- authority to take any existing agency to court as a full party to a case, whether or not he had participated in previous proceedings;
- and much more.

Great pressure is being brought upon members of the Congress and Senate by aggressive lobbyists for the "super-consumer" movement. Representatives are being told that to vote for a strong bill will count them as "pro-consumer"; to vote against it, or to vote to limit the Consumer Advocate's authority, will mark him as "anti-consumer." And members of Congress, faced with the prospect of having to vote on the "protection agency" bill on the eve of the election, when millions of consumers will go to the polls to elect a new Congress, could very well be panicked into passing the measure.

Passage of the proposed "Consumer Protection Agency" bill would constitute a dangerous breakdown of the American idea of limited, restricted government. Consumer "protection" is fine — but as for a Super Spy agency, this we can do without.

Voice of another Newcomer:

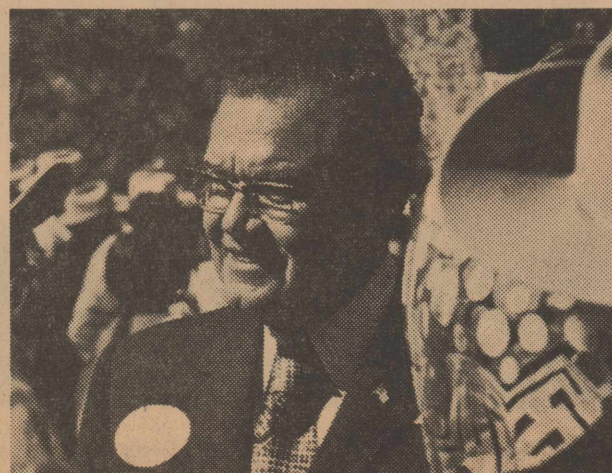
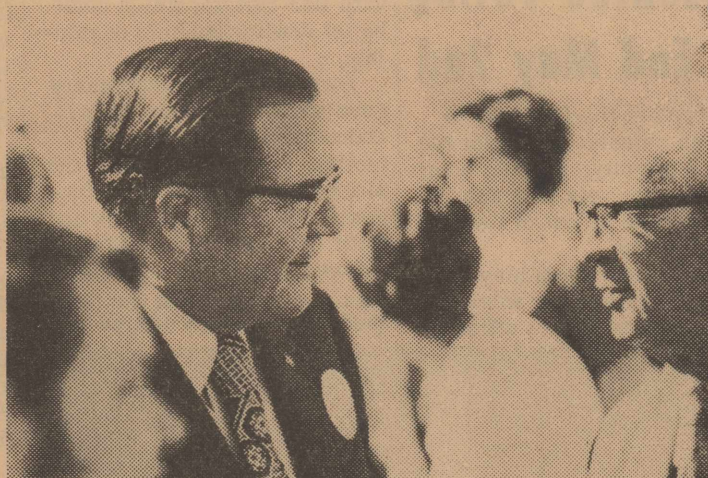

**Washington News Letter**

Signs of pro-communist, anti-U.S., sentiment surfaced in the Washington area recently, following American resistance to the brutal North Vietnamese mass invasion of the Republic of South Vietnam.

More than 20 pro-commie youths visited the Soviet Embassy here, brazenly called on the Russians to "Avenge Hanoi and Haiphong" and "Send more missiles to shoot down more U. S. Planes."

In suburban College Park, home of Maryland University, 300 demonstrators screamed anti-American slogans, burned an American flag, and forced the Maryland Governor to call out the National Guard to restore order.

About the same time, a resolution was adopted by a caucus of House Democrats which condemned U. S. bomber interference with movement of supplies to support the advancing Communist invasion.

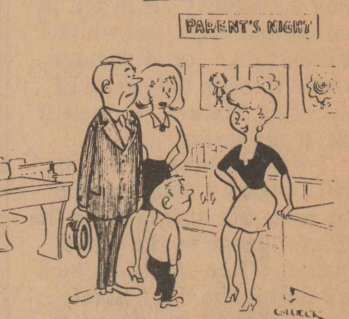
Meanwhile, the warlords of Hanoi and Moscow assessed the vast damage wrought by the surprise B-52 bombing of large supply dumps around Haiphong, which has been unloaded by Soviet freighters. And they had to reckon with reports, believed fairly accurate, of some 7,000 invaders killed. With only 85,000 U. S.

forces remaining in Vietnam (including only 8,000 combat troops), and in view of anti-military sentiment being heard from presidential candidates and others, the enemy evidently concluded it was time to strike.

To protect American lives and protect the Vietnamization program, and in retaliation against the illegal invasion across the neutral DMZ, President Nixon wisely called for the bombing of enemy troop concentrations and vast supply lines. It follows that if the invasion

is defeated, U. S. lives will be saved and chances for meaningful negotiations for a settlement including release of American prisoners, will be greatly enhanced.

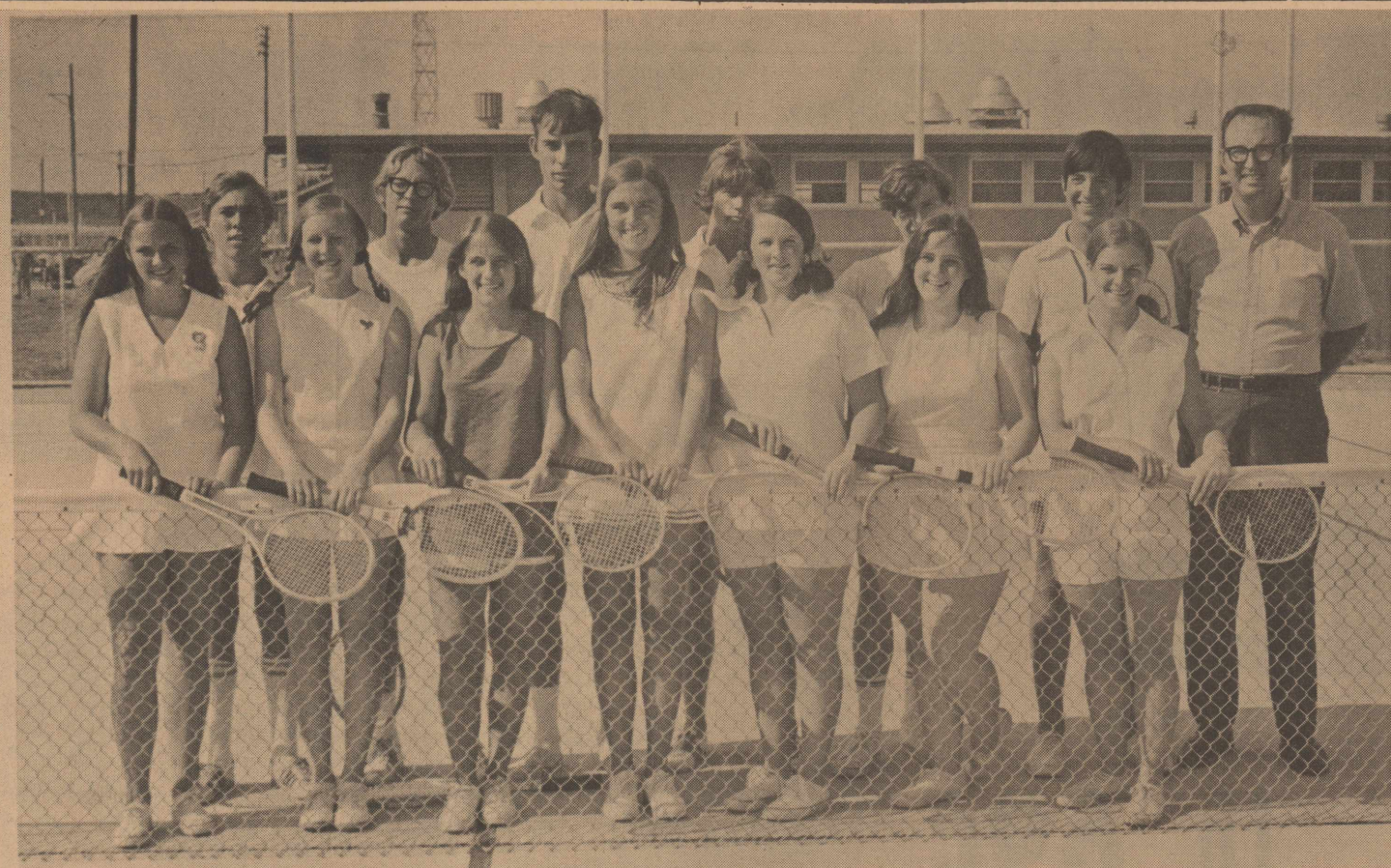
## Annual Ozona FFA Parent-Son Banquet Tonight

DON'T BLOCK THE PATH  
Occasionally, we bring you interior decorating hints and here are some about furniture arrangement that a lot of people overlook.

There is nothing more disturbing (and painful) than walking through a living room and banging your shins on the sharp edge of a misplaced coffee table.

Remember that most rooms lead to somewhere else and you must have free movement within a room a room with clear access through it.

The furniture in too many rooms is arranged like an obstacle course. This does not mean that you should line all your furniture up against the walls. Actually it is very possible and not difficult to maintain all of the all of the elements of good arrangement and still provide easy access through and within each room.

Don't block the entrances and exits. Place chairs close enough for conversation but far enough apart to allow plenty of leg room.

Arrange coffee tables close enough to sofas and chairs to be useful but far enough away to permit free passage between the tables and furniture pieces.

And, many people make the mistake of using too large a dining room table in a small dinette so that when you try to sit down at the table, you find yourself pulling the chairs up against the wall. Better use a smaller table with larger extension leaves.

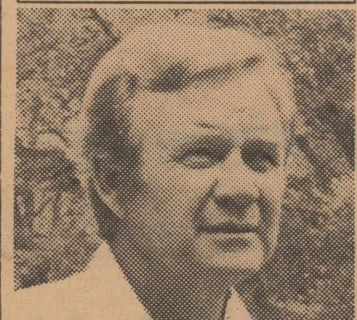
### Crockett 4-H Range Judging Team Is Second

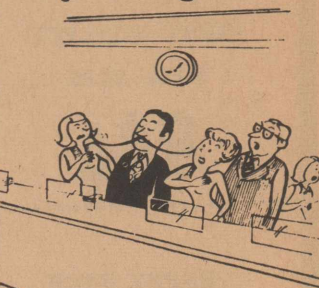

After another year of untimely weather disturbances, and a hair-line miss of a hail storm only hours after the close of our fourteenth annual flower show. We feel it was worth the effort and and work involved.

As always, the best horticulture available at the time is shown, and there is fun and plenty of conversation over the many arrangements in the various classes in the design division. 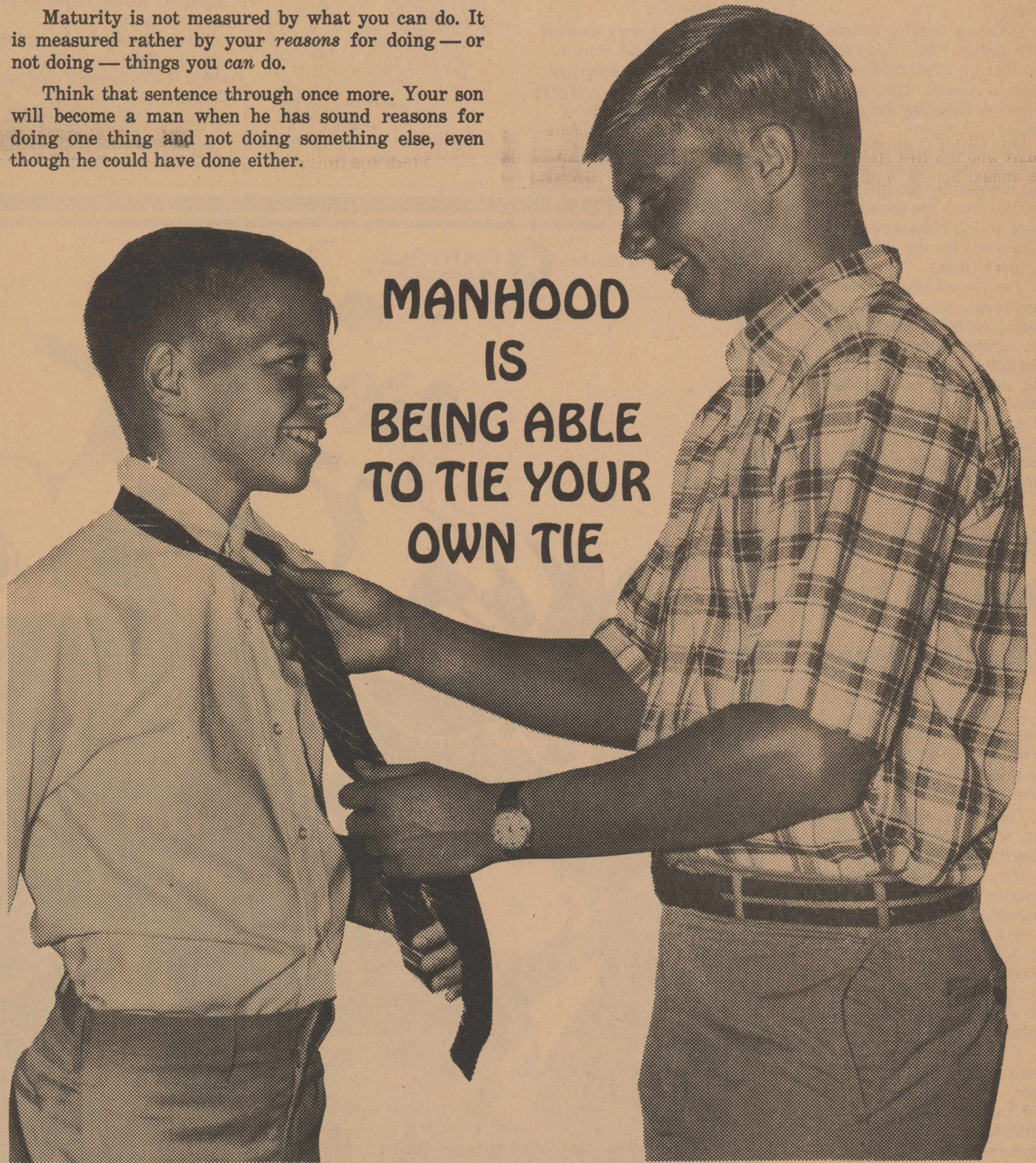

Stage Stand.

Stone Ruins nearby mark site of Early 1900's Stage Stand. First stop on passenger and mail line connecting Ozona with Southern Pacific Railroad at Comstock - 80 miles distant. When stage pulled in about 8:00 a.m. (having left Ozona at 5:00) agent had fresh horses in harness for next 20-mile run.

Agent's family lived in tent with a flagstone floor. Other structures here were rock pens for a pig and cow and probably a corral for horses. Automobile replaced stage about 1914, but wagon ruts are still visible. (1972)

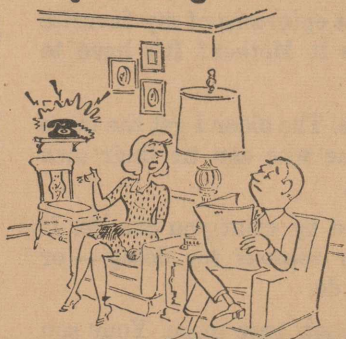

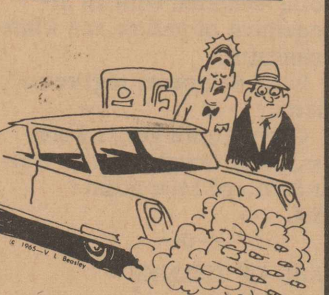
