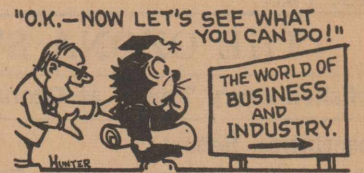

## Annual 4H Horse Show Saturday At Fair Park

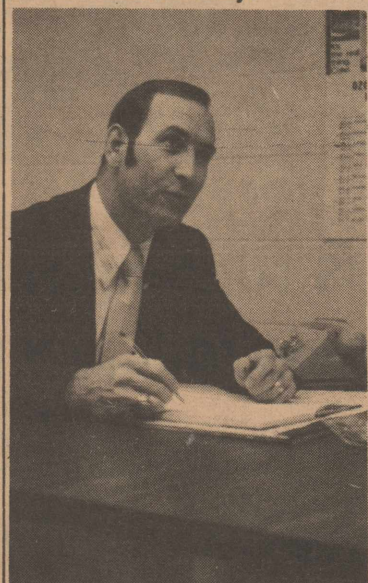

## .39 Inches Rain In Blustery Hail Shower Monday

Ozona received .39 of an inch of rain, along with small hail Monday afternoon late in an isolated thunderstorm.

The storm apparently covered only the city and did not spread to outlying areas of the county.

The moisture was the first since .30 of an inch was recorded in mid-April, the total rainfall for that month.

## Hotly Contested Races Expected To Draw Record Primary Vote Sat.

A record number of Crockett County voters are expected to cast ballots in the Democratic Primary Saturday. A total of 2,039 voters are registered for the primary. Those who did not register 30 days prior to the election will not be eligible to vote in the primary, but

will be eligible to vote in future elections, under the new law which requires that a voter register 30 days prior to an election in order to be eligible to vote.

Absentee voting has been brisk, with a total of 150 voting absentee as of early

Monday. Tuesday was the deadline for absentee voting. The large number of absentee voters is another indication of a large voter turnout for the primary.

Races of most interest to local voters will be that of District Attorney for the 112th Judicial District, and the contested races for commissioner in Precinct 1 and Precinct 3.

Dixon Mahon of Ozona is opposed in his bid for re-election by Charles M. Prock of Fort Stockton.

In a hotly contested race in Precinct 1 for the commissioner's race, incumbent Jesse Marley is opposed by Weldon Maness, service station owner; W. P. Seahorn, rancher, and Armando Reina, recreation hall operator. The precinct has 655 registered voters, the largest number to register in any precinct and by far the largest number ever registered in Precinct 1.

Precinct 3, where incumbent Commissioner Jack Williams is opposed by Ted Lewis, local grocery store operator and owner, has a record 630 registered voters. Of the 630, 28 will vote at the WTU power plant box.

Precinct 1 voters will vote at the courthouse where James Baggett is the election judge.

Precinct 2 voters will cast ballots at the home economics building at high school. Tommy Harris is the election judge.

Polls will be open at the auditorium-coliseum (civic center) building for Precinct 3 voters, with Buster Deaton the election judge.

Joe Couch will be the election judge for Precinct 4 where voters in that precinct will vote at the Ozona Primary School.

Mrs. Roy Childs is the election judge at the Powell Field box which is in Precinct 2, and has 19 registered voters.

J. A. Carroll will be in charge of the power plant box in Precinct 3.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. Saturday and close at 7 p.m.

Voters will also vote "for" or "against" a referendum stating "No public school student shall because of his race, creed, or color, be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students." The referendum is stated in rather confusing terms, as a vote "for" the referendum is a vote against school busing and a vote "against" is a vote for busing.

Keynote speaker at the Sunday afternoon business session will be J. W. (Bill)

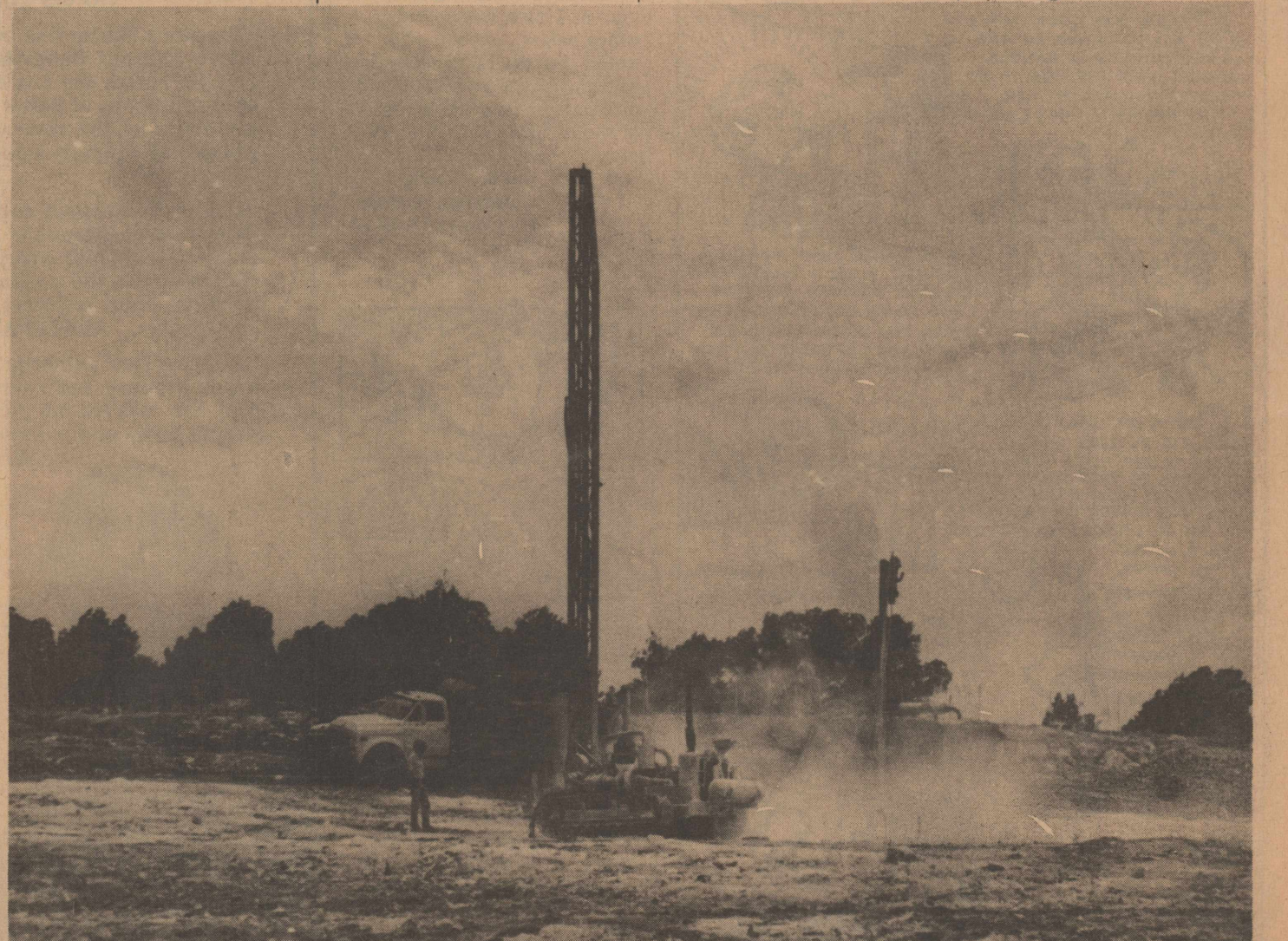
## Annual Awards Banquet of FFA Thursday Night

When's An Issue Not An Issue?

A lot of innuendos, rumors, gossip and perhaps some plain misstatements of facts should be cleared up with the letter from Hospital Board Chairman Joe Couch in this week's letters to the editor column.

The statement has been made, in the manner of a great discovery, that Dr. Carlisle has made application to practice in the Crockett County Hospital--and that he is still not practicing therein. Mr. Couch goes into details of the requirements of the Hospital by-laws for the proper procedure for making such application, making it clear that the hospital administration has done its part and that the matter is still in process and nobody has insulted anybody and nobody has shut the door on anybody else.

If wolf-wolfing the hospital got one man elected to public office, the tired issue is not one today and for the good of the community and the future possibility of adequate medical care for its people, it is to be hoped that those who are charged with responsibility for administering the facility will be left to their task. If the hospital service seems expensive, it is to the credit of an adequately provided tax base and a county administration conscious of the public need in maintaining the service in the face of extreme difficulties.

Mr. Couch points to the fallacy of much of the criticisms being launched in this political year--much should have been pointed out in previous years--and hopefully this issue, such as it is, will be dropped for more fruitful thinking in the public interest. In the final analysis, the hospital, one of the finest small hospitals anywhere in Texas, will serve this community adequately and at an economical rate of administrative cost when adequate and competent medical service is available locally. Mr. Couch has promised adequate screening of doctors seeking to serve here and that will be a main step in launching the search for that service.

Board Chairman Would Clarify Hospital Status

Dear Editor:

I do not especially like to write letters to the newspaper. However, I feel it my duty to do so now.

There have been too many false rumors and false information circulated in our town about the Crockett County Hospital and our doctor situation.

The hospital board has worked hard to provide good facilities for medical attention, yet keep the hospital from being an overbearing financial drag on our community. As for securing doctors, it has been and still is, a never-ending task. We do not intend, however, to take

any doctor into our hospital until he has been investigated and found to practice ethical medicine, and comply with the by-laws of our hospital. I do not believe that the citizens of Ozona would want us to do otherwise.

I have before me a circular with Armando Reina's name at the bottom which states, "I knew on Friday, April 7th, that Dr. Carlisle had submitted his application to the Commissioners Court. On Monday, April 10th, the commissioners had their meeting for the month. They didn't consider his application."

Let me explain this to you. A doctor does not apply to the

Commissioners Court, he applies to the hospital administrator, and from there his application goes through a prescribed procedure. These are not secret rituals, but plain cold facts written out in the by-laws of the Crockett County Hospital. The by-laws, as well as the board meetings, are open to anyone who desires to read them or attend a board meeting. I have before me a letter entitled "A letter to the people of Crockett County" with Armando Reina's name printed at the bottom. In this letter he states "I believe Dr. Carlisle has submitted his application to the medical staff and hospital board as of 4/7/72."

In reply to this I would like the people to know that I received a letter from Dr. Carlisle written to me personally and dated 4/6/72 in which he indicated his desire to become a staff member. I delivered this letter to our hospital administrator, Mr. Edwin Kirklen, and advised him to write Dr. Carlisle and inform him of proper procedure for filing application, which he did. Article VI, Section III, Sub-Section I of the by-laws of the Crockett County Hospital indicate that a doctor applying for admittance will make application on the prescribed forms, and supply the prescribed information. This was explained in Mr. Kirklen's letter to Dr. Carlisle as well as telling him that he would be happy to furnish him forms. At the writing of this letter Dr. Carlisle has not made a formal application to the hospital.

It is not my intention to get the hospital mixed up in a campaign fight, but to try to keep it out of one. In my opinion, anyone using the local medical situation for campaigning to the point that it is detrimental to the procuring of doctors or in any way causing unrest in a matter of such importance to all of us, is not really thinking of the good of the people of our community.

Finally, I would like to say, as I have said so many times before, anyone who would like the facts needs only to come to the hospital board meetings or read the by-laws of the hospital - it's that simple.

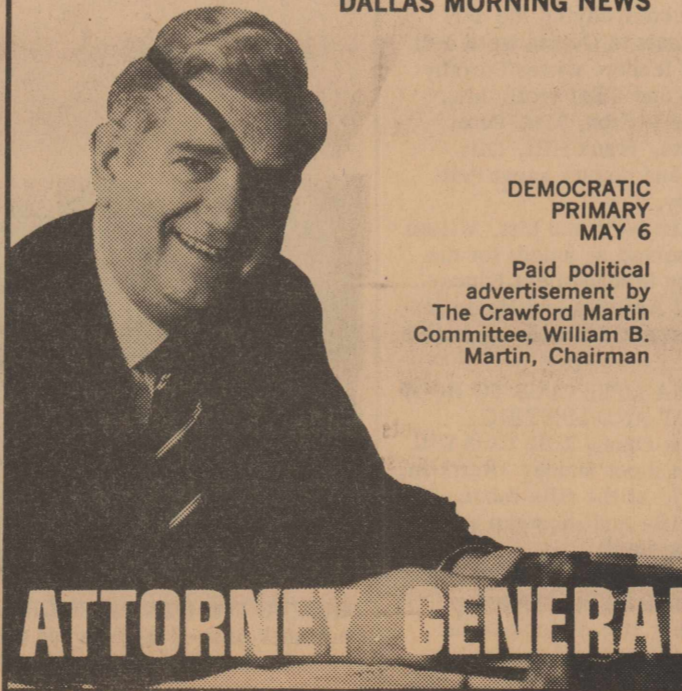

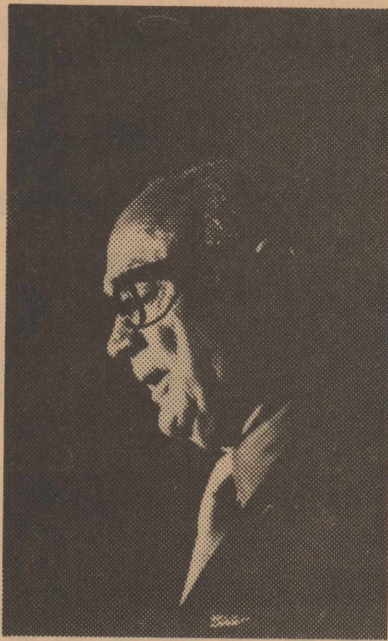

## Washington News Letter

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

The Congress has been on a spending spree for several years, and it is getting worse. Annual deficits plagued the Kennedy, the Johnson, and now the Nixon administrations. These deficits are now on the order of \$40-billion annually, and the debt limit was recently raised to \$450-billion.

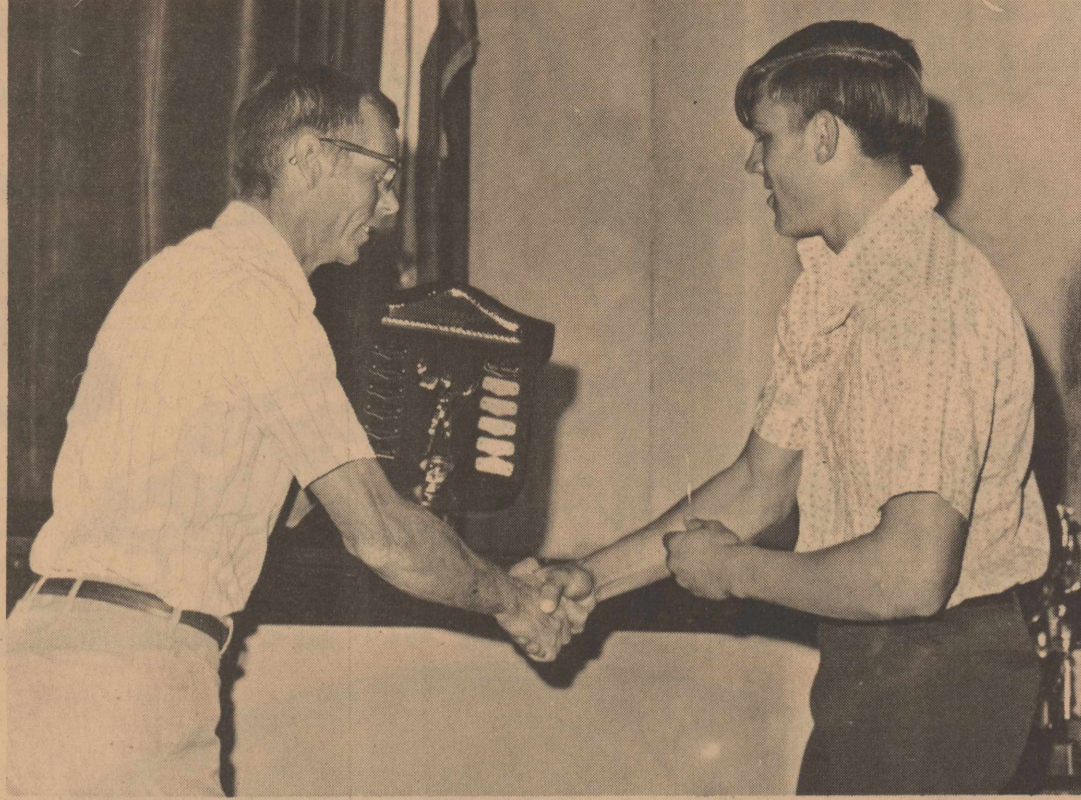
Notwithstanding this alarming rise in spending, new demands are multiplying. Among them is a \$5 billion revenue sharing measure, soon to be considered, which would be divided among the various States and municipalities.

Another bill would authorize ultimately around \$20 billion annually for college aid. Another one, to promote clean water -- a laudible cause -- would over a 10-year period cost \$25-billion.

A guaranteed annual income bill now pending, would cost initially \$4 to \$6 billion a year.

A pending housing measure would cost several billions and there's a \$4-billion vocational rehabilitation bill being considered.

These are but a few of the many new programs being proposed. These, added to the mounting costs of the many great society welfare and other projects, account for much of the mounting deficit picture which prompted George Mahon, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, to warn we "are facing fiscal collapse."

Under our system it's easy to spend and spend, add it to the public debt, and charge much of it to future generations. It's a dangerous course to follow and unless some brakes are applied will undoubtedly lead to inevitable disaster.

Moreover, so long as this free spending policy is followed, inflation will continue to plague us. The two go hand-in-hand.

**West Texans See Brush Control Work Results By Ozona Rancher**

West Texas ranchers are being invited to the Joe Tom Davidson ranch south of Ozona Tuesday, May 9, to see for themselves results achieved with a new brush control chemical said to be twice as effective as 2, 4, 5, -T.

The chemical, Tordon 225 Mixture, has been widely tested in Texas since 1963 but has become available for non-experimental use for the first time this season following registration by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency.

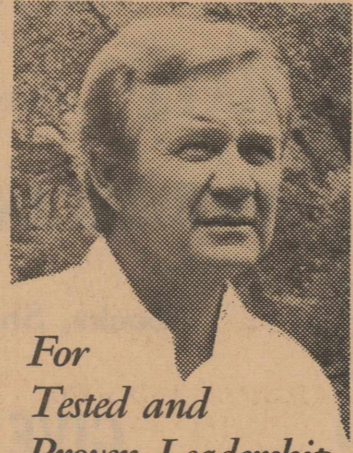

Davidson sprayed 500 acres of mesquite-infested land with the new material in 1970 when it was available for that year only under terms of a state Department of Agriculture experimental label. At the same time, in May of 1970, Davidson had 1200 acres of adjacent land sprayed with 2, 4, 5-T--until now the most commonly used chemical for brush control.

"I wanted to see what the difference would be," he says.

Now, two growing seasons later, ranchers are being invited to his ranch 17 miles south of Ozona on the left side of Hwy. 163 at 11 a.m. to

judge that difference for themselves. Tour signs will be placed on the highway. A free lunch will be served. The tour is open to "anyone who is interested in Tordon," according to Rushing Sheffield, San Angelo, a Tordon distributor, who is co-sponsoring the event with the Dow Chemical Co.

Davidson, who produces

beef and sheep on 35 sections, said the Tordon 225 was applied by Miller Flying Service of San Angelo, at the recommended West Texas rate of a half pound per acre at a cost ---at the time---of \$5.50 an acre (it's cheaper this year). The 2, 4, 5-T, put on the same three-day spraying session, cost \$2.65.

"To pay the difference, Tordon had to give about twice as much kill or last twice as long," Davidson says.

Today the veteran rancher believes the new chemical has done that much or more. "You

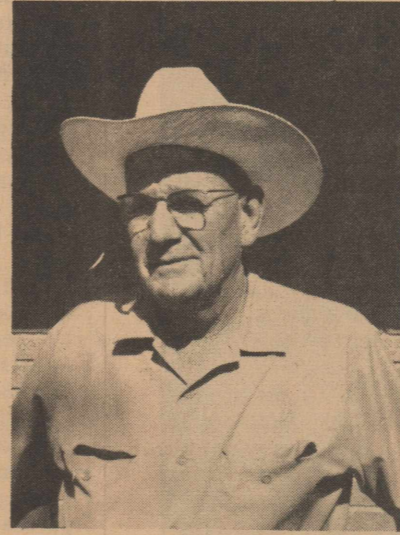
can plainly see where the Tordon was sprayed and where the 2, 4, 5-T was," he asserts. "The Tordon 225 gave a lot more kill."

Visual observation makes it clear there is much less leaf "flagging" and re-sprouting of mesquite in the Tordon-treated pasture than in the pastures

sprayed with 2, 4, 5-T, he says. He adds that the timber appears completely dead in the Tordon area with most so dry and brittle it is easy to break and to kick over old trees. Much of the mesquite treated with 2, 4, 5-T still has enough springiness left that it will not break clean.

Davidson believes 2, 4, 5-T will continue to have a place in brush control in West Texas, particularly on leased land where operators are looking for the fastest pay out on the lowest possible initial investment. For longer-lasting results, he believes Tordon will prove more satisfactory.

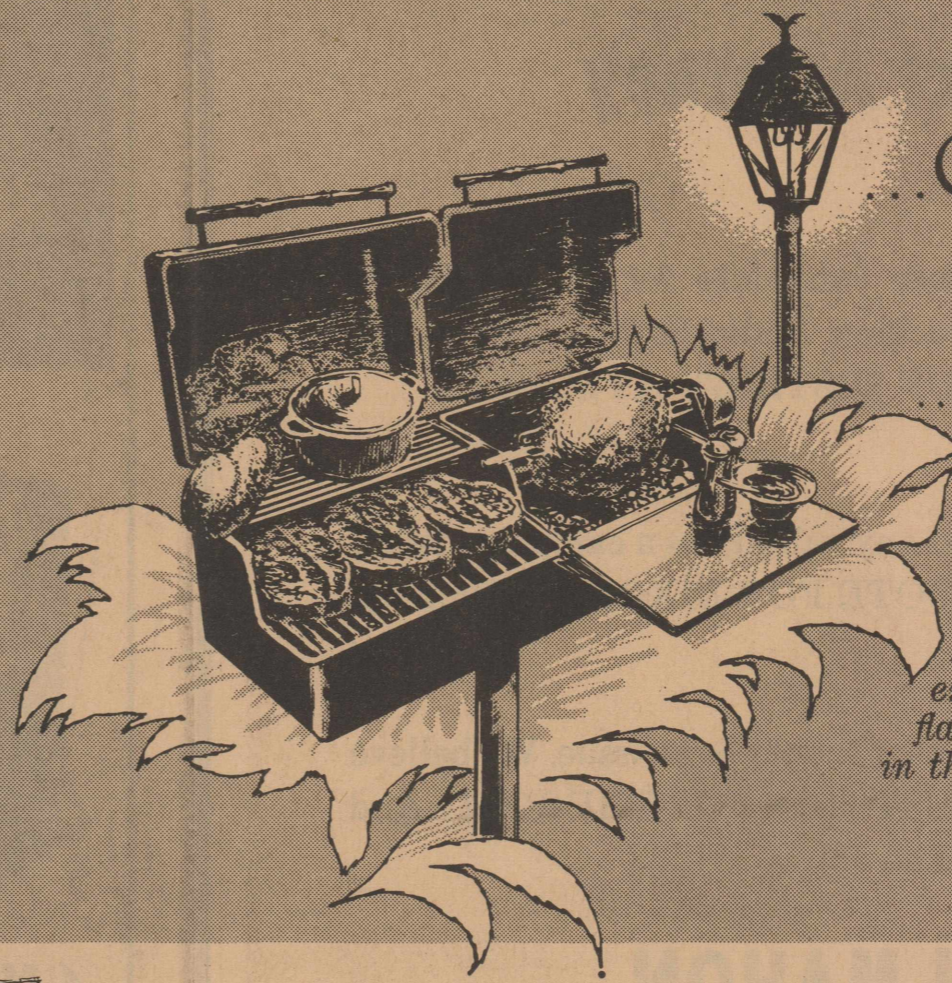

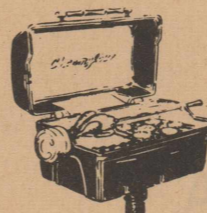

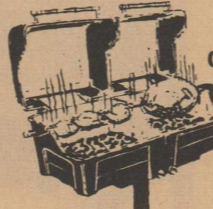

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club

Usually May brings warmer weather in our area, so take advantage of the cool days to complete spring planting of summer annuals, bulbs, and vegetables. After setting out plants, it's best to shade them for a few days while they become established. Especially they need this cover if very windy or hot. Uncover at night.

Watch for blackspot and powdery mildew. These diseases are encouraged by wet foliage. When you water, be careful that the leaves of shrubs and plants dry before night, if water sprays are used.

Spend some time now in your rose garden for big dividends later in the year and in following years. Roses, being heavy feeders, require regular application of a balanced fertilizer throughout their growing season. One-fourth cup of 8-8-8 per rose bush should be sufficient. Be sure the soil is moist at the time. Spread the fertilizer over the surface, work into the top inch of soil and water thoroughly. Repeat every six to eight weeks until late summer. Frequency of watering depends upon soil type, climate condition and growth stage of plants. Use a soaker or other method to keep water off the leaves. Soak the soil to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. A good mulch will protect the roots from extreme heat. Remove all spent flowers.

For abundant summer bloom, feed crepe myrtle this month with fertilizer, same as for roses, 8-8-8. For a large shrub, use as much as one cup per plant. If you did not apply a slow-release fertilizer to your lawn earlier this year, a little nitrogen this month will benefit the lawn. Five pounds of ammonium nitrate per 1,000 square feet is sufficient. Water the lawn thoroughly after feeding.

Vegetable lovers may plant seeds of bush beans and limas now. Corn and okra also will thrive in the warm soil. Others to try by transplants, are eggplant, pepper, tomato, sweet potato and onions.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. will drill the No. 1-B J. S. Weathered, an 8,500-foot Ellenburger wildcat, in Crockett County, six miles southeast of McCamey and 1 1/4 miles north of the Ellenburger opener of the Tripoli (Ellenburger and Pennsylvanian detrital) field.

Location is 1,980 feet from the southwest and southeast lines of 14-36-H&TC, Abst. 4991.

W. A. Moncrief Jr., Midland, will plug back to 1,600 feet for recompletion attempt in the San Andres at his No. 1 University, opener and lone producer in the Wamcoo (Canyon) field of Crockett County, 15 miles north of Ozona and 1-7/8 mile east and slightly north of the depleted Midway Lane, Northeast (San Andres) field.

An Ellenburger failure, it was drilled to 8,205 feet, plugged back to 7,991 feet and completed Jan. 22 to pump 56.02 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, plus 5.43 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 2,633-1, through perforations at 7,377-388 feet and 7,804-856 feet. It topped the San Andres at 1,590 feet and the Grayburg at 1,192 feet on ground elevation of 2,619 feet.

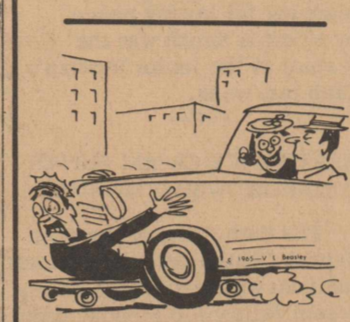
