

A write-in vote for Democratic Chairman for the county gave John R. Hunnicutt, local rancher, a clear-cut majority over Robert Flores, county employee. Hunnicutt received 341 votes to Flores' 68. There were other scattered write-ins.

Luis Martinez, another county employe, got 58 write in votes to become Democratic Precinct Chairman for Precinct 1, while Buster Deaton polled a majority of the write-in votes in Precinct 3 to get the job. He received 17 votes.

Votes for precinct chairman in Precincts 2 and 4 were scattered with several tied for the post in both polling places. The outcome had not been settled at press time.

County votes in the race for United States Senator went to former Senator Ralph Yarborough, 552, and Barefoot Sanders, 429. Other candidates and votes were Alfonso Veloz, 138; Hugh Wilson, 106, and Thomas Cartlidge, 53.

O. C. Fisher ran unopposed for U. S. Representative, District 21, receiving 784 votes.

For Governor, Dolph Briscoe, Uvalde rancher, received the majority of the Crockett County vote, polling 782. His opponent in the June 3, run-off, Frances Farenthold, received 251 votes to come in second. Governor Preston Smith and Lt. Governor Ben Barnes had poor showings with 163 and

I have noticed that the President's commission to study marijuana and its effects has reported that it's perfectly harmless and at least one of the members of the commission reported that he had smoked it himself. I don't know what kind of research they did or how well, but I find this a bit distressing.

I am more inclined to believe Dr. Jess Lord, associate professor of sociology, UT at Arlington, who has recently had a book published on the subject. After two and a half years of research the professor said: "As I went through research, I became more and more impressed with the damaging aspects of marijuana. My impression of the drug shifted, believing it to be more dangerous than I had thought originally.

Dr. Lord launched research for his book by supervising the extensive testing of 37 marijuana users, both male and female, ages 17 to 23. Results of the testing revealed that what a marijuana user feels and what he thinks he feels while under the influence of the drug differs sharply. Also, the 37 marijuana users were poorly adjusted, considerably more so than the normal college age group. He found that as the amount of marijuana smoked increased, the level of undesirable response rose accordingly.

He obtained "very definite reactions" from the test subjects in five broad areas contact with reality, overt anxiety, social adjustment, excitement and personal adequacy.

In the final chapter of his book, "Marijuana and Personality Change," Dr. Lord stresses that a great deal about the drug and its use is unknown and utilizes the final chapter to pose unanswered questions.

If, after two and a half years research, the professor believes the drug to be more dangerous than he originally (Continued on last page)



**Mahon Is Re-Elected As District Attorney** 

112th District Attorney Dixon Mahon was returned to office in Saturday's Democratic Primary by a 1400 plus vote victory over his opponent, Fort Stockton attorney Charles M. (Buz) Prock.

Mahon has served as District Attorney for the 112th Judicial District for the past ten years. He was appointed to the office in 1962 when Connel Ashley resigned the office and moved from Fort Stockton. He drew an opponent in 1964, another Fort Stockton attorney, Bill Mc-Donald, and was victorious. Since then he ran unopposed for the office until this year.

Mahon carried every county in the district with the exception of Pecos County. However, even in that county he carried every town except Prock's hometown of Fort Stockton, and the vote was

Broken down the results were Crockett County - Mahon 1177, Prock 187; Sutton County - Mahon 419, Prock 185; Upton County-Mahon 896, Prock 452; Pecos County Mahon 1438, Prock 1654. In Pecos County the towns of Sheffield, Iraan, Coyanosa, Girvin and Imperial all went heavily for Mahon.

Robert S. Calvert, the incumbent Comptroller of Public Accounts, led his six oppo-nents with 561 votes. R. G. Pendleton was second with 157, followed by James Wilson with 128 and Dallas Blankenship with 118. The other three candidates polled well under 75 votes each.

Incumbent Jesse James led the ticket for State Tressurer with 635 votes. His nearest opponent, out of a field of six, Lauro Cruz, received 259 votes.




### AND LIKE A CRAB, WE WOULD CRAWL **BACKWARDS**

Eddie and the corner grocer were boon companions. Often, when business was slow, the two men would engage in friendly scuffling around the store. One day, the grocer shoved Eddie a little too vigorously. Eddie lost his footing, fell against the counter, and cracked two ribs.

That ended their friendship. In short order, Eddie sued the grocer for damages on grounds of assault and battery. But a court turned him down, saying his claim was barred by the doctrine of "assumption or risk." This doctrine has wide appli-

cation in all kinds of playful and recreational activities.



In another case two fishermen were sitting in a rowboat when one, trying to make a backward cast, hooked his companion in the cheek. Sued later for damages, he sought refuge in the doctrine of assumption of risk. "Accidents," he said, "will happen."

But the court said accidents like this will not happen if fishermen are reasonably careful with their hooks. The victim had not assumed a risk, said the court, that was preventable by plain common sense.

Ever get the yen to bake some old-fashioned spicey .cookies? Try these recipes and add them to your cookie recipe collection JUMBLES

1 stick softened butter or margarine 1 egg, beaten

2 cups unsifted flour 1 cup sugar  $\frac{1}{4}$  teas. ground nutmeg Sugar

Combine softened butter and beaten egg. In a separate bowl blend together flour, 1 cup sugar and nutmeg. Stir into margarine or butter mixture; mix well. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead lightly a few times, until dough forms a ball.

Wrap in waxed paper and chill at least one hour. To shape, lightly roll about 1 tablespoon of dough into a 6-inch rope. Roll in sugar. Place on greased baking sheet, curving to form ring. Repeat until all dough is used. Bake at 375 degrees about 12 minutes, or until done. Remove from baking sheet and cool on wire racks. Makes

32 cookies. ALMOND COOKIES 2 sticks margarine 1 cup sugar 1 egg  $2\frac{1}{2}$  cups unsifted flour 1 teas. cream of tartar 1 teas. baking soda

1 teas. ground mace  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups chopped blanched almonds In a large bowl cream together softened margarine and sugar until light. Mix in egg. In a separate bowl blend together flour, cream of tartar, baking soda and mace. Stir into margarine mixture. Bland well.

Form dough into 1- inch balls. Roll in chopped almonds. Place on greased baking sheets. Press down using floured tumbler.

Bake at 375 degrees 12 to 15 minutes. Remove and cool on wire racks. Makes 36.





In the referendum concerning school busing to achieve racial balance, Crockett County voters voted 841 against busing and 335 for busing.
