## Registration This Week Commissioners Court Classes Begin Mon. In Busy Session Mon.

High School juniors and seniors registered for the fall school term Tuesday with sophomores registering Wednesday and freshmen registered this morning. Students in junior high school registered Tuesday and Wednesday. Elementary school students will register Monday, and classes will be held in all schools.

Although classes begin officially Monday, teachers have been in classrooms and workshops all this week for the required "in service" training. The faculty had been completed last week, but the resignation of Doug Fisk, junior high social studies teacher, created another vacancy over the weekend. Supt. L. B. T. Sikes signed a replacement for Fisk Tuesday. Mr. Sherrill McCleery, a graduate of Angelo State University, will teach eighth grade social studies in Fisk's place. Fisk and his family moved to Wallace, Texas where he will be high school principal. McCleery comes here from San Angelo where he taught in Lee Junior High last year. He also taught a year in the Paint Rock school system.

Sikes also signed a new high school biology teacher

to replace Bob Hinds last week. Teaching biology and coaching will be Richard Granada, a graduate of Sul Ross. He comes to Ozona from Stanton where he taught the past two years.

Other new faces on the faculty for the fall term include Lane Scott, band director; Alex Valverde, junior high and elementary Spanish teacher; Miss Gloria Duarte, high school Spanish; Joe Skalak, eighth grade math teacher; Mrs. Sherry Scott, junior high social studies; Mrs. Cecilia Allen, high school speech teacher.

### Oil Discovery Assured For Crockett County

A Strawn reef discovery apparently had been assured in Crockett County with the flowing of new oil at Fortune Drilling Corp., San Angelo, No. 1 Meadows, in 43-GG-HE&WTRR, re-entry operation, six miles northeast of Sheffield and 4 1/2 miles west of the Lancaster Hill (Strawn gas) field and 1 1/2 miles southeast of shallow production (Continued on last page)

Crockett County Commissioners Court met in regular session with all members present. Also present was Joan Nicholas, reporter for the Standard Times of San Angelo.

Maintenance Superintendent Dudley McCary was also assigned the supervision of both Cedar Hill Cemetery and Lima Cemetery--his salary was raised to \$625.00.

J.D. Brown, Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Beautification Committee appeared and commended the Court on its efforts to clean up the town but urged that additional cleaning of vacant lots, alleys, etc. be done. He also deplored the many abandoned and junked cars on town right-of-ways.

He again requested street signs, curb painting near intersections and removal of the old metal stop signs.

Raymond Davee, game warden, presented the new game laws and they were approved with three changes. (1) Crockett County will not allow deer to be killed during the special archery season without using tags (2) Crockett County will have a limit of two Javelina per season (3) Crockett County did not authorize the spring hunting of Turkey Gobblers.

Doctor W. A. Belcher, Area Veterinarian from Brackettville, with the Texas Animal Health Commission, and an assistant, Bob Epley were presented by County Agent Pete Jacoby. They requested the Court's aid in securing animals to be tested for recertification under the Brucellosis Program. The Court promised assistance.

The Court approved offering the property owners the sum of \$1,500.00 per mile for construction of right-of-way fencing along FM 1973, or in the alternative to accept the bid of Nick's Twin Mountain Post Company for such construction. Ronnie Onken, architect-owner of John Bright Construction Company of San Angelo presented preliminary plans for the new County Highway Department facility to be built north of town. These plans were corrected and he will submit final blue prints for approval within two weeks.

Judge Charles Sherrill, District Judge of the 112th District Court appeared and requested that the County go along with an Adult Probation officer for the 112th District. It is estimated that this will cost Crockett County \$3,000.00 annually. The Juvenile Probation officer, under the law is not to be the same person as the Adult Probation Officer and therefore will remain a local person. Presently, serving as local Juvenile and Adult Probation Officer is Foy Moody, High School Principal. The Preliminary Budget for 1973 was inspected and approved.

### Many Entries In 4H Record Book Competition

Twenty-eight Crockett County 4-H club members entered their 4-H record books for district competition last week at Fort Stockton. The books were judged by a district judging committee. This was a record number of entries from the county according to county Extension agents Pete W. Jacoby and Miss Debra Gentry.

Twenty-one of the local entries were junior 4-H record books which received eighteen blue ribbon awards, two red ribbons and one white ribbon. Six of the seven senior books received first place awards and will compete in the state 4-H record book judging at Texas (Continued on last page)

## Heavy Rains In County Bring End To Drouth, Flood Damage

Heavy rainfall last week and throughout the weekend brought mixed emotions to Crockett County ranchers. The heavy downpour brought an end to the recent dry spell, but heavy flooding in the south part of the county resulted in thousands of dollars worth of property damage.

Roads and fences were wiped out for miles from about 24 miles south of Ozona to several miles past Juno in Val Verde

County. The flash flooding covered several sections of ranch land and motorists on State Highway 163 were stranded.

Pavement on the highway was washed out in several places between Ozona and Juno, and where the Dry Devil's River came down early Sunday morning, a chunk of highway was completely washed away. Scottie Houston, Superintendent of Maintenance

for the Highway Department, estimated that the wash-out was approximately 12 feet deep and 500 feet long. The river bed crosses the highway about a quarter of a mile north of Juno.

Houston and his crew were busy all day Sunday and Monday on the washed out pavement. By Monday afternoon Houston reported that the highway was safe to travel as far as the Dry Devil's River washout, but that pavement and shoulders still remained to be replaced. Of course, the road to Juno and Comstock remained closed.

From 12 to 14 inches of rain was reported Saturday and Sunday on ranches in the south part of the county. Miles of fence was down and most ranchers were hard at work replacing fence when the sun came out early Monday.

According to the official gauge in town, the 6-day period brought 3.87 inches, the heaviest downfall coming Friday night and early Saturday morning when 1.97 inches of rain fell. For the most part, the rain was slow and steady, and draws in town did not get impassable.

Although there was no heavy run-off in the draws through town, reports of up to 5 1/2 inches of rain came from ranches in the northern part of the county. The rains were spotty west and southwest of Ozona with reports of from .3 to 4 inches. To the east, the rainfall was general and heavier toward Sonora.

The rain brought the total rainfall for the year in the city to 16.40 inches, with August being the most bountiful month, contributing 4.93 inches to the total. Last year the total rainfall for August was 9.90, a record rainfall for the month of August.

Temperatures began to rise Monday under a bright sun and cloudless sky. However, more showers were forecast for the week.

### Jackpot Roping Saturday Here

The Ozona Roping Club will hold another of its jackpot summer ropings Saturday at the rodeo arena. Activities will begin at 6:00 p.m.

The ropings have been most successful this summer with many local and area people participating. Everybody is welcome to take part and events will include junior and senior barrel racing, breakaway junior roping, junior and senior flag racing, two-calf average, open ribbon roping and two-steer average.

## Lions Start Football Practice 60- Strong

Fall brings thoughts of football just as sure as clouds bring rain, and sure enough 60 high school football players turned up for shoes last Wednesday morning at the field house.

Dr. Wm. Johnson spent the better part of Thursday and Friday nights giving football physicals, with all boys passing.

Coach Rip Sewell has called two-a-day practices until classes begin Monday morning and the boys have been having conditioning sessions, weather permitting, throughout this week. Pads will be issued Friday morning and contact practice will begin.

Coach Sewell will head up the varsity coaching staff and will be assisted by coaches John Richey and Jim Williams. Coach Charles Spieker will be in charge of the B team and will be assisted by coach Richard Granada, who will also teach high school biology and comes here from Stanton.

Coach Sewell is very optimistic about the Lions this year. The team will be a senior ball club, with 27 or 28 seniors coming out for the team. Of this number 22 are returning lettermen. Besides depth, the Lions will average around 170 pounds per man in the weight division. This will be one of the heaviest teams ever fielded by Sewell on the local gridiron.

Returning to the backfield this year are such standouts as Gerald Huff, Ruben Tumbunga, and David Sewell, along with Gary Whitley, Tim Evans, Oliver Payne and Pete Maldonado, all seniors with the exception of Payne, a sophomore.

Returning to end positions will be Steve Wilkins, Ricky Webster and Randy Crawford, all senior lettermen. Returning linemen include Jack Baggett, senior; Rick Hunnicutt, junior; Sam Tumbunga, senior; Dan Davidson, junior; Melecio Martinez, junior;

Jim West, junior; David Weant and Freddy Vela, both seniors; and Gary Mitchell and Saul Torres, both juniors. Another returnee is George Gries, who lettered with the Lions as a sophomore and is a senior this year.

The Lions will have their first practice scrimmage with Lakeview this year, Friday August 25, and the second with Alpine in Fort Stockton the following Friday. The starting line-up will not be released until the scrimmages are over and coaches have had the opportunity to evaluate the players.

### Free Clinic For Immunization To Be Held Sat.

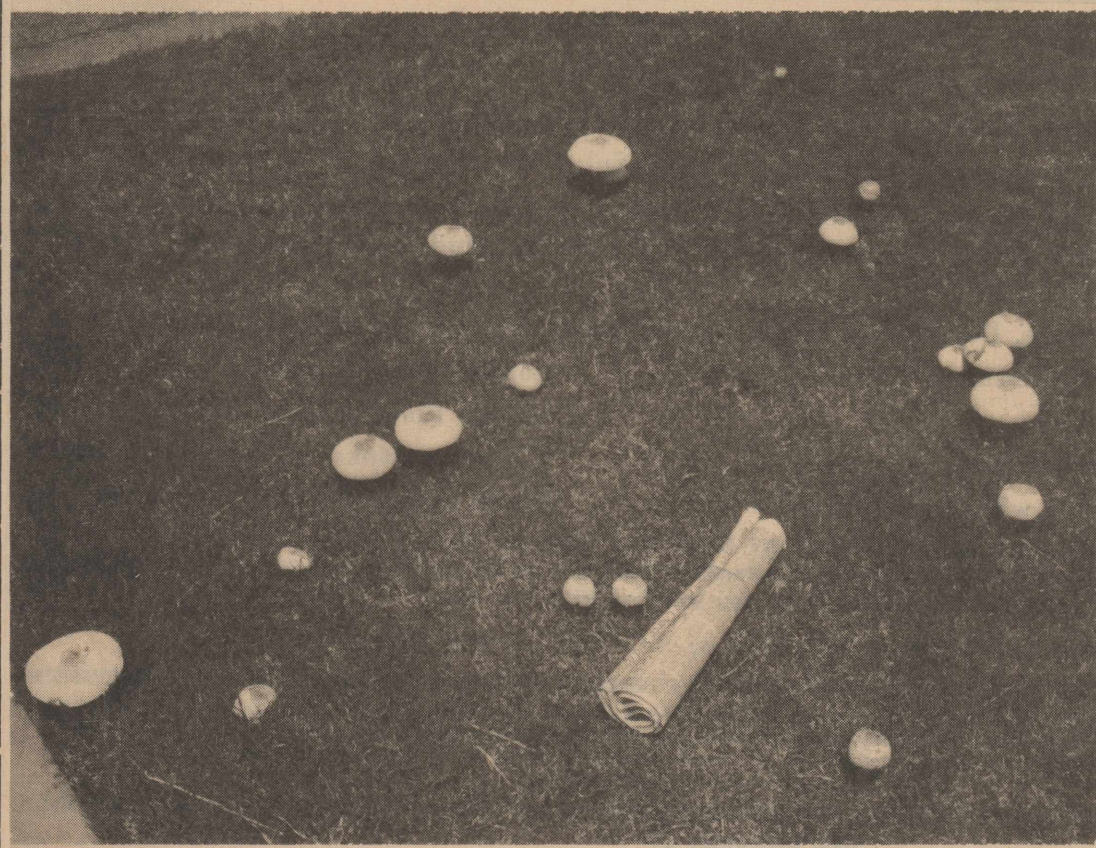
A free immunization clinic will be held Saturday, Aug. 26, from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m., in the Ozona Primary School Cafeteria, and sponsored by the Study and Action Club.

Texas law now requires that all school children must show proof of their immunizations. An up to date record must be kept on file in the school nurse's office on each child.

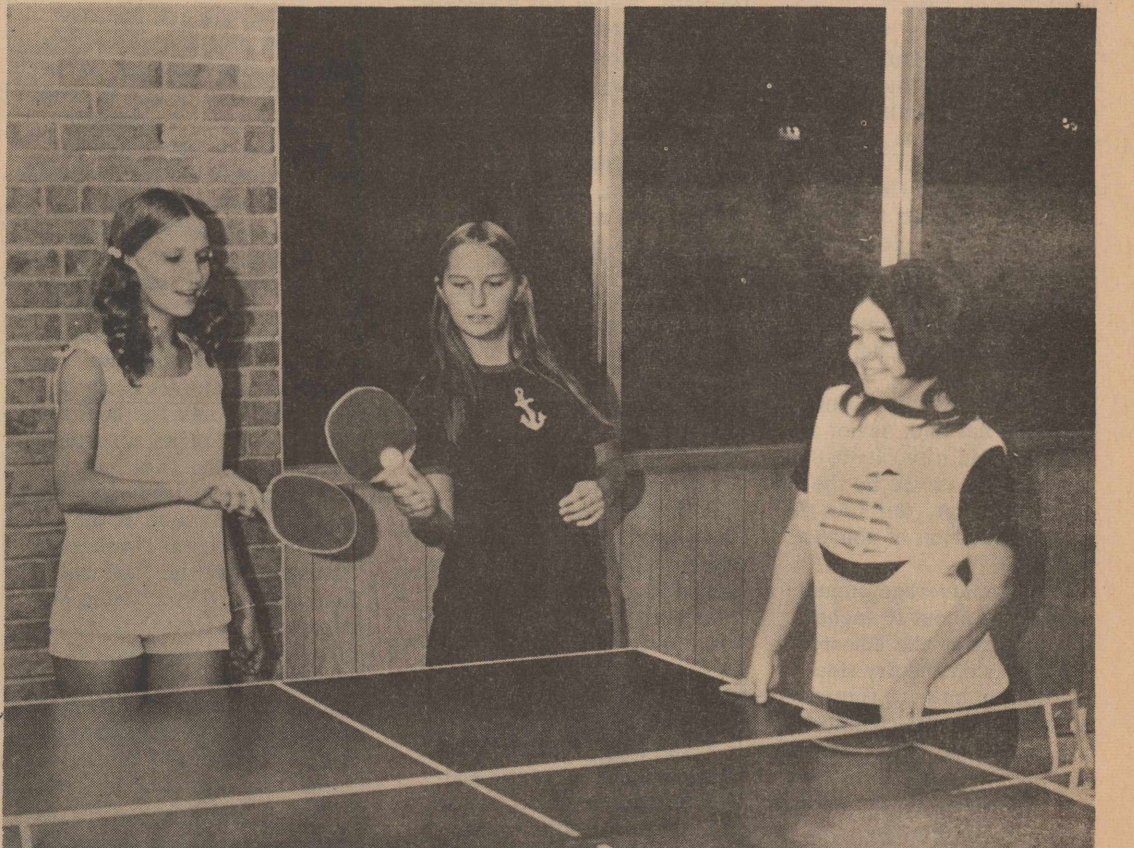
Requirements between ages 5 and 11 are: three doses of DPT, the last since age 4; 3 doses of oral polio, the last since age 4; 1 dose of Rubella (German or 3-day measles), and a dose of Rubeola (Red measles) or a history of the disease.

Ages 12 through 19: 3 doses of DT, one within the past 10 years; three doses of oral polio, one within the past 10 years. Neither of the measles vaccines are required past the age of 11.

Parents who are in doubt as to their child's record should call the school nurse at 392-2712 to review the health record.

**IN THE NAME OF THE CONSUMER**

Ralph Nader's "masterful use of the media," says biographer Charles McCarty, has opened a new dimension in politics. The consumers' champion has denounced the Washington lobbies that use money and intimidation to influence politicians. His favorable news coverage has made him a force to be reckoned with. All in the name of the consumer.

Now, Citizen Nader, as McCarty calls him, is more often using the lobby tactics he criticizes. Nader recently endorsed presidential candidate Senator George McGovern. Illinois Senator Charles Percy, a strong Goldwater supporter in 1964, has latched onto Nader in hopes of reelection this fall.

But Nader's most insidious influence is the Consumer Protection Agency (CPA), which would give Federal power to Nader-approved bureaucrats. The CPA, if Nader had his way, would have "discretionary" powers to override Federal agency decisions that he did not approve of.

Representative Chet Holifield (D-Cal.) helped remove the advocacy powers from the bill last fall. Nader's followers demonstrated at Holifield's Los Angeles office. Nader himself tried to intimidate the Congressman by standing outside the committee hearing room and accusing Holifield of being "wined and dined" by powerful lobbies. The rub was that the lobbies were not on Nader's approved list.

Nader not only wants the CPA, he is helping create it. He has helped Percy and Rep. Benjamin Rosenthal (D-NY) to write the bill. Rosenthal called it Nader's "baby."

So now Nader, the consumers' friend against those "vested interests," is on the way to becoming one himself. But how much good will more government do the consumer? Probably not much. The New Deal prototype of the CPA was termed a "disaster" by its chief. That same word will no doubt apply to Nader's all-powerful agency.

**Ozona Is Featured In T.G.R.A. Letter**

Ozona and its 1902 courthouse were the subject for a feature story by Weldon Hart in the August issue of the Texas Good Roads Assn. Newsletter.

The story was entitled "Biggest Little Town in the World" is no City."

And continues: "Ozona's magniloquent claim might be disputed, but one thing is certain: It's the biggest little town in Crockett County. Matter of fact, it is the only town in Crockett County. And Crockett is no small fry among Texas counties. Its area of 2,794 square miles ranks it eighth (after Brewster, Pecos, Hudspeth, Presidio, Culberson, Webb and Val Verde).

"Ozona, the only county seat Crockett has had, is not an incorporated city. Its 2,864 citizens are served by the county government, just like the rural population of about a thousand.

"With an average annual rainfall of about 16 inches, this county on the Edwards Plateau is on the dry side. Cattlemen have to figure on 40 acres per cow. There is practically no cultivation of the shallow stony soil. Land use is roughly: 1% for oil and gas, 99% for grazing. Out there they run sheep, cattle, goats, horses, mules and oil wells. Oil was discovered in 1928; gas is a more recent money-maker, especially for the state school funds.

Interstate 10 (US 290) arrows through Ozona. The longest stretch not completed,

about a hundred miles, is between Ozona and Fort Stockton. State 163 (north-south) and State 29 (running parallel to but north of IH 10) are other principal highways. The Interstate goes by the remains of old Fort Lancaster, now a state park, which was a deterrent of sorts to the Apaches, in Indian times.

"Ozona was noted mainly as the site of E. M. Powell's windmill when the county was organized in July 1891. Charles E. Davidson, the first county judge, was responsible for Ozona's fresh-air name. Another candidate for the county seat was Eureka, which was defeated by Mr. Powell's windmill. The only town in the county, Emerald, wasn't even considered. Most of the town moved to Ozona. As for Eureka, it was only a ranch headquarters, anyway.

"The first courthouse was a two-story frame structure with green venetian blinds. The second and present capitol was built in 1902 of native stone quarried near the location. It was designed by Oscar Ruffini, a San Antonio architect, and cost \$30,000.

"The Biggest Little Town prospers as a ranching and oil-industry trading center. The local Cadillac dealer counts on selling a dozen or more head a year, provided it rains." --0--

**State's Public Auction Slated For Saturday**

Austin, Texas, (SPL)--- Contractors may find special interest in the State of Texas 11th Public Auction on August 19 because of the offering of concrete mixers, dump trucks, water tank trucks, core drill rig trucks and other miscellaneous heavy equipment, Homer A. Foerster, Executive Director, State Board of Control, announced.

Inspection of all surplus property offered by 11 State Agencies will begin at 7:30 A.M., August 19, in the Austin City Coliseum. The auctioneer will begin asking for bids at 9:00 A.M.

Also, more than 130 automobiles and a 12-passenger bus will be sold to the highest bidder. These units have been used by the Department of Agriculture, Department of Public Safety, Department of Public Welfare, Railroad Commission, Texas Employment Commission and the Texas Highway Department. Foerster also pointed out the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would have several pickup trucks, boats, motors and trailers in the 11th State of Texas Auction.

More than one million dollars has been raised from surplus property offered in ten prior sales, Foerster reported. Bidders will also have an opportunity to take home typewriters, adding machines, calculators, wood jointers, cameras, Projectors, office furniture, vans, display cabinets, dictating equipment, portable air compressors and radio equipment if their offer is the best.

The Executive Director of the Board of Control reminded interested persons all items in the August 19 auction would be available for inspection at 7:30 A.M. and would continue until 9:00 A.M. Those interested in obtaining complete lists of items to be sold may do so on the day of the sale.

Again, the Nelson International Company will act as auctioneers for the State of Texas. Terms are cash on the day of the sale and Foerster reminded prospective bidders that merchandise must be removed that same day because space and special protection in the Austin City Coliseum was not available following the State of Texas Auction.

The State Board of Control's Purchasing Division for the past several years has been recognized as a leader in governmental purchasing. Recently an article by Foerster was published in Southwest Business which told about the Board of Control's use of its automated Data Processing Division.

Foerster's article came from an address he made at the 57th International Purchasing Conference of the National Association of Purchasing Management in New Orleans in May. He explained how the State of Texas saves money by using automation and he traced the involvement of automated applications in the central purchasing operation in Texas.

Important phases of Texas' automated purchasing functions are the automatic selection of bidders from more than 4,000 firms, the tabulation of bids, converting term contract from manual to an automatic process, converting purchasing data into useful knowledge for management and using the compu-

ter to prepare bid invitations, contract catalogs, contract orders and vendor performance statistics.

Foerster told the New Orleans NAPM conferees, "The concept of centralized purchasing, with all its advantages, is a good concept and, in my opinion, every effort should be made to preserve and strengthen the concept. When purchasing volume and data reach such a high point that manual and mechanical methods are unable to process the volume or manage the data, there is a tendency toward decentralization." --0--

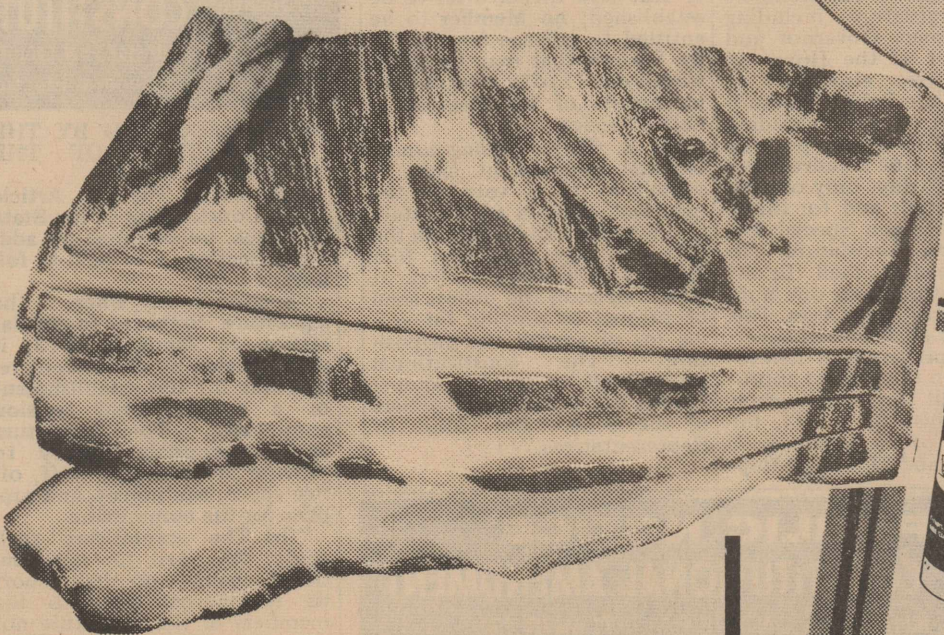
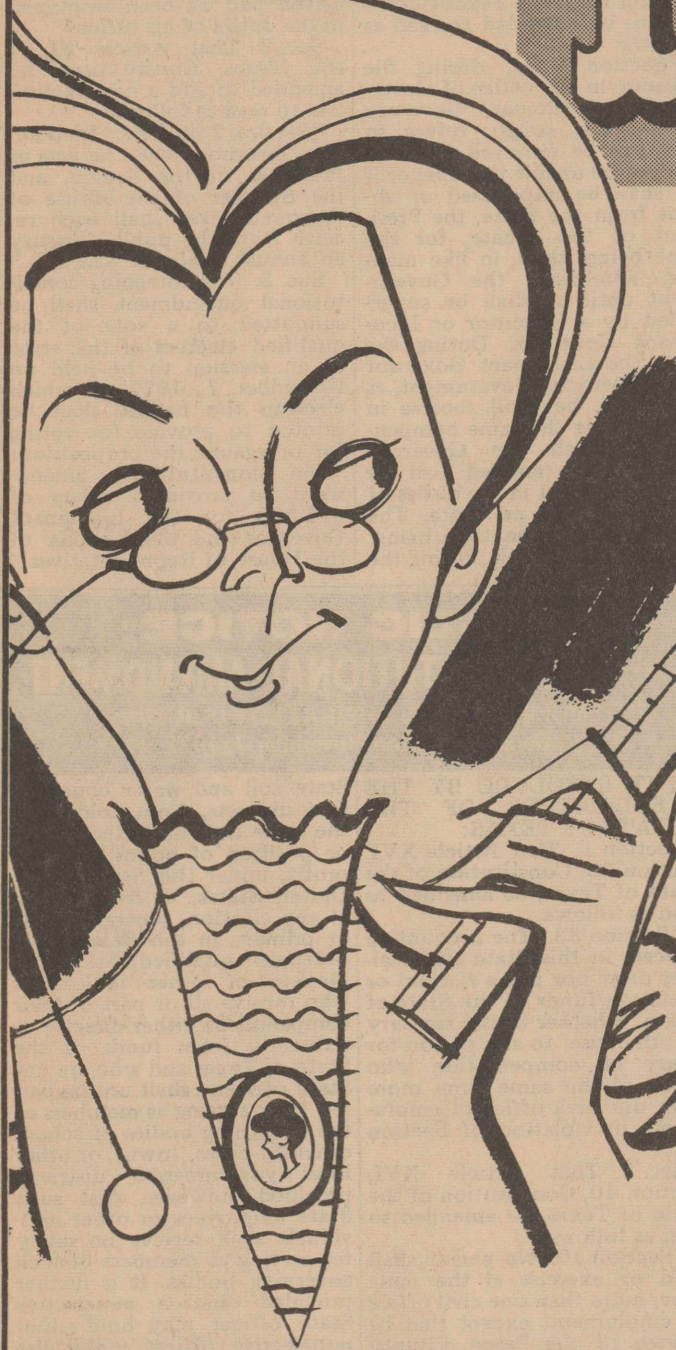

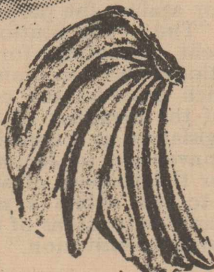

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 14 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 57)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows: "Section 6b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 6, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, any county, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and common school districts of the county on a per scholar basis to be used solely for the purpose of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements. The commissioners court shall, however, retain a sufficient amount of the county permanent school fund to pay ad valorem taxes on school lands or royalties interests owned at the time of the distribution. Nothing in this Section affects financial aid to any school district by the state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to allow a county to reduce its county permanent school fund and distribute the money to independent and common school districts on a per scholar basis."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes. (b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over from all taxation for all State purposes other than provided by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes other than provided by the political subdivision."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used for religious purposes by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions, and foreclosures sales made to satisfy such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions religiously exempted property owned by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows: "Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentally, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provisions specifically setting rates in conflict with this provision are hereby repealed." This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to allow a county to reduce its county permanent school fund and distribute the money to independent and common school districts on a per scholar basis."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in which one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 2 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 6 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 6. On the effective date of this Amendment, the Lamar County Hospital District is abolished. The Commissioners Court of Lamar County may provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital District."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment abolishing the Lamar County Hospital District."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 9 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 20)  
General Election, November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to Directors of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. A member of the Legislature shall not be eligible to serve as a Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District. It is further provided that, on September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States."

Sec. 2. That Section 40, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District, Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public, and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit a Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District, an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election, General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children, and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory on the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949. "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury where collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission. (b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. (c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature. (d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them. (e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit to a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article. (f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended by a resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members. (g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 10 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 68)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election. Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 22. Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in this office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 11 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 95)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 17 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Government, at the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. During the time the Lieutenant Governor administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office."

Sec. 2. That Article III of the Texas Constitution, be amended to add a new Section 24a to read as follows: "Section 24a. The Lieutenant Governor, while he acts as President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive an annual salary of \$22,500."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 7, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a salary of \$22,500 for the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XIII, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, and retired men who receive salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State salary to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State salary to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

The last week was so delightfully cool and with the refreshing showers you may have imagined being in the upper cooler states.

If you are one to want fragrance in your summer garden, English lavender may be the plant you have been looking for. This is a perennial herb and especially useful in a rock garden, in front of a flower border or as a low clipped hedge.

Too, August is the month the white, fall blooming clematis blooms with a most refreshing fragrance over the whole yard. Very easy to grow if given a place where its roots have afternoon shade.

In preparation for fall planting, now is the time to start new flower beds or re-do old ones. Study your plant encyclopedia to become acquainted with plant roots and the kind of soil they need.

It has been said plants are only as good as the soil they grow in. Plants adjust to many conditions with some effort to provide the correct soil.

Tender fibrous roots cannot penetrate a tight soil, so need a loose soil containing plenty of humus. Most of these are evergreens.

Lateral wiry roots can live in clay soil, such as lilacs and forsythia.

Tap root plants grow according to the soil they are grown in. In good soil they grow rapidly and in poor soil they are stunted and gnarled (pecan, mesquite, snapdragons).

Plants that grow well in alkaline soil are fruit trees, rock garden plants, cacti, succulents, vegetables, the majority of flowers and bulbs.

Since we live in an area of alkaline soil and usually have dry summers with constant irrigation necessary, the lime in the water raises the alkalinity of the soil. If your soil contains plenty of humus, so much water will not be required.

One advantage of alkaline soil is that there is a much wider variety of alkaline plants than acid-loving ones.

Bottle Gardens Are Fun For Homemakers

All that is needed to create a beautiful indoor garden are a waterproof container, tap water and some cut branches from a favorite plant.

Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, gives some pointers in preparing and maintaining bottle gardens.

First choose a waterproof container. Just about any will do, including beverage bottles, vases, antique canning jars, old fish bowls, aquariums or whatever might look attractive. The container must be clean, so wash well with a kitchen detergent and hot water. After rinsing and draining, fill it with ordinary tap water.

When selecting branches, choose them from plants such as myrtle, geraniums, oleander, wax begonia, coleus, hibiscus or any plant with a fairly sturdy stem, suggests the

Texas A&M University specialist. Using good sharp shears, make the cut on the stem clean without bruising or crushing it. Next, remove the lower leaves so none are below the water line when placed in the container. Arrange the branches to create a natural appearance. However, the leaves will usually turn to light, thus creating a pleasing composition.

Turn the arrangement at least weekly for uniform development, Janne adds. About once a month, empty the bottles and wash them thoroughly with hot water and detergent to kill any algae and bacteria that may have accumulated. Scrub the plant stems with a soft brush to get rid of any algae growth. Also, make a fresh cut on the stem to improve water up-take.

Frequently, roots will develop from these branches. New plants can be established

by placing these roots in soil, pots out the specialist.

As the branches of the arrangement deteriorate, remove and replace them with fresh ones. By doing so, an attractive arrangement can be maintained. Always clean the container when replacing branches.

Indoor living can be improved by the added interest and color of house plants. They are also beneficial in cleaning up the air we breathe.

Bottle gardening is the solution for many who would like to have house plants but are hesitant because of a lack of good soil. For the busy body, bottle gardening takes little time.

## What Is A Rancher-----

What is a rancher? Ranchers are found in pastures-riding up, cutting out, rotating rom, moving to, repairing fences, windmills, and spraying for and harvesting if.

Wives help them, little boys follow them, the Agriculture Department confuses them, city relatives visit them, city relatives visit them, salesmen detain them, meals wait for them, weather can delay them, but it takes Heaven to stop them.

When your car stalls along the way, a rancher is a considerate, courteous, inexpensive road service. When a rancher's wife suggests he buy a new suit, he can quote from memory every expense involved in operating the ranch last year plus the added expenses he is certain will crop out this year. Or else he assumes the role of the indignant shopper, impressing upon everyone within earshot the pounds of beef and mutton he must produce in order to pay for a suit at today's prices.

A rancher is a paradox - he is a blue-jeaned executive with his home his office; a scientist using insecticides for a purchasing agent in an old straw hat; a personnel director with grease under his fingernails; a dietitian with passion for alfalfa, amino acids and antibiotic; a production expert sometimes faced with a surplus, and a manager battling a price-cost squeeze.

He manages more capital than most of the businessmen in town. He likes sunshine, good food, State Fairs, dinner at noon, auctions, his neighbors, Saturday nights in town, his shirt collar unbuttoned and, above all, a good soaking rain in August.

s ditches, throughways, experts, bitterweed, the eight-hour day, helping with house work, or screwworms.

Nobody else is so far from the telephone or so close to God. Nobody else gets so much satisfaction out of modern plumbing, good weather and home-made ice cream. Nobody else has in his pockets at one time a three-bladed knife, check-book, a billfold, a pair of pliers and a combination memo book-tally book-and general ranch guide.

Nobody else can remove these things from his pockets and, on washdays, have overlooked: 5 "steeple", one cotter key, a rusty spike, 3 grains of corn, the stub end of a lead pencil, a square tap, a \$4.98 pocket watch and a cupful of chaff.

A rancher is both Faith and Fatalist - he must have faith to continually meet the challenges of his capacities amid an ever-present possibility that an act of God (a late spring, an early frost, tornado, flood, drought, fire) can bring his business to a standstill.

Might as well put up with him - he is your friend, your competitor, your customer, your source of food, fibre, and self-reliant young citizens to help replenish your cities. He is your countryman - a denim-dressed, business-wise, fast growing statesman of stature. And when he comes in at noon having spent the energy of his hopes and dreams, he can be recharged anew with the magic words: "The market's up!"

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Doting Parents

Ethel, hesitant about marrying Fred, decided to put a blunt question to his mother and father. "I love your son," she said, "but I have doubts about his health. Tell me frankly, is he well?"

They assured her that he was in perfect health. But, as they well knew, Fred was suffering from both tuberculosis and drug addiction. Ethel found out the truth shortly after the marriage, and promptly got an annulment.



But she did not stop there. She followed up with a damage suit against Fred's parents. Grounds: fraud.

At the trial, the parents claimed they could not be expected to make unpleasant disclosures about their own child. Nevertheless, the court held them liable. The judge said their deceit was too deliberate and too important to be excused.

This is an unusual case. But it illustrates that doting parents do not have an unlimited right to favor their child at someone else's expense.

A comparable situation arises when parents are accused not of unfairly pushing a marriage but of unfairly breaking one up. For example:

A mother was sued by her daughter-in-law for alienation of her son's affections. It seems that the mother had waged a relentless campaign against the marriage, not so much because she loved her son as because she hated his wife. The court decided this too was outside the parental privilege and ordered the mother to pay damages.

Of course, the law does give parents a considerable amount of freedom to speak their mind. In another case, a youthful husband who was having marital difficulties went to his father for a man-to-man talk. The father urged him to get a divorce, and he did.

Could the father be held liable by the divorced wife for alienation of affections? A court said he could not, because his interference was within the reasonable limits of a parent's role. As one judge put it:

"Times of stress naturally bring parent and child together for counsel and advice. This, the law does not condemn."

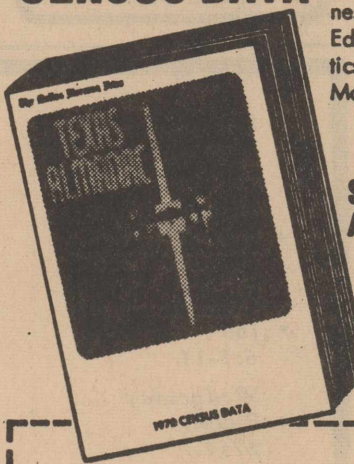

Wouldn't this world be in a terrible turmoil if every man loved the same woman? Or every woman loved the same man?

While we're thinking out loud, just imagine what would happen if every fisherman liked the same boat. There'd be only one style, one brand, one maker.

Thank goodness, we have a choice. It is keen competition for trade that makes business good, businessmen hustle and products improve.

They make Invader runabouts, both outboards and I-O's, all beautifully styled and in distinctive colors. One secret of Invader's rapid success is use of the same hull throughout their series of eight boats . . . and making only two sizes, 15 and 17 footers.

Newest product is their FISHERMAN. It's called the FRISKI, and it looks it. It's a 15-footer built sturdy enough to carry an 85hp outboard motor.

Its trihedral hull with polyurethane foam flotation makes it a soft rider, quiet and safe. For added safety there is flotation in the sides, below the gunwales. This to help prevent the

boat from turning over. In toto, there is ample bouyancy to keep Old Friski upright even under severe conditions.

There are many "handies" too, like the storage compartment in the bow . . . and the two that are aft. One is a little plastic built-in utility box made especially for small instruction books and your boat license (which title must accompany your boat). Also, there are two mounting pads . . . one fore, the other aft . . . for attaching the trolling motor. Then there are the side panels for storing your rods and reels out of the way or for attaching your rod holders. Naturally there are bow and stern eyes, and four cleats, as well as safety lights fore and aft.

Extras available? Oh boy—bow rails, stern rails, canopy, 30 or 48 qt. ice chest. Also, live bait chest with aerator; a battery box with charger; a port, starboard or center console with a bug-screen windshield; and attractive, comfortable, swivel armchairs . . . just to mention a few.

Colorful? You bet! Yet simplified to cut costs. Every Invader boat has a white hull with a deck choice of gold, green or blue.

And bless their hearts, every Invader—including Friski—has a spillover panel, splash pan, transom drain well, or whatever you want to call it . . . along the transom. That's a safety feature which, one day, will be a must on every outboard motorboat. This regardless of its size or make.

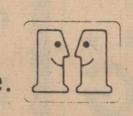


