second week, absentee voting has not been brisk, and most ballots have been cast by Ozonans living away. Very few have cast ballots in person. As a rule slow absentee voting indicates lack of interest generally.

Some local interest has been generated in the predicted write in campaign for commissioner, Precinct 1. Jesse Marley, the incumbent, won the run-off in the Democratic primary in June over his opponent, Armando Reina, but there has been an active campaign for a write-in candidate in the general election.

A sampling of Crockett County voters indicate that they go along with the rest of the state, preferring Nixon-Agnew at the top of the ticket, provided polls are correct.

Also, Republican Senator John Tower seems to have a wide lead over his opponent as well as Democratic congressman O. C. Fisher.

Although the Democrats on the ticket at the state and district level have a sprinkling of opponents, their election amounts to a shoo-in in traditionally Democratic Texas.

The fourteen proposed amendments hold little interest for West Texans with the exception of those having to do with salaries for elected officials and the drawing up of a new Texas constitution. Amendments to the constitution

have fared badly in the West Texas area for almost a decade.

Amendment number one, which would raise salaries of legislators has gone down to defeat each time it has been proposed, and it is unlikely it will pass this time. The same fate is likely in store for amendment No. 11, which would provide an annual salary of \$22,500 for the Lt. Governor-Speaker of the House.

Crockett County voters will vote at the regular polling places in their precincts. Polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00.

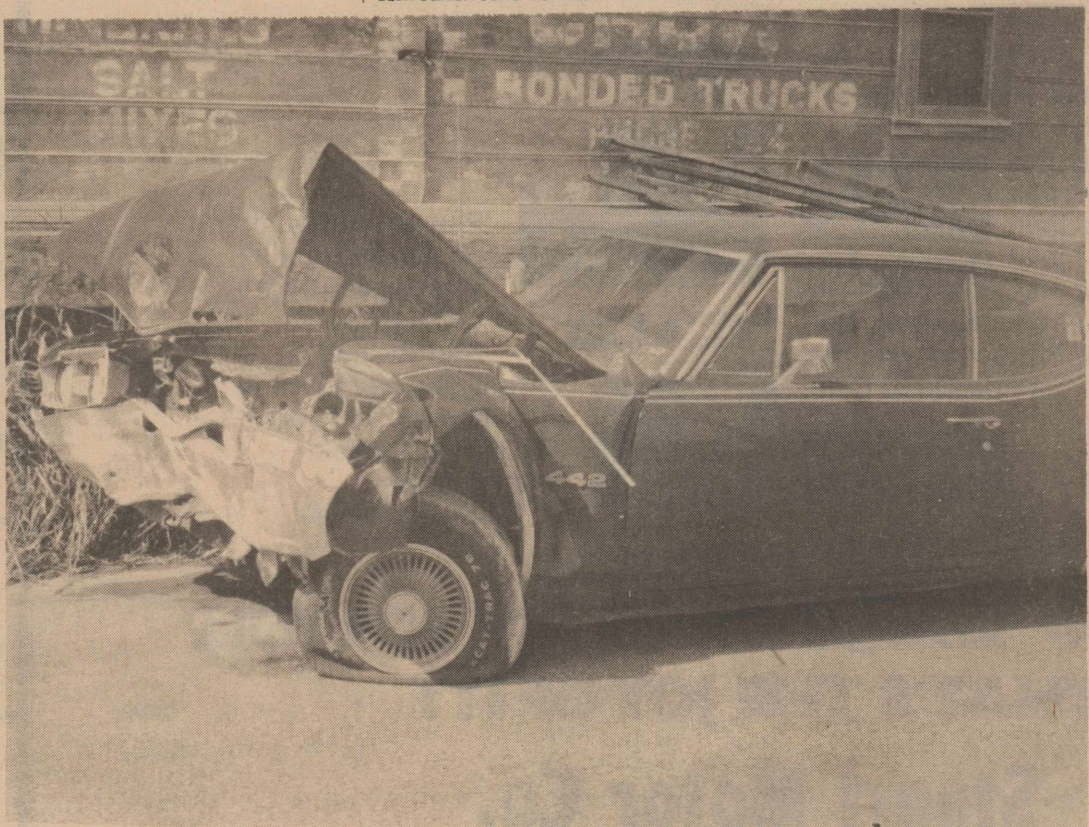
at the Civic Center. 4-H members, parents, leaders, friends of 4-Hers and the general public are invited to attend.

Danish Rice Bread

1/2 lb. rice, cooked
8 c. all-purpose flour
1 pkg. dry or 1 cake compressed yeast
2 c. warm milk
1 tsp. salt
3 tsp. sugar

Mash rice while hot and

rub it into the flour with the tips of your fingers.

Soften yeast in milk. Add salt, sugar and softened yeast to flour mixture.

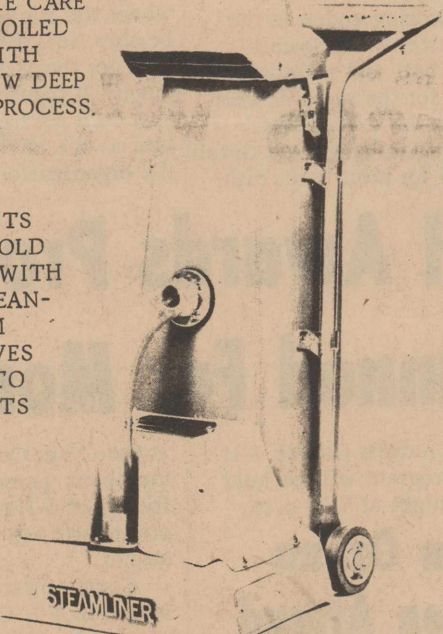
Knead in enough additional flour to make dough just soft enough to handle; knead well.

Place in a well-greased, shallow pan. Let rise until double in bulk, then bake in preheated 400 degree F. oven for about 45 minutes or until done. Tap to test. It should sound hollow. This bread is excellent served hot with butter and maple syrup.

Debra Says:

Halloween time is here again. It will soon be time for goblins, witches, and spooks to appear on the scene again. So this year, along with the fun and excitement let's keep safety in mind.

Keep these Halloween safety tips in mind for your trick or treaters.

Be sure costumes are fire-proof and visible (glow or of light color).

Always travel in groups.

Obey usual pedestrian traffic rules.

Make visits to your own neighborhood.

Stick to well lighted streets with sidewalks.

Have an adult accompany young children.

Safety in the home should be a daily habit. Is it in your home? Half a million persons in the United States receive treatment or die from accidental poisoning each year. Ninety percent of all cases reported involve children under five years of age. Medicines, household preparations, insect sprays, kerosene, lighter fluid, some furniture polishes, turpentine, paints, solvents, and products containing lye and acids are most frequently the cause of accidental poisoning.

Young children will eat and drink almost anything! Keep all liquids and solids that may be poisonous out of their reach. Aspirin is the most common cause of accidental poisoning. Keep it out of sight and out of reach.

Keep all products in their original containers. Destroy old medicine by flushing it down the toilet. If it is a liquid medicine, rinse the container before discarding. Never call medicine "candy."

Growing children are curious about things that glitter, pretty colored pills, bottles and containers of all kinds. Since children tend to imitate adults - avoid taking medications in their presence.

It's a good idea to write your physician's and Hospital's telephone number and place them near your phone.

Should accidental poisoning occur in your home: call your doctor, or the emergency room at the hospital. If the container is available, use the antidote recommended on the label.

"Poison-proof" your home prevent tragedy.

Most all dried plant material is washable, so if dusty when gathered, place in a tub of warm water and swish it carefully to remove the dust. If this is to be stored, it should be spread out on newspapers and allowed to dry several hours before wrapping or stored in boxes.

When to cut: Fresh material for curing should be picked during the hottest part of the day when it has the lowest possible moisture content. They should never be cut after watering or a rain.

Stage of development: Plant material will give the best results if picked before reaching its prime. From half to three-quarters mature is usually the ideal time. Pampas grass, thistle, cattail and other materials that shatter easily should be cut when less than half matured.

Color - Some flowers will change color very little in drying if gathered at the proper stage of development, picked when dry and cured in darkness. Celosia (in all colors), golden-rod, liatris, bachelor's buttons, straw flowers, thistle, zinnias and black-eyed susans are most satisfactory.

Air curing - When moisture is to be removed, the material must have free circulation of air and be hung upside down to avoid a droopy look. Tie in small, loose bunches and hang from a line in basement, garage or attic.

Borax curing - Borax is an excellent curing property and less expensive than many solutions on the market. A shoe box is excellent for borax curing and may be stored away and forgotten while material is drying. Anywhere from a week for delicate flowers to six weeks for moisture filled mushrooms, is required for curing. Test a bloom near the top of the box every week after the first ten days. When the borax no longer cakes around the material, the process is nearing completion. After using, borax should be sifted and spread out on a newspaper overnight before storing or reused. Flowers such as daisies, zinnia and roses should be placed face up. Put about an inch of borax in bottom of box, then place flowers on top. Sift borax into crevices to hold the blossoms in shape during the drying process. Place the flowers at least an inch apart.

Glycerine Curing - Material (foliage) cured in one part glycerine and two parts water will take on a deep, gleaming mahogany hue and remain pliable indefinitely. The secret of success lies in getting freshly cut stem ends into the solution before they dry out. As the water evaporates, add enough to keep filled until all the glycerine is absorbed. This will take four to six weeks for some and less time for others. Add hot water if you want it to act quicker. Magnolia, holly and loquat are especially beautiful.
