## Light Voter Turnout For County In Tuesday's General Election

Crockett County voters went to the polls 1220 strong in Tuesday's general election, a light turnout in view of the fact that over 2,000 residents were registered to vote in the election. Registration closed thirty days before the election.

Voters in the county did go along with the rest of Texas and the nation in giving the Republican Presidential-Vice Presidential incumbents a wide margin of victory. The Nixon-Agnew ticket polled 851 votes to 329 for the Democratic ticket leaders, McGovern and Shriver.

Crockett County voters also went heavily for the incumbent Republican Senator John Tower. The count was 684 for Tower and 340 for Barefoot Sanders,

The only other race at the state level with any opposition was State Representative for District 70. Hillary B. Doran, Jr. the Democratic incumbent was opposed by Erasmo Andrade of Crystal City, and the candidate of Raza Unida. Doran won Crockett County with 840 votes to 176 for Andrade. ## Ozona Infant Dies Of Drug Poisoning In SA

Tragedy befell an Ozona family last weekend when little one year old Clara Pena died of tranquilizer poisoning.

The baby girl was found in a semi-conscious condition Thursday afternoon and rushed to Crockett County Hospital where the contents of her stomach were removed after it was discovered that an older sister, 3 years, had fed her several pills of a potent tranquilizing drug given only by prescription.

Members of the family found the children with the medicine and the baby was already in a toxic condition. They rushed both little girls to the emergency room at the local hospital and they both received treatment. However, all efforts failed to restore the younger child to consciousness.

She was transferred to San Angelo by a Janes ambulance later Thursday afternoon and placed under the care of a pediatrician at Shannon Hospital where she died Saturday without regaining consciousness. She was born in Ozona Aug. 19, 1971, the daughter of

LET'S STOP THE SMEAR CAMPAIGNS

Now that the elections are over we hope that we can deal with a touchy matter without being accused of 'partisan politics.' It is an issue which the Milwaukee Sentinel has bluntly dubbed as 'McGovernism,' described as 'making assumptions of guilt that are far more reckless and dirty than anything the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy was accused of doing.'

'Taking stories from the Washington Post alleging a White House use of a secret fund to finance political spying and sabotage,' declares the Sentinel, 'McGovern proceeds to treat the stories as proven facts.'

'Never mind the principle of being innocent until proven otherwise. McGovern brushes all this aside. Acting as judge, jury and would-be executioner, McGovern declares that The Washington Post stories 'place the whole ugly mess of corruption, espionage and sabotage squarely in the lap of President Nixon.'

'As it happens,' continues the Sentinel, 'no one has been convicted of any such charge, let alone having been tied to Mr. Nixon. The whole case consists of little more than hearsay and insinuations. The only matter of any substance of this point are the indictments returned in the Watergate bugging case, and that is still far from sufficient proof beyond any reasonable doubt to support McGovern's verdict of a 'whole ugly mess of corruption.'

'McGovern has met the enemy of morality in politics and he is it. Meanwhile, the old enemies of McCarthyism, such as The Washington Post, are engaging in the same sort of low tactics they accused McCarthy of employing in battling Communists,' concludes the Sentinel.

Unfortunately, now that the election is over there are still those around who intend to continue the game of smear and fear; the so-called 'Common Cause' outfit and 'Nader's Raiders.' These are genuine, bona-fide witch-hunting organizations and they should be denounced by all fair-minded Americans.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Pied Piper

Little Tommy raced across the street to buy a strawberry cone from the ice cream truck. But as he started back, he stepped into the path of an oncoming car. Tommy was seriously injured, and his family sued the ice cream company for having failed to warn him of the danger.

At the trial, the company protested that its driver had no obligation to take care of other people's children. But the court ruled otherwise. Ordering the company to pay damages, the judge said: 'The sense of haste is purposely aroused in the children by the tinkling of bells and flashing of lights. The responsibility of one who provokes into action the natural recklessness of children ought (to) be proportionate to the danger he creates.'



There have been a number of these 'Pied Piper' lawsuits in which a street vendor has been held liable for tempting a child in

to jeopardy. However, some courts have rejected such claims, at least when special circumstances come into the picture.

Consider another case, also involving injury to a youthful ice cream purchaser. This time, the boy had walked some distance around the rear of the truck before starting back across the street. Moreover, he was a vigorous 10-year-old, the kind of youngster ordinarily well able to cross alone.

Denying damages, the court said the driver could not fairly be blamed for assuming that the boy was 'on his own.'

Furthermore, the victim himself may be guilty of negligence.

Thus: An 11-year-old boy leaped onto the running board of an ice cream truck, out of the driver's line of vision. When the truck began to accelerate, the boy fell off to the pavement.

In the lawsuit that followed, he acknowledged that he had been aware of the risk he was taking. Turning down his claim, the court said:

'All the essential ingredients of contributory negligence were present.'

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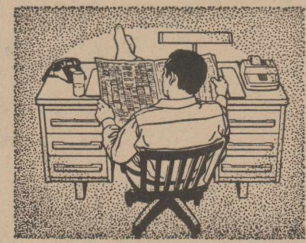
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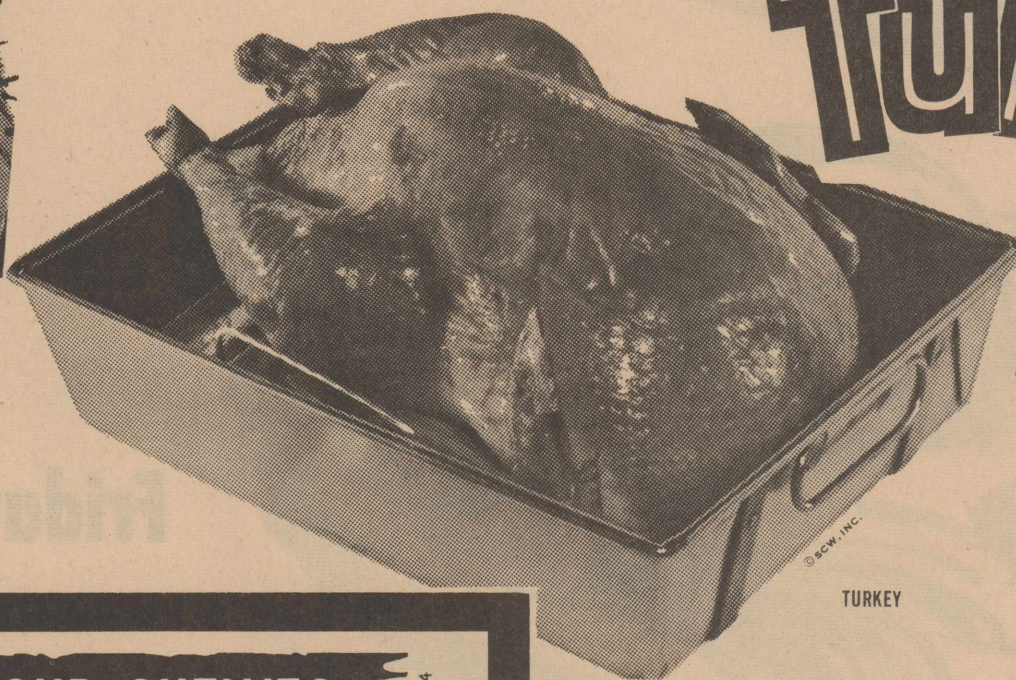

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Since last week's near freeze, I am hoping this warning isn't too late to caution you to get your indoor potted plants, that need to be protected from freezes into the house, hot house or other storage space. Plants may be trimmed back severely so not to take up so much room, or you may place several plants in one pot for the winter. Give these plants some water, but do not over-water during the winter.

Provide special protection against sweeping winds and intense winter sun for slightly tender evergreens. Screens of burlap or other material are especially useful for plants newly planted or planted in drafty locations.

To protect old peonies, cut the browned or dead tops off to near ground level. Place a cup of bone meal around plant and mound dirt up several inches for the winter months.

If you haven't planted pansies, November is the ideal time to get them started. Be sure the bed is located in sun or partial shade. The soil should be well prepared to the depth of 12 inches. Add peat moss or compost and a light feeding of a complete fertilizer. Plant pansies at least six inches apart and cover lightly with a mulch. Keep beds moist during the growing season.

There are many common shrubs and trees you may have or want around your home that would be attractive background material in a flower arrangement. In your plans for the fall planting, use some of these in your landscape. Some that do well here are Aucuba, Barberry, Callicarpa, Eleagnus, Loquat, Holly, Creeping Juniper, Mahonia, Nandina, Photinia, Pyracantha (red), Native Evergreen Sumac, Abelia, Artemisia and other new ones that you may want to try.

**Mildew; Easier To Prevent Than To Cure Says Expert**

College Station--Mildew is a problem that's much simpler to prevent than it is to cure.

Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University, explained mildew growth and outlined prevention tactics in answer to a growing number of requests from Texas residents for the information.

Cotton, rayon, linen, silk, paper, plaster and leather are all affected by mildew, while certain man-made fibers are not, the specialist noted.

"Because of their resistance to mildew, the homemaker might want to consider using man-made fibers for curtains, rugs and blankets in damp areas."

"Mildew flourishes in damp, warm, poorly aired and lighted areas."

"These include closets, damp basements, laundries, sink cabinets and refrigerator interiors--mold will grow even at low temperatures."

"Wherever there are damp clothes, draperies, shower curtains, rugs or leather goods, look out for mildew."

"Even plastic shower curtains can mildew--due to the soap film accumulation."

Preventing mildew in the first place is much easier than trying to get rid of it once it's established, Mrs. Myers said.

She outlined USDA tips to help combat dampness--and thus mildew--using mechanical means.

First, since continuing dampness is the root of this evil, the homemaker should provide adequate drainage around the outside walls of the house.

Turning to home interiors, the specialist recommended installation of air conditioners and dehumidifiers which can aid in removing moisture.

Likewise, good air circulation can be achieved through the use of properly sized and well located fans--to help reduce chances of mildew.

"Any walls and floors made of concrete or other masonry need to be waterproofed."

mildewing, sponge it with one of the following solutions prepared by a local pharmacist: a one-percent solution of dichlorophene, hexachlorophene, salicylanilide, thymol or paratropenol in alcohol."

Mrs. Myers stressed the importance of always reading the label on chemical containers--and then following the directions accordingly.

"Also, store the containers well out of the reach of children and pets," she concluded.

"Clothes dryers should be vented to exhaust moisture outside."

"Silica gel, activated alumina or calcium chloride can be used to absorb moisture from the air in enclosed areas such as closets."

"They are sold in department stores and drugstores and by building supply dealers, sometimes under various trade names."

To use, hang cloth bags of the chemical in closets or place in an open container on a shelf or on the floor. Keep the door closed to prevent outside air from entering.

If this doesn't solve the problem, then lowered closet doors or exhaust fans may be required.

Other chemical measures can help prevent mildew, as well, Mrs. Myers added.

"For example, fabrics can be stored with a mildew preventative such as paradichlorobenzene, using a pound of crystals per 100 cubic feet of air space."

Surfaces of paper or cloth can be sprayed with a mildew preventative fungicide that comes in aerosol cans.

If you are planning on making your own applesauce or apple juice this fall, right now is the time to select your apples. Large quantities of fresh apples are moving to market from apple producing areas around the U. S. Although this year's forecasted apple crop of 149 million cartons is just under last year's total, there will still be an abundance of fresh apples available in November.

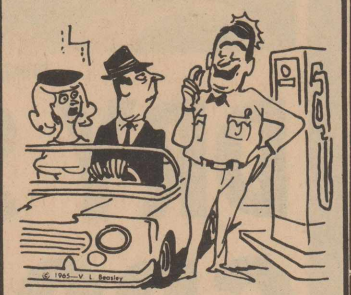

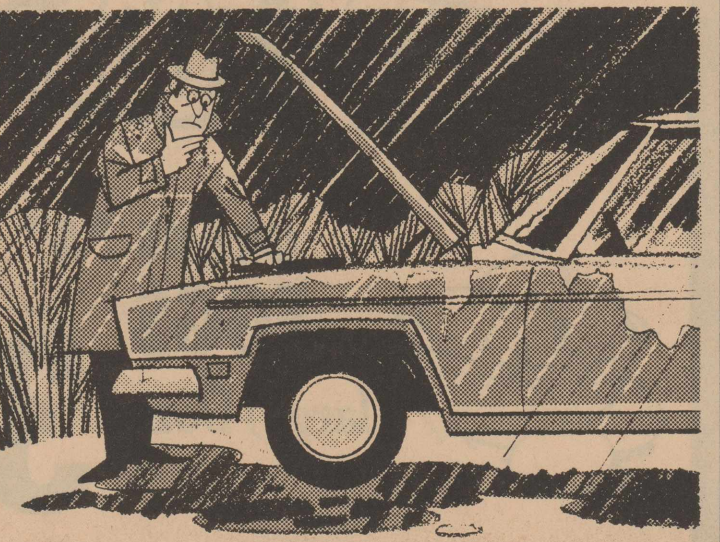

College Station--Fall is here so out come appropriate sweaters, jackets and coats.

With the cooler weather, summer clothes are put away with expectations of a nice, fresh wardrobe next spring, Marilyn Brown observed.

The consumer education-clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, said the homemaker should take certain steps prior to storage to keep clothes fresh and undamaged.

Unless stored clean or unsoiled under good conditions, clothes can come out of storage in poor shape.

"Store clothes in cool, dry areas. Warm, moist or humid areas are ideal environments for mildew--especially if any starch is left in the

Miss Brown offered another tip:

"Never put away soiled clothing. Stains will draw moth larvae, which can quickly damage garments in dark closets."

In addition, the stain may set during the time in storage whereas it might have been easily removed if promptly treated.

"A few extra minutes of care now can result in a better conditioned wardrobe later," she concluded.
