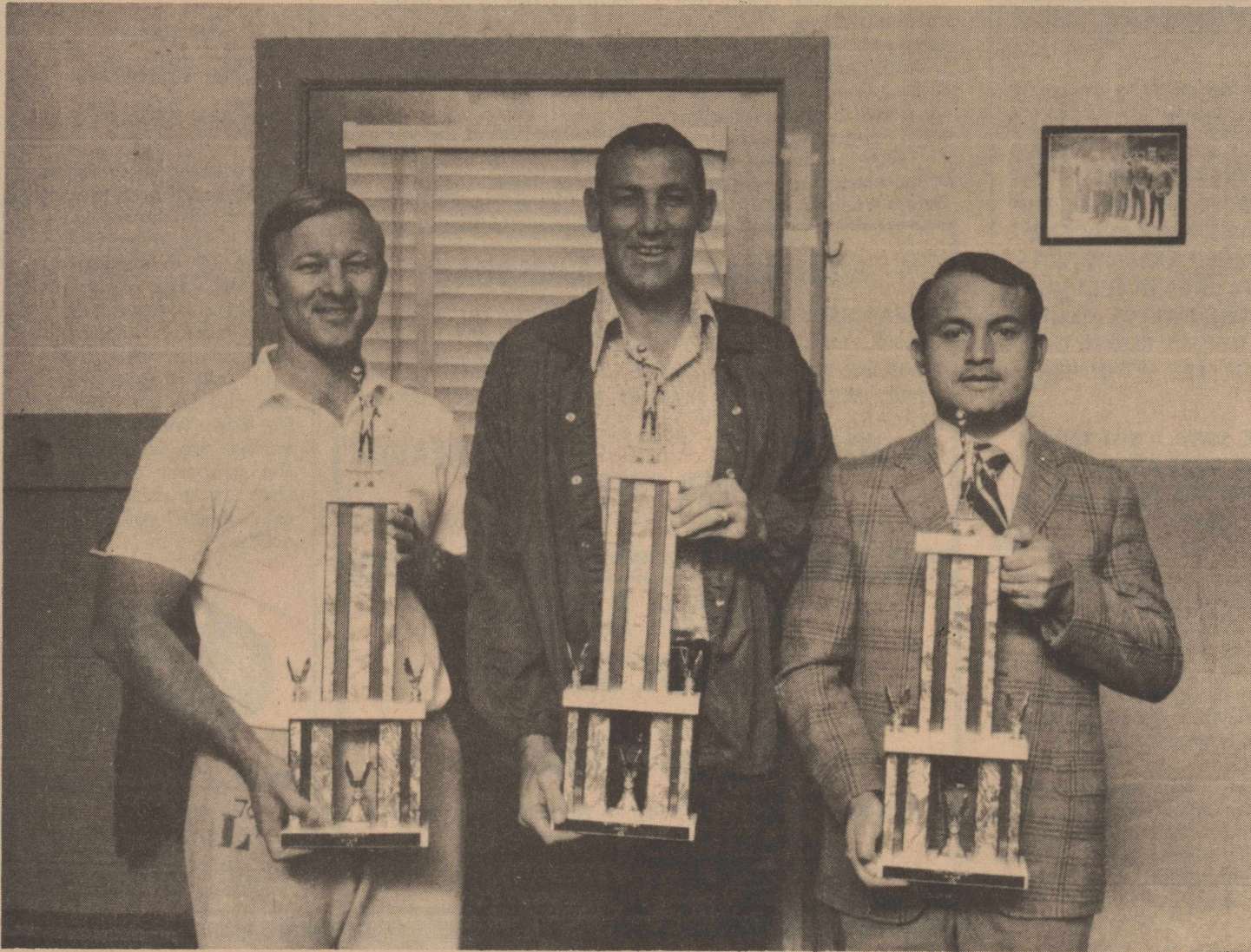

### Spots Shallow Meadows Test

Henderson & Erickson, Midland, will drill the No. 1 C. W. Meadows as a 3,800-foot Spraberry or Clearfork wildcat, in Crockett County, a southeast twin to Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field, 990 feet south of depleted Spraberry producer in the Ozona, Northwest field and 1 1/4 miles northwest of Clearfork oil production in the Ozona, Southwest multipay field.

Location is 1,670 feet from the south and 1,532 feet from the east lines of 7-QR-D&E. The Pure-Bean, South (San Andres) field of Crockett County gained its third well and a 1/2 mile southwest extension with completion of Robert M. Wynne, Midland, No. 1-88 Isabel Lyons, 10 miles northwest of Ozona, for a daily pumping potential of 7.5 barrels of 32 gravity oil.

Production was through perforations at 1,419-447 feet, which had been acidized with 4,000 gallons.

Drilled to 1,500 feet, with 4 1/2 inch casing a set at 1,473 feet, it is plugged back to 1,460 feet.

Location is 995.9 feet from the south and 2,481 feet from the east lines of 88-OP-GC&SF

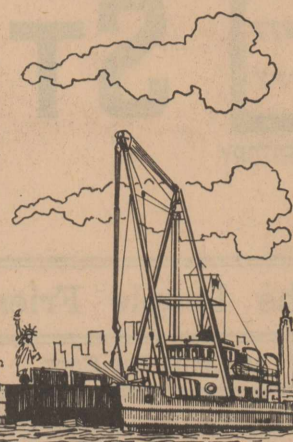

**Judge Williams Attends State Legal Conference**

Crockett County Judge Troy Williams attended the Pre-Legislative Conference of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce State Affairs Committee at Wichita Falls, Texas, Friday and Saturday.

Governor-elect Dolph Briscoe was the featured speaker at a barbeque at the Lake Kickapoo Boy's Club Camp later in the evening. Briscoe touched heavily on subjects he plans to take action on in the upcoming term, including the water shortage, crime prevention, better spending control over state funds, etc. He urged that "career-oriented" education fill the paradoxical shortage of skilled and semi-skilled workers and said something should and would be done for the 100,000 students who started to school 12 years ago who did not appear in the graduating rolls of high schools.

Saturday was spent attending panel discussions at Mid-Western University of Wichita Falls with Lt. Gov. elect Bill Hobby, the key speaker

at the noon luncheon. Hobby expressed his belief that no new taxes would be needed during the new biennium.

Most of West Texas Senators and Legislators were in attendance including Senator Pete Snelson of the 25th District.

Mrs. Williams also attended and his mother, Mrs. J. H. Williams accompanied them to Ft. Worth and will visit her daughter, Mrs. A. J. Tawater, Jr., and family.

**Texas Imports Five Million Christmas Trees**

There's no substitute for the beauty of a natural Christmas tree if it's wisely purchased and safely used, says Bill Smith, forestry specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

Texas imports nearly five million Christmas trees annually, some as far away as Western Canada, points out Smith. As a result, the trees are stored in boxcars that undergo temperature extremes. "Those exposed to warm temperatures for a period of several weeks may already

have dried out by the time they're put on our Texas markets", Smith notes.

To keep a Christmas tree fresh and green, he suggests these guidelines:

Tuy your tree early. This will enable you to be selective in purchasing a reasonably fresh tree. Check for signs of needle shedding and brittleness which indicate excessive drying.

Store the tree outdoors in the shade until ready for use. Spray it frequently with water.

Once the tree is brought indoors, make a diagonal cut, removing one to two inches of the base. Stand the tree in water and keep it there until it's discarded. Check the water level daily.

## Invite Visitors To Travel West Texas Museum Trail

Twenty-two area museums which run the gamut from archeological, history, military, and science to art, aviation, natural history, and presidential--are inviting area residents and visitors from throughout Texas to "travel the Permian Basin Museum Trail" on December 9 and 10.

To familiarize visitors with the varied history and culture of the area and its peoples, the twenty-two museums in eighteen Permian Basin towns are sponsoring a simultaneous "open house" during the two-day period and encouraging all Texans to visit as many of the museums as possible. All will be open to the public from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. both days, and a number will feature special displays, exhibits, and activities.

"The Permian Basin has a long, rich, and varied history," observed a spokesman for the museums, "running from prehistoric times when dinosaurs roamed the shores of the Permian Sea, through occupation by Indians, Spaniards, and soldiers, through the era of buffalo hunters, farmers, and ranchers, to the more recent days of oil boom and wealth."

"The various chapters in the story of this heritage-rich land are portrayed most eloquently through the vast holdings of the Permian Basin's numerous local museums," he observed. "Thousands of relics from Indians, cowboys, ranchers, and oilmen, and from the women who made their homes, bring to life the pioneer days of the area."

In addition to treasures like dinosaur fossils, arrowheads, Indian caches, and artifacts of the early cattle and oil industries, there are a number of more unexpected finds that tell little-known facts in the Basin's history.

A medallion belonging to an Egyptian camel driver recalls the abortive "Camel Corps" experiment of Jefferson Davis in 1856; a cider press proves that there were once rich apple orchards in the southern part of the Basin before the days of sandstorms and tumbleweeds; while fine organs, elegant period clothing, and ornate pieces of china and cut glass remind that all was not work and hardship even in the early days.

The open house on December 9 and 10 offers Basin residents a unique opportunity to visit several of the museums and see some of these rare and informative exhibits.

Museums participating in the project include the Museum of the Big Bend in Alpine, the Andrews County Museum in Andrews, Big Spring's Heritage Museum, the Colorado City Historical Museum, and the Fort Davis Historic Site Museum and the Overland Trail Museum in Fort Davis.

Others are the Annie Riggs Memorial Museum in Fort Stockton, the Borden County Museum in Gail, the Iraan Archeological Museum, the

Comanche Trails Museum in Kermit, the Dawson County Museum in Lamesa, and McCamey's Mendoza Trail Museum.

Also participating are the Midland County Historical Museum, the Museum of the Southwest, and the Abell Aeroplane Museum, all of Midland, the Presidential Museum and the Meteorite Museum in Odessa, and Ozona's Crockett County Museum.

The West of the Pecos Museum in Pecos, the Local History Museum in Seagraves, the Scurry County Museum in Snyder, and the Martin County Historical Museum in Stanton are also cooperating in the open house.

Co-sponsoring the two-day project with the museums are the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, the Texas State Historical Foundation, the Texas Tourist Development Agency, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, the Permian Historical Society, and the Presidential Museum of Odessa.

## Home Sewers Given Pointers On Sweaters

Home sewers tempted to try their hands at sweater creation are finding the new venture fun, according to one authority.

Vivian Waminski, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, compiled a 10-point guide for sewing the fashion. Noting the recent popularity of "sweater original," her 10 points are as follows:

1. Launder fabric to remove finishing solution.

2. Place fabric on hard, flat surface to cut. Avoid letting fabric hang off table to prevent stretching.

3. Use a polyester or polyester core thread.

4. Use a ball point needle. Adjust stitch length to 12-14 stitches per inch.

5. Stay-stitch each piece on seamline immediately after cutting to prevent stretching.

6. Reinforce stress areas, such as shoulder seams, crotch and armholes.

7. Trim seam allowances to 1/8 inch and zigzag seam edges together to prevent fraying and eliminate bulk.

In sweaters without seam down the center back, stitch a narrow "V" down the center back, the length of the zipper. Cut down the center of the stitching. Sew bias seam tape to the edges. Insert invisible zipper in usual manner. After zipper is installed, stitch from zipper, tapering to nothing and forming a slight dart.

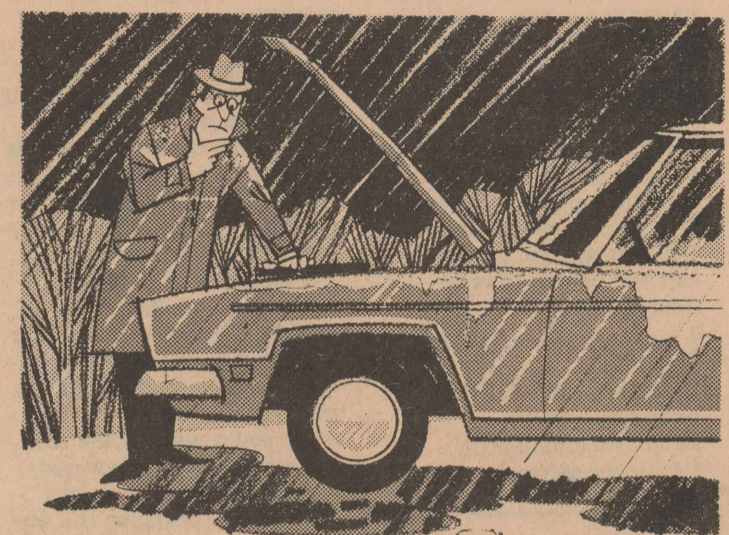
Take care not to stretch knit when pressing. After pressing area with steam, allow garment to dry before picking it up.

Miss Waminski cautioned home sewers to hand wash most sweater knits and place on flat surface to dry as dry cleaning may cause acrylic to shrink.

"Be sure to check the end of the fabric bolt for care instructions, and ask sales personnel for permanent care label," she advised.

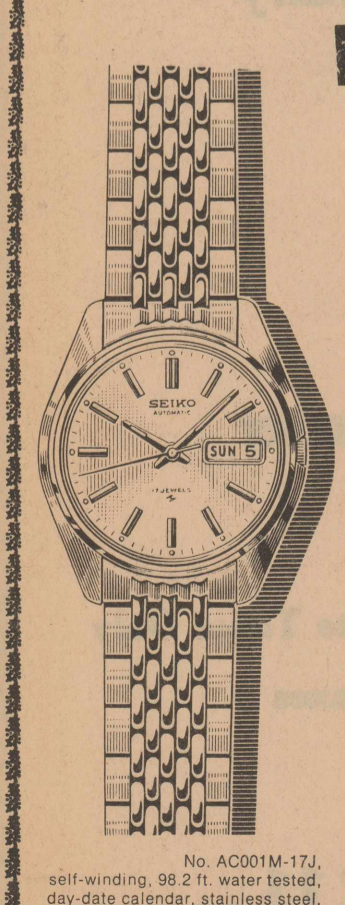

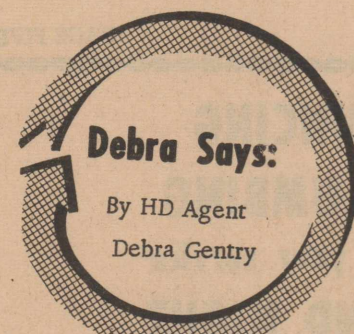

Simmer stock with onion, celery, garlic salt. Pepper to taste and add bay leaves. Simmer for 30 minutes. Strain stock. Blend margarine, flour, and 1 teaspoon salt. Add stock and milk. Simmer, stirring constantly until smooth and thickened. Stir in seasonings, cheese, pimento and peas. Arrange layers of rice, chopped turkey and sauce in buttered casserole. Repeat layers until all ingredients are used. Sprinkle additional cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

The recipe above or any other turkey dish can be frozen for future use. To prevent vegetables and other ingredients from becoming too soft or having a warmed over taste when reheated, slightly undercook the turkey. When reheating, always use a cover.

Another way to assure a better final product is to cool food dishes immediately after cooking. Cooling stops the cooking process and helps preserve the natural flavor, color and texture of the food. To cool, set the uncovered pan of food in iced or very cold water, changing the water as often as necessary to keep it cool. Unbreakable pans may be placed directly on ice.

Avoid placing a very hot dish directly in the refrigerator as this may cause other refrigerated foods to warm up and spoil. Foods to be baked after freezing may be frozen directly in oven proof containers. To do this, line the casserole dish with heavy aluminum foil, then freeze the food. When frozen, remove the aluminum foil package containing the food. This frees the casserole pan for other uses while the food is stored. And since the frozen food will be in the shape of the casserole, simply remove the foil and replace the food in the casserole when ready for heating or cooking.

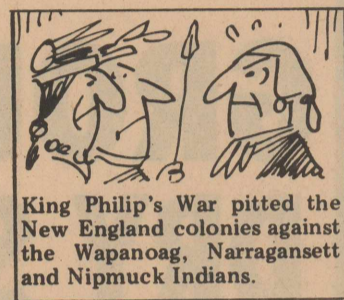
### Jr. High Teams Pick Up Four Wins Over Sonora

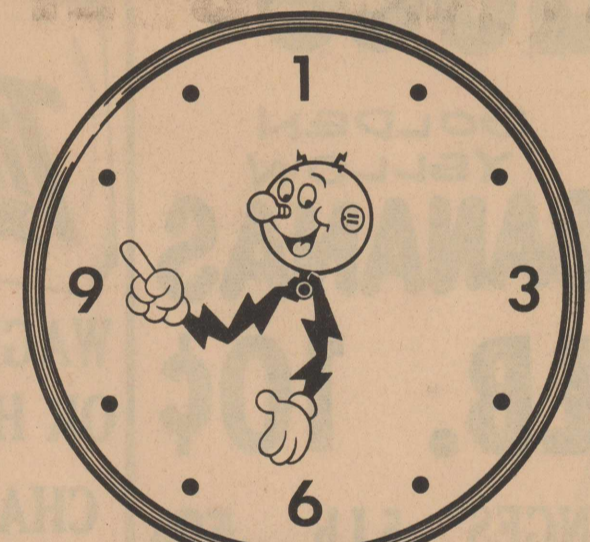

**Alcohol And Alcoholism Are Series Topic**

(The following is the first in a series of articles prepared by the National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, concerning some questions and answers about alcohol. The articles will be run as space permits in the Stockman. The series is sponsored in this area by the Concho Valley Council of Governments.)  
Alcohol is the major chemical ingredient in wines, beers, and distilled beverages. It is a natural substance formed by the reaction of fermenting sugar with yeast spores. Although there are many alcohols, the kind in alcoholic beverages is known scientifically as "ethyl alcohol," a colorless inflammable liquid which has an intoxicating effect.

By strict definition alcohol is classified as a food, because it contains calories. However, it has no nutritional value. Alcohol is also classified as a drug, because it dramatically affects the central nervous system.

Different alcoholic beverages are produced by using different sources of sugar for the fermentation process. Beer, for instance, is made from malted (germinated) barley, wine from grapes or berries, whiskey from malted grains, and rum from molasses.

Hard liquors result from the further concentration, through a process called distillation, of the alcohol produced by fermentation. Thus, whiskey, scotch, gin, vodka, and other liquors are referred to as "distilled beverages."

Most American beers contain 4 per cent alcohol. Dinner wines, like Beaujolais or Chablis, are 10 to 12 per cent alcohol. Dessert wines such as sherris are fortified with more alcohol to bring the level up to between 17 and 20 per cent. Distilled beverages range from 40 per cent (80 proof) to 50 per cent (100 proof) alcohol.

Any two drinks which contain the same amount of alcohol will have a similar effect on the drinker. Thus a 12 ounce can of beer, an average 4 ounce glass of wine, or the usual highball or cocktail with an ounce of 100 proof liquor, all contain approximately 1/2 ounce of alcohol, and if drunk slowly, will have an equal effect on the brain and body.

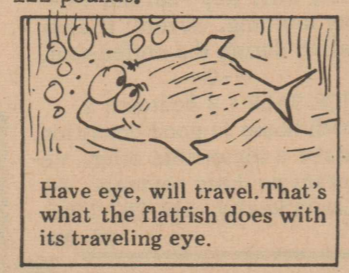
**Hunting Contest Lead Changes**

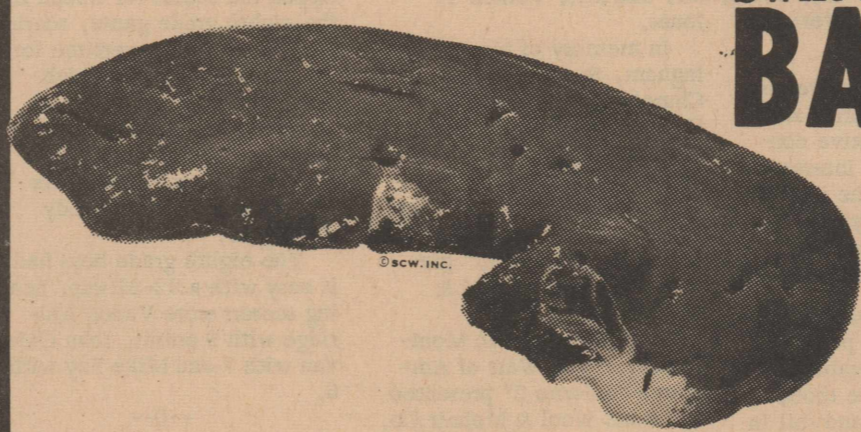
