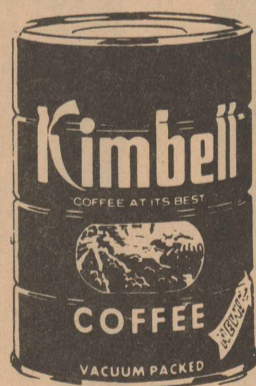

**Early Winter
Good Tree
Planting Time**

Late fall and early winter are good times to set out new trees in your home or community landscape.

"Planting good trees demonstrates a feeling of continuity with the past and anticipation for the future," points out Dr. William Welch, landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Citizens are quick to point out to visitors and tourists the better residential districts, parks, campuses and other areas where old trees thrive as the most beautiful parts of their communities."

The Texas A&M University specialist lists other reasons for planting trees:

Trees reduce smog and purify the air by acting as dust and pollution filters and by releasing life-giving oxygen into our air.

Trees moderate the climate by protecting from extremes in wind, heat, cold and drought.

Trees provide many bird and animal species with food and shelter.

According to real estate people, one of the best reasons for planting good trees is to increase the value and sales appeal of homes. Beautiful, well-placed trees are a prime selling factor, especially in older homes.

"Trees are probably one of the biggest bargains in our environment. Since considerable time may be required to produce trees of useful size, plant them as soon as possible and select adapted varieties that fill specific needs," advises Welch.

The horticulturist outlines some basic points of landscape design to keep in mind when placing trees in the landscape:

Consider the scale and proportion of the tree species at maturity. Too often large growing trees are placed in areas where they must be later removed because of being too close to a home or other structure. Trees may become so massive as to visually overwhelm a small structure.

Use restraint in the number of different tree species planted in a land-space development. Too much variety results in confusion and lack of unity.

Consider year-round interest in foliage, flower, fruit and bark as well as placement for proper shade and sun needs and a proper balance between

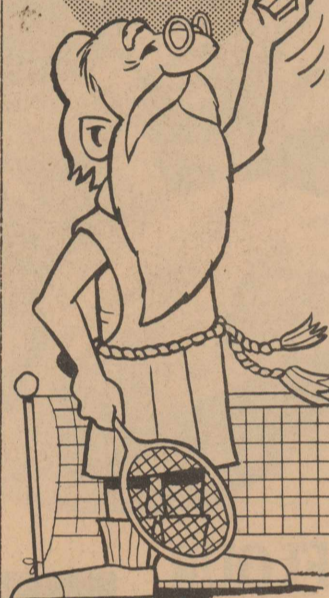

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club

This should be a time for thanks to the many individuals, merchants, and organizations that have helped in anyway make this Christmas holiday more meaningful, pleasant and colorful to us, as well as the many tourists and friends coming our way.

Several have asked about the care of house plants received as gifts. Here are a few do's and don'ts. You can enjoy these plants long after the holidays if you give them a little timely care.

Because of its brilliant color and seasonal bloom, the favorite poinsettia has become a symbol of the Christmas season. Given abundant light and water, they should remain attractive indoors for weeks. If the plant has a decorative wrap around the pot, punch holes in it so no water will accumulate. Water only when soil turns a lighter color or is dry to the touch. After watering drain saucer of surplus.

Azaleas should be given winter sunlight and cool nights with temperature around 60. Keep the soil moist, check its water needs every other day. After a month, give a feeding of liquid plant food.

The Christmas cactus wants

full winter sun, 60-degree nights, a moist growing soil and regular house plant feeding while in active growth.

The Cyclamen is short-lived in our warm houses. They need full winter sunlight and given chilly 50-degree nights and 65-degree days. Otherwise they disintegrate rapidly and unless you can keep it cool, you may as well discard it after it blooms.

Kalanchoes are an attractive Christmas plant. Give it all possible sunlight, a moist soil and cool nights.

Christmas begonias will provide three or four weeks of clusters of flowers. These too need a sunny location, water checked daily or kept moist. Temperature should be kept 60 to 65 degrees at night to continue bud development. Discard after blooms come to an end.

The Christmas pepper requires full winter sunlight, 60-degree night temperature and moist soil. Discard when fruit begins to fade.

Filing Deadline For Sign Owners Is Extended

The Texas Highway Commission has extended the license and permit filing deadline for owners of signs along Interstate and primary highways.

The Commission extended the filing deadline from December 31 to June 30, 1973.

Advertising industry and individual sign owners requested the extension because the previous deadline did not permit sufficient time to comply with the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The Act requires a permit for each existing or planned sign. Also, anyone erecting or maintaining signs within 660 feet of an Interstate or Federal-aid highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

Sign owners are advised to apply for a license and all necessary sign permits as soon as possible since no further extension of the deadline is contemplated.

The State license fee of \$25 is valid for an indefinite period. In addition, sign owners are required to post a \$2,500 bond in each county in which they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications are available through the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department,

P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas, 78763.

In addition, owners must obtain a \$5 permit for each sign. Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the right of way sections of Highway Department district offices.

Owners of signs who have questions about the program or the new deadline date should contact the nearest Highway Department district office.
