Early Sign-Up For ASCS Work In 1973 Urged

Crockett County ranchmen who plan to carry out ranch improvement work under the ASCS program in the coming year are urged to make application early in the year since funds are to be limited next year. Sign-up begins January 2, 1973, at the local ASCS office, according to the news letter issue last week by C. W. Elder, county executive director, Crockett-Sutton county ASCS. Ranchers are cautioned to sigh up at the office before starting the

work. Producers of wool and mohair are reminded that applications must be filed in the ASCS office for 1972 wool and mohair incentive payment not later that January 31, 1973. Applications are for sales made during the 1972 marketing year. Contact your ASCS office if you have any questions on eligibility of sales or other details of the program, the news letter said.

Incentive price levels for the new year remain the same as for 1972, 80.2 cents on mohair and 72 cents on wool. The rate of payment will be determined later in the year based on average prices during the 1972 marketing period.

Now called the "Rural Environmental Assistance Program" the ASCS program for 1973 provides a limitation per ranch operation of \$500 in Crockett County and \$400 in Sutton County. Practices approved for 1973 include cross fences, livestock water storage and pipelines, well drilling and various brush control mea-



Revenue Sharing, Or Debt Sharing?

Among the "achievements" of the late, non-lamented 92nd Congress was passage of the so-called "Revenue Sharing" bill. Immediately thereafter the Washington money managers quickly dispatched computerized news releases to every part of the nation, reporting how much "revenue" would be passed on by the Federal Government to the various and sundry states, counties, cities and townships. In California, for example, the amounts promised run all the way from \$10,116.00 for Villa Park City in Orange County to \$35,442,819.00 for the city of Los Angeles. It all looks good on

There is only one very slight, altogether minor problem. The Federal Government has no revenue to share. According to a New York investment house (Anderson & Co.), the federal budget for fiscal 1973 will have a super-collosal \$33 billion deficit; or, to spell it out -- \$33,000,000,000.00. In other words, Congress has already appropriated far more money than we have. Assuming the Anderson & Co. projection to be fairly accurate, our deficit for fiscal 1973 will be greater than the entire Federal Budget for the year 1948.

One of our compatriots Editor R.H. Kirkpatrick of the Palm Beach (Fla) Times commented:

"Where will the money come from? More deficit spending by the Federal Government. More borrowing to further increase the staggering national debt. More paper money to create more inflation. If any individual taxpayer or business firm operated in this fashion, it would mean bankruptcy court in a very short time. But the Federal Government, aided and abetted by a spendthrift Congress keeps shoveling out money as if there were no tomorrow.

"And who pays for it all? You do."

To which commentary we add our own:


"Revenue" sharing? Who do our Congressmen think they are kidding?

We have been tipped off by our spies in the Nation's Capitol that plans are in the legislative mill to raise the salaries of Congressmen from the present \$42,500.00 a year to a flat \$50,000. What with inflation and all it is understandable that our hard-working representatives might want a raise -- but how about something a little more reasonable -- say \$15.00 a week? That's a bigger raise than most of us will be getting.

for the future, "points out Dr. William Welch, landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Citizens are quick to point out to visitors and tourists the better residential districts, parks, campuses and other areas where old trees thrive as the most beautiful parts of their communities."

The Texas A&M University pecialist lists other reasons for planting trees:

Trees reduce smog and purify the air by acting as dust and pollution filters and by releasing life-giving oxygen into our air. Trees moderate the climate

by protecting from extremes in wind, heat, cold and Trees provide many bird

and animal species with food and shelter. According to real estate people, one of the best rea-

sons for planting good trees is to increase the value and sales appeal of homes. Beautiful, well-placed trees are a prime selling factor, especially in older homes. Trees are probably one

of the biggest bargains in our environment. Since considerable time may be required to produce trees of useful size, plant them as soon as possible and select adapted varieties that fill specific needs, " advises Welch.

The horticulturist outlines some basic points of landscape design to keep in mind when placing trees in the landscape

Consider the scale and proportion of the tree species at maturity. Too often large growing trees are placed in areas where they must be later removed because of being too close to a home or other structure. Trees may become so massive as to visually overcome a small structure.
Use restraint in the num-

ber of different tree species planted in a land-space development. Too much variety results in confusion and lack

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

This should be a time for thanks to the many individuals, unless you can keep it cool, merchants, and organizations that have helped in anyway make this Christmas holiday more meaningful, pleasant and colorful to us, as well as the many tourists and friends coming our way.

Several have asked about the care of house plants received as gifts. Here are a few do's and don'ts. You can enjoy these plants long after the holidays if you give them a little timely care.

and seasonal bloom, the favorite poinsettia has become a symbol of the Christmas season. Given abundant light and water, they should remain attractive indoors for weeks. If the plant has a decorative wrap around the pot, punch holes in it so no water will accumulate. Water only when soil turns a lighter color or is dry to the touch. After watering drain saucer of surplus.

Azaleas should be given

winter sunlight and cool nights with temperature around 60. Keep the soil moist, check its water needs every other day. After a month, give a feeding of liquid plant food.

full winter sun, 60-degree nights, a moist growing soil and regular house plant feeding while in active growth.

The Cyclamen is shortlived in our warm houses. They need full winter sunlight and given chilly 50-degree nights and 65-degree days. Otherwise they disintegrate rapidly and you may as well discard it after it blooms.

Kalanchoes are an attractive Christmas plant. Give it all possible sunlight, a moist soil and cool nights.

Christmas begonias will provide three or four weeks of clusters of flowers. These too need a sunny location, water checked daily or kept moist. Temperature should be kept 60 to 65 degrees at night to continue bud development. Because of its brilliant color Discard after blooms come to

> The Christmas pepper requires full winter sunlight, 60-degree night temperature and moist soil. Discard when fruit begins to fade.

Filing Deadline For Sign Owners

The Texas Highway Commission has extended the license and permit filing deadline for owners of signs along Interstate and primary high-

The Commission extended the filing deadline from December 31 to June 30, 1973. Advertising industry and individual sign owners requested the extension because the previous deadline did not permit sufficient time to comply with the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The Act requires a permit for each existing or planned sign. Also, anyone erecting or maintaining signs within 660 feet of an Interstate or Federal-aid highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

Sign owners are advised to apply for a license and all necessary sign permits as soon as possible since no further extension of the deadline is contemplated.

The State license fee of \$25 is valid for an indefinite period. In addition, sign owners are required to post a \$2,500 bond in each county in which they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications are available through the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department,

P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas, 78763.

In addition, owners must obtain a \$5 permit for each sign. Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the right of way sections of Highway Department district offices.

Owners of signs who have questions about the program or the new deadline date should contact the nearest Highway Department district office.
