Voters Decide \$500,000 Bond Issue For Nursing Home Mar. 17

Eligible Crockett County voters will be called upon to cast their ballots March 17 on the question of authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of building a nursing home wing onto the present Crockett County Hospital facility.

The order for the election was passed and posted by the Commissioners Court at a meeting called for the purpose February 19. During the meeting the court met with architect John Chiles Allen of Austin, who had presented plans for a 61-bed facility at the regular meeting of the court February 12. Allen presented new plans which cut the facility from 61 beds to 40 beds. After a few alterations, the plans were accepted.

The Court's action was in response to a petition signed by 308 citizens asking that such action be taken in order that these facilities might be provided for the elderly citizens of the county. A group of citizens met with the court several months ago to ask that this matter be considered, and the petition and the court's work with the architect followed.

The proposed 40-bed addition to the hospital would be constructed at the north end of the present facility. It would be constructed with a separate entrance and exits. Adjacent to the existing structure would be the foyer, rest rooms, staff dining and conference room, employee

rest rooms, and mechanical room. In the same area will be the nourishment center which contains the kitchen, patient dining room, serving area and the patient recreation area. The nurse's station is situated in the center of the 3-wings which contain patients' rooms. Eight rooms will be built into a wing on the west, which will also have a large day room and enclosed patio. A four-bed wing will be built to the east of the nurses' station. Each room in both wings will accommodate two patients and all rooms have baths. The wing which extends to the north will be built especially for ambulatory patients. It contains eight patient rooms, a day room and two large central bath areas with patient and nursing aids.

The only change in the existing structure will be a new office, which will be built to the left of the present hospital entrance.

The facility has been planned and will be constructed so that if the need arises, the last few rooms in the north end of the hospital may be used for nursing home patients.

The proposition to be voted upon is whether or not county bonds, in the total amount of \$500,000 bearing interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined by the Commissioners Court and to mature in not more than twenty years, be issued for the enlarging and equipping of the hospital for the purpose of a nursing home. Also, to levy a tax upon all taxable property in the county for the purpose of paying interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity.

Architects estimate the total cost of the building at \$350,000. The remainder of the bond issue would be used to equip and furnish the facility. County Judge Troy Williams said it is unlikely that taxes would be raised for the purpose of paying off the bonds, as federal revenue funds have already been allocated by the court for that purpose. However, in the event the facility is not self-supporting, taxes might possibly be raised for maintenance.

All polling places will be open for the election from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Absentee voting will be conducted at the County Clerk's office from March 3 through March 14.

Crockett Fields Gain 2 Wildcat Locations

Crockett County drew two wildcats Tuesday.

American Quasar Petroleum Co., Midland will drill a 9,200 foot wildcat in Crockett County, 15 miles southeast of Ozona, 2 1/2 miles east of a dual 7,890-foot Pennsylvanian gas producer in the Davidson Ranch multipay gas field and a producer in the DePaul (Strawn gas) field. It is the No. 1-26 Jean Scheuber.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 26KLTCCF Ground elevation is 2,446 feet.

The firm has four deep wildcats in the vicinity, all of which are "tight". 3 1/2 miles north-northwest of the one well Angus (Strawn) gas field.

Robert M. Wynne, Midland, and W. H. Price, Granbury, will drill a 1,750-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 15 miles north of Ozona, 1/4 mile north of the depleted Wamoco (Canyon oil) field, which was re-entered for recompletion attempt in the San Andres, and two miles northeast of the depleted Midway Lane, Northeast (San Andres) field. It is the No. 1 Moncrief-University.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 13-42 University.

The Wamoco opener, W. A. Moncrief Jr. No 1 University, was finalized Jan. 22, 1972 to pump 56.02 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, plus 5.43 barrels of water with gas-oil ratio of

2,633-1 through perforations at 7,377-856 feet. It topped Grayburg at 1,192 feet and the San Andres at 1,590 feet on ground elevation of 2,619 feet.

It was re-entered by Moncrief and plugged back to 1,600 feet and abandoned June 5, 1972.

Coach Charlie Spieker's OHS Golf Team made a good showing in the annual Andrews tournament over the weekend, coming in fourth in their division.

The first day, Friday, they played on the Odessa course due to weather conditions in Andrews, and had a bad time as a team on the first nine holes of the tournament. However, the second 18 holes on the Andrews course Saturday saw considerable improvement.

Ricky Webster led the team effort with a 27-hole total of 116. Lessley Russell was second with a score of 124, followed by Mike Williams with a 125, Steve Wilkins with a 126 and Jack Baggett with a 135.

The only other team in the district to finish ahead of the Lions was Crane with a third place. The Lions start district play next Saturday with the Big Lake tournament.

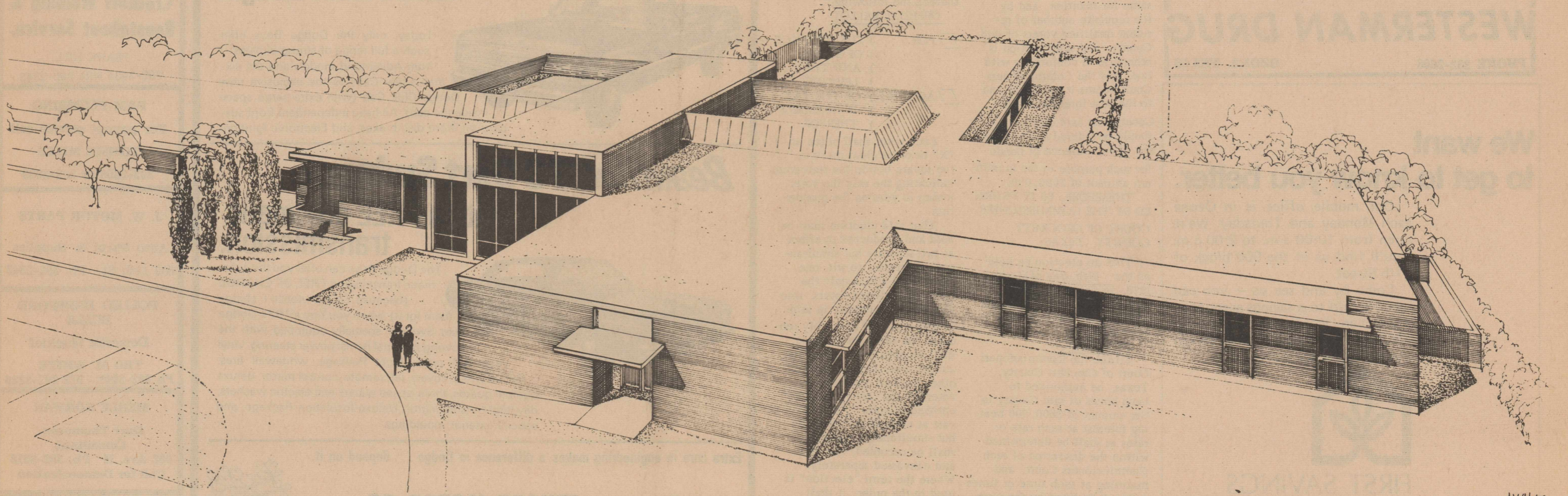
Forum To Have Guest Day Tue.

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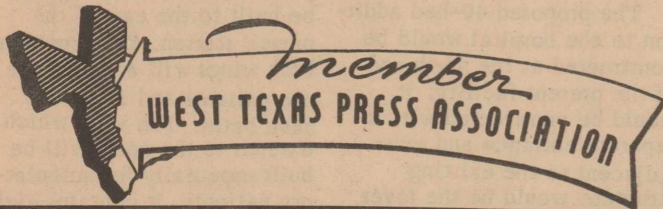

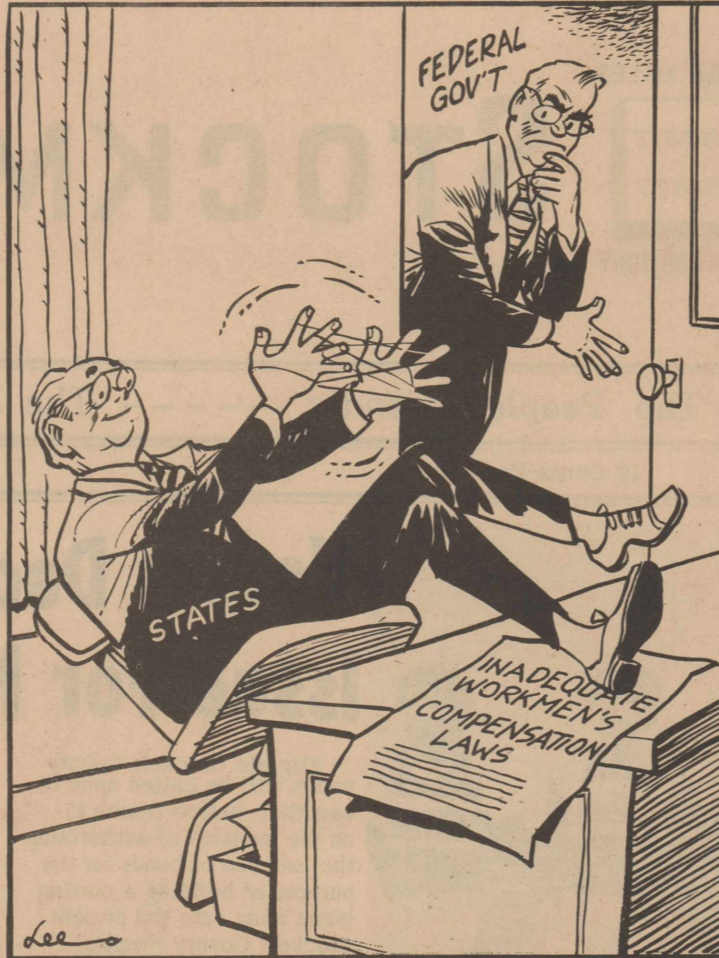

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED VOTERS OF CROCKETT COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID COUNTY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION, AND TO ALL OTHER RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SAID COUNTY:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Crockett County at the time and places and on the proposition as provided in the Order for Election, duly passed by the Commissioners Court of said County, which Order for Election is substantially as follows:

WHEREAS, each and all of the members of the Commissioners Court of Crockett County was duly and sufficiently notified, officially and personally, in advance, of the time, place and purpose of this meeting; and

WHEREAS, proper notice of this meeting has been duly and timely posted as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, a petition signed by ten per cent of the resident qualified property tax-paying voters who own taxable property in Crockett County, Texas, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and signed by ten per cent of the resident qualified voters of said County, has been presented to this Court, praying that an election be ordered for the purpose of determining whether or not the bonds of said County shall be issued in the amount of \$500,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the enlarging and equipping of the County Hospital in said County and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court hereby finds and determines that said petition is signed by the requisite number of resident qualified property tax-paying voters of said County who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and by the requisite number of resident qualified voters of said County, and said petition is otherwise in conformity with law, and the Commissioners Court deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County that said election should be ordered on the question of the issuance of bonds for such purpose in the maximum amount of \$500,000;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF CROCKETT COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 17th day of March, 1973, in Crockett County, Texas, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION SHALL the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the amount of \$500,000 bearing interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of such Commissioners Court, and maturing at such time or times as may be fixed by the Commissioners Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed twenty (20) years from their date, for the purpose of providing funds for the enlarging and equipping of the County

Hospital in said County and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, and to levy a tax upon all taxable property within said County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas?

Precinct No. 1, voting place, Courthouse, presiding judge Mrs. Kaleta Shepperson, alternate, Bill Seahorn. Precinct No. 2, voting place, Ozona Intermediate School, presiding judge, Tommy Harris, Jr., alternate, Bob Bailey; Precinct No. 3, voting place, Auditorium-Coliseum Building, presiding judge, Mrs. Mary Deaton, alternate Buster Deaton;

Precinct No. 4, voting place, Ozona Primary School, presiding judge, Joe Couch, alternate Earl Acton; Precinct No. 5, voting place, Powell Field, presiding judge Mrs. Roy Childs, alternate Mrs. Roy Joiner; Precinct No. 6, voting place, West Texas Utilities Plant, presiding judge I. A. Carroll, alternate Mrs. F. A. Carroll.

The polls for regular voting shall be open from 7:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. Absentee voting shall be conducted at the Office of the County Clerk in the County Courthouse, Ozona, Texas, for the period absentee voting is permitted by law, and the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 9:00 o'clock, a. m., to 5:00 o'clock, p. m., on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

That the following persons are hereby appointed to serve as a special canvassing board for canvassing ballots of absentee voters: Bud Hoover, Presiding Judge; Bud Meinecke, Clerk; Jean North, Clerk.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925, as amended, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

Each voter shall place an "X" or other clear mark in the square beside the statement indicating the way the voter wishes to vote on the proposition.

That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to wit: one election at which only the resident qualified voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which all other resident qualified voters of the County shall be entitled to vote. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned and canvassed separately.

Where the term "election" is used in the order, it shall mean the separate but simultaneous elections. In further explanation, if need be, the tax-paying voters vote in one box and the non-tax-paying voters vote in the other box. A notice in substantially

the same language as this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and attested by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The County Judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted in each election precinct and at the County Courthouse door, as provided by law, prior to the date of the election. The County Judge is further authorized and directed to file a copy of said notice with the County Clerk to be posted on a bulletin board in the office of the County Clerk before the election.

The County Judge is further authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published within said County, on the same day in each of two successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Though the past weeks have been dreary and unpleasant for normal out-door activities, everyone should be grateful for the beautiful moisture received. Most all plants are ready to burst into spring growth or bloom though many chores have had to be postponed until more favorable weather. That means we need to be busy when a warm sunny day comes our way.

Pruning should be finished before new buds are too far advanced on evergreens especially. Roses between now and March 15th is the best time for them.

Crepe Myrtle should be pruned severely before new growth begins if you want larger clusters of flowers this season. Cut plants back as much as you wish to reduce their size, and then thin out excess growth. To have a well shaped plant prune in un-even heights with highest in the center. If you keep old flower heads removed during the blooming season, your plants will continue to produce flowers. New plants need to be planted in a place that will have full sun, but will tolerate partial shade.

Pampas grass also needs to be pruned before new growth appears. In a small garden the large over grown plant can become a problem, so may need to be cut back and divided. To divide, lift out of ground with either a fork, sharp shooter or ax to separate the large clump of roots into several small divisions that can be easily replanted. If to be left as a large specimen, cut top back near the ground with sharp pruning shears. If planting new plants, choose a place with plenty of room, best in a sunny location. Pampas is a fast grower in rich soil, but will grow in any type of soil, dry or wet, acid or alkaline. Last fall there were many showy groups, or single specimens over Ozona.

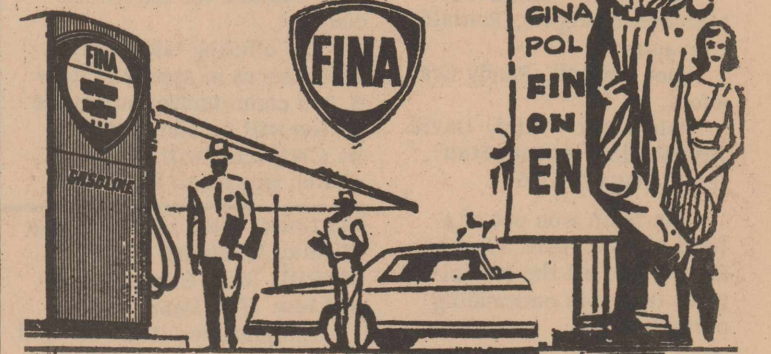

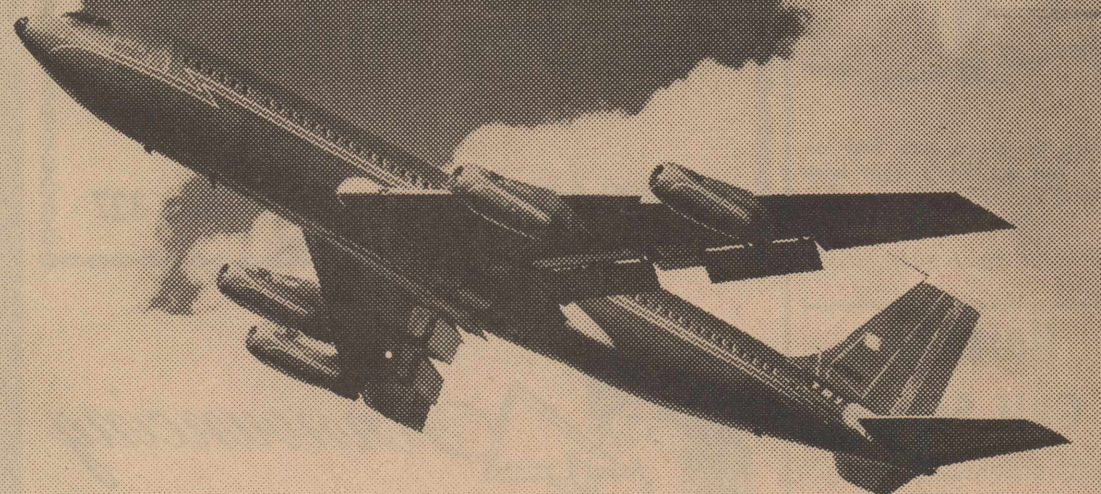

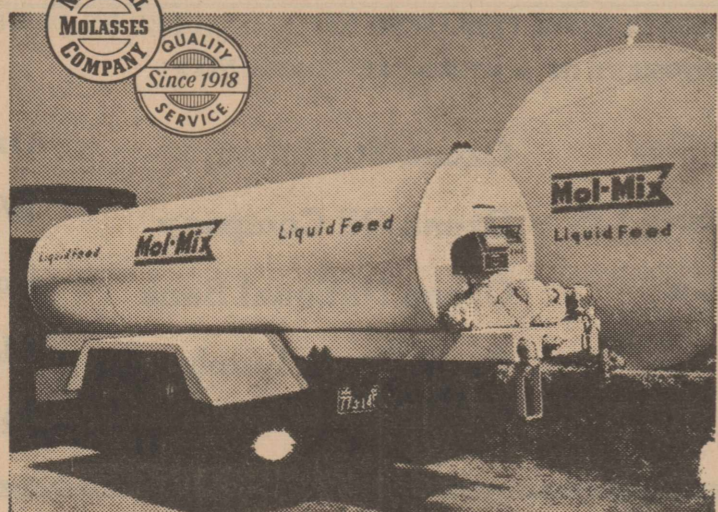
