

Voters Decide \$500,000 Bond Issue For Nursing Home Mar. 17

Eligible Crockett County voters will be called upon to cast their ballots March 17 on the question of authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of building a nursing home wing onto the present Crockett County Hospital facility

The order for the election was passed and posted by the Commissioners Court at a meeting called for the purpose February 19. During the meeting the court met with architect John Chiles Allen of Austin, who had presented plans for a 61-bed facility at the regular meeting of the

court February 12. Allen presented new plans which cut the facility from 61 beds to 40 beds. After a few altera-

The Court's action was in response to a petition signed by 308 citizens asking that such action be taken in order that these facilities might be provided for the elderly citizens of the county. A group of citizens met with the court several months ago to ask that this matter be considered, and the petition and the court's work with the architect followed.

The proposed 40-bed addition to the hospital would be constructed at the north end of the present facility. It would be constructed with a separate entrance and exits. Adjacent to the existing structure would be the toyer, rest rooms, Staff dining and conference room, employee



ORDER FOR ELECTION WHEREAS, each and all of the members of the Commissioners Court of Crockett County was duly and sufficiently notified, officially and personally, in advance, of the time, place and purpose of this 5, voting place, Powell Field, meeting; and

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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Though the past weeks have been dreary and unpleasant for normal out-door activities, everyone should be grateful for the beautiful moisture received. Most all plants are ready to burst into spring growth or bloom though many chores have had to be postponed until more favorable weather. That means we need to by busy when a warm sunny day comes our way.

Pruning should be finished before new buds are too far advanced on evergreens especially. Roses between now and March 15th is the best time

Crepe Myrtle should be pruned severely before new growth begins if you want larger clusters of flowers this season. Cut plants back as much as you wish to reduce their size, and then thin out excess growth. To have a well shaped plant prune in un-even heights with highest in the center. If you keep old flower heads removed during the blooming season, your plants will continue to produce flowers. New plants need to be planted in a place that will have full sun, but will tolerate partial shade.

Pampas grass also needs to be pruned before new growth appears. In a small garden the large over grown plant can become a problem, so may need to be cut back and divided. To divide, lift out of ground with either a fork, sharp shooter or ax to serparate the large clump of roots into several small divisions that can be easily replanted. If to be left as a large specimen, cut top back near the ground with sharp pruning shears. If planting new plants, choose a place with plenty of room, best in a sunny location. Pampas is a fast grower in rich seil, but will grow in any type of soil, dry or wet, acid or alkaline. Last fall there were many showy groups, or single specimens over



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
