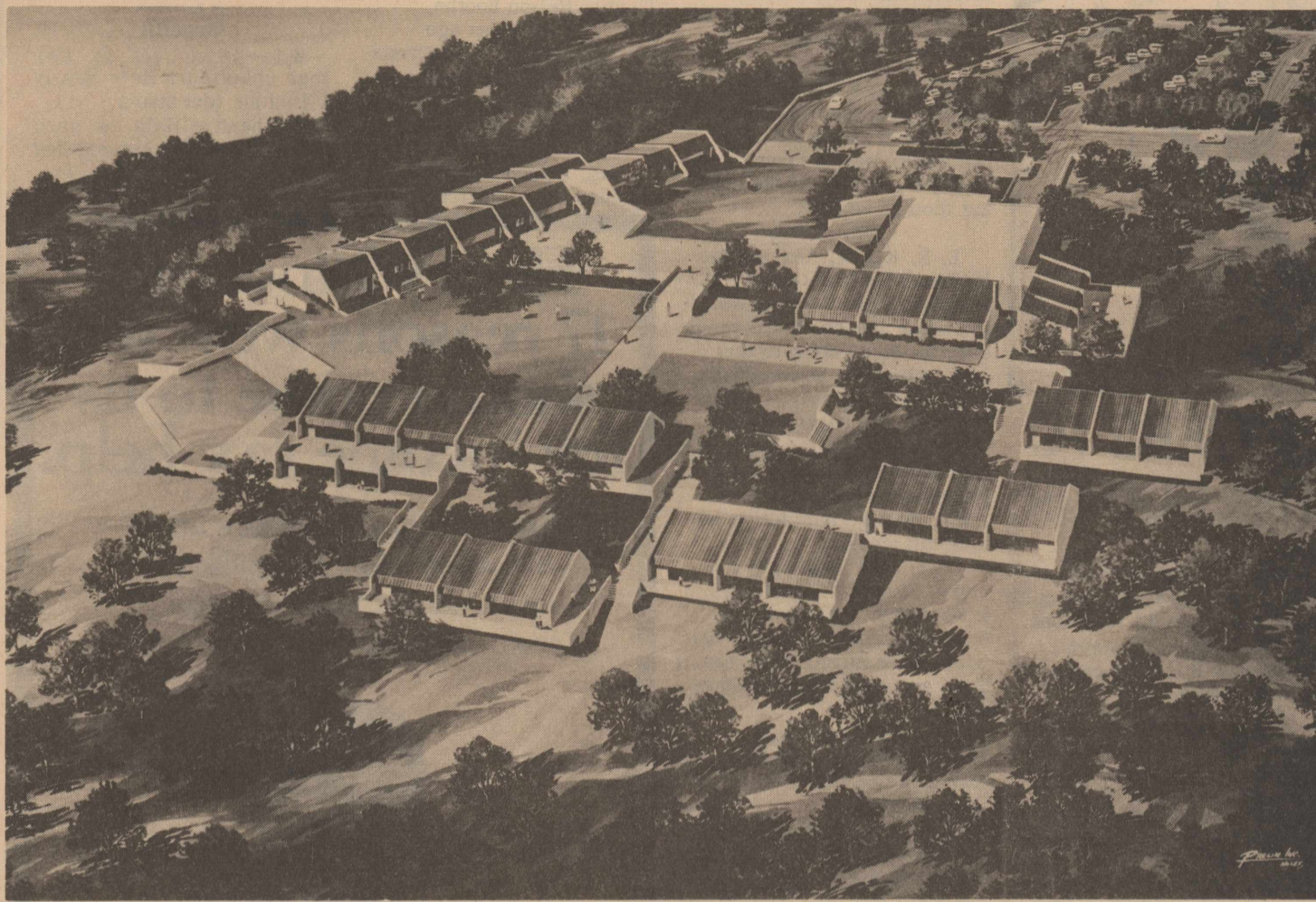
Bond Issue Passes In Light Voter Turnout

In a very light turn-out Saturday, Crockett County voters went to the polls to pass the half-million dollar bond issue for the nursing home wing by a margin of 411 for and 63 against.

A total of 474 votes were cast out of 2,098 eligible voters in the county, denoting a lack of interest generally on the part of the voting public.

The 40-bed wing will be built at the north end of the existing hospital building.

Results of the balloting by precinct were Precinct 1, 151 for, 10 against; Precinct 2, 60 for, 8 against; Precinct 3, 107 for, 27 against; Precinct 4, 61 for, 9 against; Powell Field, 6 for, 1 against; WTU Power Plant, 2 for, 4 against; Absentee box, 24 for, 4 against.

4-H Center Planned For State Of Texas

The Texas 4-H program has a goal to construct a State 4-H Center and to involve 250,000 young people in the '70's.

Well-trained, confident adult leadership is vital to youth programs. To enable the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to offer adequate leadership training and establish new programs, a permanent facility is needed, a State 4-H Center.

Such a 4-H center is on the drawing board for Texas. Presently about 20 states operate year-round 4-H Centers and others have numerous summer camps.

Leadership for the projected 4-H Center is being provided by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, but members need the help of all area citizens. "Put it all together with a 4-H Center" is the campaign theme.

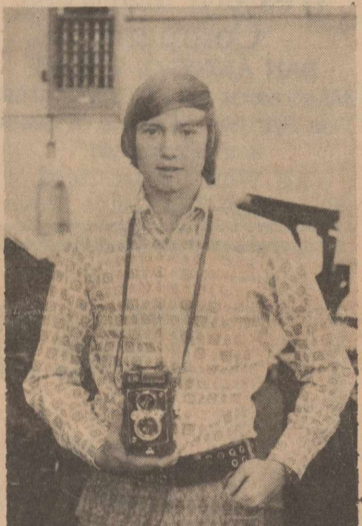
Second Pay Is Assured in Miller Field

Second pay, the Canyon, apparently has been assured in the Miller (Ellenburger Gas) Field of Crockett County with the flowing of the No. 1, W. M. Allison, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.6 million cubic feet of dry gas per day, for an unreported time at the rate of 200,000 cubic feet daily at McCulloch Oil Corp. of Texas and IDS Midland, No. 1-172 Chandler, in 172-0-GH & SA, 22 miles south of Ozona.

Flow was through an unreported choke and perforations at 5,592-747 feet. Testing continued.

Originally slated as a 7/8 mile south outpost to the five-well Miller field, it was drilled to 12,143 feet.

Funeral Service Here Monday For Sherman Taylor

Funeral services for Sherman Taylor, 68, were held Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the Ozona United Methodist Church with Rev. John Berkley, pastor, conducting services. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Taylor died Sunday morning in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo, where he was taken by ambulance after becoming ill here Friday. He died of an apparent heart attack.

He was born March 31, 1904 in Juno, the son of a pioneer ranching family in the area. He moved with his family to Ozona in 1910. He was a graduate of Ozona High School and an outstanding athlete. He is credited with making the first touchdown for the Ozona Lions.

He was married to Florence Smith in Ozona December, 15, 1925. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Ozona, and was a retired rancher and motel owner.

He and Mrs. Taylor were in the ranching business in Val Verde and Crockett counties, until they sold their ranch in 1947. He was in the Butane business for a short while before buying the Silver Spur Motel, which he and Mrs. Taylor operated for eighteen years. They sold the motel and retired several years ago.

Mr. Taylor was active in civic affairs and was a director on the Crockett County Water District Board at the time of his death.

Survivors include, his wife; and five sisters, Mrs. Vera Baker, Mrs. Ora Coates, Mrs. Modinia Coose, Mrs. Roy Parker and Mrs. Jesse Deaton, all of Ozona, plus numerous neices and nephews.

The Twenty-second Annual Ozona Relays will get underway Saturday morning with 22 schools entered in the three divisions.

Six of the schools entered have won one or more meets this year, so records should fall in many events provided the weather cooperates.

In class AA the Lions will be heavy favorites, having won every meet they have entered this year. They are also the defending champions.

Teams to watch will be Denver City, with two wins and a tie this year, and Stanton. Stanton tied Denver City last week at Odessa for the team championship.

According to Coach John Richey, the AA field is the strongest yet in the Ozona meet.

Rankin has the best shot at the Class A championship, with Iran, Marfa and Sanderson ready to snatch the title if the Red Devils falter.

Rocksprings seems to be the team to beat in Class B, on the strength of time and depth. Eden will have a shot at the top spot along with last year's champions Miles. Mertzson cannot be counted out, returning with Sandy Evans who finished second in the State Meet in Pole Vault last year.

LOOKING FORWARD TO RETIREMENT from the Ozona School Faculty are Mrs. Jewell Bailey and Roy Killingsworth. Both will retire at the end of this school year from Ozona Intermediate School where he is principal and she teaches fourth grade. Mrs. Bailey will retire with 28 years service in the Ozona public schools and Mr. Killingsworth retires with 20 years.

School Faculty Is Rehired, 2 Retirements and 2 Resignations

All faculty members in the Crockett County School System were rehired at a meeting of the school board last week.

The faculty remains the same for the fall term with the exception of two retirements and two resignations.

Roy Killingsworth and Mrs. Jewell Bailey will retire at the end of the school year, and Mrs. Susan Webb, high school girl's P. E. and basketball coach, resigned, along with Miss Linda Anthony, third grade teacher at Ozona Intermediate.

Killingsworth retires after 20 years in the Ozona school system. He came here to teach in Ozona Junior high school and became principal of that school 18 years ago.

For the past 44 years he has been principal of Ozona Intermediate School. His wife, Betty, retired from the system two years ago.

Ted W. Cotton will replace Killingsworth at Ozona Intermediate. He has been member of the faculty for eight years. He taught at the elementary level the first two years and has been teaching in junior high since.

Mrs. Bailey retires after 28 years in the local system. She came here to teach fourth grade and taught English at junior high for a year or so before going to South Elementary (now Ozona Primary) to teach fourth grade. She moved to Ozona Intermediate three years ago,

still teaching fourth grade. She and her husband, T. J., plan to travel after her retirement. He retired as West Texas Utilities manager here, seven years ago and has been associated with Trans Pecos Finance Co.

Principals will remain the same at the other three schools, Foy Moody, high school principal; Charles Womack, junior high school principal, and Claud Leath, Ozona Primary.

Tips For Gardeners
From the
Ozona Garden Club

Another reminder that many garden chores should be accomplished in March. In between the windy unpleasant days. Maybe you can get the necessary planting, transplanting and pruning finished.

Peonies are showing new growth, so if you banked them with dirt for the winter, be careful in pulling it away so not to break the buds off.

When growth is about six inches high, feed with bulb fertilizer for larger blooms. Protect if weather forecast predicts a freeze. Disbud for single specimens to exhibit at the flower show. Leave one bud to each stem.

Perennials should be divided before new growth is very far advanced. For early blooming, divide, replant and plant dahlia tubers now. For later blooms, do not plant until April or May which gives the best results.

If lily bulbs are to be planted this spring, get them in the ground at the earliest possible date. Bulbs for summer blooming that may be planted outdoors in March are Calla lilies, Gloriosas, crinum, tube roses, cannas, elephant ears, spider lily, montbretias, oxalis and tigredias. Gladioli may be planted now every ten days to have continuous blooming. They should bloom seventy days after planting.

Don't forget to watch roses etc. for early arriving insects. Wash off with strong water spray or use a dust.

If you can grow weeds, you can grow vegetables in good soil and the right preparation before sowing seed. If you don't have room for extensive gardening, border some of your flower beds with salad greens, onions, chives, radishes, beets and other varieties that are attractive.

Cut lawn grasses short to remove all the dead grass. Fertilize now and water well to have a pretty dark green turf. Use fertilizer at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

Many of the flowering trees and shrubs are very colorful now, so drive over our city to see the beauty. Also, check any that you would want to add to your landscape, and rush to get them planted for next spring blooming. It has been suggested that everyone plant another red bud.

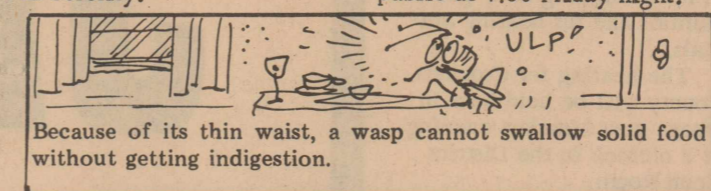

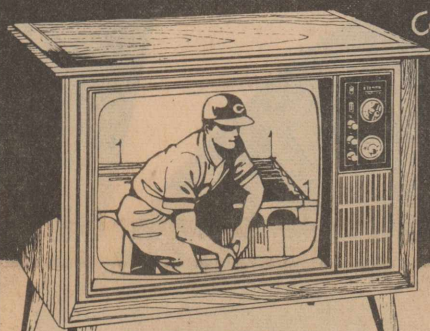

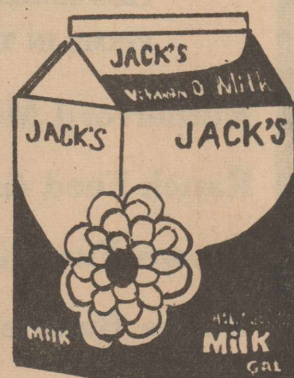
