

The Right To Die

The American Hospital Association, the nation's leading hospital association, recently adopted a bill of rights after a three-year study in which four consumer representatives participated.

Some of the major points of the declaration include the right of a patient to die gracefully, if he or she prefers that to temporary life-prolonging expedients, the right to complete medical information concerning one's condition, full explanation of bills, continuity of care, consultation prior to any experimentation, the right to privacy and to pertinent information about other institutions treating one's condition, etc.

The AHA expects its 7,000 member institutions to adopt the new twelve-point bill of rights though this might be optimistic in view of the fact that AHA will not withdraw accreditation from hospitals which do not.

While one would prefer that the bill of rights be made mandatory, it is nevertheless a major forward step in the direction of greater self-determination by, and consideration of, patients.

The Lobby Game, which centers around city halls, courthouses, state houses, and the nation's capitol, has become something of a fixture on the American scene. It's a part of the political system, the "right to petition," and serves a useful purpose if properly used. But we must all be on the lookout for those who have axes to grind which might not be in the public interest.

Here in Washington two of the most active lobby powerhouses are John Gardner's Common Cause and Ralph Nader's raider group. Both wellheeled and professional, they seem to engage in a sort of tug-of-war in massive drives for more members and more contributions. While the espouse worthy causes at times, as is true of most lobbyists, they must be judged on each

issue they embrace. Stewart Alsop, the noted writer, finds no difference on issues between Common Cause and the radical Americans for Democratic Action (ADA).



Television & History

In addition to serious questions prompted by commercial television's reporting of the news, its presentation of U.S. history, in specials, raises basic questions related to the national welfare and future interests of the nation.

Most Americans rightly oppose censorship, oppose bureaucratic interference in television documentaries; neverthe less, television's impact has become so great the output of the three major networks in the field of teaching history can, to a shocking extent, influence public opinion.

Should there be a national commission, composed of eminent historians, to advise producers on the true facts of history--so that Americans would not be taught incorrect history? Is there no way to protect the national interest from inaccurate or misleading or intentionally slanted documentaries, designed perhaps to control public opinion, all billed as objective history?

These are good questions; the answers to them do not come easily. Obviously, few wish to entrust three small groups of commercial network officials with the power to teach Americans history via saleable television programs. Professional historians and scholars in the schools and colleges are better entrusted with this task.

A Restoration

Now that President Nixon has achieved an honorable ceasefire in Vietnam, and the nation is spared further combat deaths and gets its prisoners back, the task of publicminded citizens and officials must be to restore the nation's unity of purpose and spirit, to restore order and respect for others and authority.

The long war has encouraged extremists and many others to undermine respect for the nation's government and leaders. Vociferous campaigns by some newspapers also encouraged extremists, who have compared President Nixon to Hitler. They have accused elected leaders of duplicity, deception, barbarity, etc. (Some of the same newspapers are now sermonizing that Vietnam has changed American life so that it will never again be the same.)

Vietnam has not permanently destroyed the nation's sense of unity or order. It has been a negative factor in the swell of disrespect for government and law. But now that it's over, the restoration of our country can begin.

Many protesting students in recent years, so morally indignant and self-righteous, faced possible service in a brutal war. They had several reasons to protest, one based on the law of self preservation. Others were more interested in the United States focusing its attention on the Middle East (where they are more willing for us to go to war). Others were communist-influenced or motivated, many simply naive and still others conscientiously and honorably opposed to all violence.

The primary cause of this disunity and disruption is now removed. Americans can now concentrate on building a better country, a better functioning society with liberty, justice and equal opportunity for all--and show the world that the American experience-and idea, is right and workable. From this effort every American citizen can enjoy advantages and blessings as great or greater than those offered citizens of any other country in the world.





Tips For Gardeners From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Another reminder that many ings. garden chores should be accomplished in March. In between the windy unpleasant days. Maybe you can get the necessary planting, transplanting and pruning finished.

Peonies are showing new growth, so if you banked them with dirt for the winter, be careful in pulling it away so not to break the buds off. When growth is about six inches high, feed with bulb fertilizer for larger blooms. Protect if weather forcast predicts a freeze. Disbud for single specimens to exhibit at the flower show. Leave one bud to each stem,

Perennials should be divided before new growth is very far advanced. For early blooming, divide, replant and plant dahlia tubers now. For later blooms, do not plant until April or May which gives the best results.

If lily bulbs are to be planted this spring, get them in the ground at the earliest possible date. Bulbs for summer blooming that may be planted outdoors in March are Calla lilies. Gloriosas, crinums, tube roses. cannas, elephant ears, spider lily, montbretias, oxalis and tigredias. Gladioli may be planted now every ten days to have continuous blooming. They should bloom seventy days after planting.

Don't forget to watch roses etc. for early arriving insects. Wash off with strong water spray or use a dust.

If you can grow weeds, you can grow vegetables in good soil and the right preparation before sowing seed. If you don't have room for extensive gardening, border some of your flower beds with salad greens, onions, chives, radishes, beets and other varieties that are attractive.

Cut lawn grasses short to remove all the dead grass. Fertilize now and water well to have a pretty dark green turf. empty. Use fertilizer at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per 1,000 square feet.


time is spent. How much goes for unimportant things, and how much for special things? Chances are unimportant things take more time. If so, you may want to make some changes.
